SILVER FURTHER DECLINES.

AMERICAN DOLLAR WORTH NOW ONLY FORTY-TWO AND THREE-QUARTER CENTS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—The 'Evening Post' says:—Silver bullion declined penny per ounce further to-day to 25 pence in London and fell in New York 1/2 cent to 55¢. These prices are the lowest recorded in the present extraordinary break and the lowest in the silver market's history. As compared with the prices of a month ago, to-day's quotations represent a fall of more than 24 per cent in London and of nearly 50 per cent in New York. The cause of the continued decline in silver is the steady pressure of silver on the New York market by agents of the silver miners. London advices show plainly that there has been no impingement by London speculators; on the contrary, the demand for silver from India has increased in the last fortnight, checked the New York decline. India's import of silver from London this year, up to the close of 1896, was valued at \$15,933,000 against only \$9,952,500 last year. But China is taking hardly any silver against its import of \$5,500,000 from London in the first seven months of 1896. It took only \$3,872,000 in the same period of 1896, and barely \$200,000 up to July 30 this year. Our own silver miners, in other words, have tried to force a market. At to-day's New York price of silver the American silver dollar was worth 42¢ cents.

ORANGEMEN ANGRY.

MAINTENANCE DEBATED WITH THE SCHOOL QUESTION.

WINNIPEG, August 16.—The County Orange Lodge of Manitoba has passed a resolution denouncing the so-called question by the Federal and Provincial Governments as to a delusion and a snare and altogether contrary to the pre-lection pledges of the members of the Provincial Government to the electors of Manitoba of the last general election. The resolution continues: 'That we fully believe that the reports sent east to the effect that the school settlement was satisfactory to the orangemen and a majority of the Protestants of Manitoba is altogether misleading and contrary to the facts, and we also take the opportunity of expressing our disapproval of the actions of the members of Dominion Government who petitioned the Pope of Rome to send to this Canada of our a Papal legate to help settle our national affairs.'

FUGITIVE BANK PRESIDENT.

HARTFORD, Conn., Aug. 16.—James S. Parsons, the fugitive president of the Continental Life Insurance Co. has returned after ten years, a penniless man to pay his debt to Nature. It is said that he has an incurable disease of the stomach and can live but a short time. He has been living in Canada since the wrecking of the Company but for a year or so intimate friends have known that he was in Massachusetts, lately in a Boston hospital. He appeared in Williamsburg yesterday so much aged and worn as not to be recognized and was taken in a carriage to his home, in Windham Centre. He is only 60 years old, but his long exile and disease have wrought havoc with his physique. He was hunted out of the United States by the officers of the last year, but returned in the hope that he may breathe his last in his own home. It was believed that Parsons' delinquencies amounted to between \$100,000 and \$150,000, though what he had done with the money was a mystery.

DARING RAID BY CUBANS.

CAPTURED A CITY WHILE SPANISH OFFICERS WERE AT A DANCE.

Havana, via Key West Fla., Aug. 16.—While the Spanish officers at the town of Santa Rosa in Santiago de Cuba province, the eastern end of the island were attending a big ball in the town hall, General Calixto Garcia and a picked body of men set upon the town. In the height of the festivities the ball room was fired at on all sides by the insurgents. The officers rushed to the doors to escape, but it was too late. The Cubans appeared with their machetes in hand. Some of the women fainted. A desperate fight began, in which the Cubans killed the captain and two inhabitants and thirty Spanish soldiers. In the struggle a bullet struck a woman, killing her instantly. Fourteen Spanish guerrilleros, with the intention of assisting their comrades entered the house behind the Cubans, but another force of insurgents overpowered them and the fourteen guerrilleros were all killed. The Spanish officers surrendered and were taken prisoners to General Calixto Garcia. Many Spanish soldiers were found drunk on the streets and were easily arrested. The whole town was burned by the insurgents excepting three houses. Then they retired. A Spanish spy, Miguel Besta has been hanged without trial by Baldomero Acosta, a prominent Cuban leader. Besta had been employed by Weyler to visit Acosta's camp, and assassinate him. Reaching the camp, his execution was ordered, his mission having been made known before his arrival.

REPORTED SPEED TEST.

