EXPLANATIONS OF PRINCIPAL ARTICLES
OF THE CALENDAR.

ON the left hand page are given the Day of the Month. Day of the Week, Time of Sun rise and Sunset, to the nearest minute, local mean time; the Equation of Time ("Sun fast or slow of Clock.") for the instant of Apparent Noon at Greenwich, together with the hourly variation of the same.

The Sun's Declination is given for Greenwich Mean Noon with the hourly variations. If the declination at Apparent Noon (Greenwich Time) is required, it can be readily found by multiplying the hourly variation by the equation of time reduced to the decimal of an hour and applying the result to the declination at Mean Noon, as follows:

The Sun's semi-diameter is given for every day in the year; from it may be obtained the sun's horizontal parallax, dividing the semi-diameter reduced to seconds by the constant 107.44. Thus on July 1st, semi-diameter $15' 31'' = \frac{93''}{107.44} = 5''.33$, horizontal parallax.

The right hand page contains the Changes of the Moon, its Rising, Southing and Setting, and the time of High Water at Charlottetown, all reduced to the nearest minute, local mean time. The bearing of the Moon at full and change, the times of Perigee, Apogee, crossing the Equator, and of reaching its greatest declination are given, for the purpose of assisting weather forecasts, it being generally found that the Lunar Equinoctials are marked by atmospheric disturbances, the stronger the more nearly the times agree with those of the moon's changes and perigees.

ECLIPSES.

During the year 1881, there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon:

1st. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, May 2nd. Greenwich mean time of conjunction, 11h. 57m. 55sec. Invisible at Charlottetown.

2nd. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, June 11th. Greenwich mean time of opposition 18h. 54m. 23sec. Partially visible at Charlottetown, commencing at midnight. Total obscuration from 2 a. m. (June 12) till 3.20.

3rd. An Eclipse of the Sun, Annular, near the South Pole, only partially visible at the southern extremity of America.

4th. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, December 5th, invisible at Charlottetown. Greenwich mean time of opposition 5h. 7m. 11sec.

Transit of Mercury across the Sun's Disc.

November 7th. Commencing 10h. 16m. 13s. ending 15h. 37m. 41sec., Greenwich time, consequently invisible at Charlottetown, the Sun being then below the horizon.

PLANETS.

MERCURY—Will be at his greatest apparent distance from the Sun, West rising before him. East setting after him on the following days, Feb. 22nd, E., April 7th, W., June 19th,

E., Aug. 5th, W., Oct. 15th, E., Nov. 24th, W., being so near the Sun. Mercury is not easily found except when at the time of his greatest elongation, his North declination is greater than that of the Sun, the most favorable time will be about Feb. 22nd, when he will set nearly West at 2½ hours after the Sun. He will be in transit Nov. 7th.

VENUS.—Will be an Evening Star during the early part of the year, coming into interior conjunction with the Sun, May 2nd, afterward re-appearing as a Morning Star till the end of the year. She will be occulted by the Moon twice, viz., March 3rd and Aug. 20th, the latter not observable here the former only as a very near approach a little before the time of Moon setting.

MARS.—Will be a Morning Star throughout the year till his opposition to the Sun, Dec. 26th, he will be occulted by the Moon but not visible at Charlottetown, Sept. 15th.

JUPITER AND SATURN.—Will be Evening Stars at the early part of the year, they will be both in conjunction with the Sun April 21st-22nd, re-appearing as Morning Stars about the middle of May. Saturn will be in opposition to the Sun, Oct. 31st, and Jupiter, Nov. 12th, coming to the Meridian at midnight.

HERSCHELL.—Will be in opposition March 1st, and in conjunction, Sept. 6th.

NEPTUNE.—Will be in conjunction, May 3rd, and in opposition, Nov. 6th.

TIDE TABLES.

The time of High Water, Charlottetown, is given to the nearest minute for each day in the Calendar, once in the twenty-four hours. To find the time of an intervening morning or afternoon tide, take the mean of the two adjacent tides. Thus, for the afternoon tide of June 6th, take the mean of the morning tides of June 6th and 7th:

$$\frac{4\text{h. } 46\text{m.} + 5\text{h. } 58\text{m.}}{2} = 5\text{h. } 22\text{m. for the afternoon of June 6.}$$

Steamer (Trade)—One flag, Diamond Red and White, with Ball up to yard.

