The Eighth Session of the Free Baptist General Conference of Nova Scotia, was held at Session Hill, Yarmouth County, commencing on Thursday, September 11th, 1873, at 10 o'clock, A. M.

#### REPORTING MEETING.

The Rev. Wm. Kinghorn gave his report :

He spoke of the peculiar doctrines and principles of the Free Baptista, and the extension of our borders by the diffusion of these. Referred to the Home and Foreign Mission work; their failure to care for all the Churches by not farnishing proper pastoral care; have to do all they can through the Home Mission Society. Referred to the fact of their ministers leaving the N. B. Conference; hoped they may be,as successful with us. Made some excellent remarks concerning the Sabbath work in connection with this Conference.

Rev. E. Wayman thought-

This Conference and the N. B. Conference were not working as much together as it may be possible for them to do. If any thing could be done to bring the two Conferences to more perfectly co-operate, he would like to have it so.

The Rev. G. S. Ricker reported as follows:

He expressed the great pleasure he felt while present with us. Extended the greetings of his Yearly Meeting to the Conference. Said his Yearly Meeting proposed six thousand communicants, one hundred ministers, and about one hundred Churches. The three Yearly Meetings'in the State of Maine were contemplating a union in one Convention; this would comprise fifteen housand communicants, and three hundred ministers. Referred to the influence this would exert upon the State. He spoke of the great work they were doing the interests of the Sabbath Schools, and the duty of ministers touching them. Explained concerning their State Missionary Society helping up weak Churches. Also, of the Foreign Mission work; a pathy of the past, and revival of the Mission spirit at the present time. Five Missionaries sail this day from New York. It is proposed to send out three more as soon as possible.

Much is doing in the Educational interests; the rapid development of those interests impose considerable burdens to be borne by the friends of education. One gentleman will give one hundred thousand dollars, and another fifty thousand, if the denomination will raise fifty thousand. We, as a Yearly Meeting, may do something in this direction. They will do the same for our

young man as for the young men of their own Yearly Meetings.

He requested that the correspondence be continued, and that we send a delegate to the next General Conference of F. B. in the States.

After which a hymn was sung, and Rev. W. Downey led in prayer for the safety and success of the Missionaries embarking that day for the foreign field. A solemn season was enjoyed.

Rev. W. Downey, delegate to the M. C. Yearly Meeting, said he was very cordially and courteously received; had a good time, and spoke of the effect his visit had upon his feelings. He expressed his pleasure upon seeing the delegate from the Maine Central Yearly Meeting present with is.

#### ANNUAL REPORT

Of the Yarmouth and Shelburne Quarterly Meeting Clerk for the year ending 11th September, 1873.

DEAR BERTHER'S.—The time has come when it becomes my duty to lay before you the Annual Report of the state of the Churches composing this Quarterly Meeting. No important changes have taken place in our ministerial spheres, except the removal of the writer from his former field of labour—Cape Sable Island; which place, I am happy to report, is now being occupied by our esteemed Bro., Rev. Mr. Babcock, of New Brunswick, who, I believe, met a very warm—reception by the church and congregation of that place. The very being located at Tusket Village, and labouring with churches adjacent.

Death has not been permitted to enter our ministerial ranks during the past year; for which we have cause for devout thanksgiving. Neither has any serious illness occurred to any of our brethren in the ministry, except that to our esteemed Bro, Rev J. I. Porter, causing him weeks of suffering, and depriving the churches with whom he laboured, of his valuable services for nearly or quite three months. But, praised be God, who was pleased, in accordance with many prayers, to spare a valuable life to his family and to the church. But the pale horse and his rider have gone forth among our brothers and sisters of the different churches, causing death, lamentation and sorrow.

This Quarterly Meeting has held its usual number of sessions—the first being held at Brooklin, Yarmouth County; the second, at West Pubnico, Yarmouth County. The religious meetings in connection with this session, were very interesting. Brethren Knowless and Weston continued those services for several days, resulting in a revival of religion, which extended to the Lower Several days, resulting in a revival of religion, which extended to the Lower Pubnico. All of those sessions have been quite was very interesting, and, I trust, profitable. The following resolution was passed, which I am expected to embody in this report:

Resolved, That this Quarterly Meeting request the Yearly Meeting to consider the subject of uniformity in the control of and building of meeting houses.

