

PROCEEDINGS OF THE SYNOD

THE DIOCESE OF RUPERT'S LAND.

The Diocesan Synod of Rupert's Land assembled on Wednesday, The Diocesan Synod of Rupert's Land assembled on wednesday, Nov. 23rd. The meeting was opened by the celebration of divine ser-vice at 10:30 a.m., in St. John's Cathedral. Morning prayer was read by Rev. S. P. Matheson and Rev. Canon Grisdale. The first lesson, M. Inkard by Rev. S. P. Matheson and Rev. Canon Grisdale. The first lesson, Isaiah, chapter 52, to the end of verse 10, was read by Rev. M. Jukes, Rev. O. Fortin. The Bishop read the ante-communion service, and the Venerable Archdeacon Cowley the epistle. The Bishop delivered the following address instead of a sermon :

REVEREND BRETHREN AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY :

When I addressed the last meeting of Synod I spoke of the rapid growth of the country, the changes this growth was bringing with it, and the deepening responsibility of our position. But the past year and the deepening responsibility of our position. But the past year has not only witnessed a greater progress still—a progress beyond our past experience—but a progress beyond all expectation. This progress has not been so much in the additional emiration, considerable as that has been, as in the rise in the value of land in Winnipeg and other that been as much in the result of the with which with the start is being as a start of the start has been as the start of the places, and in the growing appreciation with which the country is being regarded by ourselves and others.

The vast railway works that are being carried on have, no doubt, had most to do with these results, but other circumstances have helped. We have had an excellent harvest. We had in the past summer most enjoyable weather. The inconveniences felt by travellers during the wet seasons of the previous years have been unknown. Most visitors have been, therefore, enabled to see the land properly and have uni-formly carried away the most favorable impression. Winnipeg, by the close of next year, will be the centre of a network of railways. The great Pacific Railway, which is daily being carried further west over the critle parine's of this hand, is by the end of next year to be 600 miles yest of Winnipeg, and in another year at the base of the Rocky Moun-ins. The coming year will also see Winnipeg connected on the east the Lake Superior, by railway. Other railways are being constructed various directions. We still hear of colonies of Englishmen to the United States-but when we think of the order in this country-the unquestioned supremacy of the law equally with white and Indian-the observance of the Lord's Daythe efforts, entirely, I believe without, precedent, made by the various religious bodies to afford the opportunities of worship to the new settlements, the colleges and the educational system of the Province, I cannot but think that there will soon be an end of these colonies, and that our countrymen will be naturally drawn to our own hand.

During the past year there has been from immigration a large advance of settlement in Western and Southern Manitoba. From want of funds we have not been able hitherto to do much to meet the needs of our fellow churchmen that have come to these new settlements, but we have done what we could, and we have it now in our power to occupy several of the more important districts. In some cases there have been signs of impatience, and it has been even suggested that the have been signs of impatience, and it has been even suggested that the church is waiting for easier times before it takes its place by the side of the other bodies. There is but one reason for our absence. We would gladly share the burden of the day. We simply have not the missionary, because we cannot pay the missionary, but we have taken on ourselves responsibilities which no other body has been called to un-dertake, because the bodies they come from, and are in communion with, have done so. The excentive committee are at this Synod to propose our mission resulting the will involve usin animum reasonability, but new mission regulations that will involve us in serious responsibility, but it is a venture of faith which duty calls us to, and in which I trust, with God's blessing, we shall be sustained. I cannot but express the deep gratification which I feel at the kindness which our clergy and tudents of theology meet with wherever they hold service. They are heartily welcomed even by those outside of our com-munion. This has not arisen from any sinking of the distinctive peculiarities of the church, but is above all, I repore to think, to be peculiarities of the church, but is above and replete to think, to be attributed to its being manifest that the first desire and endeavor is to deliver the Master's message. This has ever been characteristic of the ministrations of this diocese and I hope will ever be so. We can-not do better than walk in the steps of him who said : "I deternot do better than walk in the steps of him who said: "I deter-mined not to know anything among you save Jesus Christ and him crucified." I desire briefly to lay before you what we have been able to do to supply the means of grace to the vast districts of country now being settled. In accordance with the wish expressed by the last Synod, on receiving, shortly after it broke up, an invita-tion to attend a meeting in January in Montreal, I attended that meeting. I met during that short visit the central committee ap-pointed by the Synod of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada. I stated that \$4,000 a year would meet this year our most pressing wants. They resolved to assess the Canadian Dioceses for that amount. I have been anxious to get them to act like the Presbyamount. I have been anxious to get them to act like the Presbyterian body in Canada, and in voting that amount assume the re-sponsibility and at once send the men. But this has not been done. A year has passed and we have received \$559.35, inclusive of \$359.35 directly voted to us by the Synol of Huron. I have, however, been authorized by our friend Mr. C. J. Brydges, who is their treasurer, to provide for two districts, which I consider equivalent to a pledge of \$1,200. However, the money in Canada is really in the hands of the Diocesan Synods, and, as in some cases they have only quite recently sanctioned the assessment of their Dioceses, it is probable that next year the result may be more satisfactory. At present then we have, in accordance with the pledge of Mr. Brydges, set apart two districts; one of these is Birtle, including Shoal Lake and Fort Ellice. This is partly taken from the huge district of some fifty townships or more that has been attended to for the last two or three years by Mr. Wilson. I cannot mention Mr_1 Wilson's name without giving expression to the deep sympathy that is felt for him by all his friends in the deep sorrow that has once again taken from him the joy and comfort of his home. I had hoped soon to have found Mr. Wilson full of spirits amids this abounding work on the occasion of the consecration or opening of the new church at Nelsonville. The district of Pembina Crossing will have 15 or 20 townships about half settled, and probably one-fifth of the population belongs to the discussion.

