INDUSTRIAL SECURITIES

Recently a number of new offerings of industrial securities have been made and the advertising in connection therewith has aroused an increased interest on the part of the public in that sort of security. Under such circumstances, it is quite usual for unscrupulous salesmen to take advantage of the interest created by legitimate investment firms to sell valueless securities of those of doubtful value to persons who are not familiar with the investment business. Here is an article of interest that might prove of benefit to investors.

"One of the chief financial nuisances of the day in Montreal and vicinity is the group of stock salesmen who peddle shareholders of one company to switch into another stock, very frequently of doubtful value and sometimes worthless stuff. People who have sound listed securities are the ones mostly approached owing to the readiness with which these can be turned into cash and the proceeds applied to the purchase of the offering they are making."

"Women shareholders are considered easy marks by these sharp individuals and it would be well for them to consult their husbands before taking action, or in the cases of spinsters and widows, their banker or some reliable, well-informed financial

friend who is willing to give them conservative advice.

"Many of these salesmen, some of whom are known as 'high pressure' artists in their line, were driven out of the U. S. by vigorous prosecutions for crooked dealings and are following their customary tactics in Canada, some of them having headquarters here."

"One scheme which has been effective has been to approach small tradesmen and advise the purchase of some well known local stock which enjoys an excellent reputation. The stock is supposed to be bought on the installment plan, but the order is actually bucketed and the payment put in their own pockets. Having established what seems to be a sound reputation for conservative dealings in the eyes of their inexperienced clients a switch to some other offering is soon made. Some of these are worthless if they are delivered but delivery is generally delayed for a time on one pretext or another. In the long run, the client loses everything."

"This emphasizes the necessity of the public being extremely careful about dealing with strangers who adopt such methods. A great deal of money would be saved if old established houses dealing in securities were consulted before undertaking commitments or exchanges."

If we are taking into account only the direct effect of the manure, no other way equals the mixing of fresh manure with the soil.

THE VALUE OF THE SOVEREIGN

It is little short of marvelous that, in spite of the prevailing depression in the country's trade and commerce of the hundreds of thousands of her people out of work, of the immense mass of money she is paying out for debt, only partially her own. Ex-land's monetary unit, the pound sterling, has gone up to within a fraction of its pre-war parity.

The German pre-war mark is worth less and has been abandoned. The French franc is at a trifle over one fourth of its old value; Italian currency is in a slightly worse position.

Some of us remember how many years went by before United States dollars recovered their full value, after the civil war in that country.

Britain attempted no inflation of her currency, never even dreamed of anything like repudiation, met her debts as they came due, depended not at all upon reparations, made no attempt to bolster up her currency by artificial means, but committed her cause to honesty, industry and fair dealing.

As a result her monetary unit the pound sterling has been adjudged by the unbiased arbitration of universal commerce to be worth its old time value in the world's exchanges.

To Canadians this means that a great obstacle to the floating of loans in London, has been removed. It also means that the commercial world will still look to London as its financial centre. — F. H. and W. S.

Across Canada

The Good Roads Department of Manitoba expects to complete the Trans-Canada Highway through that province by October the first. This will complete the road from Brandon west to the Saskatchewan boundary.

The city of Halifax, N.B., is planning to re-establish its Provincial Exhibition this coming fall according to Mayor Murphy. The fair has only been held once or twice since the war prior to which it was an annual event.

The Canadian Trade Commissioner at Liverpool, England, is taking steps to interest Canadian business men in the export of crushed oyster shells to Great Britain. The United States exports 20,000 tons of crushed shells annually to the British Isles.

The official opening of Crystal Garden, Victoria's latest and finest Amusement Park will take place on June 26th. Celebrations, including a ball, processions, and sports, will mark the occasion and are scheduled to continue until July 1st.

Navigation on the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence is now open and has provided employment for hundreds of men from Montreal, Toronto and other cities who have been idle during the winter. Shipping circles are optimistic concerning the season just commenced.

It is announced that the Banff, Alberta, Pow-Wow and Indians Day celebration which takes place annually, will be held this year, July 23 and 24 in the Yoho Valley. On these days the Stony tribe of Indians in full regalia, hold their Pow-Wow and compete in contests of every kind.

There are approximately 2,200,000 persons attending school in this country. Of this number, 1,600 are at institutions for the blind and mute; 81,000 at vocational schools or classes; 14,000 at Indian schools and the remainder attend colleges, universities, subsidized and private schools and institutions for training teachers.

With a view to arranging a new trade and transportation agreement between Canada and the British West Indies a conference is to be held at Ottawa in June which will be attended by representatives of the Governments of Canada, Bermuda, Leeward and Windward Islands, Barbadoes, Trinidad, British Guiana, Jamaica and British Honduras.

The gold mines of northern Ontario are said to have yielded a higher income during the first quarter of 1923 than in any similar period in their history. Estimates place the income of mining companies in the Porcupine district at nearly six million dollars and in the Kirkland District at one and a quarter millions.