Ship—Blue Pennant, with Ball up to yard.

Barque—Blue Pennant, red tipped, Ball up to yard.

Brig—Red Pennant, Ball up to yard.

Brigantine—Red Pennant, white tipped, Ball up to yard.

Schooner—White Pennant, Ball up to yard.

2. The phases happening from 4 to 10 p. m., may be followed by fair weather; but this chiefly depends upon the direction of the wind.

3. If a storm arises from the East, on or immediately preceding the Spring Equinox, or a week after, the following Spring or Summer will be wet four times out of five; if from the West, North or S. W., the Spring and Summer will be dry five times out of six.

The rate of Postage on a letter posted within the Dominion of Canada, for transmission by Mail to any place in Canada, is three cents per half ounce weight; but the Statute provides that this rate must be prepaid by Postage Stamp at the time of posting the letter.

Any such letter posted wholly *unpaid* (or prepaid less than one full rate of *three cents*) cannot be forwarded to its destination, but will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, with the reason plainly written or marked upon it—"postage not prepaid."

Letters as aforesaid posted in Canada, and addressed to places in Canada, when weighing more than half an ounce, and liable therefore to two or more rates of Postage, will be transmitted by mail to destination, though not tully prepaid, if as much as one full rate of three cents has been prepaid thereon by postage stamps; and in such cases will be forwarded charged with double the amount of deficient postage not prepaid: Thus, if such a letter weighing more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and not exceeding 1 oz. in weight, be posted prepaid 3 cents only, it will be rated 6 cents unpaid—"more to pay"—and forwarded to its address.

On letters posted at an Office to be delivered from it, commonly known as "*drop letters*," the rate is 1 cent per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.; to be in all cases prepaid by postage stamp affixed to such letters when posted.

The charge for the Registration of a letter is 2 cents, to be prepaid by Registration stamp.

CANADA AND NEWFOUNDLAND.

Letters for Newfoundland are charged at the rate of *five* cents per half ounce, and must in all cases be *prepaid*.

CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES.

The rate of postage upon letters passing by mail between Canada and the United States is the same as to places within the Dominion, and must in all cases be prepaid by postage stamp.

The Registration fee to the United States is 5 cents, to be prepaid by Registration stamp.

TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Addressed to Great Britain must be prepaid by postage stamp *Two* cents per 4 oz. each packet.

PARCEL POST.

To any part of the Dominion, for each parcel weighing

Not more than 4 oz., 6 cents,

Exceeding 4 oz., and not exceeding 8 oz., 12 cents,

Each additional 4 oz., or fraction, 6 cents.

Parcels should not exceed 5 lbs. in weight, or 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth, and should be marked "by *Parcel Post*." Parcels may be registered by affixing a 5 cent Registered Letter Stamp thereto, in addition to the Postage.

Such books, papers, returns, etc., must not be accompanied by any instructions or directions.

The rate of postage on Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbs and Roots is 1 cent per 4 oz., the weight of a package not to exceed 24 oz.

PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

CANADA.

Patterns and Samples of merchandize, not exceeding 24 oz. in weight, when posted in Canada for places within Canada or Newfoundland, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of *One Cent* per 4 ounces weight, and put up in such a manners as to admit of inspection.

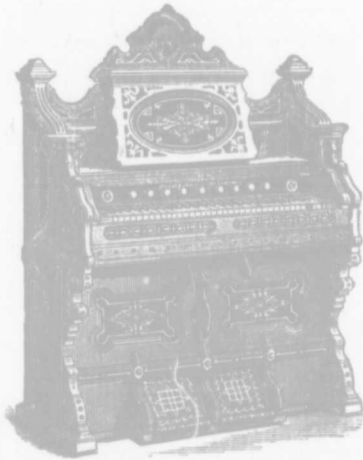

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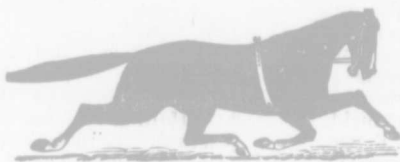

