How Men Are Procured.

Pittsburg, Pa., July 28.—An afternoon paper reports a riot on a Baltimore and Ohio train near Whitehall this morning between non-union men on their way to Homestead and guards on the train. It is alleged that when the men learned they were bound for Homestead a number deemanded permission to get off. The guards refused and a general fight ensued, in which two men were seriously injured. Thirty-five of the men then seeaped and the others went through to their destination. When the men left Cincinnati they did not know they were being taken to tion. When the men left Cincinnati they did not know they were being taken to Homestead, and when they found it out they rebelled. That is how the riot started. Joseph Maaning, a resident of Cincinnati, about 20 years of age, says he will make affidavit to this. After leaving Cincinnati, says Manning, all the doors were locked and the windows fastened down and we were not allowed to open them. Early ning, all the doors were locked and the windows fastened down and we were not allowed to open them. Early this morning we had all been sleeping and when we awoke were surprised to find both doors to our cars guarded by a watchman with a gun. Some of the puddlers approaching one of the guards asked: "Where are you going to work?" "At Homestead," was the reply. The puddlers then gathered around the guard and demanded that the doors be unlocked and that they be allowed to leave the car. The guard refused to let them pass, and then the puddlers jumped on him and there was a terrible scene. Every man in the car jumped from his seat, some making for the doors; others tried to break through the windows and some got into a fight. At Whitehall the guard was thrown from his position and the door burst open. The men commenced to jump off and they kept dropping off all the way to the city. I escaped in the crowd at the depot. On down town streets it was many degrees hotter, and the effects were very generally apparent. About 5 o'clock a coal teamster named Patrick Lyons dropped from sunstroke in the East End and died after three hours of intense agony. A great number of cases of prostration, more or less serious, are reported. The street car service was greatly demoralized owing to the horses auccumbing to the heat and overwork, and at least seven died in harness. At 11 p.m. the temperature was 87 degrees, with no sign of the promised drop.

Bindsedd, July 29.—As the completion of the five-inch Brown segmental tube wire gun draws near, the experiments with the fac-simile tests have been resumed. ASLEEP FOR YEARS!

A Varitable Rip Van Winkle in Quincy,

A Veritable Rip Van Winkle is Quincy, Minn.—Physicians Puzzled.

QUINOY, Minn., July 28.—Minnesota's modern Rip Van Winkle, Mr. Herman Harms, who has slept almost incessantly for the past seventeen years, has once more started out of his sleep. His case is most phenomenal and is attracting more attention from day to day. Within the pass year he has been visited by several prominent physicians for the object of medical enlightment. It is now about one year since he was last swake, at which time he remained awake for two weeks, taking the normal amount of sleep.

Mr. Harms is now living on the Bugmann farm, one mile and a half cast of this place. He noved here about three years ago from near Utica, this State. Some seventeen years since, when living in Illinois, Mr. Harms was attacked by a severe fever and had intense pains in his head. After the febrile symptoms had passed away this sleepiness came upon him. His physicians advised him to try living in a cooler climate whereupon he moved to Minnesota. This was in 1878. During his stay in Illinois he did not sleep continuously, but since coming to this State he has slept all of the time, with the exception of eighteen months beginning with 1881, two months in 1889 and two weeks last July.

While he is sleeping he can only be aroused by his wife touching him gently on his head. Calling or shaking him will not arouse him in the least. In this particular he is a strikingly strange case. He takes no nourishment at all to speak of, but when he does it is always in the night. The past year he has become terribly emaciated and seems to have aged greatly indeed.

Mr. Harms was born in Germany in the year 1838. In 1863 he was married to Miss Lydia Bugmann. Five children have been born to them, the last one in 1891. All the children appear to be as bright as the average child.

The eldest boy, Willie, was a victim to melancholia, and in 1882, at the age of 12 years, committed suicide by hanging himself to the plow handle while in the field plowing. This affliction falling u

prowing. This ametion failing upon the poor wife and mother prestrated her. Only a few days past she said she could bear with the care of her husband, but when her son's name was mentioned she broke completely down. During all these years of her husband's torpidity she has zealously guarded him and has labored with Christian resignation and fortitude.

The family is in almost destitute circumstances. Last summer a representative of a well known circus called on Mrs. Harms and offered to give her \$5150 per month and expenses of the family it they would travel with the circus. But she would not listen to the proposition. She has also received several similar offers from numerous museum managements of Chicago and other larger cities. Mr. Harm's case has thus far baffled the skill of the best physicians.

The Middlesex Law Association at their ecent meeting made out a strong case in favor of a decentralization of the law business of the Province—at least so far as this be taken against the policy of diverting almost all the legal business of the country to Toronto, and that united action should be maintained till a remedy is applied. Two reasonable contentions are advanced by the gentlemen who set the ball rolling at the London court house this week. 

LONDON'S LEGAL NECESSITIES.

Proposed Establishment of a Law School in London.

Weekly Sitting of the High Court Imperatively Required in This Western Center.

In response to the call of the secretary a well attended meeting of the Bar was held at the court house yesterday afternoon. The chair was occupied by E. J. Parke, Q.C., Vice-President J. B. Mr. I. F. Hellmuth stated there wer Mr. I. F. Hellmuth stated there were two objects before the meeting—the establishment of a law school at London and securing a sitting of the High Court weekiy at London. The tendency recently had been to centralize all in Toronto. The law school produced this; students all had to go there two or three years. Practically they were valueless now. If we had a sitting by a judge of the High Court weekly at London it would not be necessary to go to Toronto except for the Court of Appeal and Term. He would like to see lawyers on both sides unite, and it could be reasonably carried. would like to see lawyers on both sides unite, and it could be reasonably carried. Mr. R. Bayly, Q.C., thought the law offices were changing. The type-writer had dispensed with many clerks; the law school had taken many more of them to Toronto. The present system would weaken the outside bar beyond recognition. All students who go to Toronto and do well will likely remain there. He would like to see the weekly sittings taken hold of with a will, and it could be carried. Mr. M. D. Fraser supported the ideas of the previous speakers. The profession generally were in accord with them. He considered it a great hardship on the out-

Mr. E. Meredith, Q.C., favored both schemes, particularly the weekly sitting, which would be a great convenience.

Hon, D. Mills was in sympathy with the object of the meeting. He referred to the London Law School and the establishment of the school at Toronto. The effect of the school at Toronto. The effect of the school at Toronto. The thought it would be right to allow a student either to attend the law school or study at home if he preferred it. It should be optional with the student. He thought if a student was able to pass the examinations it should make no difference where he obtained his education. It was the right of the public to say who shall practice, norther right of any society. He favored what would be in the interest of the public, and he would not leave it discretionary with county court judges to hear high court motions. He would make it compulsory. On motion of Mr. T. H. Purdom, seconded by E. Meredith, Q.C., it was resolved that a committee be appointed composed of the following gentlemen: James Magee, Q.C., E. J. Parke, Q.C., R. Bayly, Q.C., Hon. David Mills, Q.C., T. H. Purdom, M. D. Fraser, I. F. Hellmuth, E. R. Cameron, T. H. Luscombe, F. Love, T. G. Meredith and R. K.