The reported intention of the admiralty to get the battleship Renown a speed test from England to Halifax will be one of the great commercial and naval features of the year if carried into effect. Such a test by the naval authorities would demonstrate the character of the 'Hax' as the terminal port of a fast Atlantic service. The Renown is a massive ship and yet speedy and her safe arrival here in perhaps five days would be a tangible advertisement of the port. The speed of the Renown is 18 1/2 knots. While this speed is not equal to the proposed fast passenger steamers, it is a greater speed than any sea-going steamship of those which come to Halifax are capable of developing. The Renown's venture on fast running at sea will also demonstrate the sea worthiness of the vessel and her coal carrying capacity. The Renown is a heavier vessel than the Indiana by 3,000 tons, but does not carry half the guns that the Indiana does. The Renown has barbettes, in place of revolving turrets, and has several heavy guns below the main deck. The Indiana carries none below decks. What the Renown lacks in weight and size of guns, she gains in speed, seaworthiness and ammunition and bunker space. She could remain longer in action than the Indiana, maneuver more rapidly, and stand heavy weather better.

IN THE KLONDYKE.

THE ENDURANCE OF PEOPLE REMAINS TO THE GOLD FIELDS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16.—Thomas Magee, well known as a conservative business man and a careful observer, who, accompanied by his son to Dyea, writes to the Associated Press from that point to the effect that the ignorance displayed by the crowds who are flocking to the Klondyke fields is lamentable. Of the four hundred passengers who sailed with him on the steamer George Elder, half of whom were from San Francisco, not one in twenty had any definite idea as to how to reach his destination. While the routes were well known, the details and the conditions to be met with, are not considered, most of the searchers for wealth hoping to settle all doubts and uncertainties when they reach Juneau. Instead, however, further confusion was created by the appalling statements that there were only two routes, each of which necessitated the encounter of almost insurmountable difficulties. There were plenty of advocates for both routes at Juneau, but most of them were found to be interested parties. The two starting points, Dyea and Sawney, were ports of salt water. The Dyea trade goes over the Chilkoot pass and involves a climb of 3,500 feet, while the other, which is not yet completed, has a 2,250 foot climb over the White pass, and besides being six miles longer, is boggy in places. The Indians, who use the sawney packers, all pack over the Chilkoot pass from Dyea. Nearly 500 pack animals are now on route, on arrival will be pressed into regular pack trains, which will remove the chief obstacle for the transportation of supplies over the 35 miles of land, which is much more formidable than that over the 599 miles of water on the other side of the pass. August 7th a miner was drowned about a mile and a half from Sawney. A steamer charged five dollars for bringing in the corpse into town, and this so enraged the people that he was ordered to leave the town at once. He was offered \$2,000 for his wagon and team before he left for Juneau.

WITH MILITARY HONORS.

MADRID, Aug. 10.—The Queen Regent has decreed that the Military honors observed in the case of the funeral of a marshall be accorded the remains of the late Premier of Spain, Sr. Canovas Del Castillo. The body of the Spanish statesman will arrive here on Wednesday morning accompanied by his widow, the minister for the Colonies, Sr. Cos Cayan, and the Chief Magistrate, Sr. Duro. The Duke of Sotomayor, representing the Queen regent, the full honors of the Senate, an Admiral, the President of the Senate, a knight of the golden fleece, and Marshall Martinez De Campos. The interment will take place in the Pantheon. Funeral services will take place simply in the cathedral churches throughout the country and the official mourning will last three days. The Queen Regent is greatly affected by the tragedy and is still confined to her room.

BECOMING MUCH DISGUSTED.

SEATTLE, Aug. 12.—The Klondike of Klondykers at Dyea and Skagway will lead to much suffering this winter. Capt. Amey, who was the pilot of the Str. Islander, which has returned from the north, says that things are in a very bad shape. Affairs could not be much worse. Two thousand people are camped along the Rocky shore but few horses or pack animals at hand and they have practically no chance of getting over the pass. One of the United States commissioners, by using his official influence and paying \$400 in coin managed to get the Indians to pack his mail over the Chilkoot pass to the lakes. Of the others who went from Puget Sound without horses not one in fifty will get across the mountains this winter. Seven Seattle men who went up in the Islander returned on the Victoria utterly discouraged with the prospects and will remain at home until spring when they will make a start. Those who have horses and dogs stand a fairly good chance of getting through, but the start must be made before winter comes.