that although the English common people were then well-fed their houses were little better than pigsties. With good drainage, personal cleanliness, wise sanitary measures, and an ever watchful army of scientifically trained medical men, epidemics should soon be conquered. The common disease called measles has been frequently traced—at its inception as an epidemic—to filthy straw. In the middle ages, and down to the seventeenth century, measles and small-pox were classed together in the mortality returns; and we have lately seen what measles can do, in the absence of sanitary measures, in the decimation effected by an epidemic of it breaking out among the Fiji Islanders. Macaulay relates that men died faster (in the fourteenth, fifteenth, and sixteenth centuries) in the purest country air than they now die in the filthiest purlieus of our great cities. It is true that Black Death attacked sailors at sea; and it is related that vessels were seen drifting about the ocean, their crews having perished to the last man. But it may be that this was due quite as much to contagion as to "the air being quite as much infected over the sea as over the land." We are not going to dispute altogether the "germ-theory" of disease; it is old enough to command respect, for positive indications are to be found among the writers of antiquity of a belief in it; but the fact is, that although the specific germ may not be produced by spontaneous generation, yet it is only capable of generating an enormous extension of disease when it attacks a people wallowing in social squalor, decomposing filth, and vice. Then, those who live by rule and are cleanly in their habits, suffer, or at least those who are so unfortunate as to possess a predisposition to the prevailing disease; the innocent suffering through the guilty. The advocates of the germ theory are so short-sighted as to reject the idea of planetary influence; they admit that "unfavourable weather" materially assists to spread epidemics, they notice the periodicity of the outbreak of plagues, and they recognize "a certain individual predisposition the ultimate cause of which we do not know with certainty," yet they fail to study the operation of the planetary influences which produce unfavourable weather, etc., and neglect to compare the periodicity of epidemics with that of astronomic phenomena. It is to the diligent watchfulness of the astrologer, who is ever on the look-out for coincidences between Celestial and mundane events, that mankind must look for the very desirable foreknowledge of periods of "plague, pestilence, and famine." When such foreknowledge shall be attained then the adoption of wise sanitary measures would prevent much, if not the greater part of the evil. It is remarkable that the Cholera years do not show any great excess in the death-rate, although the number of the victims to

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made and used by the Egyptians, whose proficiency in Art and Occult learning at that remote period far surpassed that of the contemporary nations.

The objects sought in their use was to gain information or knowledge from spiritual beings, who could by means of the glass or crystal, place themselves in rapport with persons having peculiar temperaments or qualities of mind, and which obtained chiefly among the priesthood, and by this means if questions were asked, answers could be obtained, sometimes in the form of words or written sentences visible in the crystal, and to some spirit forms would appear, while to other seers only a luminous appearance, or a peculiar light would appear in the glass. It seems, however, that it required great purity of thought and character on the part of those using the glass, to obtain any response by this means. And it is said that no answers could be had to questions of an immoral character, or to those where fraud or an undue desire for gain was the object. Crystals in the time of Moses, were much in use by the Egyptian Priests, and also by certain of the judges, and by their use, it is said they were accustomed to decide on the testimony or the reliability of witnesses; as for instance, when a falsehood was spoken by a witness the stone would assume a dark or cloudy appearance, but if truth was told, then the glass would become luminous or very bright.

It is, therefore, manifest, to be a good seer in the Crystal, it required peculiar mental attributes or qualities, or in other words mediumistic powers, such as many persons possess at the present time.

There can be little doubt that Israel's law giver, Moses, who was reared and educated by the Egyptians, and was familiar with the occult knowledge possessed by that wonderful people, well understood the use and importance attached to the Crystal; for when after the departure of the Israelites out of Egypt, Moses ordered the making of the *Ephod* and the judgment Breast-plate as a part of the vestment to be worn by Aaron, the High Priest, when he entered into the Holy place or Sanctum; see *Exodus chapter 28*, where a full description is given, and in the fourth row of stones set therein the *Beryl* is named which is believed to be identical with one used by the Egyptians, as a spirit seeing glass. Hence probably arose the name of *Judgment Breastplate*, for in the description given of it there appears to be no reason assigned for the name farther than it being an insignia of office or a mark of distinction, which alone would have no bearing on the title. But if this Breastplate was used in part for the purpose indicated above, viz:—the same as the Egyptians used it, (*the Beryl*) and at the same time

as an ornament, then the meaning of the title would be clear enough, and the name would be appropriate for the purpose for which it was used, and we believe this was the chief use made of it by Aaron the High Priest.

