





CLAIM POACHERS AT WORK ON THAMES

Vigilance Committee Almost Captures One Gang.

Members of the London branch of the Ontario Forest, Fish and Game Protection have solved the mystery surrounding the large numbers of dead fish seen floating down the River Thames recently, after many days and rights of investigation. They claim nights of investigation. They claim that the fish were killed by poachers employing old but unique methods. The said poachers, in groups of three or four would go out each evening, and, selecting a likely spot in the river, would throw in a bottle congining a quantity of lime, the bottle being corked with a quill inserted through a hole in the cork, which is fitted as tightly as possible. The water gains access to the lime via the quill route, and calcium hydroxide is formed, the gas bubbling off the lime, and because escape is arrested by the cork, the bottle bursts, all fish in the immediate vicinity being killed or stunned by the explosion. The bursting bottle throws the water in the air for a considerable distance. nights of investigation They claim

able distance.

Float on Surface.

The dead and stunned fish then float on the water surface, and the poachers gather the best edible types, leaving the others as evidence of their work. Some species of fish sink when killed by the concussion. The unfortunate part of this practice, which is against the law, is the fact that fish of all sizes fall victims, thousands of minnows, which are of no use to the offenders, being included on the death list.