Holy Trinity Parish, Winnipeg, has through its reetor guaranteed our mission-fund at least \$800 a year, and expressed a wish for another district to be taken up to be more immediately connected with itself. The Mission Board has accordingly taken up a district, without any outside grant, to be associated with Holy Trinity. The district selected is to have the promising new town of Brandon as its centre, and will also contain at present Milford and Roundthwaite. Brandon did not exit as its months ago. Now it has over 100 buildings. There may be, within a year after the presence of a clergyman, three churches in this district. A very carnest layman, Mr. Fortier, who has my license, has been most kindly holding services every Sunday at Brandon. A clergyman from the diocese of Niagara has been anxious to spend some months in this country. He has been temporarily appointed to Brandon. The appointment of missionary has been offerd to a clergyman of experience in the diocese, but it is not yet certain whether he will accept it.

During the past year, owing to the sudden rise of land near Winnipeg, we have, by a sale of the largest portion of the glebe of St. James, obtained an endowment of \$19,000. At the same time the Ineumbent Mr. Pinkham felt it his duty to resign the parish on account of the rapidly growing demands on his time of the office of superintendant of Protestant schools, which he has held for a number of years with such credit and usefulness. I desire to express my sense of the highly honorable action of Mr. Pinkham in this matter. He has been very faithful as a parish priest—most punctual in his duties. He has also been always ready to help us in any exigency that has arisen. Thus he has more than once taken charge of Headingley with great advantage to the church. He will still be ready to help us in any way not interfering with his public duties, and as he will now be near us at our diocesan centre, I have no doubt he will yet be very useful to us. He has gone at present to Canada at he request of the Protestant section of the Board of Education to report on High School and Normal School education. He will make use of any opportunity that he pleasure of collating to St. James the Rev. The remaining £100 of the grant to St. James has been transferred to a new district at Turtle Mountain. There will be at least two centres—Whitewater and La Riviere's. The district will include at present 30 or 40 townships, is about one-tenth settled, and nearly half the settlers, I understand, are Churchmen. I have offered the appointment of missionary to the Rev. G. Aitkens, a graduate of Cambridge, of whom I have excellent accounts. Services will at present be held by Mr. H. M. Drummond, who has received my license as reader.

An endowment of \$9,000 has been obtained for Headingley by the sale of 180 acres of the glebe. This parish has also become vacant by the resignation of the Rev. Alfred Finkham, who, after a short residence in Headingley, to the regret of the parishioners, accepted the parish of Morris. Mr. Gardner was obliged to leave Morris by the illness of his wife. The duty was taken for a year by the Rev. H. D. Cooper, a clergyman of the diocese of Toronto, who was, I believe, very acceptable to the people. During his residence a very neat church was rerected, which I opened last summer. I have offered Headingley to a clergyman of considerable experience, who is well spoken of, the Rev. T. Aitkens, a graduate of St. John's College, Cambridge. He is father of the clergyman who was nominated to Turtle Mountain. Several of his sons are coming to this country as farmers. It is thought best for all the family to come.

I an advising the Colonial and Continental Church Society to give the grant which has been hitherto given to Headingley to a district of which Gladstone would be one centre. I have for years been endeavoring to obtain a grant for this district from that society, but from want of funds, they have not been able to do this; indeed, their grant to this district was reduced this year by £25. I am not, howevere, certain till enquiry be made, under what circumstances the church would now enter this district. With so many districts unprovided for, we must select those where we shall be met by substantial help. Failing Gladstone, there could be an important district formed partly out of the present Rapid City-district, with Minnedosa so one centre. I hope, however, in view of the great extent of country being settled, the society may arrange for our having another grant, so that we may have both districts. We have a celergyman in view as the missionary. The Rev. G. Turnbull, who resides in the Rapid City district, is to

The Rev. G. Turnbull, who resides in the Rapid City district, is to have an allowance for partial services. The Rev. W. A. Burman, of the Sioux reserve, may also be able to render some help to the settlements near his reserve. A new church has been opened at Rapid City. There is a large district containing Beaconsfield and other places where there are many earnest churchmen. There have been two readers in this district deserving of our best thanks. One of them, Mr. Dobbs, has been holding services regularly at four different centres and the other Mr. Ashbey at two. Several visits have been paid to the district by Mr. Jukes and Canon Grisdale. A grant in aid has been guaranteed to us through the Rev. W. S. Rainsford, from St. James' Cathedral, Toronto, and it has been assigned to this district. The appointment of a missionary is to be offered to a clergyman of the diocese of Huron.

On the recommendation of the Mission Board it has been thought necessary to join again in one mission the parishes of St. Ann's, Poplar Point, and St. Margaret's, High Bluff. I had hoped that these parishes

Under these circumstances the pressing needs of the new settlements compel us, in justice, to unite the two parishes. I trust the society will give the grant, thus unite the two parishes. Before closing this review of our posttion, I have to notice the great change that is about to take place in the position of the old missions of the C. M. S. in this Province. The society has been for some time anxious to retire from those missions. A scheme, at the request of the society, was prepared by their finance committee here and forwarded to the society. As we did not hear from the society before the meeting of the executive committee we were obliged to avoid loss of time to place the scheme committee, we were obliged to avoid loss of time to place the scheme before the members of the Synod as proposed. The C. M. S. has accepted the scheme as far as affects the resolutions to be brought beaccepted the scheme as an as an ects the resolutions to be brought be-fore the Synod, but it requires all its lands to be placed in one trust with the Bishop of Ruper's Land. The missions will receive from the proceeds up to £100 per annum, but the surplus above that, if any, will go to the benefit of the other Indian missions. The exact It any, will go to the benefit of the other indian missions. The exact terms of the trust are, however, not yet settled, as we have proposed a slight modification of what the society proposed. I think occasion should be taken by the Synod to express with no ordinary emphasis our sense of the infinite obligation which not only the church of this

land, but the land itself, lies under to the Church Missionary Society. Personally I desire to bear affectionate testimony to the kindness, the consideration, and the regard for the episcopi office that have marked the dealings of the society with myself. The successive honorary secretaries, Prebendary Venn, Prebendary Henry Wright, and now the Rev. Fred. Wigram, have been among our chief friends and helpers. I do not doubt the Synod will contaily accept the propositions to be laid before it, and I think that, if the country advances as it now promises, the land to be placed in my trust twill probably rise in a few years to a value that, if not allowing of any surplus such as is heing provided for, will at any rate free the church of any serious Jiability.