It is clear then that the belief and practice of holding communication with the Spirit World is not, as many people suppose of modern birth, but it had in reality, its origin in the remotest antiquity, it is in fact coeval with man. It has been practiced either through the Crystal or in some other form amongst the different nations, all along down the past ages of the world, according as the people were willing or capable of understanding it. Crystals eventually found their way into Europe but they probably never came to be very extensively used from the fact that so few people have the requisite gift to see in them.

MYSTERIES OF MYTHOLOGY.

A great deal has been said and written on the mythology of the Ancients. Many modern writers have so mystified its true meaning, either from some sinister motive, as from gross ignorance, as to render it wholly unintelligible. True mythology, or that which related to Subjects of a higher order, such as different systems of religion, and to nature and nature's laws, although generally supposed to be fable, implied either a moral, or represented truth in disguise.

Nearly everything of importance was symbolized by the Egyptians, as was the case with the Chaldeans, Persians, and Hindoos, whose system of mythology was, in many respects, similar to the Egyptians.

Thus we find that the eagle, the lion, the bull and whale stood as symbols for the four seasons of the year. The eagle representing Spring time, the lion the Summer, the ox, Autumn, and the whale the Winter season. And again they typified the four elements, earth, air, fire and water, as these animals correspond in their natures to the seasons and the elements, all of which had their origin in the Signs of the Zodiac. And so it was in every other department of nature worthy of notice, each one of which was symbolized, or set forth in Allegory.

There was, no doubt, much traditional mythology, having its origin among the lower order of men, and which was little more than a system of maxims. But these have nothing to do with what we are now discussing.

Much of the mythology which took the form of allegory, had a far deeper bearing, and was made to typify the wisdom or knowledge gained in their astronomical researches, as well as in other departments of nature. Whence originated the great Hindoo numbers, known as the cali-yug of 432,000; the

The Conjunction of Saturn & Jupiter, 1881.

The Moon in the fourth house, in her north node, and in trine aspect with the Sun, promises legislation that shall greatly benefit the farmers and farm labourers. The valour of Britain's sons will again be rewarded with victory, and if England be but true to herself, her mighty empire will be made secure, and will also be extended.

which he enters December 21st, 1880. Leaving for a time the denizens in northern latitudes to battle with the warring elements, pregnant of fogs, snows, boisterous winds, leaden skies and half lighted days; while he rolls along the southern hemisphere, dispensing his bounties on the other side of the globe. Yet December is not always the most gloomy month in the year; for now comes the ushering in of the Merry Christmas, with its real and anticipated joys, the preparation for the coming New Year, with the thousand and one hopes to be realized in the future. Fortunate it might be for all, could their hopes be realized; but many are doomed to disappointment. The ponderous SATURN rules again this month and he is below the horizon; MARS is in the 6th and URANUS in the 8th house. There will be much fever, and many sudden deaths. The sun and moon in the 10th, is good for the government and tradesmen. Persons born the 10th, will have URANUS, see remarks September. Those born the 26th, will be subject to fever, &c., &c.

THE SIGNS OF THE ZODIAC.

The whole circumference of the heavens being divided into 12 equal parts, each one of these parts constitute what is called a sign, and wherein move the Sun, Moon and all the erratic stars and planets, belonging to the Solar system. The Egyptians, and the Oriental nations, found by observation and long experience, that each sign possessed a specific influence, which was exerted on some particular portion of the Earth; such or such a sign was said to rule over, or govern such or such a country.

Thus we read in the Scriptures, "*the Lord, thy God hath divided the constellations and the stars thereof unto all nations.*"

The stars, it is true, are visible unto all nations, but here we have the emphatic declaration that they are divided or apportioned out, some to one nation and some to another. Hence the above declaration, were it not based on something more than fancy, would be void of sense. The mere fact that the stars and constellations, being at times visible to the whole world, would not constitute a division of them unto all nations, any more than the Sun's light falling in one broad mass on the Earth, would constitute a division of it. It might be called diffused light, but not a division of light; therefore if the constellations are divided, i. e. their influence unto all nations, then the philosophy of the Ancients is fully borne out by the declaration quoted. It is not necessary however, to quote Scripture in support of the Egyptian theory, only in so far as to show the utterances of inspired writers; for the long continued observations in all time past,

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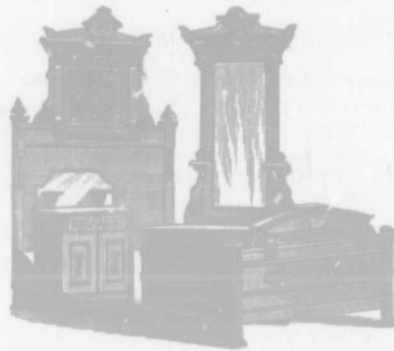

