THE CONSERVATIVES AND MI OHAMBERLAIN'S POLICY.

most respected and popular members of the House of Commons and each day finds him growing more and more in the esteem and the regard of the people at large.

Many people were surprised that at the recent session of the Dominion House the Government failed to pass any resolution with regard to the Chamberlain propisals, and some have criticised Mr. Borden in that as leader of the Opposition he did not introduce a resolution when the Laurierites amitted that plain duty.

Mr. Borden now states that he went to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and of fered the support of the Conservative members in a body if the Government would submit a resolution in support of Chamberlain's idea. He

"But nothing was done by the Government, nor one word said by Sir Wilfrid Laurier to encourage Mr. Chamberlain by showing the people of the Mo, her Country what the feeling of the vast majority in Canada is concerning a policy calculated to bind the empire in a bond of commercial interesid as well as of sentiment and mutual sympathy. Mr Borden believed that Mr. Chamberlain's policy, if adopted, would result in the raising of the value of all farm property in Canada 25 up 50 per cent. If it were asked, Why had not the Opposition submitted a resolution favoring Imperial reciprocity he would say that it would not look well in Great Britain to see the proposition voted down in the Parlimment of Canada. That might be a good thing from a party point of view, but he believed the interests involved in the success of the preferential trade far transcended those of partly."

The entire incident is eminently characteristic of Borden and just as characteristic of Laurier whose Gov ernment, it will be remembered, was the last to offer assistance to the Mother Land, at the time of the Boer war and then did not take the step until forced by public opinion

POLITICAL CHALLENGING OF JURORS.

The Toronto Telegram directs public notice to the extraordinary use of Crown prerogative in the trial of W H. Callaghan on the charge of theft from the Crossin Piano Co., when all Conservative jurors were challenged against Callaghan. Now the parties to the quarrel are all Liberals, including Callaghan, but even a disgruntled Liberal is entitled to fair play in court, if that has not become an exploded notion under Ross Rule. The rule is that the defence is restricted to twelve challenges, whilst the Crown's right to challenge is unlimited, and that prerogative was exerted against seventeen Conservative jurors, the re sult being that a jury was got which promptly indicted Callaghan for steal-

The Telegram thinks that a variety of circumstances go to show that Callaghan was put on trial for dishonesty in order that he might be punished for making the affidavit which he did against Stratton, Johnston. Crossin and others, indicating crookedness in the deal whereby Cross-in was enabled to buy Gamey's stock in the piano company. In fact the presence of politics in the trial was hardly disguised at all. The Callaghan side exhausted their twelve challenges to exclude Liberals from the box, but of course failed in the competition with the Crown's superior privilege, and so the Crown. which guise the Liberals worked the Doubtless the Crown's challenging only stopped at seventeen Conservatives because the jury at that point had become satisfactory to the

There are three from To-ronto, three from London, one from Belleville, one from Strathroy, one from Bloomfield, and three from Ot-Others are from Montreal Win nipeg. Halifax and other cities. The applications are from all classes of soldiers, from Lieutenant-Colonels to privates. The Toronto applications are from veterans of the Canadian Mounted from veterans of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, two of whom are now in the 48th Highlanders. Two of the appli-cations from London are for positions to act as scouts. Some of the appli-cants, explaining why they are anxious to enlist, state that their opinion of the situation in the far east is that of all Pritishers, that Leans should deep all Britishers, that Japan should keep Russia out of Corea, just as England should keep Russia out of India." The applications have been forward ed to the Japanese Government.

THE KAISER'S WRATH.

Crown Prince Confined to His Room for Three Days.

Berlin, Dec. 16.-Crown Prince Frederick William was required by his father to remain in his room for three days for having raced in a steeplechase against the Emperor's wish, and was reprimanded by the Emperor's wish, and was reprimanded by the Emperor for riding up the steps of the San Souci Palace at the head of a company of the Guards, of which regiment he had recently been appointed Colonel. The Prince, while at Bonn University, was noted for driving tandem at full speed to see how close he could cut corners.