We have had to lament since our last meeting the death by a very sudden illness of one of the incumbents of these missions and one of the senior clergy of the Diocese, the Rev. Henry George. He was prevented from being with us last year by the detention of the train. His work had all his heart. He was much estemed by his brethren and friends. I felt his loss greatly for he was always singularly anxious to give his support to whatever I proposed for the good of the Diocese. The Portage has made astonishing progress during the past year. The filling up of the vacancy calls for my most anxious thought and care. Providentially a missionary, the Rev. T. H. Canham, on his way to a post of rare self-denial, among the Esquimaux of the Actic Circle at the mouth of the Mackenzie, arrived in the Province a week or two before the death of Mr. George. We knew of no way of his getting on to his mission except at an expense and an exposure and risk for an inexperienced traveller that we did not think it right to face and it had been settled that he should spend the winter in the Province in the Society's work, Mr. Canham has taken charge temporarily evol 'the Portage. But for this we should have been in great difficulties.

I had the pleasure in the autumn of opening a very neat church at Westbourne. The appointment of Mr. Alfred Cowley to St. James' has made St. Clements' vacant. The Ven. Archdeacon Cowley with his usual kindness and self-devotion at once stepped in to supply the services. I regretted very much the labor and exposure that this would entail at his distance from the parish—but I knew of no other way. However a clergyman arrived in the diocese a few weeks ago the Rev. Augustus Sullivan with satisfactory papers who had come here under medical advice. He has been temporarily placed at St. Clements'. Definite appointments for the Portage and St. Clements' cannot be made till the arrangements with the C. M. S. are completed.

There have been several other changes and appointments during the year. The Rev. J. Reader went from Touchwood Hills mission to Devon. He was succeeded by the Rev. Gilbert Cook from St. Peter's and he again by the Rev. B. McKenzie from Cumberland. This last mission is as soon as possible to be under a dergyman, but at present is in charge of a catechist. The Rev. J. Irvine has been appointed to Lac Seul mission, and we have gladly welcomed two young earnest clergymen, Mr. Leslie, and Mr. Stunden, as curates and assistants in Christ church and Holy Trinity parishes.

I may say that in the course of about six months, God willing, I hope to be mainly free for the pastoral and administrative work of the Diocese. Duties connected with the college and college school have hitherto tied me considerably. It has been difficult to have it otherwise, but in the past condition of traveling and the sparse nature of the settlement, I have not seen how I could do any other very effective work. That has been the main reason. There has been such a considerable amount realized by the sale of cathedral land that I am hopeful that by Easter it will be in my power to appoint a Dean. 1 am convinced that this will be greatly for the advantage of the cathedral itself, while it will do more than almost any single thing to set me free for the general work of the diocese. Years hence, when the country has grown and students have become numerous, and every department of work will have enough labor in its own sphere, other proment of work will have enough labor in its own sphere, other pro-fessorships will properly go to the best scholars to be got in the special branch of study, but this position will be appropriately filled by one that has proved his ability in parish work, and shown himself fitted to be a guide in that work. But my greater freedom for the pastoral work of the diocese will not make less necessary the ap-pointment of a secretary. The office of a Bishop is a spiritual office for spiritual gifts. It is not desirable that he should be brought into contact, with the necuniary arrangements of narishes. Canon into contact with the pecuniary arrangements of parishes. Canon Grisdale, who has kindly been acting as secretary for some time, finds himself unable to continue in the office. The time is coming when we shall require a clergyman whose time can be wholly de-voted to this and general mission visitation. But we have not yet the means. I believe Mr. Pinkham, who will be resident near me, which is very necessary at the present time in this country, is willing to act as secretary if Canon Grisdale continues to be treasurer,

and I think this arrangement will be the best for us for the present. St. John's College has been progressing very satisfactorily St. John's Conege has been progressing very satisfactority, but we are laboring in many ways in our present build-ings under disadvantages. This will be more ap-parent when the fine buildings that have been erected for the other colleges are occupied. We have also to act without the other colleges are occupied. delay to prevent the large grant of £1,000 from the Society for Pro-moting Christian Knowledge to lapse. Accordingly we have begun an effort to raise the means for a wing of a new college. We have an entort to raise the means for a wing of a new college. We have obtained the promise of nearly \$20,000 from friends in Winnipeg and the immediate neighborhood. I think for such a wing as we now require we should have \$40,000 (£8,000). We, therefore, still need \$15,000. But the new buildings will at the present cost of living in this country cause a considerable addition to our expenses. We also need greatly at least two tutors—whom I propose to call Fellows—to take charge of the general instruction in acts. Here accounts the second s hat have charge of the general instruction in arts, more especially in mathematics and natural science. The theological professors at present supply the want, but the sooner we can get further help it

will be a great advantage-and the day is hastening on when it will be an absolute necessity. There are also encumbrances on the old buildings. I have been asked by my commissiary, Dr. Forbes, and by friends in England to visit England, to push the interests of the diocese at this crisis, but I cannot see my way. Canon Grisdale has felt rather wearied by his multifarious duties, and is desirous of hav-ing some rest and change. I think of his having leave of absence and of our committing to him this work. I dare say if I were to go myself I might have some advantage as Bishop, though there are some who resent the presence of a Bishop in England for his diocese. But I am sure Canon Grisdale will go with our fullest confidence.

However strong the case it is not very easy amid the conflicting claims of the day to get a hearing. But the help is all important for us. There are hundreds of Chuchmen in England who could give us all we ask—for it is not much—only about £10,000—and it is of such vital importance that we should have all care and difficulty about the college removed from us, so as to give our undivided effort to the mission work. Besides the college itself is of all importance. The men we train ourselves are those in general most fitted for our work .

