President Van Horne Submits the Directors' Annual Report-His Views on the Rate War.

Following is a fuller report of the C. P. R. shareholders' annual meeting at Montreal, which was briefly mentioned in yesterday's Advertiser: In submitting the annual report to the directors for approval, President Sir William Van Horne said, with reference to the difficulties with American transcontinental lines: For a number of years prior to 1894 the Canadian Pacific had, by agreement with the transcontinental lines, been allowed

The preamble of the bill was adopted, and the bill was discussed clause by clause. Some of the clauses were held over for further consideration, but the main features of the bill were passed. Power to acquire stock in other companies was withheld for the present. The company will have power to acquire mines and operate, construct tramways and telegraph, and acquire vessels for navigation, etc. The capital stock of the company is placed at \$20,000,000. The head office will be at Hamilton. Power asked to construct from mines and furnaces of the company to existing railways was held over. The bill will no doubt be put



He Prefers Peace.

Mr. Culver, the Local U.S. Consul, on the Cuban Trouble.

Hopes War Will Be Averted, But Has No Doubt of the Result If It Comes -An Advocate of Anglo-Saxon

An Advertiser representative met Hon. Mr. Culver, the United States consul, yesterday, and asked him what his opinions of the Cuban situation were. Mr. Culver replied that as he had been absent from his own country so long, he was not fully posted.
"I sincerely hope," he said, "that the Cuban trouble will be settled by peaceful means. Because of the possibility of war, it seems to me that the United States has been preparing to strike a decisive blow, that would cripple or destroy the Spanish navy at the out-set, and thus end hostilities at once. This would be more humane and less destructive than a protracted strug-

"Do you think it would be a sea fight exclusively?" "That depends. The United States would place troops in Cuba if a naval victory did not terminate the war. It would be impossible for Spain to land an army on United States soil. course the first engagement would be on the sea, and in all probability that would be the last. Some think that naval hostilities would be prolonged, but I cannot see it in that light. The American navy is undoubtedly much superior to the Spanish. It is not only larger, but the ships are of the most recent type and construction. A naval encounter would be of peculiar interest to the whole world, because it would be the first real test of the modern battleships. The Chino-Japanese war was not a sufficient illustration for naval authorities, as the ships were not handled by experts-on one side at



Great Distress in Shawneetown Ill.—The Bodies of the Dead Not Recovered.

Shawneetown, Ill., April 7.—Twenty-three known dead, a possibility that the list may reach 30; 1,500 people in actual need of the necessities of life; 700 people homeless, and damage to the amount of \$200,000, is the net result of the flood which swept through Shawneetown late Sunday afternoon. Not one of the bodies has been recovered. There is not in the town a loaf of bread, a pound of meat or an ounce of drugs that can be bought with money. There is absolutely nothing in the town Seven hundred people have been driven from their homes with no clothing but what they wore on their backs at the time they were overtaken by the flood. Every available room is taken, every family is living in the second story of its house, and of those whose homes were wrecked 100 or more are camping in the court house, 100 in the school house, 75 in the loft of & small elevator, and 50 are quartered in a flouring mill, and the ferryboat Jessie Wilson has furnished refuge for 100.



On the following grounds we think the commissioners are under both legal and moral obligation to refuse the ap-
