The S. S. Stephano's turn out was—37,882 seals, mostly young harps; gross value, \$69,757.09; her crew of 270 men shared \$85.56; the captain's share comes to \$2,500.00.

S. S. ADVENTURE.  
The S. S. Adventure's turn out was; 8,175 seals, nearly all young harps; gross value, \$12,731.93; net value \$12,555.26; her crew of 270 men shared \$13.50.

S. S. BONAVENTURE.  
The S. S. Bonaventure's turnout was 13,176 seals, nearly all harps; gross value, \$20,079.46; her crew of 270 men shared \$25.25.

S. S. BELLAVENTURE.  
The total number of seals landed by the Bellaventure is 9,534; the gross value of which is \$15,063.40; net value, \$14,933.40; her crew of 270 men shared \$18.37.

S. S. SAGONA.  
The S. S. Sagona landed 12,226 young harps, 1591 young hoods, 450 bedlamers, 63 old harps, and 15 old hoods, a total of 13,045. The price of the young seals was \$4.50 a cwt, of the bedlamers \$3.70, of the old seals \$3.00. Net weight was nearly 2814 tons, the net value \$24,450.15. The men's share was one-third of this—\$47.50 apiece.—Standard.

### Proclamation.

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of GOD of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

WHEREAS we deem it expedient and necessary to appoint a Term or Session for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of our Island of Newfoundland, at the time and place hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, by this Our Proclamation, declare to all Our loving subjects within Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that a Term or Session of Our said Supreme Court on Circuit shall be open and holden at HARBOUR GRACE, in our said Island, on Tuesday, the Twentieth second day of April instant, and continue thence until Saturday, the Twenty-sixth day of April instant, both days inclusive; and, if necessary, the presiding Judge of Our said Court shall have power to extend the time thereof for two days, or for such further period as may be necessary for the conclusion of any matter or cause then in course of trial.

And of these Presents, all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaols, and all other Officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Witness Our trusty and well-beloved WALKER EDWARD DAVIDSON, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, at Saint John's, in Our said Island, this 8th day of April, A. D., 1913, and in the third year of Our Reign.



**HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY**

(Continued.)  
Wednesday, March 12.  
Hon. Colonial Secretary tabled report of Savings Bank for 1912.

Hon. Minister-Finance tabled Auditor General's reports, and accounts of Municipal Council.

**PETITIONS.**  
Hon. C. H. Emerson from Harbor Breton for a ferry, and from Pass Island for a fog alarm; Mr. Parsons from Upper Island Cove for a road, and from Harbor Grace for lights; Hon. Colonial Secretary from Brownsdale for a wharf; Mr. Clapp from Conche for a harbor light.

**QUESTIONS.**  
Hon. Colonial Secretary informed Mr. Clift that subsidies for the S. S. Portia are paid trip by trip. The owners have been paid for nineteen trips since the 26th April, 1912. Also that no amount has been paid the Reid Nfld. Co. on account of Bruce and Invermore for running between Port aux Basques and North Sydney from 12th to 20th January, 1913, nor has any claim been made by the Company.

Hon. Minister of Finance told Mr. Clift that no fees had been paid the sub-collector at Port aux Basques for clearing steamers after hours, and that his department knew nothing of any timber ordered by the sub-collector for a wharf at Conche.

Bills to amend the law in relation to the sale of intoxicating liquors, and to amend the law relating to the Registry of Deeds, were introduced and read a first time.

Railway, Marine Disasters Fund, and Marconi Wireless Bills, were read a second time.

The bill to further provide for the security of money entrusted to the Registrar of the Supreme Court passed the Committee stage.

Other items on the Order Paper were deferred, and House closed shortly after four o'clock.

Thursday, March 13.  
Hon. Colonial Secretary tabled the annual report of the Licensing Board.

