## Difficult Work

Building the Springbank Line a Tough

Horses Mired and Quicksand and Springs Encountered-Straightening the Road.

The street railway company have at present 260 or more men engaged in building their road in the city or on the line between Woodland Cemetery and Springbank, A reporter took a trip over the line yesterday afternoon with Manager Carr, who goes over the work of construction the first thing in the morning and the last at night, rain or shine-and a great deal of rain accompanied yesterday's trip. The street company is considering the advisability of changing to York street, owing to the high grade on the south curve of the railway leading into Railway street. By leaving the city via Stanley street, a gentle slope leads from

street.
From Railway street to Woodland there is very little change in the road of last year. The outer rail has been raised on the curves to permit of abstreet. there is very little change in the road of last year. The outer rail has been raised on the curves to permit of absolutely safe traveling at high speed. The curves have been lengthened and rounded considerably. The frost raised the pilework at the Cove bridge,

ecessitating some strengthening. The car stopped at Woodland Cemetery, where a large party was waiting to return to town. From Woodland to the stopping place of last year the road is being straightened, unsafe banks cut down, and the grade altered considerably. The new work leading into Springbank commenced under great difficulty. Holes could not be dug for the trolley poles, as the quicksand and water would fill in imme-diately, and the only way the difficulty could be got over was by sinking barswamp a thick bush is encountered, and a road has to be cut through, the fallen trees and bushes being strewn along to give a foundation to the road-The scene through this avenue of trees is very pretty. In Springbank proper the railroad strikes the gravel road leading to the pump house at about the same grade. The old ice house east of the hotel has been torn down, and so has the merry-go-round. Mr. Simmie's house will be taken down this week, and meantime the family is occupying quarters in the top gat of the old hotel on the riverside. The projected line extends due west through the park and between the two collecting ponds. About 100 yards west of the pump house there are two miry holes that are giving the teamsters no end of trouble, teams having to be dug out repeatedly. The line extends for fully half a mile west of the pump house, and ties and a great deal of iron are already laid. The rails are of the "T" variety, which were taken up in South London. A sand pit adjoins the loop at the end of the line, and this will be made good use of for sand

Paris, May 12.-In this town, the other night, Mr. Wm. Paterson, manufacturer, Brantford, addressed the electors on the question of taxation and its relation to manufactures and the prosperity of the people. He said the Conservative managers took a delight in misstating the Liberal platform-"free trade as they have in England" was the cry of the Conservative leaders. 



TUESDAY MORNING. Mr. Justice Armour is making rapid fore him, and will probably get through on or before Thursday. The audience was much smaller this morning than yesterday, but much interest was taken in some of the cases.