And now I wish in conclusion to consider with you how we are to meet the ever-growing needs of the incoming population.

First, we must do the best we can with our own resources.

The executive committee are bringing forward a new body of mission regulations. We feel the great financial responsibility the church is being asked to undertake, but we think our experience shows it to

be necessary. These regulations will enable us far more satisfactorily to en-

gage clergymen. They will make it more easy for the missionaries to encourage their people in performing their duty in giving. They will greatly facilitate the working of the scheme by which

we hope to get every member of the church to be a contributor to our mission funds.

Next a canon is to be presented to you for the creation and working of a ruridecanal organization. Dr. Ryle, the Bishop of Liverpool, ing of a furthermator of particular of particular of the machinery he had found in the diocese, and of its service, spoke especially of the advantages from rural deans and ruridecanal conferances. Some 3,000 laymen are there at work, incorporated into a regular body, who are expected to meet from time to time, as circumstances allow, for a united participation of the Holy Communion. 

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THE CONSTITUTION OF THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF ST. RUPERT'S LAND.

Ist. The Synod shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese; of the dergy of the same licensed to the Cure of souls, or holding office in any College or school under the jurisdiction of the Bishop, and not underecclesiastical censure; and of Lay-Delegates as hereinafter provided. Clergymen who have been members of the Synod, and who continue to hold the Bishop's Dense, though they may cease to have the Cure of souls or to hold any other office, may continue to attend the meetings of the Synod and to vote hereat.

2nd. The Lay-Delegates shall be male communicants of at least one year's standing—members of the congregation which they represent, and of the full age of twenty-one years. They shall be elected during Easter week, or if necessary afterwards, at a public meeting specially called for that purpose during Divine Service on the preceding Sunday. The Voters shall consist of Male Communicants of the parish of at least six months' standing, and a majority of those present shall determine the choice, but no person shall wote for the Delegate or Delegates or more than one congregation. The Incumbent or his Assistant shall preside at the meeting, and in their absence the meeting shall elect a Chairman from their own number.

3rd. The Incumbent or Chairman shall furnish each Delegate with a Certificate as follows :

Parish or Mission of.....Church

No. of Registered Communicants.....

(Signed).....Chairman.

That one Clergyman and one Layman shall be appointed by the Synod to examine the certificates and report on them.

4th. Each congregation recognized by the Bishop, duly organized by the election of Church Wardens and Vestrymen, and having at least six Registered Communicants, shall be entitled to send one Delegate; but two delegates shall be sent if the number of Registered Communicants is over forty -- and three if it is over one hundred; but no Congregation shall send more than three Delegates.

5th. In case of the death or resignation of a Lay-Delegate, or his ceasing to be a member of the congregation by removal from the neighborhood, or from any other cause, the Incumbent shall within one month after such vacancy proceed to a new Election at a meeting of which notice shall have been given the previous Sunday during Divine Service.

6th. The Synod shall meet annually unless otherwise ordered by the Bishop, and the time and place of meeting shall be fixed by the Bishop, who shall also adjourn the Synod as the shall see fit.

Bishop, who shall also adjourn the Synod as he shall see fit. 7th. A Quorum of the Synod shall consist of at least one fourth of the Clergy of the Diocese and one fourth of the Lay Delegates.

APPENDIX.

8th. No resolution of the Synod shall pass into a Law without the concurrence of the Bishop and a majority of the Clergy and Laity present the votes of the Clergy and Laity to be taken collectively unless a vote by Orders is demanded by any member of the Synod before the question is put from the chair, when a majority of each order will be necessary to affirm the resolution.

9th. That a committee be appointed to be called the Executive Committee, to consist of the Bishop, or his Commissary, as President, the Dean, whenever such a dignitary shall be appointed, and the Arch-deacons as Vice Presidents, and three Clergymen and five Lay Delegates; and that three in addition to the President be a quorum ; that the Executive Committee shall take the management of the various Diocesan Funds under the direction of the Synod, carry out the decisions of that Body, prepare business for the annual meeting of the Synod, and at such annual meeting give in a report of its proceedings.

10th. No alteration in the Constitution shall take place unless the proposition has been first sent to the Executive Committee for consideration, approved at the meeting of the Synod by the Bishop and a majority of two-thirds of each Order present, voting separately, and afterwards confirmed by the Bishop and a like majority of each Order at the following meeting of Synod.

CANONS.

1-of submission of clergy to the provincial and diocesan synod.

That before ordination, licensing, to a cure of souls, instituting or collating to any benefice or dignity, the Bishop shall require the candidate to make the following subscription and declaration of assent

I, A. B., do willingly subscribe to and declare that I assent to and abide by the Constitution and Canons which have been or shall be from time to time passed by the Provincial Synod or the Synod of the Diocese of Rupert's Land.

II-OF SUBSCRIPTION, ETC., BY THE CLERGY.

Before ordination, licensing to a cure of souls, institution or collation to any benefice or dignity, each candidate, in addition to subscribing as already appointed, the canon of submission to the Provincial and Diocesan Synods, shall also, in the presence of the Bishop who is officiating, make and subscribe the following :

1. The declaration of assent.

The oath of allegiance.
 The oath of canonical obedience.

"The declaration against Simony shall be made and subscribed before institution to a benefice. Provided that the Bishop may, if he see cause, allow a citizen of the United States to take the oath of allegiance with the following addition : "While holding any ecclesiastical office or appointment in the Diocese of Rupert's Land."

-ON THE CREATION OF DIGNITARIES AND OFFICIALS.

That the Bishop may form Rural Deaneries and nominate clergymen as Rural Deans, and may also, at his pleasure, remove the same; that the Bishop shall have such right to appoint Chaplains as is usual for Bishops, and also to appoint or remove any of the following Officials:---Vicar-General, Commissaries, General or Special, Chancellor, Registrar, or any others mentioned in the Letters Patent, founding the See of Rupert's Land.

