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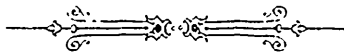

CHRONICLE.

BOLIVIA.—The 2c. violet of the new issue has appeared.

CEYLON.—We have the 25c. and 28c. both surcharged in black in two lines "FIFTEEN CENTS."

COLOMBIA.—We have lately seen the current 1 centavo, printed in blue on bluish paper instead of green on green.

ECUADOR.—The 10c. envelope has been surcharged in black "5 centavos 5."

GREECE.—Mr. Rechert has shown us the current set perforated. 11½ except the 2 lepta which is 13½.

GUINEA.—The 10 reis card has a new frame. Instead of resembling that of the 10 reis of Macao and Timor it is now the same as the 20 and 30 reis of Guinea.

HONG KONG.—The Jubilee stamps were issued Jan. 22, and were on sale for three days. 50,000 were made.

ITALY.—The 5c. green is surcharged across the lower part in black "C^{mi}—2."

LABUAN.—The 16c. stamp is again printed in blue, Watermark CA.

LAGOS.—There is a 2½d. blue.

MONACO.—M. Maury informs us that the new stamps are of the same colors as the old ones, with slight variations, except the 75c. which is now brown lilac on white. There is a new value 50c. violet on orange.

NEW SOUTH WALES.—The 6d. has "O—S" in the upper corners in white circles.

ROUMANIA.—Stamps and cards of special design were to have been issued early in May in commemoration of the 25 years' reign of King Charles I. They were for circulation in the interior only for 10 days.

SALVADOR.—The Government seems to have run out of 1c. stamps temporarily, for the 2c. has been coming up with surcharge "Un Centavo."

SARAWAK.—The 12c. is now surcharged 5c. in black.

SIAM.—We have seen the 1att. olive green of the current type. It differs from the other values in being printed in one color only.

SIERRA LEONE.—There has been issued a new value, 2½d. blue.

STRAITS SETTLEMENTS.—There are five sizes of the 5c. registry envelopes, 132x83, 150x95, 202x128, 227x100, 292x154mm.

SWEDEN.—the 10 and 20 ore of the new design are now in circulation. They are watermarked with a crown.

We have appointed Adrien Champion, of Geneve, Switzerland, our agent for Europe. He has our authority to receive subscriptions and advertisements for this journal.

THE coming Convention of the C.P.A. will be the most important in its history; in fact it seems to us that the very life of the Association depends on the action taken in amending our constitution and by-laws and in putting all the departments of the Association in working order, especially the exchange department.

IN another part of this number we publish the correct form of proxy to be used. The editor of this journal Mr. H. F. Ketcheson will personally attend the Convention at Belleville, Ont., next August, and any members who cannot be present but wish to be represented may send their proxy with a letter of instruction to him and they may count on having their instructions carried out.

"IT APPEARS quite certain that Chalmers first suggested the adoption of such a scheme as a necessary accompaniment of the Penny Postage system. It is, however, an interesting historical fact to learn that the use of that exceedingly convenient bit of paper, the adhesive postage stamp, dates from 1840, and that Great Britain was the first European country to adopt such a method of prepaying and stamping letters. The stamps were first printed in slips from dies, gummed and cut off as used. Perforated sheets were introduced in 1852. This improvement was the invention of a Mr. Archer, for which he got the sum of £4,000. It is very likely a claim will now be put forward in the British Parliament for some suitable recognition of the services of James Chalmers in this connection. Such recognition will not benefit the inventor, but may help to keep his memory green as, in his time, a genuine public benefactor."—*Montreal Herald*.

S. ALLEN TAYLOR was brought to trial yesterday afternoon before Judge Aldrich, in the United States circuit court, on a charge of using the mails in a scheme to defraud. The claim of the government is that he issued circulars offering for sale certain rare postage stamps of foreign countries, when, in fact, he manufactured them himself. While Assistant District Attorney, John Murray Marshall, was addressing the jury in his opening of the case, Mr. Bordman Hall interrupted with objections to some of the statements. Finally Mr. Marshall appealed to the court asking protection. Mr. Hall replied that he had made no remarks except that he had directly addressed the court. Judge Aldrich suggested to Mr. Hall that there ought to be no interruptions other than to note exceptions. A

motion by Mr. Hall to quash the indictment was held in abeyance by the court, but will be renewed by Mr. Hall in the form of requests for rulings later in the trial. The point raised is that the circular gave sufficient warning that the stamps were not genuine. The case is still on trial.—*Boston Herald*.

