THIRTY-SECOND REPORT
OF THE
INDUSTRIAL REFUGE
AND
AGED WOMAN'S HOME.

The time has again come round when the friends and contributors to the Industrial Refuge and Aged Woman's Home look for a Report of the work done in the past twelve months; and in what follows we shall endeavor to give them, not only a true and faithful account of the results, but also try to bring to the minds of our readers a *vivid conception* of what the work done in these Homes *really is*, and the difficulties which at all times—but more especially at the present—surround it.

But first, let us record our devout thanks and praise to our Heavenly Father for all the many mercies vouchsafed to the inmates in both Homes, and in permitting the Managers to carry on the work and blessing *it* and *them* in the doing of it.

In a work of this kind—which, as far as the Industrial Refuge is concerned—is wholly confined to the effort of reclaiming the fallen and dissipated, and which has now been carried on for thirty-two years, comparatively little variety of detail can be given. The class who voluntarily seek the shelter of the Refuge are, many of them, old (*i. e.* over 40) and broken down in mind and body, and not a few very weak in intellect, and thus it can be easily understood that the results in restoring such to their proper place in the community as honest and industrious, as well as intelligent and helpful women, are comparatively small. Nevertheless this class must be cared for. Every woman who seeks the shelter, with the professed intention of leaving her degraded and often most wretched life, must be given a chance to do so, be she old and broken down or even embecile. Hence quite a number remain in the Refuge year after year, not being able—

though really reformed, and, some of them, respectable members of Protestant churches—to make a living for themselves outside: in many cases having neither friends nor relatives to help them to do so. But they do not live in the refuge as *idlers*, as the sum—\$1,412—earned by the inmates testifies, and towards which they did a very considerable share. Now, if the Refuge accomplished no other good than the caring for, and so protecting, this class from the vicious outside, at the same time surrounding them with religious and moral influences, it would be well worth the comparatively small sum received each year from the public. For let it be remembered we have never, with one exception, asked our friends for any assistance over and above the yearly subscription. But that is not all that is accomplished by this charity. Quite a number have so improved during their year of probation, as to be fitted for domestic service, and many in such places have done and are doing well, while others have been restored to relatives or friends. As we remarked in a former report lunacy is greatly on the increase in this class, and this year we were compelled to send one to the Asylum. Those who are not only weak-minded, but subject to epileptic fits, are also a numerous class, and it becomes a most serious question what is the true course to pursue in regard to them, and at the same time be just to those who are earnestly trying to reform. This class, in addition to being weak-minded, are often violent in temper, and abusive and profane in language. They are not insane, therefore cannot be sent to the Asylum. Though incurable, they are too irritable and abusive to be sent to the Home for Incurables. They have not committed any criminal act so cannot be sent to the Mercer or the Jail. What, then, is to be done with them? Most persons seem to think the Refuge is just the place for them. But think, for a moment, how this interferes with and hinders the real object of the Refuge, viz., to reform the fallen and restore them to their proper place in society. Their presence amongst those who are thus struggling back to a healthy state of mind is irritating in the extreme, and often places the Matron in a position of great difficulty and discouragement,—and also the Managers, who, recognizing the difficulty, yet find it a most serious matter to dismiss such an one, knowing that practically there is no place for her to go to, and feeling that it looks like sending her to destruction. Yet two of this class we were

obliged to dismiss, and that after having cared for them for several years and seen, to some extent, an improvement; but they were, at times, so insubordinate to the Matron and so irritating to the others, that it became absolutely necessary, for the sake of these others, to dismiss them for a time at least. None but those who, year after year, attend to this work among fallen and dissipated women, know how great the difficulties are, and in the majority of cases how discouraging. But thanks, very grateful thanks, be to Him who cared for such while on earth and thus left us His example. There is a bright side to this work, and every now and then the managers are cheered and strengthened for prosecuting the work with renewed hope, when they hear of one and another forsaking the downward path, and while earnestly striving to lead a new life expressing their gratitude for the kindness shewn them.

Regular morning and evening worship is held in the Refuge, also morning and evening service on Sabbath by laymen and others, and instruction in Bible truth in the afternoon of Sabbath by a band of devoted ladies and gentlemen, besides reading and prayer during the week by the visiting members and other friends who, though not on the committee, take a most lively interest in the Refuge. We pray God to greatly bless all such in their untiring efforts for the best interests of the inmates.

The number in the Refuge 30th September, 1884, was 30. Since then we have admitted 69: of these 25 have gone to situations; 30 left after a shorter or longer stay; 7 were sent to, or taken out, by relatives; 5 sent to Hospital; 3 dismissed; 1 to Lunatic Asylum; and 1 to Haven, leaving 27. The total collective number of days was 12,165, showing 36 inmates all the year round; and the expenditure \$3,368.65—this covers every expense.

Mrs. Spence still continues the faithful and trusted Matron, and the Managers duly recognize the arduous position she has to fill. Laundry work, plain sewing, knitting, quilting, and carpet-making, are the industries pursued by the inmates. We ask friends to patronize our workroom.

The new branch of our work, the Aged Woman's Home, which is completely separated from the Refuge, though under the same management, has been most successful, and has met a want long felt by many for a comfortable home for aged and respectable

women, who from old age and infirmities required to be cared for, and for whom it was difficult to find comfortable board at a reasonable price. The charge at the Home is five and six dollars a month, according to room and attention required. Several are placed there and paid for by the churches of which they were members. The payment for others is met by friends or relatives. We were most fortunate in securing a competent matron, whose close attention to the comfort of the inmates, as well as the best interests of the Home, has succeeded in making it, to a very considerable extent, self-supporting. The Home is not quite two year old and could only accommodate 14. But in August, finding it full and others applying for admission, we determined to raise the extension in the rear one story, which will give us six additional bedrooms.

During the year two of the inmates died, one 84 years old, the other 70, and both to a very large extent helpless. Very great gratitude has been expressed by their friends for the kindness and attention shown them, thus making their last days so much more comfortable than they were before they entered the Home. And while their bodily comforts are thus attended to, their spiritual needs are not neglected. One or two of them are able to attend church in the neighbourhood. There is a religious service once a week which has hitherto been most kindly attended to by the students of Wycliffe College. On Sabbath afternoon one or more Christian ladies read and pray with them: add to this the kindly attention and reading of the weekly visitors and other friends. There are 16 now in the Home, five of these are above 80 years of age, five above 70, and three above 67.

We send out this Report asking for it a careful consideration, for we are convinced much misconception exists as to the nature of the work, and the results to be expected from it.

Before closing we would record our most hearty thanks to all those ladies and gentlemen who so perseveringly and devotedly attend to the religious services in both Homes.

And also to Dr. Clapp and Dr. Brittain who have given their services so faithfully and freely, and that without fee or reward, but what comes to them in the blessed assurance "Inasmuch as ye did it to one of the least of these ye did it unto Me."

Also upon the success which has attended their efforts to establish and maintain an institution where friendless, aged women can find a comfortable home.