Persians Defeated.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 16.—Sanguinary conflicts between Persians and Turcomans are reported to have occurred on the Russo-Persian irontier. Fights between custom officers and Turcomans followed the estab ishment of Persian custom houses, and resulted in killings on both sides. The Governor of Astrabad, with a large body of troops, intervened, and refused an indemnity offered by the Turcoman Khans. In the fighting which ensued both sides sustained heavy losses. Report says the Persian troops were defeated and retired to Astrabad.

THE NEW REPUBLIC

PANAMA, WHICH SECEDED FROM THE REPUBLIC OF COLOMBIA

The revolution on the Isthmus of Panama, which resulted in the capture of the department of Panama by revolutionists and the forming of a new republic, was brought about because of alleged intrigues by United Statesers playing upon the passions of the inhabitants of the isthmus over the rejection of the Panama Canal treaty by the Colombian Congress.

gress.

It is believed that the adjoining states of Cauca, Bolivar and Magdalena will join with the revolution-

ists and that the new republic will consist of those states and Panama. The treaty by which the United States guarantee free traffic across the isthmus was made with New Granada in 1846 and promulgated two years later. In 1862 New Granada became the United States of Colombia, and in 1886 the name was again changed to the Republic of Colombia.

The new republic of Panama has an area of 31,571 square miles and a population of 504,773. The territory to be embraced in the new state will extend to the Costa Rican boundary on the west, a distance of 225 ists and that the new republic will

dary on the west, a distance of 225 miles from Panama city, and to a point some 225 miles east, making the new republic about 450 miles in

the new republic about 450 miles in length.

It seems to more than a mere coincidence that the United States Government has a stronger force on the isthmus than it has ever had there before, nearly 3,000 men being there or in the immediate vicinity. The Atlanta, with 400 men; the Nashville, with 260, and the Dixie, with 800 to 1,000 are on the Colon side of the isthmus, while the Boston with 400; the Concord, with 250; the Wyoming, with 400, and the Marblehead, with 300, will be stationed at Panama.

His body was found the next day forty rods from the cutter, lying on his back, where he had apparently fallen after a last struggle to regain his feet. Tumut Again Formally Declared the Site of New Previncial Capital.

The Federal House of Representa-tives at Melbourne has reinserted. Tunut in the Bill fixing the site of the new Federal capital. The site was rejected by the Federal Sensite on the 15th ult., in favor of Bom-bala, while only a week previously

the House of Representatives decisived for Turnut.

Turnut was originally chosen because of its admirable situation: It is a pretty little town some 264 miles from Sydney, on the River Turnut, a tributary of the Murrumbidge. The district round Turnut embraces the richest agricultural land in the country. Its cereals are especially fine, season changes being of the slightest at this favored spot. The population of Turnut is about 6,000, with an area of holdings totalling 500,000 acres. It is rapidly increasing in importance as a wine

totaling 500,000 acres. It is rapidly increasing in importance as a wine growing centre.

Bombala is the leading township of the Monaro district on the Bombala River, 319 miles from Sydney, and is a great grazing centre. Gold mining is also carried on a few miles from the town, and there is a big trade in valuable timber for building purposes. Stream tin has also trade in valuable timber for uniding purposes. Stream it has also
been discovered and is now being
worked with good commercial results. Lead, silver, and copper are
also plentiful, and it is this richness
in mineral wealth which is believed
to have swayed the Senate in its
choice of sites for the capital.

