Fifty returned soldiers walking the streets of the city, out of work, willing to work but still unable to procure it, is the situation as presented by the Returned Soldiers' Association.

In speaking of the problem of getting the returned men back into positions suitable to their needs, a member of the association said' to a reporter today. "We have on the list a number of of men, quite capable of taking and doing almost any kind of work and on the other hand we have men fit only to do the lightest kind of work.

"Efforts have been made by the men themselves, by the Returned Soldiers' Ald Commission to secure positions, but it seems that for some reason or other there is no place for a returned soldier."

It is further claimed that some of the returned soldiers who were unable to make good in civil life as quickly as expected were released.

The men believe that more leniency should be shown and that they should not be expected to do so much until they become accustomed to the new order of things. With more returned soldiers coming every week and others being discharged from the hospital, the problem of finding employment for them groks dally more acute.