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birth. The worst effects of this eclipse will fall on the countries mentioned above, about the 28th of January (when Mars transits the place of the eclipse), and the latter part of August. In England the recruiting sergeant will be actively employed, and I fear that there will be some serious quarrels among military men which are far too likely to lead to riot and bloodshed. The presence of Venus in the tenth house indicates a royal marriage; and inasmuch as the eclipse falls in the western part of the heavens, we may look for some alteration in the laws affecting women. The weather for the ensuing month will be remarkable for "flashes of lightning and tempestuous storms of rain." *Death will be busy among the great*, and the rate of general mortality will be high this winter. It is remarkable that the figures of the heavens for the moments of occurrence of these two eclipses (of December 16th and 31st) are so extremely similar, and that Mercury at the latter is exactly on the place of the Sun and in opposition to that of the Moon at the former. A very critical period indeed will have to be passed through by Old England—her enemies will be numerous, powerful and insidious, and she will be compelled to draw the sword, ere many weeks shall pass away, in defence of British interests and of treaty rights. The Moon, ruler of the second house, afflicted, shows great expenditure.

The position of Mars on the cusp of the ninth house, and in the sign *Aquarius*, may indicate some great alteration in the laws relating to the army and navy and to *religion*. About the middle and end of April, when Mars will transit the mid-heaven of this ingress, the British Government will be in a sore strait. The position of Mars also indicates that "travelling shall be dangerous," and that many shipwrecks will occur; the destruction of several ocean steamers by fire is also threatened. The position of Uranus on the lower meridian signifies a cold and stormy spring, peculiar darkness of the atmosphere, and a heavy rainfall. Accidents in mines will cause loss of life, and I would counsel extra precautions, at the latter part of April. The Moon in the fifth house, and in square to Mars, is not a good omen for theatres and places of amusement.

Now, Asia Minor was declared by Ptolemy to be ruled or influenced by the sign *Taurus*. Ireland is also ruled by the same sign, and history records that the Emerald isle was, in 1146, the scene of anarchy and civil war.

Such disastrous events having befallen the countries ruled by *Taurus*, immediately after the last conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter in this sign, astrologers will look with anxious eyes for the approaching development of events in the same countries in 1881 and the years immediately following.

discord is at work. Church rights, and land tenures, will become a bone of contention, tumults follow and blood will flow. Poland, Persia and Asia Minor will suffer also, and in the latter places, disastrous earthquakes may be expected.

AUGUST.

VENUS is the dominant planet this month, and she is located near the cusp of the 2nd house. This argues a favorable condition for the public health, and fair, financially considered. The Sun being strong in the 4th quadrant, is a good testimony for the landed interests, and insures good and plentiful crops. Mercury and the moon denote much travelling and journeying about this month, and consequently, success and good revenues to the railroads; with the exception of URANUS in the 5th denoting troubles to theatres, and a diminution in the number of births, there is little else of public interest to be noted. The flaming Mars enters Gemini this month, and ere long, he will begin to manifest his evil propensities among us. On the 24th SATURN falls stationary which will give a shock to the places named under July, where want, misery and discontent will stalk abroad. Persons born on the 3rd of August, will have SATURN to square off Sun at birth; and to a certain degree, will those born the 1st of November, and the 30th of January, they should guard against losses, injury, and take care of health for weeks to come.

SEPTEMBER.

At the time of new moon for September, JUPITER the people's significator will be located in the 5th house, in sextile to VENUS. These positions will prove highly beneficial to schools and all matters connected with education, and it also promises a very high birth rate. Theatres flourish greatly, as well as exhibitions and other places of amusement. Mars has now fully entered into the ruling sign of AMERICA, and he is unfortunately placed in the house of sickness, and in bad aspect to four planets in the 8th house. These positions will, we fear, develop epidemical disease, similar to the cholera, which promises to prove very fatal in certain sections of the country. Jupiter falls stationary on the 14th day and will notwithstanding the presence of Saturn in Taurus, afford some benefits to the places under that sign. All persons born about the 18th of September, will then have the great benefic JUPITER with the sun at the birth day, and they will have a year of prosperity. But those born about the 3rd of September must prepare for trouble, as URANUS in his revolution of 84 years will pass the sun of birth. They may expect great trouble in business, and financial matters, separations occur between husband and wife, and this influence will continue for months. Let all such take heed to the warning.