IV-ON ARCHDEACONS.

Archdeacons shall be collated by the Bishop after the usual oaths and declarations required on collation to any benefice or dignity by the canon of "subscriptions, etc., by the clergy," and shall be inducted and installed by the Dean in the cathedral and under the mandate of the Bishop or his commissary

Their duty shall be so faithfully, in all ways, to aid the Bishop in the superintendence of the diocese, and the promotion of the glory of God and the interests of the church, as to justify the ancient description of the Archdeacon, as "Oculus Episcopi."

Their special duty shall be :

(a) To receive yearly the reports of the Rural Deans, to enter the same in a book, and to send a copy of the reports within two months of Easter Sunday to the Bishop with any suggestions, to make any suggestions to the Rural Deans for themselves or their Ruride-canal Chapters as far as practicable.
(b) To visit the parishes and missions in each Rural Deanery so the bish of Rural Deanery can be theme and the formal deanery so

as to visit each Rural Deanery once in three years, and to formally seek information on the various matters in (b) of the duties of Rural

Deams and to report from time to time as far as may seem advisable. (c) To call meetings of the Rural Deams for consultation, and also on receiving the approval of the Bishop a meeting of the Ruridecanal meetings of his Archdeaconry, and if he thinks it advisable to deliver a character on paints of interest in reference to narcochial or church a charge on points of interest in reference to parochial or church work or property, but such charge shall not enter into questions of doctrine

(d) In many places where the Bishop cannot institute and induct in face of the congregation on receiving the Bishop's mandate to either personally or by mandate to some clergyman in priest's orders, induct a clergyman appointed to an incumbency in face of the con-gregation, such clergyman having, as must be stated in the mandate of the Bishop, been already instituted or collated by the Bishop or his commissary, and such form of induction shall be used as the Bishop shall appoint.

 (e) To assist the Bishop in any enquiry he may make, confidentially if necessary, to aid the Raral Deans by advice, to visit any parish or mission or Rural Deanery, if judged necessary or helpfull in the interests of the church, to aid the Mission Board by being convener of any commission or otherwise.

V-ON RURAL DEANS.

It shall be the duty of the Rural Dean :

(a) To call meetings of the Ruridecanal Chapter, quarterly, or oftener, and also Ruridecanal meetings at such times, as to himself and the Ruridecanal Chapter may seem advisable and to preside at the same

(b) To visit every parish or mission in his Deanery, at least once a year, to confer with the clergy, churchwardens, and other officers of the church, and to inspect churches, churchyards, books, ornaments, utensils, parsonages, and other buildings belonging thereto, and note all additions, decays and delapidations; to ascertain how far buildings being and a buildings below the section of the are insured and what amount of debt may lie upon any of them, and what steps are being taken for its liquidation; to inquire into the value and condition of any endowments or other property; to learn what public services are performed within each parish or mission, what is the average attendance at; and whether the families are being care-fully and regularly visited and how often the Holy Communion is administered, and the average attendance, and the whole number of Communicants within the Cure ; how often, and when the sacrament of Baptism is administered, with the number of adults and infants baptized during the year ; what Sunday Schools are in operation within each parish or mission, and the general condition of the same as to scholars, teachers, librarians, etc., and to furnish other statistical information desired by the Bishop or the Synod ; to keep a book containing a record of the above for every parish or mission, and to send yearly, within four weeks after Easter, a report respecting the above matters to the Archdeacon in whose archdeaconry his rural deanery lies for the ecclesiastical year ending with Easter Sunday inclusive.

(c) To carry out and superintend, with such assistance as may be necessary, the missionary arrangements of the Ruridecanal Chapter and communicate for the Chapter with the Bishop, Archdeacon and Mission Board, to visit parishes or missions, if needful, to arrange for raising the assessment of the Synod, or for an addition to the salary of the incumbent or missionary ; and when there is difficulty, to endeavor to ascertain the cause, and if necessary communicate with the Archdeacon, Bishop or Mission Board.

(d) To give advice to the Bishop and Archdeacon when so requested on special matters, if necessary in confidence.

(e) To inform the Bishop and Archdeacon, if necessary, in confidence, of any reports, conduct or proceedings affecting either any of the clergy or church wotkers individually or the church.

VI-ON RURIDECANAL CHAPTERS.

On the determining of the bounds of a Rural Deanery by the Bishop the clergy within it holding the license of the Bishop shall form the Ruridecanal Chapter.

The Bishop may from time to time alter the limits of a Rural Deanery.

The Cathedral of St. John's shall form a separate Deanery under its Dean and may have attached to it as a Deanery such parishes or missions as are worked by the Cathedral or Cathedral Mission as the

Bishop may think proper. The Chapter shall be called by the Rural Dean at his pleasure or at the written request of a majority of the members of the Chapter. It shall be the duty of the Chapter :

(a) To consider questions submitted to it by the Bishop;
(b) To consult generally for the spiritual benefit of the Rural Deanery and for the interests of the Church in it ; (c) To have all new settlements within its limits visited, and in-

to see to the formation of Sunday School associations from time to time, in any district where there is no missionary, and to report time to time, in any district where there is no missionary, and to report through the rural dean to the mission board on all such subjects .

(d) To consider questions submitted by the Rural Dean, and to arrange for assisting him in any visits to the parishes or missions in connection with Synod assessments or other object. (e) To consider what would be of advantage to be brought before

a Ruridecanal meeting ;

(f) To assist in carrying out the wishes of the Synod, and especially in securing throughout the Rural Deanery the efficient working of the arrangements for the Mission Fund ;

(g) To form a Ruridecanal Library for books of reference for the clergy.

VII-ON RURIDECANAL MEETINGS.