JOHN R. HOOPER writing under the "non de plume" of *Canadensis* in *Mekeel's Weekly* takes this Journal to task for daring to nominate a ticket for C. P. A. officers. He calls us a subsidized organ and tells his readers that we have no right to express our opinion or offer a suggestion for the benefit of the Association. We do receive \$50.00 per year for publishing the reports of the Association and consider we should have twice that sum, as 2 or 3 pages of our space is taken up in each issue which would bring \$50.00 per page per year as advertising space. We give value for every cent we get from the Association and have always, and *always will*, express our opinions freely on all subjects even if a self-boomed nominee for President does object. The editor of this Journal has sent in more applications for membership to C.P.A. than any other member of the Association and during the past year out of 14 new members added to our Association, 9 of them were proposed by H. F. Ketcheson; during the same time Mr. J. R. Hooper has not secured a single application for membership. We leave our readers at large and particularly the C. P. A. members to judge who has the interests of the C. P. A. at heart, the editor of this "subsidized organ who tells the members who to vote for," or J. R. Hooper who tells his readers that there are "good men" in the field for president and that "J. R. Hooper" is one of them? However, we make the following suggestions to Mr. Hooper whereby he can redeem his reputation and add a couple of new members to the list. In one of his notes he adds that there are three aspirants for "Official Journal"; THE DOMINION PHILATELIST, *Canadian Philatelist* and *The Maritime Philatelist*. We would suggest that Mr. Hooper secure the applications for membership of the editors of the last two Journals as he should know that the "Official Board" will not appoint persons to office who are not members.

CORRESPONDENCE.

H. F. Ketcheson, Esq. :

DEAR SIR,—A great deal has been written lately about the cause of the actual depressed state of the C. P. A., and every one agrees that something should be done to change this. Now I think that the main cause of all this trouble is that some of the officers do not see that the Regulations and By-Laws of the Association are carried out. When the Rules have been decided upon, as being the proper ones, it is the duty of all officers from the President down to see they are properly observed. If they do not suit, then they should be changed as soon as possible. But this does not seem to be the case.

Take for instance the case of the President and Mr. Sicotte. Do you not think it would have been better, and more in accordance with regulations, if the President had made such a serious accusation as that of circulating counterfeit stamps, in a more regular manner; that is to instruct the Executive Committee to make an inquiry in the matter and report fully; It would then have been done in a proper way, and it would have saved the President from making an accusation he he could not substantiate.

The same thing applies to the accusations against the Exchange Superin-

tendent, was there ever a regular inquiry about those repeated complaints? and if this was not done whose fault is it?

Then again we have the Superintendent complaining that some people will not pay their accounts when called upon to do so. Did the Superintendent see that every one who was receiving stamps from him, had at first sent him stamps, or made a cash deposit, or given first class reference, as mentioned in the regulations?

This reference question could very easily be arranged. We have officers of the Association, or good reliable collectors, in all important places. Would it not be an easy matter for the Executive Committee to get a list of all the members who desire to use the Exchange Department, and get full information as to position and general character of each, and forward it to the Superintendent? This would be a guide to him, to insist, in certain cases, on a cash deposit, or extra caution.

Mr. Hooper's suggestions are very good and I hope the members will give him an opportunity to put them in practice. I am sure he will make a first-class Exchange Superintendent, which is the officer we are most in need of at the moment.

I think your ticket a very good one. To the Editor of the Dominion Philatelist:

DEAR SIR,—The May number of THE DOMINION PHILATELIST has just come to hand, and it does one good to read the numerous letters which that particular number contains, coming as they do from members who evidently have the well being of the Association at heart. The Convention will meet in August, and it would be well if every member, either Canadian or American, having suggestions to make, would utilize the June and July numbers of your JOURNAL and air the views which each would like to have discussed at Convention and possibly acted upon. I think that Dr. Egerton T. Davis was right, when in the last number of your paper he expressed a doubt as to the wisdom of electing officers from any and all quarters of the Dominion. The working officers, as distinguished from the ornamental, must be centralized, if they are to pull together harmoniously.

