

character of his disease. It is recalled that the surgeons at that time made nothing of the first operation on Emperor Frederic. There is anxiety, because both Emperor William's father and mother died of cancer, and his grandmother, Augusta, was also so afflicted. 

Leicester, Nov. 9. - Lord Rosebery, addressing an audience here Friday afternoon, said the attitude of the present Government was unparalleled Mr. Joseph Chamberlain's policy rested entirely on personal pledges, but the country was not prepared to surrender a certainty for a hypothesis. The speaker admitted that the condition of the country was unsatisfactory, that agriculture was crippled, that education was defective and that the question of the number of persons unemployed was important, but he claimed protection was no remedy. If protection were once adopted they could

The report also confutes the stories of the outflow of gold and shows Great Britain inported more than \$17,500,000 more bullion than it exported during the ten months of 1903.