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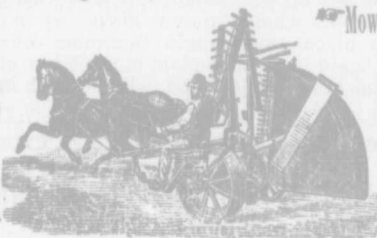
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OCTOBER.

As the month comes in, the active Mercury is found rising at the time of the lunation, and is free from any evil configurations. This foreshadows a period of activity—a busy time in the community, and much travelling and trading with foreign parts. But Mars bids fair to bring much damage to vessels by fire, and navigation will prove unsafe the latter part of the month, and disputes and wrangling will arise in the churches. The Government will be fortunate at this time, if it is not involved in dispute with some foreign power in relation to navigation, or other questions of international law. JUPITER and SATURN imply that many deaths among old people will occur during the month. Persons having their birthday on, or near the 31st of October, will now be under the hostile rays of SATURN, as will those born the 1st of May, any year; they should avoid speculations, and guard their healths for months to come, as they will be liable to throat difficulties, and consumptive complaints, and some will lose relatives.

The Mohammedans will be greatly excited; the Greek Church will attempt to proselytise by fire and sword; and the Roman Catholic Church will suffer at the hands of the atheistical republicans. Even in our own country, religious disputes will arise and will be waged in a spirit the reverse of Christian. A new sect will arise.

NOVEMBER.

This month brings the fiery PLANET MARS to the 12 degree of the tropical sign cancer, wherein he causes fires, tumults, and bloodshed in places under that sign, among which, are NEW YORK CITY, Constantinople, Scotland and some other places. At the lunation on the 22nd of October CANCER will be rising at NEW YORK, with Mars therein, and close to the ascending degree retrograde; hence accidents, explosions, and murders of no ordinary degree, may be expected to follow during his stay in the sign; and the evil is in no way lessened by the presence of URANUS in the 3rd house where he brings accidents on railroads, bridges, and such like places. The 7th, 10th, 16th and 17th are critical days. SATURN in the 11th in opposition to the lights, will prove detrimental to the revenues, and the secretary of the treasury will have his hands full of difficulties at this time. Persons born on the 5th and 6th of July must beware of accidents and explosions now, as Mars is stationary in the 14th degree of Cancer. But those born the middle of May now prosper and have health. Let them push their business, wherever it be.

DECEMBER.

The orb of light, the Sun, is now drawing down close on the verge of Capricorn, the beginning of his winter quarters

Spain; also for all persons born on or near the 1st of May, the 2nd of November, or when the Moon held the 11th degree of either *Taurus* or *Scorpio*. Such persons should avoid danger and safeguard their health in every possible way for the ensuing few weeks.

At PEKIN the conjoined planets will be setting; hence we may shortly expect to hear of bloodshed, earthquakes, and destructive storms in China.

The chief effects of this conjunction will be a great prevalence of sickness among mankind and small cattle.

- Conjunction of Mars and Jupiter, July 22nd, 1881.

At ST. PETERSBURG this conjunction takes place in the fourth house, Saturn being exactly on the lower meridian, and these positions portend that "houses shall come to ruin, and the earth shall not give its due increase." The Czar and his Chancellor will be involved in a labyrinth of trouble. Religious personages will be mixed up with political propagandists, and the crusade in favour of Pan-slavism will be preached with unwonted fervour and effect.

At CONSTANTINOPLE, also, the conjunction takes place in the fourth house, so that similar evils may be anticipated for the Turkish rulers, and earthquakes will follow in parts ruled by *Taurus*.

At PEKIN the conjoined planets are just risen, so the Chinese will experience great religious excitement, and will suffer from the war fever also. Shocks of earthquake and violent storms will quickly follow in China.

The Sun enters Libra, Sept. 22nd, 1881, at 9h 49. 5m. a.m.

At WASHINGTON, at the *ingress*, Mars will be in the *fourth* house. New York will suffer from numerous fires and scenes of violence. At the *lunation* Mars will be in the ninth house, and this prenotes many shipwrecks and burning of ships during the next few weeks. There will be plenty of work for the lawyers, and the religious world will be greatly excited.