In the current number of the JOURNAL I notice that Mr. Hooper gives notice of motion that at next Convention the annual subscription be reduced from two dollars to one. In the present condition of affairs I cannot think that motion a wise one, for the simple reason that unforeseen contingencies may arise. The Exchange Department may again get into difficulties, and the Association

be called upon through its treasury to make good the deficiency. Were the Association in good working order, and the Exchange Department in good business shape, such a reduction in the membership fee might be advisable and would no doubt prove welcome. Do not begin by tying the hands of the officers you are about to elect, for the time may come when they would be glad of the extra elbow room the present subscription gives to them. I wish to emphasize what I have just written, and will do so as follows: On the 25th April, 1889, the sum of \$44.24 was sent to the Superintendent of Exchange by order of the President, to straighten out the affairs of his Department. The other day the Treasurer was again ordered to send the Sum of \$100, and again for the same purpose! Your treasury is now in debt to the Treasurer.

There is another small matter to which I would like to direct the attention of members. By referring to Act IV, Section II, of the constitution, you will notice that the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, are elected by the Association at large, and that they form the Official Board, one of the duties of which board is to appoint all other officers. Nominations are therefore not in order. It might be well for the members to remember this point when filling out their proxies, for their wishes therein expressed will no doubt carry great weight with the said board.

Before closing I would like say a word to those members who have not yet sent in their subscriptions for the current half year. The half year is drawing to a close; some 20 members are still in arrears, and if they will consider this a personal notice, I shall be much obliged and shall forward their receipts without loss of time.

Mr. Editor:

It was not necessary for Mr. Sicotte to intimate that I should not have noticed his first letter. I was fully aware at that time of that fact. It was his wanton and uncalled for attack upon a faithful and painstaking officer that induced me to pay any attention to it.

His subsequent letter only tends to confirm the fact that he knows very little of the subject he has written about.

He apparently has not the faintest conception of the difficulties attending the successful and satisfactory operation of the Exchange Department.

He does not seem to realize that when members take stamps amounting in the aggregate to nearly two hundred dollars from sheets on circuit and neglect or refuse to pay for them that the Exchange Manager is powerless to enforce payment and consequently the claims against the department cannot be satisfied unless the money is forthcoming from other sources. I know that Mr. Grenny has made every possible effort to induce those in debt to the department to settle and has time and again sent the lists of names and amounts due, to the Executive. I have in many cases written repeatedly and tried all means to secure cash settlements but in quite a number of cases without success. The

Executive Board has considered the matter and decided that nothing would be gained by exposure or expulsion and hope to see the amounts paid through time.

The explanation of the falling off in membership and interest in Association work lies with the individual members and not with the Executive. The great majority of the new members added to the Association in the last eighteen months have been proposed by officers and not by private members of the Association. Again many of the advanced collectors have either sold their collections or hesitate to place good sheets on circuit owing to the uncertainty of receiving returns.

It is a lamentable fact that some of our professional members whose positions and calling should place them above suspicion of dishonesty are notoriously backward in settling their bills and have caused the Exchange Superintendent and Executive no end of trouble.

Mr. Sicotte's remedy for all this trouble is heroic he says "let some one who understands his work better replace him."

Had I less regard for the future of the Association I should earnestly hope that at next convention the members present would be induced to place as high an estimate upon Mr. Sicotte's abilities as he does himself and appoint him Exchange Superintendent, and thus relieve the situation.

Mr. Sicotte's defence of his Mexican "rarities" does not do him much credit. He unblushingly acknowledges that he is in correspondence with a party who was so dishonorable as to write "Counterfeit," &c. on the pages of the book containing them with the obvious intention of preventing their sale, and afterward securing them by private arrangement for himself.

