



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Halifax, Feb. 18.—The full bench of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia de-cided an interesting case on Satur-day. This was an appeal brought by the Yarmouth Street Railway and Yarmouth Electric Company from a judgment of Judge Lawrence granting an injunction and awarding \$500 dam-ages against these companies. The action was brought by a mill owner from further up the Tusket River than the Yarmouth Company's dam, who alleges that the dam forced the level of the water up at his prop-erty so that it interfered with the mill, Other mill men on the river have been watching the case. The court reduced the damages to \$150 but con-tinued the injunction.

Having been caught in an awkward and embarrass ing situation following an attempt to connect Premier Hazen with the affairs of the Albert Southern Railway, the Telegraph on Saturday, by blustering and misreentation, succeeded in landing Mr. Robinson, who made the charges, and incidentally itself in an even large majority behind him, he came out with a corporal's worse position than before

"Hon.