In any Rural Deanery the following persons may be called together by the Rural Dean with the Ruridecanal Chapter, and shall form a body called the Ruridecanal Meeting

All clergy in the Rural Deanery, holding the license of the bishop, the church wardens, and the lay representatives of any parish or mis-sion within the Rural Deanery, all lay reders holding the license of the bishop, and residing or officiating regularly in any parish or mis-sion in the Rural Deanery : and any other clergy or laity specially in-vited before such meeting, by a vote of the Rurdecanal Chapter. The Ruridecanal Meeting shall be presided over by the Rural Dean or in the shares by one of the glarge of the glarged Deaneery.

Dean, or in his absence by one of the clergy of the Rural Deanery elected by the meeting

Their duty shall be to consider any questions submitted to them by the Bishop, Archdeacon, Mission Board, or Ruridecanal Chapter; or any questions proposed by any of themselves and generally to con-sult for the spiritual welfare of the district or the interests of the Church.

The Rural Dean shall have the power of suspending or dissolving the meeting at his pleasure.

There may be combined meetings of the Ruridecanal meetings in an Archdeaconry at the request of the Bishop or Archdeacon, with the approval of the Bishop of the Diocese.

VIII-OF LAY READERS.

Under the circumstances of the Diocese with a scattered population in large Parishies and Missions, it is very desirable that Lay Readers should be more generally employed than is now the case ; such Lay Readers shall be recommended to the Bishop by at least two licensed clergymen shall be recommended to the bishop by at least two necessed dergyment of the Diocese, and have either a general license for the Diocese or a special license for a particular Parish or Mission. They shall not be employed in any Parish or Mission but at the request or with the con-sent of the Incumbent of said Parish or Mission, and they shall be entirely under his control and direction, and shall be removed at his request ; they may be set apart for the service at such place and with such service as the Bishop may appoint.

OFFICE OF LAY READER.

The office of lay reader shall be to read the word of God in the congregation, and in the absence or illness of the clergyman to read in the pregation, and in the absence or inness of the dergyman to read in the congregation any appointed portions of the Morning and Evening Prayer, not including the absolution or any part of the communion ser-vice, and such sermons as he shall be duly authorized to use; or to preach or expound the word; if he be specially licensed thereto by the Bishop; and generally to aid in Parochial and Mission work and perform such functions as it is competent for a Lay member of the Church

to perform, and as he shall be directed to discharge, under the authority of the Bishop. When officiating he may wear the surplice.

IX-ON PAROCHIAL ORGANIZATION.

1. The Cathedral as the church of the Diocese having the seat of the Bishop shall, for the purposes of this Canon except as regards its Parochial boundaries. be considered Extra-Parochial and be governed by its own statutes.

2. Any District where services are performed and a congregation organized according to clause four of the Constitution of the Synod may be erected by the Bishop into a parish having defined limits, with a clergyman in charge, who shall be called the incumbent, and may be collated or instituted and inducted with such forms as may be enacted by the Synod, or till such forms be enacted, as the Bishop may appoint. But such District shall not include any part of an existing parish without the consent of the incumbent and the majority of the vestry of such existing parish: provided that if such consent be re-fused the Bishop may refer the matter to the Executive Committee, and the Executive Committee shall on full consideration of the case report to the Bishop, who may then carry out the division of the ex-isting parish if the Executive Committee report in favor of that measure, but not otherwise.

3. The Bishop shall appoint a Commission to determine the boundaries of the existing parishes as defined by the late or the present Bishop of Rupert's Land, or where there has been no such definition, Bishop of Rupert's Land, or where there has been no suff definitions by custom; and the boundaries of such parish; but if the Bishop think the Bishop, be the boundaries of such parish; but if the Bishop think it advisable he may remit any part of the report to the Executive Com-mittee, whose decision respecting the boundaries shall be final; and the hundrain of concidence shall be recorded in a book to be the boundaries of parishes so defined shall be recorded in a book to be kept in the Diocesan Registry.

4. The Bishop may at any time, if he think it advisable, change the boundaries of a parish or parishes on the petition of the incumbent and vestry of the parish or parishes interested.

5. After the limits of a parish have been canonically defined, no clergymen, though holding the license of the Bishop, shall have public prayer, or service, or administer the sacraments within such limits. whether according to the prescribed order of the church or not, without Whether according to the presented order of the entries of not, without the consent of the incumbent or clergyman in charge of such prish; provided that this shall not prevent any clergyman from attending or taking part in any public meeting though for a religious object. Provided also, that a clergyman may visit ministerially, with private administration of the sacraments, if necessary, any person or family

in the habit of attending his ministrations.

Provided also, that any clergyman shall be at liberty to give spiritual comfort and counsel to any one seeking for it, by personal visit, if he think it desirable.

Provided also, that this shall not prevent the Bishop licensing a clergyman to officiate as chaplain in any hospital, jail, penitentiary, or other public institution or school within any parish, or for those em-ployed on a railway, or by any employer of labor. 6. Whenever a parish shall become entirely self-supporting, it shall

be called a Rectory.

DUTIES OF CHURCHWARDENS.

17. It shall be the duty of the Churchwardens and they are hereby empowered :

a. To see that Divine service is decently and regulary performed; to have, jointly with the Incumbent, custody of all monies belonging to the Parish; to procure all things requisite for Divine service, and for the supply and safe custody of Parochial Records; to have the joint dis-posal with the Incumbent of all offertories, except on days when collections are ordered by the Synod, when they shall be assigned as-directed by the Synod. directed by the Synod.

In the case of any disgreement between the church-wardens and the Incumbent respecting the disposal of the offeriories, there shall be an appeal to the Bishop of Rupert's Land as Ordinary, who shall finally decide the question.

b. To collect the offertories and have them entered in a book kept for the purpose; to keep the parochial accounts, and to pay all sums received for the specified purposes.

c. To attend on the visitation of the Bishop or his Commissary or the Archdeacon, whenever eited, and in case of the death of the Minister or his inability through sickness to perform his duties, to report the same to the Bishop.