**PETITIONS.**  
Petitions were presented by Hon. Colonial Secretary from Winterton for a road; by Mr. Devereaux from North Harbor for telegraph extension, and from Mussel Pond for a road; by Mr. Moulton from Petties for a landing place; by Mr. Parsons from the South Side of Harbor Grace for a road; by Mr. Clapp from S. W. Pass for a road; by Mr. Keat from Quidi Vidi for a public wharf; by Hon. Colonial Secretary, on behalf of the Speaker, from Barrenec for a well.

Hon. Minister of Justice presented a petition from Herbert Knight on behalf of the Eastern Trust Co., asking to be incorporated. This petition was referred to the following select committee: Hon. Minister of Justice, Mr. Kent, Mr. F. J. Morris, Mr. Clapp, and Mr. Goodison.

**QUESTIONS.**  
The Colonial Secretary informed Mr. Kent, that the Output News Despatch is compiled by the Editor of the Evening Herald, under arrangement by the Government, the only expenses being the payment to Mr. McGrath of \$200 per annum.


The Colonial Secretary informed Mr. Clapp that Mr. Walter Crosbie is employed in the Postal Service as Railway Construction Clerk, at \$60 per month. During the winter months he is engaged as Relief Clerk on trains. Owing to ill health he was given leave of absence last summer to attend the Hospital at St. Anthony, and he has also been granted one month from March 10th, 1913.

The Colonial Secretary informed Mr. Clift that Dr. Grant was last year paid \$215.25 for 1722 vaccinations. Cost of vaccine \$223.86. Dr. Brehm, the Public Health Officer, has reported to the Government that every case of small-pox in this Colony during recent years has been traced to a second class passenger from Cape Breton and it is upon Dr. Brehm's recommendation that only passengers of that class have been vaccinated. It is satisfactory to note that since vaccination was made compulsory the expenditure on account of small-pox has greatly decreased. In 1909 expenditure was \$20,000, in 1910 \$14,000, in 1911 \$3,000, and for 1912 to date \$1,800.

The Minister of Agriculture informed Mr. Dwyer that the Agricultural

farm was sold to Mr. Harold Macpherson for \$7,500 in October 1912, and no help has been employed there at the expense of the Government since the most obstinate one stallion in the stables there now.

The security of Moneys bill passed third reading and was ordered to be sent to the Legislative Council for concurrence.

House went into Committee on Supply.

Mr. Kent offered some remarks on the estimates, pointing out that from the Auditor General's report it might be gathered that they were not sufficient to meet the expenses. Various votes were being paid which should show but do not, and besides many accounts were held over and paid out of the vote for the following year instead of the current year. From this he contended it was impossible to place any confidence in the financial statements of the colony presented to the House. He also pointed out that in election was coming this year, but that the estimates made no provision whatever for it. He believed additional estimates would have to be brought before the House, and thought the expenditure for the ensuing year would greatly exceed the estimates.

Minister of Finance replied showing that every supply presented to the Government there had been an increase in the estimates, and while the country continues to grow such increase must continue. But of course it was the part of the Opposition to criticize to put up a case for themselves to the country. As far as the government was concerned, the money was properly spent; and they didn't propose to vote money that was not there. Reference had been made to the omission of a vote for the elections. Well the government would not be asking for any vote for that, as it would be paid out of the surplus revenue of last year. Other omissions had been noted in the way of salaries, particularly one from his department, that may have been an error by the department, and will be remedied in the next supply. Reference was also made to the public debt. The amount did not frighten the minister at all, even though it represented an increase of \$1 per head. There was one thing, full value was received for it, in the increase of public works, building of branch railways, etc. extensions of telegraphs etc. The minister pointed out the very great results that had followed the policy of the government. He had seen in the extreme prosperity of the country; and to the fact that all the vast undertakings had been done without increasing taxation, while this year the Government saw its way clear to reduce taxation to the extent of \$350,000 on the necessities of life.

