GEN. KAULBARS REPLIES. Gen. Kaulbars, governor general of Odessa, was interviewed at Odessa, Saturday, by the correspondent of the Associated Press on the subject of the charges brought against him by Gen. Kuropatkin in his book on the Russo-Japanese war. "Although the book has not yet been handed to me," he said, "I have had correspondence with Kuropatkin on the subject, in which I repudiate the charges and prove by documentary ev-idence that they are entirely false. "On the eve of the battle of Feb. 22, 1904, the Russians were camped between the Sha river and the Hum river. I sub-mited to Kuropatkin a plan, subse-quently rejected, to attack the Japan-ese jointly from our strong infrench-ments, the Japanese having none. The defeat was chiefly due to Kuropatkin removing my reserves to reinforce his left, thus running into a trap of the Japanese, whose successful demonstra-tive advance of their right effected the desired concentration of our troops on our left, My forces consequently were

# QUITE A SEVERE EARTHQUAKE SHOCK FELT AT ST. GEORGE