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d. To keep the fabric of the Church and its appurtenances, in repair and insured, subject to the direction of the Bishop or Archdeacon.

e. To maintain good, order and quiet in and about the Church or place of worship, and in the adjoining roads and public places, during Divine Worship ; and, if necessary, prosecute all offences against that good order and quiet.

f. To take care as far as possible that the Parishioners are accommodated in the church.

g. To give attention to the Parsonage and grounds during any vacancy of the cure, communicating when advisable with the trustee or trustees of the property.

DUTIES OF VESTRYMEN.

18. It shall be the duty of Vestrymen and they are hereby empowered :-

a. To assist the Churchwardens in the collection of offertories and contributions for general or special purposes; and in taking care, as far as in them lies, that the clergyman's stipend is regularly paid, according to Diocesan regulation.

b. To see that the yearly accounts, duly audited, are laid before b. To see that the yearly accounts any authent, its an other the Parcehial meeting, and that a copy of the audited accounts are transmitted to the Secretary of the Synod.
 c. In Vestry meeting to deal with all matters committed to them by the Synod or other authority, to consider and determine upon what-

ever may be remitted to them by the Minister or Churchwardens, and by resolution to express their wishes on any subject to the Minister or Churchwardens.

19. The Parishioners are to be duly summoned for consultation and co-operation when any large outlay of money is proposed, or when means must be raised to meet such an outlay.

20. After the accounts have been audited, any balance in hand must be handed over to the new Churchwardens, together with the church goods, inventory and terrier. 21. The following books are to be kept by the Parish :-

a. A book for entering the minutes and resolutions of all parish and Vestry meetings. b. A book for the parish accounts.

c. A book for entering the amount of alms and collections in church.

d. A book for entering all services that take place in church with the name of the officiating clergyman, if not one of the clergy of the

parish signed by himself if possible. e. A register of the names of church members resident in the parish, distinguishing those who have signed the declaration of church membership, and those who are communicants.

22. An inventory shall be kept of all church goods belonging to the parish and a terrier of the lands.

PAROCHIAL AND VESTRY MEETINGS.

23. In every parish there shall be a meeting of the parishioners on Easter Monday or as soon as possible afterwards, for the purpose of Easter Anonday or as soon as possible antervarias, for the purpose of receiving and passing the year's accounts and of appointing and electing Churchwardens and Vestrymen. 24. The Incumbent shall be the convener of all parish or vestry meetings; if there be no dergyman, the Churchwarden or Church-

29. Similar notice shall also be given by the officiating clergyman, in the church, on a Sunday before the meeting. 30. At a meeting of the parishioners duly convened, the votes of those only who are registered shall be recorded, and their decision shall bind those who are absent.

31. The clergyman is ex-officio chairman of all Parish or Vestry meetings. If the Cure be vacant; or if it be not vacant, but if the Incumbent be absent, the Minister's Churchwarden shall be chairman.

32. The chairman has the usual powers appertaining to the chair-man of any public meeting. It is his duty to remain in the chair until the business is concluded, or the meeting adjourned ; to keep the meeting when necessary to the specified purpose of its assembling, and to decide all questions of order. He shall have the same right of voting as if not in the chair, and an equality of votes shall be considered as

negativing a proposition. 33. The right of adjournment is not in the Incumbent or any other person, or chairman, nor in the churchwardens, nor Vestry, but in the whole assembly ; and the question of adjournment must be decided by a majority of votes.

34. Minutes of proceedings and resolutions of every parish or vestry meeting shall be correctly entered in a book, and unless the Vesty including shall be correctly entered in a book, and unless the minutes were read and approved at the close of the preceding meeting the first business of every meeting shall be the reading, passing, and signing by the chairman, of such minutes of the preceding meeting. 35. Every parish or vestry meeting shall be opened with prayer. 36. Incumbent in this canon shall include curate in charge.

CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESAN MISSION BOARD.

1. The Mission Board shall have the administration of the Home Mission Fund and the Indian Mission Fund and the care of the Mission work within the Diocese.

2. The Mission Board shall consist of the members of the executive 2. The mission board shall consist of the memoers of the executive committee, and ten additional members elected as follows :-- A list shall be prepared by the secretary of the Synod, after Easter, containing all who have given two dollars or upwards to the Home or Indian Mission Fund, since the previous Easter. Every such donor shall have a right to vote for ten or fewer gentlemen on the list. Every donor of five dol-lars shall have two votes for each of ten or fewer, and every additional

five dollars shall give in like manner an additional vote. In case of an equality of votes the other members of the board shall decide who shall equaity of votes the other members of the board shall decide who shall be declared elected. If from any cause there should occur a vacancy in the number of the elected members, the Mission Board shall fill his place by themselves electing another of the qualified subscribers. The Mission Board shall arrange from time to time, how the list may be most conveniently and economically brought before the subscribers and the voting taken. The old members of the Mission Board shall retain office till their successors are elected. 3. The Bishop or his Commissary shall be President of the Mission Board and preside at its meetings.

Board and preside at its meetings. In their absence the Senior Arch-deacon present shall preside. In the absence of any Dignitary the Mission Board shall elect a chairman.

4. Seven members shall be necessary for a quorum for the trans-

action of business. 5. Meetings of the Board may be called by the President or Secre-tary, and the Secretary shall call a meeting when requested to do so, in writing, by three members of the Board.

GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR THE MISSION BOARD.