Mr. Clift followed with a further criticism of the estimates, dealing with them generally. First and then making some references to particular votes such as those for Agriculture and Mines, which did not seem sufficient to cover the expenses. He also dealt with the reduction of taxation referred to by the Minister, and held that it was a fallacy to say they had benefitted directly the fishermen of the colony. The reduction on sugar he held, had injured the merchant by the immediate removal of the tariff, while it did not so greatly benefit the fishermen, a large majority of whom use very little of the article. The reduction on pork he also contended would not benefit the consumer, as the duty removed was not large enough to reduce the retail price even one cent per pound. Anyway he thought it would have been better to have kept on the duty



### Legislative Council

(Continued.)

The House met at 4.30 p.m. pursuant to adjournment.

Hon. Mr. Goodridge—On behalf of the Select Committee appointed to prepare Address in Reply to His Excellency's speech from the Throne, begged to present a draft of same, and moved that it be read a first time.

Hon. Mr. Hanson—Mr. President: Before this matter goes through I should like to say one or two words by way of friendly criticism. It is not my intention to oppose the Address in Reply; on the contrary, I wish to support it. I am very sorry I was not able to be present to hear the hon. gentleman who proposed the Address in Reply, whose acquisition to this Chamber is a matter for congratulation. As there does not seem to be any other opportunity for discussing the general principles touched on in the Speech, I must take this occasion to say one or two words in relation thereto. I take it from reports which I have seen of the hon. gentlemen (Mr. Goodridge's) remarks, that he felt that he would have preferred to see a little more caution exercised in the removal of the duties. In this I fully agree with him. I don't say it in any spirit of captious criticism. We have all felt that this reduction was due to come, and that it has now come is a matter for congratulation. I welcome it, but, speaking for myself, I would have preferred to have seen the reduction of duties take a more gradual form. I see that the increase of interest on loans for railway extension has been estimated by the Premier from \$40,000 to \$50,000 a year. The Colony is pledged to the upkeep of sanatoria, which, when fully operated, will cost in the neighborhood of \$70,000 a year, and there is not the remotest doubt that a large amount of additional grants for education will be necessary almost at once, if this Colony is to retain its present progressive condition, besides a large number of other items to be provided. The aggregate will be very considerable. I do hope there will be no difficulty in providing for these things, but I feel some misgivings about a reduction in the revenue at one fell swoop of something like \$400,000. There is another matter which I should have liked to see provided for before it may present serious difficulties.

It will be in the recollection of hon. members that two years ago, I myself brought up the matter of the meagre salaries of some of the heads of departments in our civil service, and that much to my satisfaction strong sympathy was expressed with the attitude I then took, by the hon. leader of the Government in this House, as well as by Hon. Messrs. Robinson and Gibbs, and a number of other gentlemen. I think it is a great pity that nothing has been done to ameliorate the position of the heads of our public service who are very capable men, are greatly underpaid and are getting the same salaries nominally as they were ten years ago, though in reality these salaries are greatly less. It is not in keeping with the dignity of the Colony, nor is it fair to them, and I am sure this position has the sympathy of both sides of the House. Perhaps, however, it is still intended to deal with the matter.

Hon. Mr. Winter—Mr. President: I wish to support in the strongest

possible manner the remarks of the hon. gentleman on my right, Mr. Harvey. It was my intention to make practically the same remarks myself. I do not suppose that anyone will think that I am actuated in what I say by any feeling of antagonism against the present Government. On the contrary I am a strong supporter of the Government, and up to the present have supported their policy, which I think has been a wise and very successful one. In this instance, however, I must say a change has taken place in my opinion. I refer to the reduction of the tariff. We have been advised that the duty has been taken off tea, sugar, beef and pork. This will mean a loss to the revenue of from \$385,000 to \$400,000 a year, which loss the country will have to bear. Now Mr. President at the present moment at a conservative estimate, there is at least two months supply of tea and sugar, on which duty has been paid, and the placing of these articles on the free list will mean that instead of the revenue losing this duty, the traders of the country will lose it.

