TWELVE MILLION REBATE

NEW YORK, N. Y. Mar. 1.—Disbursements of the \$12,000,000 in rebates due gas consumers in Manhattan and the Bronx under the eighty cent gas law in accordance with the decision of the United States Supreme Court, was begun today, by the Consolidated Gas Company and its subsidiary corporations. Up to 10 o'clock tonight when the first day's work of repayment was closed approximately 9,000 checks had been sent out, these aggregating a face value estimated at about \$100,000. In all about 2,700,000 checks must be issued.

Miss Ethel M. Arnold, of England, Finds

Change in America's Sentiment

On Question.

NEW YORK, March 1.—Miss Ethel
M. Arnold, the younger sister of Mrs.
Humphrey Ward and granddaughter of Dr. Arnold, of Rugby, has been in America four months approximately delivering lectures on subjects conected with the feminist movement. She has delivered lectures in Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, Boston and Cambridge, besides appearing before many clubs in New York and taking part in various luncheons and breakfast functions, where she has addressed hundreds of progressive women.

A reference is made to the attitude of Mrs. Humphrey Ward on the suffrage question, which surprised many of her American admirers. Miss Arnold replies with a natural reserve, not as apologist or as explainer, but rather as if she would prefer, if possible, to ignore a subject which she had found facing her at every turn.

"I know" she says, "that Mrs. Ward's statement that she believed the women of America were not as greatly interested in the universal suffrage movement as they were advertised to be, and that if they really wanted it they could have it, which she made after she returned to England, created a more or less unfriendly feeling. I hear that when Mrs. Ward was visiting Mrs. James Field in Boston she is said not to have manifested especial desire to meet the women pledged to support this great movement, and I assume the same lack of desire was shown here.

Vital Statistics for the Past Year—The Population Four and a Half

NEW YORK, March 2.—Vital statistics just compiled show that the "hard times" may have exerted their influence in restricting vital activity in various directions in Greater New York. There have been 13,596 fewer marriages in 1908 than in 1907, and 282 more suicides during the same term. There were 4,145 more births, and 6,133 fewer deaths during 1908 than in the year before. The fact which has become apparent in recent years, that it year before. The fact which has become apparent in recent years, that it is growing more and more expensive to kill a human being in New York, may account for the showing of 53 fewer homicides; though the homicidal person is not usually considerate of anybody's expense except his own.