I. The mission board may assist a mission or parish by guaranteeing to its incumbent or missionary a sum up to \$800 a year. The mission board shall, it giving such guarantee, carefully consider the circumstances of the parish or mission, and assess the parish or mission for such amount as the board consider it is able to pay, but in no case, except for the most urgent reasons for a less sum than \$200. Such grant in the first instance shall be for three years, but after that shall be reconsidered yearly. In case of the failure of the parish or mission to furnish its assessment for two years, the mission board, if not satisfied with the cause, shall name one or more persons to form a com-mittee, with the archdeacon and rural dean, if there is a rural dean, to visit the parish or mission, the archdeacon being, if possible, convener and chairman of the commission ; or, failing this, a clergyman named by the mission board, and on receiving its report the mission board is all deal with the case, suspending its grant and reporting to the bishop for the withdrawal of a resident dergyman, or for taking such

basep for the withdrawal of a resident clergyman, or for taking such other steps as he may judge necessary. 2. The Mission Board may in special cases grant \$900 for one year. It may also make a grant for outfit or towards travelling ex-penses either to a mission of in a mission. It may also, but only unier very exceptional circumstances, make a grant to the Ruride-canal Chapter towards expenses in visiting settlements, but these chap-ters must ordinarily endeavor to meet these expenses from the gifts of those ministered to, or by a special effort, in their own Rural Deapary.

3. In considering the circumstances of a parish or mission in making the assessment the board shall be at liberty to consider the advisability in the interests of the church for the clergymen having \$900 or more in that parish or mission, and therefore, so determine the assessment as to leave it in their opinion in the power of the people to augment by \$100 or more the salary of the clergyman.

Whereas it is expedient that there should be obtained from time to time a full accurate statistical view of the state of the Church in this Diocese, it is hereby ordered that every Minister having the care of souls shall immediately after Easter in each year prepare, and cause to sous shar interenery after faster in each year prepare and particular back to be delivered to the Secretary of the Synod, a statistical Parochial Report stating the number of families and individuals belonging to the Church, of communicants, and of children attending day or Sunday schools or under catechetical instruction in his Parish or Mission for the time being and the number of persons who have been baptized or confirmed, and of marriages and burials that have taken place, together with the amount of contributions for Church or other objects that have been made during the year ending the Easter previous, and so on ; and it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Synod to condense and combine in one report the aforesaid particulars in the Parochial Reports, and to print the same together with such other information as the Bishop or the executive committe of the Synod may from time to time furnish as an Appendix to the Synod Report, and copies thereof shall be circulated by him under the sanction of the Bishop.

4. For the present the Synod recomends the continuation of the hymn book of the Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge, at present in general use in the Diocese.

5. The Synod recommends the formation in every parish or mission , of a board, to be called the Parochial Mission Board, of which the composition and duties shall be as follows : That at Easter, after the vestry has been elected, the donors of one dollar and upwards towards the clergyman's income shall elect six of their number to act along with the vestry in communicating with the Diocesan Mission Board, and pro-

PROGEEDINGS FOR THE B. D. DEGREE.

There are two examinations for the Ordinary B. D. Degree. first of these is open to all Matriculated Theological Students of St. John's College who have passed the Previous Examination of the University of Manitoba in Latin, Greek and Mathematics, and have been matriculated as Theological Students for at least one year of the College course, or two terms. The second examination is open to all such students who have passed the First Examination, after an interval of one year from passing such examination.

The subjects of the first examination for May, 1882, are : (a.) Greek New Testament, one of the Gospels with Alford's notes and prolegomena, the Acts of the Apostles ; (b.) Hebrew, grammar and Genisis. Chap. 1 ;

(c.) Old Testament;
 (d.) Ecclesiastical history—first two centuries;
 (e.) Liturgy of the Church of England;

(f.) The first eighteen articles

(g.) We scott's Bible in the Church ; Paley's Evidences and Horae-Paulinae ; Wordsworth's Theophilus Anglicanus. The following books are recommended : Tregelles' Heads of Hebrew grammar ; Maclear's History of the Old Testament ; Robertson's History of the Christian Church ; Proctor on the Book of Common Prayer ; Boultbee on the Articles.

The degree of B. D. may also be taken in honors. In this case there is a further examination for those candidates who have been declared to have passed for the ordinary B. D. Degree.

The subjects of the higher examination, the terms and course of study, may be learned from the Most Reverend the Warden or the Rev. the Dean, Canon O'Meara.

The fees and other charges are the same as for the College School.

This remains in the hands of the College till the pupil is withdrawn, when it goes against the last account. In con-sequence of this the College bills are not sent out till the close of the term, when payment should immediately be made,—at least before the commencement of the next term.

Any sums due to the College may be paid to the account of the Bishop of Rupert's Land, Merchants' Bank, Winnipeg, or to the Steward, the Rev. Canon Matheson, St. John's College.

The payments for Board and Tuition must be made strictly in advance, at the beginning of each term. The accounts for laundry, books and school material will be sent out at the end of each term.

A notice of five weeks must be given before the withdrawal of any boarder in the course of the school year, from August 8th to June 7th.

Applications for admission will be received by the Secretary or Lady Principal, and admission given according to priority, on the regulations being complied with.

Every boarder has to provide a mattrass, 3 blankets, a pillow, 2 pillow cases, 1 quilt, 2 pairs of sheets, 4 towels, 4 dinner napkins, clothes-bag, and India-rubber overshoes.

Laundry and seamstress work will be afforded, when required, at cost price.

It is earnestly requested that the dress of the pupils may be simple and inexpensive. Every article must be marked in full with the owner's name.

It is requested that the payment of pocket money be placed in the hands of the principal, acting by the parents' wishes; and that no large sums be given at once.

Parents will be charged for medical attendance, and if they desire any particular physician, he will be called in.

Arrangements will be made for the pupils to shop once a week, accompanied by a governess.

All letters to other than parents, must be given open to the Principal, through whom alone letters may be received and sent. Day S without spe

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Day Scholars must not carry any letters and parcels for boarders without special permission.

On Wednesday afternoons, from three to five p. m., friends will be permitted to visit boarders, subject to the approval of the Principal.

Every third Saturday between 9 a. m. and five p. m., boarders will be allowed, at the request of their parents, to visit friends in the city or neighbourhood, if proper attendance be provided them to and from the College.

A report of the progress and conduct of each pupil will be sent at the close of the Term.