Hon. Mr. Ryan—Mr. President: I rise to support the remarks of the hon. gentleman opposite. I think it is the first time that duties have been sprung upon us in this matter. When I read in the Herald that the duties had been taken off I did not think it was possible, as the matter had not become law. We can make it law, but I think it will be unfair to a certain number in this community. It is all very well to reduce taxation, but the traders who have large quantities of goods in stock should be given an opportunity to dispose of them. Take an article like tea. We don't know what it costs. The regular importers purchase their tea in Ceylon, India, London and Liverpool at regular rates. It comes in on certified invoices, on which duties are paid. Those teas are kept in bond here and doled out by the chest, while the regular importer who brings in his tea two or three times a year and pays the duty on it is a pretty hard hit. For my own part I have been hit about £250 sterling.

It is only fair to reduce the taxes on these articles, and I rejoice to find it been done, but it is being done at the wrong end. I have never heard of taxes being reduced before, simply because the statement was made in the Governor's speech. When it was stated in the Governor's speeches in the past, that duties were to be taken off they were not taken off until the proper time. It looks as if this is being done with one particular purpose, viz: to help the tradesmen who keep their goods in bond, and rush to the Custom House at the last moment. It is only those who have paid the duties should have an opportunity to get their money back. I am not speaking in an unfriendly way. To be continued.

### Mill Operative Winner of \$300,000

Ottawa, March 23.—Leon Henley, an employe of the W. C. Edwards Company Mill at Rockland, Ont., has discovered that he is the holder of the ticket bearing the number advertised as winning the first prize of \$200,000 in a lottery conducted by the Government of France two years ago.

According to the story as told by Henley's friends, the French Government extensively advertised the result of the lottery, when none appeared to claim the big prize it was supposed that the holder of the winning number had gone down with the Titanic last year. Henley heard nothing of this till a few weeks ago when his attention was brought to an advertisement of the result. He gasped to find, on comparing the number of his ticket, that it corresponded with that entitled to the first prize, \$300,000. Henley is at present employed as a yard hand by the Edwards Company. He has placed his case in the hands of Manager Marchand, of the Bank of Ottawa at Rockland, and the ticket and other data have been forwarded to Paris. An answer is now being awaited, and meanwhile Henley is keeping his job.

He claims to have bought the ticket from the original holder shortly after its issue for a small sum.

The schr. Little Shamrock, Joseph Snow, master, arrived from St. John's on Sunday last.

It is estimated that claims for the Titanic disaster already filed will total \$10,000,000. The White Star Line claims that its liability is limited to but \$100,000.

## Lest We Forget

On Wednesday of this week the last session of the present Parliament closed after sitting six weeks, during which time a large amount of legislative work was done, and many important measures enacted.

With the closing of the House ends the Legislative duties of Sir Edward Morris' first Administration.

The record of that Administration now lies like an open book before the electorate of this country, and for the next few months will be closely scrutinized by the opponents of the People's Party, and will be the storm center of the approaching General Election, in so far as the politicians of the opposite party can use it to their own advantage or to the disadvantage of the Government.

It will, therefore, be of great assistance to the electorate in forming their opinion to be fairly well posted on the various issues of the political battle that is pending, and thereby be in a position to make an intelligent use of the franchise, and make it more difficult for demagogues to sway them against reason and common sense, and against their own and their country's interest.

The Morris Government came into power at a time when the colony's industries in all directions languished, and depression, verging on despair, was writ largely over the horizon of the future.

The comprehensive programme which he laid before the country at the General Election of 1909 breathed faith in the future and confidence in the country's ability, under wise and capable administration, to shake off the lethargy which was paralysing its energies, and take its place in the van of progress among the dependencies of Britain.

Faith begot faith, hope begot hope, and the country responded splendidly to his call and empowered him and his colleagues to man the Ship of State and direct her course to the haven of prosperity pointed out by Sir Edward Morris.

At that time the country suffered from depression and incompetency at home, and ridicule and contempt abroad; the former because dreamers sat in the seats of statesmen and dissipated the energies of the country in rainbow chasing; the latter because of our rulers' irrational attitude towards the British and United States governments in relation to international questions.