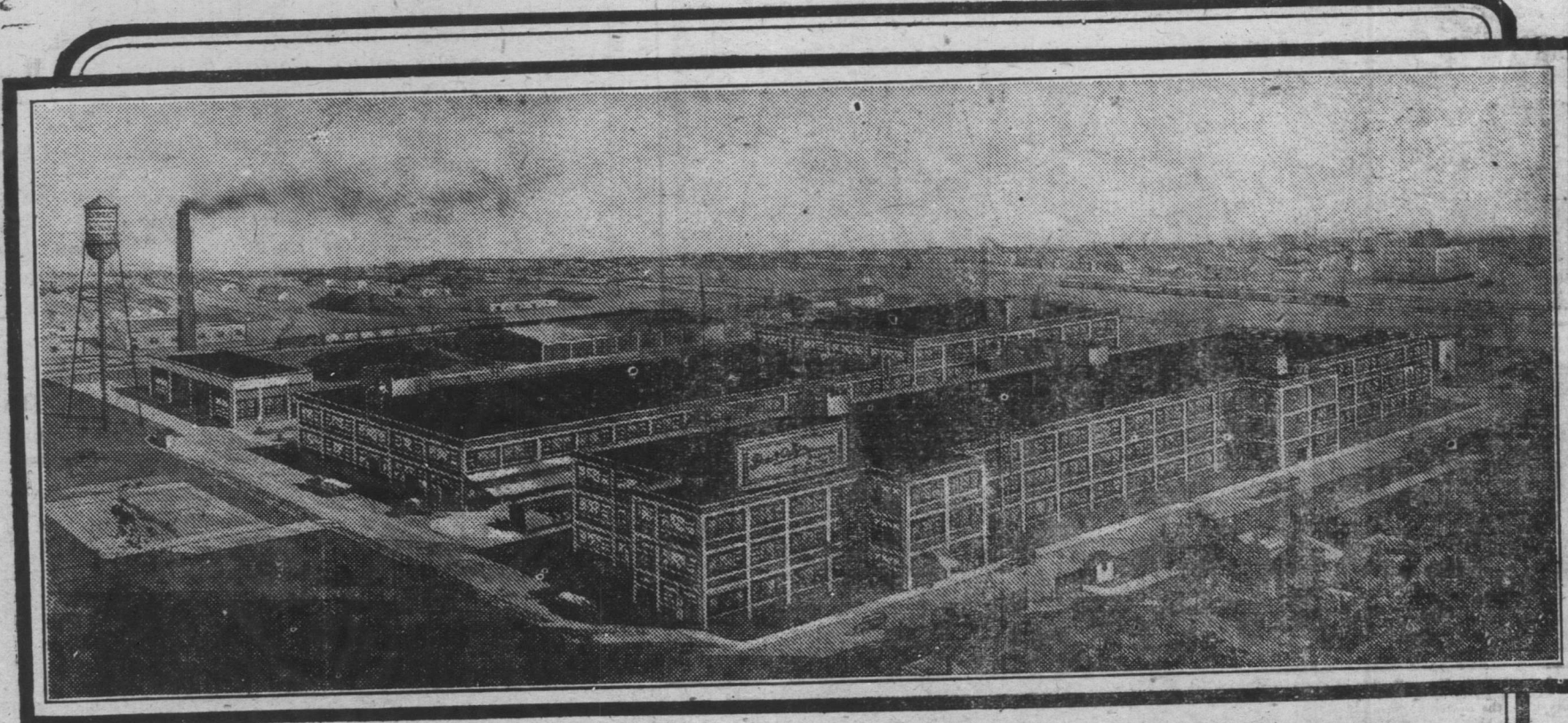
Here and There

That Hollanders who have located in Alberta are making good and are satisfied is the statement of Baron W. Van Heeckeren, of Rotterdam, after a recent tour of investigation.

The forming of a mining bureau as a branch of its activities is announced by the Winnipeg Board of Trade. The bureau is to collect data on the mining situation in the province and will do everything possible to foster greater mineral production in Manitoba.

Tourist traffic in Canada this year is likely to constitute a new record, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Parks. No estimate has been compiled as yet but the figures for 1922, which were carefully estimated at \$124,000,000, indicate the value of this traffic to the Dominion.