A good interest was awakened in our Home Mission work, by the presence of Rev. Mr. Durkee, as a delegate from a Society in Halifax, recently organized for the purpose of maintaining Free Baptist preaching in that City. The Quarterly Meeting passed a vote, recommending the executive of the Home Mission Society to aid the Society in Halifax, in carrying out their purposes

in reference to christian work.

Having written briefly concerning the Quarterly Meeting, I come now to
speak of the Churches; and as there is some twenty one of them to claim our

attention, we must necessarily be brief in our notice of each.

The Church at Port Latour contains a membership of sixty-four—treaty of whom are males. Rev. J. I. Porter is still paster of this Church, preaching one-fourth of the time. The Church and congregation of this place have done themselves much credit in the erection of a new Church, at a cost of four thousand dollars. This Church reports in favour of pastorates. They have a flourishing Sunday school of forty pupils. They contribute ten dollars for Foreign Missions—nothing for Home Missions and Education.

irch, preaching dace have done a cost of four They have a ten dollars for First Barrington Church reports a membership of two hundred and thirty eight; of whom eighty-nine are males. Rev. Wm. Downey is engaged three-fourths of the time. Rev. Mr. Swim preaches occasionally. They have a Sunday school of one hundred pupils—contribute nothing ts Foreign and Home Missions, or Education. Prayer meetings twice in the week. There have been added to the Church during the year, three; six have died, and passed to their reward.

Church on Cape Sable Island reports a good interest, and a general desire for revival of religion. They have the permanent labours of Rev. Mr. Babcock, of New Brunswick.

This Church contains four hundred and twent-nine members; one hundred and ninety-six of whom are males. They have two Sunday schools, containing eighty pupils each. They report no sums for missions and

Church at Bear Point has the labours of Rev. W. Weston one-fourth of the time, and has a membership of eighty-eight; of whom thirty-seven are males. They have a Sunday school of forty pupils. Prayer meetings in the absence of their minister.

Church at Shag Harbour is in a low state. No Sunday school. Have the labours of Rev. J. I. Porter one-fourth of the time. Not in favor of pastorates. They contribute for Foreign Missions, nine dollars; not anything for Home Missions and Education. Number of members, forty-three; of whom seventeen are males.

Church at Pubnico.—Number of members, one hundred and twenty-seven; of whom forty-seven are males. The revival before mentioned, resulted in the addition of twenty-two members. The cause low at present; are in favour of pastorates; Sunday school of one hundred pupils. Report no sums for missions and education.

Woods Harbour reports one hundred and two members; fifty nine of whom tre males. Have the joint labours of Revs. Weston and Downey, each one-fourth of the time. Social meetings of the Church sustained. They do not report Sunday school, or contributions for missions or education.

First Argyle Church reports a membership of one hundred and thirty-one; of whom fifty-nine are males. They have the labours of Rev. C. Knowles one warter of the time. There have been added during the year, three; two by ster, and one by baptism. Their social meetings are sustained in the absect of their minister. They have a Sunday school of thirty-five pupils; report no sums for missions or education.

Second Argyle Church have the labours of Wm. M. Knollin one-half of the ine. This Church enjoyed a revival of religion, under the labours of Rev. William Downey last winter, which resulted in the addition of forty-one members. This Church has a membership of one bundred and thirty-four; of Church has a membership of one bundred and thirty-four; of Church with the church with the

Tusket Church reports number of members fifty-nine; of whom twenty-four smales. They have the labours of Rey, J. I. Porter one-fourth of the time. Restate of religion in this Church is very low. Have enjoyed many refreshing seasons during the past year. Four have been added by heptiam, and one by letter. Have a good Sunday school of thirty pupils. Nothing for missions and education.

Deerfield.—The Church of this place enjoys the labours of Rev. C. Knowless one-charter of the time. No especial interest. Have a union Sunday school. Are firm in their adherence to the principles of this Conference. Their Church numbers thirty-four.

