



No candidate is required by the department to take any one of these four tests unless he intends to teach, and nobody who knows any-thing of our public school system would dream of permitting men or women to "teach" subjects which they do not know. These examinations we must have, and it is perfectly right that those who seek to pass them should be required to pay for the privilege. They cost money, which neither the general public nor the teachers already in the profession should be required to pay. 4. In fixing a scale of charges for these departmental examinations the aim is to make them self-sustaining, not to make them a source of revenue Every cent of the money so collected by the department goes into the consolidated revenue fund of the province; every cent of the expenditure comes out of the same fund, and is checked in the provincial audit office. All the receipts and all the expenditures are open to the annual inspection of the publ accounts committee of the Legi Assembly, and all the items take their places with the other expenditures of the education department, and with the expenditures of all the other departments of the public service, in the ulpit at Poplar Hill.

Principal Kirk Returns From the Mining Region.

Very Favorably Impressed-Not Many Going to Klondike.

Principal Kirk, of the Aberdeen school, has returned from British Columbia after an absence of about four weeks. It was Mr. Kirk's first visit to the mineral province, and he was favorably impressed. To an Advertiser reporter who called upon him this morning he gave a most interesting account of his experiences. Mr. Kirk spent most of his time in the vicinity of Golden and Windemere, East Kootenay, the richest mining district of province. He ventured on horse back 30 miles up among the mountatins during his visit at Windermere, and will ever remember the wild and rugged scenery along the route. The country, he says, is uninviting to the farmer, as it is purely a mineral country. 