BETWEEN THE SEASONS. emaining Relies of Summer Take of

The searching, penetrating air of winter persistently impresses the universal law of change. It comes supremely indifferent to its welcome, and regardless of the petty human activities it interrupts. The remaining relics of summer take on a new interest. Birds are not careful gleaners, and the berries still clinging to the withered and shrunken stalks of the solomon's seal and wild lily of the solomon's seal and wild lily the solomon's seal and wild fily of the valley betray their negligence. Even the freely-displayed berries on the viburnum have been overlooked in many places. The wintergreen and partridge berry reveal their brilliant contrasts of scarlet and green in per-lect indifference to the passing sea-sons. But the most brilliant display of the closing year is made by lect indifference to the passing seasons. But the most brilliant display of the closing year is made by the bitter-sweet, as it clings and struggles over shrubbery unable to withstand its strangling coils. This vigorious climber sometimes sways loose, is apparent indifference to the sturdy tree that supports it. A slight hold on a branch, in a lofty, spreading top, is all the support if elight hold on a branch, in a lofty, spreading top, is all the support it demands, and it swings to the ground like a big, idle rope, light and flexible, inviting various speculations as to how it contrived to climb without taking hold. Sometimes the bitter-sweet will clasp a tree scarcely as large as itself, coiling round and round about it like a serpent, and slewly strengling it to death. The dead and attenued very reround about it like a serpent, and slewly strengling it to death. The dead and attenuated victim may remain in the great overgrown coils, while the scrpentine trunk reaches up among the branches of other trees. Its handvome display of rich, red fruit is now revealed among the naked branches, and, in spite of its tempting appearance, is carefully neglected by the birds. The three-valved, spherical orange pods that cluster irregularly on the smaller branches are now open and turned back, displaying the bright red pulpy covering of the seeds. This fruit has the reputation of being poisonous, but while birds avoid it, ether bipeds collect it for decorative purposes. It is very enduring, and dries without losing its form or color. The bright colors now displayed among the naked branches are an attraction to the feathered gleaners but while they linger and fit about they are not further tempted by appearances.

further tempted by appearances.

The bracing air is an inspiration to all animated nature. A brightly-decked jay pulls the last remaining acorn from the highest branch of a red oak, shaking in his strength the clinging bunches of withered leaves. He flies to another tall branch to display his handsome mettling of display his handsome mottling of blue and white, but is too busy even to gratify his vanity. The chirp of a junco comes from the close foliage of the cedars, but he cannot remain in hiding. His active energy is contagious as he struggles with the problem of a food supply. Birds become sociable with the approach of winter. Their more somber colorings geem to climinate all class distinctions. Juncoes, chick-a-dees, and free sparrows gather together in communal activity. The tree sparrow.

The tree sparrow, distinguished by a little black dot in the centre of his otherwise plain breast, seems to take special delight In hiding and concealing his identity, while his friend the chick-a-dee has anothing to conjectely ignores his most curious visitors. The fomalning robins are congregating in flocks and rehearsing for the long migration by lofty, aimless flights. And away up, almost among the grey clouds a belated flock of flights. And away up, almost among the grey clouds, a belated flock of wild geese appear like a geometrical form of black dots as they move slowly and steadily southward. That angled outline in the silent distance is moved by a guiding instinct as certain as the calculations of the navigator. RUSSIA BELIEVED TO BE CHAMBERLAIN READS A LET-PLAYING A DEEP GAME.

London, Dec. 17.—The Times has the following to-day from its corres-pondent at Tokio:—In spite of reassuring utterances from Paris and Berlin, the conviction is widespread here that Russia shows not the smallest practical evidence of a desire to conciliate Japan. While she is sim-ulating a pacific demeanor in Europe ulating a pacific demeanor in Europe she is in reality seeking by delay and a display of warlike preparations to goad Japan beyond endurance, and thus impose upon this country the responsibility of a belligerent initiative. Indignation is consequently growing rapidly in Japan. Three petitions, urging resolute measures, have been addressed to the throne since the Diet dissolved.

Tokio, Dec. 17.—In consequence of Russia's reply a special conference of

Russia's reply a special conference of older statesmen of Japan, including the Marquis Ito and the Cabinet Ministers, is proceeding here to day. It is understood that the statesmen are is understood that the statesmen are considering the adoption of a firm stand against Russia. General Kodama, the War Minister, was present for the first time at the conference. There is renewed activity at the Admiralty in view of a possible naval demonstration.