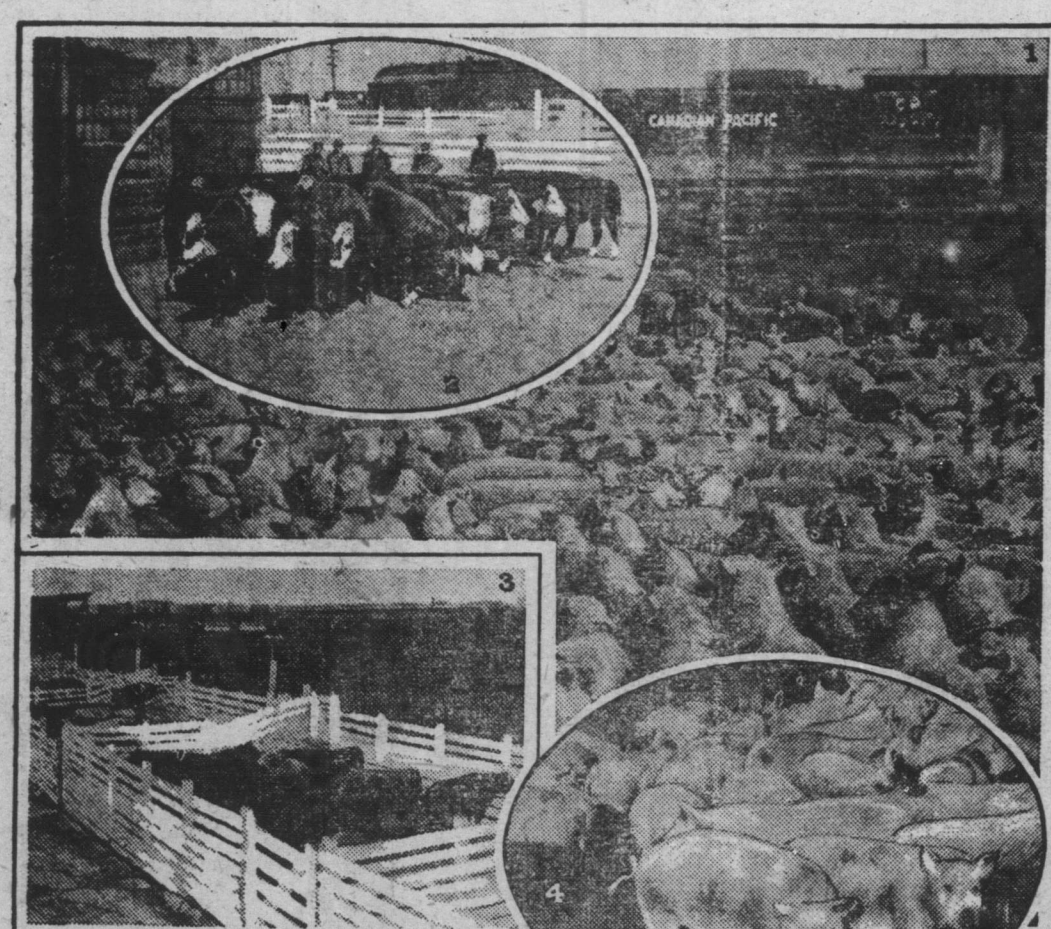

FATTED CALVES FOR BRITISH BUTCHERS

These four-footed emigrants are on their way to Europe. They belong to the Livestock Producers of Canada and have taken lodgings for the night at the Canadian Pacific East End Market, Montreal, before continuing their long journey from Winnipeg to Glasgow.

The extent and the variety of the activities of this Market, its value to the community and indeed the fact that it exists at all is not nearly as widely known as it should be, except among those farmers, drovers, butchers, buyers and exporters who make use of its manifold conveniences.

The establishment has been in operation on its present site for 12 years. It has accommodation for 3,000 head of cattle, 5,100 head of sheep, lambs and calves, 1,200 hogs and can provide sleeping quarters, board and valet service for a total of 14,000 animals at a time. Its export sheds (said to be the finest in Canada) have 50 modern, light, airy pens in which 1,000 transient guests may be housed without crowding or difficulty.

The establishment has facilities for handling, branding, exporting, killing and chilling cattle, sheep, lambs, calves, hogs, milk cows, bulls and horses. There is, in the market grounds, a modern and well equipped abattoir where local purchasers may have their stock killed quickly and efficiently. Incidentally, the stock coming from the western farms and ship-

ped to England or sold locally is, almost invariably of superb quality, being equal to the finest stock in the world.

Cattle is sold on the market four days a week, auction sales of horses are held once a week, roping and branding takes place weekly and slaughtering is a daily occurrence.

The market, in all its branches is owned and operated by the Canadian Pacific Railway and is government inspected.

J. H. Pierpont, the manager, says that the present consignment, of which only a few are shown above, is one of the finest that has ever passed through his hands. Some of them are show cattle, bound for Wembley, and the others, less fortunate, will probably be converted into the roast beef of Old England and grace the tables of London, Leeds and Manchester, etc.

The consignment consists of 283 western steers, all fine, fat fellows, of which J. P. Kennedy, president of the Livestock Producers of Canada, is justly proud. Owing to some slight damage being done by fire to the vessels on which they were to travel, their departure has been delayed a few days. In the meantime they are living on the fat of the land, philosophically enjoying the comforts of the present, without concerning themselves too much with the uncertainties of the future.

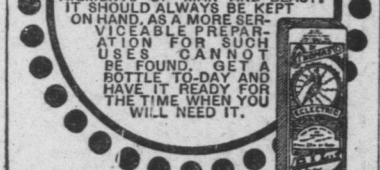

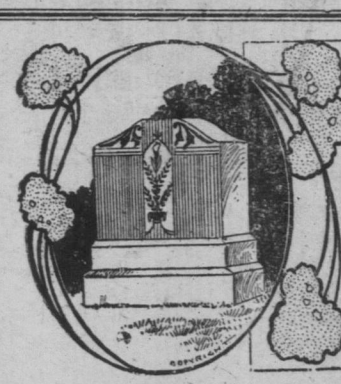
