ROCKEFELLER RAPS HIS UNIVERSITY

Thinks the Great Chicago School Should Turn Out More Successes.

Chicago, July 11.-John D. Rockefeller is disappointed in his pet institu-tion, the University of Chicago, to which he has given almost \$20,000,000 of his Standard Oil profits.

This became known today as a de elopment of his visit here at Judge Landis' urgent invitation last Saturday. It came in the report of a conversation with the oil king and caused tremendous sensation among the faculty, students and adherents of the

It was remarked at the time that he did not visit the university, though he had never before failed to do so when

Seated in an automobile with his brother, William Rockefeller, and a friend, the "richest man in the world" gave his criticism of the university in a terse reply to a question as to what he thought of it and its work.

"The only regret I have concerning the university," he said, "is that there are not as many men as successful as hoped there would be after their schooling there. "But I am advised by some of my riends that the future may show bet-

er results than the present. If the

future will show that it was a wise

inderaking, I shall be satisfied." It Stirs Up the University. Nothing has happened in the history of the university since it became the eneficiary of the Rockefeller wealth which has stirred the campus occupants more than this statement, and were John D. Rockefeller, as painted in oil, to step in real life from the frame, holding his likeness in Hutchinson Hall, the consternation would not equal the storm which his criticism of the Midway School has caused

n university circles. Members of the faculty in part and almost the entire student body represented during the summer course aired their sentiments as to the erroneous views entertained by Mr. Rockefeller. They combined the following points:

Making money alone does not necessarily mean success. The business course is most practical, and in no other university are the students given the opportunity to brush up against so many successful businessmen as in Chicago. Theory, thoroughness, application to duties, and hard work taught—the primary principles that should make graduates successful. ONTARIO FRUIT FOR WEST

St. Catharines District Now Competing With Growers on the Coast.

Toronto, July 11. - The Ontario department of agriculture will make an exhibit of Ontario fruits next week at the Winnipeg exhibition. The fruit markets of the Northwest provinces have been supplied mainly from the Pacific coast. About three years ago, at the request of the Niagara fruit growers, the department made some shipments to Winnipeg which were quite

This has been followed up by the fruit growers, and an increasing business is the result. Last year about 60 cars of fruit were shipped from St. Catharines alone. With a view to encouraging the consumption of Ontario fruit the department made a collection of apples last year. These have been kept in cold storage and will be sent forward and put on exhibition at Winnipeg on Monday. Mr. Percy W. Hodgetts, who has charge of the fruit work of the department, will have charge of

the exhibit at Winnipeg. In addition to the cold storage fruit there will be some shipments of this year's early fruits. So that it is expected a very attractive exhibit will be made, which should be of value to Ontario producers.

JUDGMENT IN FAVOR

Of "Baby's Own Soap" Given by Judge

The Albert Soap Company recently brought an action against Drysalters, Ltd., manufacturers of "Mothers' Favorite Soap," for infringement of their trade marks. This being a matter which is of general interest, we print below the finding of Judge Burbidge in this case, which forbids the sale of that soap in its present style.

Between Albert Soaps, Ltd., plaintiffs, and Drysalters, Ltd., defendants. This action is brought by the plaintiffs, who are manufacturers of soaps. to restrain the defendants, who are in the same business, from infringing certain registered trade marks that the plaintiffs own and use in connec-

tion with their business. The plaintiffs manufacture a soap known as "Baby's Own Soap," the defendants a soap known as "Mother's Favorite Soap."

The plaintiffs ask for a declaration that the acts of the defendants in placing their soap on the market with the labels at present used, and in the manner at present adopted, constitute an infringement of their trade marks, and for an injunction to restrain the defendants from continuing the use of such labels in the manner mentioned. There will be, in respect to the specific trade mark hereinbefore mentioned, judgment for the plaintiffs, with costs, and the injunction asked for will be granted.

death seeks to claim him. Graeco-Romans Not Embalmed.

In the Graeco-Roman tombs the bodies were not embalmed. Instead they were plunged into a bath bitumin for a certain aromatic period, with the result that they are absolutely black. Sometimes were subsequently gilded from head to foot, though generally only the face was so treated. Upon the breast, the arms and the legs bits of goldleaf, almost square, applied. The ritual required that the face should shine brill and that the body should be wrapped in thick bands until its outlines were wholly concealed. As that would have made the head appear disproportionately small the head was wound about with linen. 'Upon' both head and breast were placed the combined mask and cuirasse, modeled in this case of painted stucco. The portrait of the departed represents him as holding in his hand the emblematic sheaf of wheat and the crown of the elect.

One of these mummies right hond pressed to his bosom, with the forefinger and the thumb outstretched in the mystic gesture that recalled to the faithful the monogram of Christ, while the left hand holds the crown. Above his head runs aureous frieze, Upon another mummy you can make out the figures of Osiris, Isis, Thoth, Anu-





Washington, July 11.-The departward trusts violating the Sherman act, and it is expected it will be given a trial in a very short time, in an action against the tobacco trust.

The department will ask the court, if in its judgment the interests and the facts as disclosed demand such action, that receivers be appointed to take charge of the business and adtake charge of the business and administer it in harmony with law.

Such a course, it is said, if adopted, would require the receiver taking charge of a corporation with a view to the gradual disintegration of such monopoly, that is to say, such recelver, in administering such business, would from time to time be expected to sell and dispose of the different property units composing such monopoly in such a way as to preserve all the essential rights of the stockholders and at the same time ultimately give to the general public the benefit of competition between separate and independent corporations or businesses.

The policy was decided upon by Attorney-General Bonaparte and Milton D. Purdy, the trust expert, after careful and mature deliberation, and there is every promise that it will shake the trusts as nothing before has done. If the views of the attorney general and his chief lieutenant are realized, the smashing of trusts is a certainty in the future, and there will be more alarm among the combinations than ever before.







HAYWOOD TELLS HIS LIFE STO HIS LIFE STORY &

Declares Orchard's Confession implicating Him to Be False.