DEAR SIR,—My attention has been drawn to a letter appearing in your last number over signature of P. Sicotte, in which my name figures as an Exchange Superintendent of C. P. A. who does not perform the duties of his position. I emphatically and positively deny this allegation, as I have always to the best of my ability discharged as promptly as possible, what I considered to be my duty to the Association.

Because the Exchange Department does not work to suit each and every individual member's ideas, a few (very few) members have rushed into print, with complaints that Exchange Department is improperly conducted. I will refer to the Clark matter first. Mr. Clark's letters appeared in the Dec. number 1890, not last Feb. as erroneously stated, he says, "Sent in sheets, until about Aug. 1889. Below, I give dates of receipt, No. and value of each consignment.

So that it appears $\frac{2}{3}$ of the sheets were sent in after Aug. '89. In Mar. '90, \$20 cash was paid and in May \$10.00 cash, by Exchange Department in Aug. '90 (all sheets having been returned to owner) a balance of \$12.38 was due Mr. Clark, which was paid on 14th January, '91, or as soon as funds were available for that purpose.

Mr. Sicotte refers to Report of Committee to Convention, adopted 12th Aug. last, and asks if Supt. has adopted the suggestions. I would like to know which of them I have not endeavored to carry out! If Mr. Sicotte reads the official organ he will see that I have duly acknowledged receipt of sheets from members. As all sheets were printed on back same as A. P. A. sheets with "By the Superintendent" first on list. I would like to know by what authority he ventures the assertion that I had first choice from his sheets. It is nevertheless a fact that I was entitled to first choice, on 10 sheets out of the 14 received on dates as follows.

These stamps were a remarkable lot in more ways than one, one of which was their very high prices. I not only render quarterly accounts, but monthly to those members who are indebted to department.

Mr. Sicotte says he was compelled to pay for stamps taken from exchange sheets, when he was a creditor for much larger amount. If he paid anything, it is not known to me, as I received no money from him direct, he being a member of the Montreal Branch. I was requested by the Branch Manager at its formation to keep the account of all sheets sent in from its members, and the Branch Manager would pay cash for all stamps taken from Exchange Books when statements were rendered at regular half-yearly balance 1st Feb'y and 1st Aug. On June 16th, '90 5 sheets were returned to Mr. Sicotte at an average of about 4 months after their receipt by me. No Exchange Books or Sheets are circulated during July and Aug. of each year by this department. Of the other 9 sheets, 4 were received 3rd July, and could not be circulated until Sept., and as sales on the other 5 had been very light, I sent the 9 sheets out again on 2nd Sept. on an extended U. S. circuit of 12 members. They came back to me on 27th Dec. '90, and were returned to Mr. Sicotte on 3rd Jan'y '91, together with a post card written by Mr. Gurdji, of Texas, with comments on the quality, &c, &c., of the stamps. As this card is addressed to me will Mr. Sicotte kindly return it to the owner.

The 2 stamps mentioned as 4 and 82 of 56-63 of Mexico are split provisionals on part of original envelope, and were unquestionably *genuine*. So much could not have been said for a number of the others, Sattello surcharge, 3 acatecas, price \$20 or \$25, etc., etc.

The Exchange Superintendent is very willing and ready to yield up his fat office to anyone who understands the work better (or worse) and trust that some one will be selected who will give the greater satisfaction demanded by Mr. Sicotte.

Re CANADIAN REVENUE STAMPS.

QUEBEC, June 13, 1891.

To the Editor of the Dominion Philatelist :

Having obtained the following Quebec Law Stamps, and which I do not remember to have seen mentioned before, I desire to advise you of the issue, trusting that the information may prove useful to collectors of Canadian Revenue Stamps.

In the latter part of 1889 the Quebec Government issued three stamps similar in design to the issue of 1870. Full length figure of justice in the centre, "Law Stamp" in straight line across the top, below in curved line "10 dollars 10," on the left "Province," on the right "of Quebec," across the bottom in a wavy line the value in words. 1889, 10 dollars, yellow; 1889, 20 dollars, green; 1889, 30 dollars, violent brown. The Government have issued only 500 of each of the two higher values, and as it is not their intention to issue more, having found that the \$10 stamp will meet the demand, the two in question will become very scarce.