Morris found the treasury depleted as a result of the mad efforts of the Bond Government to retain power by the reckless distribution of the revenue during 1908 in one of the boldest attempts ever made in this country by any political party to buy their way back to power by debauching the electorate with the taxes wrung from them. That debt the Morris Government had to pay off as soon as they took office, and the Colony to-day is nearly \$200,000 worse off because of that reckless squandering of the public funds by a moribund Government to retain power.

The Morris Ministry found trade and commerce depressed to an extent

They found the harbors around the coast neglected and the lives and property of fishermen and mariners jeopardized for want of light-house and fog alarms. They have placed a dredge at the disposal of the fishermen to deepen their harbors and facilitate their operations in the prosecution of their hazardous calling. They have placed lights and fog alarms wherever experienced mariners have indicated they would be of most use, and thereby added to the safety of those of our people who risk their lives on our rugged coast in darkness and storm.

They found the Labrador coast served with one badly operated steamer and isolated from the world. They have provided a second mail boat, and have extended the wireless telegraphy as far north as Mackovik.

He set to work at once to revive the lagging energies of the Colony's commerce, and in the four years past trade conditions have increased to a marvelous degree, and today indicate a prosperity unexampled in the history of the country.

The Morris Ministry found the fishermen and workmen generally carrying excessive burdens of taxation which should have been removed years before, and they determined to relieve them of it and have succeeded in doing so to the extent of fully \$400,000 per year on foodstuffs alone, and an additional \$100,000 on other commodities which go into general use among the laboring men of this country.

He found the agricultural industry of the country languishing through a long continuance of a policy of drift, inactivity and indifference. Within a year all that was changed, and from one end of the country to the other interests in agricultural pursuits have been revived to a degree unprecedented in the history of Newfoundland, and as a result there are at present over one hundred agricultural societies in operation throughout the Island, distributing the best seeds, best breeding stock and best information which years of experience of the most progressive farming countries of the world have made available for us.

The Morris Government found the country's aged and worn-out toilers unprovided for in the winter of their life and left, in many cases, to choose between the paupers' dole, the cold charity of the world or ingenuous friends, and the Poor House. He at once passed legislation and laid aside from the revenues of the Colony a fund which will for all time provide a living stipend for these deserving men who spent their days in building up the country's commerce and industries.

He found the postal system disorganized (some say corrupt) and inefficient, and he has brought about reforms which has placed it on an efficient and more profitable basis than ever before in the country's history. The country is to-day circled with telegraph lines and hundreds of new way-offices and post offices have been provided for the outlying settlements which had been so long neglected by his predecessors. Settlements which were isolated for generations have been brought in touch with the capital by cables, and every facility that the requirements of the people justify have been provided.

# Proclamation.

By His Excellency WALTER EDWARD DAVIDSON, Esquire, Companion of the Most Excellent Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS it is provided by Chapter 23 of 2 Edward VII., entitled 'An Act to amend the Post Office Act, 1897,' that upon the recommendation of the Board appointed under the provisions of the said Act, the Governor in Council shall, by Proclamation, give notice of any alteration of name, naming or remaining of places within this Colony, provided that Public Notice of such proposed alterations of name, naming or remaining of places shall have been given for Three Months previous;

And whereas, by Public Notice of date the 3rd day of December, 1912, certain alterations of name and remaining of places within this Colony were notified, as required by the above mentioned Act;

I do, therefore, by this my Proclamation, order and direct that the alterations of name and remaining of places within this Colony, as contained in the said Public Notice of the 3rd day of December, 1912, shall come into effect from the date of these Presents, that is to say:

1. That Upper Rocky Brook and Middle Rocky Brook, Smith Sound, T.B., be re-named 'Monroe.'
2. That Lower Rocky Brook, Smith Sound, T.B., be re-named 'Clifton.'
3. That Britannia Cove, Smith Sound, T.B., be re-named 'Britannia.'
4. That Lance Cove, Smith Sound, T.B., be re-named 'Petley.'
5. That Cuckhold's Cove, near Trinity, T.B., be re-named 'Dunfield.'
6. That the North Side of Norris Arm, N.D.B., be re-named 'Alderham.'


