Sackville's Queer Claim.

London, Sept. 3.—Lord Sackville, as lord of the manor of Stratford-on-Avon, has presented to the Town Council a claim for encroachment and rent in respect to the fountain and clock tower donated by Mr. George W. Childs, of Philadelphia. At a court meeting to-day several speakers denounced the conduct of Lord Sackville in the matter. They said the spot on which the fountain stands has not been used as a public market for 600 years. The Council holds that there has been no encroachment unless Lord Sackville's agent writes that if the Council admits the claim, at the same time asking that it be not enforced, his Lordship may refrain from levying rent. Why should any decent journalist be asked or expected to give his columns for such a vile purpose? Why should a newspaper be made the medium through which ruffians attack each other? Why drag a publisher who cares nothing about a quarrel—who probably hates it as much as any man in the community—why drag him into it and make him take the risk of a libel suit for a quarrel not his own? Publishers are often themselves to blame. Many of them are too willing to give space to any anonymous scamp who is too cowardly to put his name to his libelous effusions.

The Adver-tiser has invariably urged this view on its contributors, and will certainly not permit its columns to be used to promulgate the views of anonymous letter-writers who wish to turn their opportunity to write to an unfair or dishonest purpose.

The rich men who deal with first-class houses, and can afford to pay top prices, are almost the only ones who are not victims of fraud; the farmers and the working classes are the chief victims.

The machinery for the electric light will be urnished by Goldie & McCullough, of Galt, and Leonard & Son, of London. The exhibit in the main building will surpass in interest and novelty all previous fairs.

Something entirely new and original will be seen on the south side of the main building. Here will be shown different materials and articles in the process of manufacture. There will be seen featherbone coraets made on the spot, cigars finished from the leaf, glass-blowers at work, tin-stamping by the McClary Company, shoes made fromraw leather, furniture carving and upholstering, screws turned out in machines, harness manufactured, the various processes in pottery work from the clay, and many other things to delight of the exhibit.
