Davis in reference to the a colonist nar Matabele raid at ort Victoria, and alleged atrocities commuted by the British, was recently published in the Pretoria press. Davis declared hat the stories about Davis declared that the stories about Mashonas being assaulted in the streets were unfounded. The impi, he said, never entered the town but Dr. Jameson summoned the Matasle headmen, who were deferential, while Dr. Jameson himself brusquely gave them an hour in which to cross the Matable border, 30 miles distat. Davis thus describes the pundit: Davis took the impi seven miles from Victoria. They were going at a jog-trot. Many were unmounted. Dr. Jameson immediately ordered us to fire. Our men were mad and shot down the Matabeles like rabbits, pointing indiscriminately at the dead, the dying and wounded. Twenty-five of the Matabeles were killed. Each body contained enough bullets to kill a dozen. The Matabeles never turned when we opened fire on them. Only one, an old man, fired a return shot, and he was immediately brained. Another Matabele was brained with a gun stock, which was smashed by the blow. It was sickening work, yet on returning to Fort Victoria we were cheered as though we had wen a second Waterloo."

CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—The paid admissions the World's Fair yesterday were 252,-

618. Chief Clerk Blackman, of the administra-Chief Clerk Blackman, of the administra-tions and collections department, figures that the profits of the concessionaires will aggregate \$4,000,000 after deducting the percentage to the exposition. This repre-sents about 20 per cont. of the gross re-ceipts. The Ferris Wheel Company will pay a profit of \$260,000, after deducting \$200,000 for cost and 50 per cent. of the ceipts. The Ferris Wheel Company wan pay a profit of \$260,000, after deducting \$300,000 for cost and 50 per cent. of the receipts paid to the fair after that amount was taken in. The fate of the Ferris wheel is not decided. It has been stated that it was to be put up at Cape May or Coney Island, but neither statement is correct. THE LOST NARONIC.

Interest in the Missing Vessel Revived.

One of the Ill-Fated Steamer's Boats Picked Up at Lea.

LONDON, Oct. 26 .- Capt. Anderson, Ayres, from Chicoutini, writes from the Argentine capital under date of Sept. 20 that he found on July 21, in latitude 36° north, longitude 33° west, one of the boats of the White Star steamer Naronic, boats of the White Star steamer Naronic, which was lost at sea many months ago.

Capt. Anderson adds that the boat was bottom up and contained nothing whatever. It was thickly covered with barnacles, and there was a large hole in the bottom. The lashings of the boat appeared to have been cut in a great hurry, and with such force that the rail beneath where the lashings had been fastened was severed. The patent unhooking apparatus had not been used.

The Naronic, which was valued at \$500, 000, sailed from Liverpool on Feb. 11. She was commanded by William Roberts, one was commanded by William Roberts, one of the most competent captains in the White Star Line's service, and had altogether 72 persons on board—the crew numbering 55 men. Severe gales swept the Atlantic on Feb. 16, five days after the Naronic started, and it is surmised that in one of these storms the vessel went to the bottom, nothing definite having ever been learned as to the fate of the steamer and those on board.

The train was late and did not get in until 12:30 midnight. The coffin, encased in a zinc-lined shell, was lifted out of the baggage car to a truck. "It's not very heavy," remarked the baggageman, as he moved it off to one side, and it certainly was not. Mr. Frederick Colgrove states that the identification of the body was complete. It could not be recognized by wearing apparel, as the clothing was burned completely off. Both hands were burned off and both legs broken. The body was frightfully burned, not a feature being recognizable. A peculiarity about the toes known to the family was one of the means of identification; another was the general shape of the skull. One of the boys thought they could identify the remains from a gold filling in one of the teeth. On arriving at Battle Creek they found a hole in the tooth, but no gold—it had probably melted in the heat of the flames. There were other peculiarities about the remains that assure the sons that they have brought home the body of their father. All that could be found of Mr. Colgrovo's belongings were a jack-knife, a handkerchief and the skeleton of his valise. There is some uncertainty about the remains of the grip, butfrom the his value. BAPTIST FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Continuation of the Women Workers

What Has Been Done in Quebec-Reports of the Scoretary and Treasurer.

Hamilton, Oct. 26.—At last evening's session the church was well filled. Prot. J. H. Farmer gave an address on the mission work in Queber and Ontario. During the past year 900 persons have been converted. There are 133 students at the Grand Ligno School in Quebec, and scores of applicants had to be turned away for lack of accommodation.

To-day the Foreign Missionary Society is doing business, with Mrs. Booker in the chair. After the opening exercises Mrs. Booker, the president, delivered her annual address. It began by extending a glad welcome to Miss Hatch, the missionary, who has been for a number of years the society's representative in India. The death of Miss Hattie West was referred to. The report said: "The outlook in our field is most hopeful, the Lord is enlarging our borders. As a society we are not growing as we should. We have not kept pace with our outlay. Standing still means to go back. To go back in Christian work is to die. We are using for current expenses the reserve fund we always need at the beginning of the year for our first appropriation, so as to be always free from debt. Does it not seem strange that we should constantly need to be reminded of our duty to the heathen?"

Mrs. Wm. Davies, jun., the sceretary, presented her report. It showed the appropriations which had been made on Oct. 26, amounting to \$6,010. Reference was made to proposed changes in the constitution, of associational societies, and instructions to directors. These were referred to a committee. In behalf of the society a petition was sent to the Minister of Customs with a view to the abolition of the importation of Chinese girls. 



"I landed in Liverpool on Saturday morning. That eveniny I did not feel sick but could not write or read with comfort (as usual at sea), and felt as if the time were lost. On Oct. 14, I entered upon a two months' course of meetings in the largest etties of Sociand and England, and Ireland follows, all arranged before I came by a volunteer committee, which saves me much labor and time.