Carleton.—The Church at this piace have the labours of Wm. M. Knolline half of the time, who found the Church in a very low and scattered conditions. numbers thirty-four. aving been much neglected in the past. Where lies the cause of our failure, is a thought which must often recur to the reflecting mind. Is our people covetous? They have the means. Fifty cents per head would give us over twelve hundred dollars—only twelve and a half cents a head every three months. Who could not double that som, and give us nearly two thoursand five bundred dollars for the Masser's work?

The salary of our ministers is far below that of other demoninations. Are not our people as able as others? as liberal as others? Why, then, are we mader the painful necessity of recording those hundlisting figures? True, 35.26 is not all that we are doing for Foreign Missions in this section of our Conference. I hope a much harper amount will be shown by the Treasurer of are Foreign Mission Society ere those meetings close. There are many among a who are somewhat interested, and who give for the support of the worthy eject of Foreign Missions. But what about our Educational interests? The cople want intelligent as well as good ministers. Do they expect others to sustain self-tenial and sacrifice to educate ministers for them? I hope not.

Now, with regard to our work as a christian body. What success has atmaded our efforts, which in some respects is not small, it is evident that in none respects we have signally failed. Now, what is to be done? Our people are not sting; they are willing to give as fold has prospered them, as far as key recognize duty. Bro. E. Munroe was employed during his summer vacation as Home Missionary among some of the more destitute Churches of King's and Hants

We hope to be able to do something to help in the establishing of a Free Baptist Church in the City of Halifax, and saving sinners there. It may be in place to say here that we believe the right time has come to undertake that work. The way seems to be opening; and if Free Baptists will do their duty, before long we may have a site and a suitable place of worship, and a home for Free Baptists in our capital. We believe that the Conference, the Quarterly Meetings, the Home Mission Societies, and every Free Baptist in the Province, Meetings, the Home Mission Societies, and every Free Baptist in the Province, ought to take an interest in that enterprise, and push it forward as fast as possible to a creditable completion. A few of the brethren there have, as a beginning, rented a half, and are doing something toward making up a salary for Bro. the Rev. H. J. Durkee, who went there without any human guarantee with regard to his support, and who is preaching and labouring there for the present with encouraging prospects. May the Lord help all to become prely interested in this object, and crown our efforts with abundant success.

Mention should be made also of a new preaching station at Vogler's Gove, Lunenburg County. During the greater part of the year our Clerk has made regular monthly visits to that place, and preached to the people. Some commencement has been made to erect a place of worship there; and it is hoped that this autumn the work will be resumed.

The interest in Foreign Missions has increased in some of the Churches, which is a very encouraging feature; for the word of the Lord is surely true, that "he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully."

Our statistics, as near as we can learn, are as follows:

Avonport Church.—Present membership, 38; union Sabbath school of 50 scholars, and a library of 100 volumes.

Black Rock Church.—Added by baptism, 27; present membership, 90; Subbath school of 45 scholars, and a library of 100 volumes.

Canning Church.—Added by baptism, 2; died, 1; present membership, 130; Sabbath school of 40 scholars, and a library of 100 volumes.

East Medicay Church.—Present membership, 34.

Harmony Church.—Died, 1; present membership, 89; union Sabbath school, with 50 scholars and 9 teacher

with 50 scholars and 9 teachers.

Hall's Harbour Church.—Added by baptism, 12; present membership, 55; labbath school of 40 scholars, and a library of 120 volumes.

Mount Denison Church.—Present membership, 54.

Port Medway Church.—Died, 2; present membership, 105; Sabbath school of a scholars, and a library of 150 volumes.

Port Mouton Church.—Died, 1; present membership, 62; Sabbath school of 5 scholars, and a library of 60 volumes.

Scott's Bay and Ell's Mountain Church.—This little Church has become ush scattered; only "a few names" are now left to sustain the cause of God. Bey still sustain a Sabbath school.

With regard to the idea. that the heathen are well enough off as they are it is with regard to the idea, that the heathen are well enough off as they are, it is enough to say that those who will say that, and act according to that notion, must certainly "undervalue the privileges they enjoy themselves, or be grossy in the real condition of the heathen world," or their hearts need sill to be touched with the softening influence of Christ's love.