At CALCUTTA, Jupiter will be on the mid-heaven at the *ingress*, and this is a sign of good government and reform. Saturn in the ninth house, is evil for travelling (long journeys), and there is reason to apprehend some danger therein. The positions of Mars shows that the army will be reinforced and will gain additional *prestige*. At the *lunation* Mars will be on the lower meridian, so that during the ensuing month the weather will be very dry and unusually warm. At the same time, affairs will not be in anything like a peaceful condition.

At PEKIN, at the *ingress*, Mars will be culminating, thus foreshadowing a continuance of the evils already foretold for the Celestials.

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Ireland will suffer greatly through the agitation anent the land laws, and the crops there will be very deficient.

A great earthquake will cause great destruction in Afghanistan.

The periods at which the evils forshadowed by this great conjunction may be expected will be when Mars joins Saturn and Jupiter, viz., July 6th and 22nd, 1881; and when eclipses shall fall, either on the place of the conjunction or on that of Mars; also when Mars shall transit the ascendant of this figure.

Partial Eclipse of the Sun, May 26th, 1881.

Canada will feel some of the effects of this eclipse and most important alterations in the laws will be made there, Alarms of war will be felt.

The Sun enters Cancer, June 21st, 1881, at 7h. 27. 9m. a.m.

At BERLIN, VIENNA, and ROME, Saturn will be culminating at the *ingress*, and cannot fail to bring misfortunes and physical evils (earthquakes probably) on the Germans, Austrians, and Italians.

At WASHINGTON, at the *ingress*, Venus and Jupiter will have just risen (in *Taurus*); hence the harvest will be plentiful and the American people will be very prosperous during the ensuing quarter. However, the Moon and Mars conjoined in the twelfth house prenotes some troubles arising from warlike acts of discontented tribes of Indians, etc. At the *lunation*, Mars and Saturn will be located in the ninth house, and this signifies that there will be some great catastrophe to ocean steamers, and many shipwrecks during the ensuing month. Venus and Jupiter being on the meridian shows a very prosperous period generally.

At CALCUTTA the Moon and Mars will be in the seventh house at the *ingress*, and this is indicative of *war*. Mercury in the tenth house and in square to Mars shows great perplexity for the Viceroy, and his enemies will be numerous and powerful. At the *lunation* Saturn and Mars will be on the lower meridian, and this is a bad augury for the crops. Shocks of earthquake will be felt in India.

Conjunction of Mars and Saturn, July 6th 1881.

A most violent storm attended by slight shocks of earthquake, will attend or immediately follow this conjunction. In Ireland and in all places ruled by *Taurus* the worst evils will follow; turbulence, bloodshed, and epidemics will fall on them. In some parts of England there will be most exciting scenes. In the House of Commons "scenes" will be frequent, and the Government will meet with a reverse. This conjunction is very evil for the Czar of Russia and the King of

financially considered, tradesmen flourish, and the revenues are augmented. But as Saturn is there also, he causes some losses and damage to merchants; nevertheless an improvement on the previous month will be apparant. The Luminaries to gether with Mercury are rising, and are opposing URANUS from the 7th House. These influences will develop much excitement in political circles, and Congress will become the arena of some lively scenes on the Presidential or some other question, chiefly about the 1st or 2nd days. The lights ruling the house of sickness, and in the ascendant, bespeak much sickness to prevail from coughs, colds, and obstruction of the lungs. Turkey and Paris witness strange scenes this month; and Mars will not fail to trouble the Czar's dominions, where Nihilism creeps from its hiding place again, and an attempt on the Emperor's life is not improbable at this time, as Mars will be squaring the Sun at his birth. All persons born on the first of March will enter a year of trouble.

APRIL.

MERCURY rules this month and is weak and out of all dignity in the house of sickness and under the evil rays of URANUS. This implies an unhappy condition of the people in certain sections flying from one extreme to another, without any settled purpose; but this applies more particularly to TURKEY as well as PARIS, where in the former place, tumults and insurrectory movements are in vogue, and shocks of earthquakes may be looked for in these parts of the old world, chiefly about the 15th, 21st, 22nd and 23rd days of the month. The Congress of Sun, Jupiter and Saturn about the 22nd, will unhinge affairs somewhat, in England and Germany, where the church question again assumes prominence, and ultramontaniam becomes defiant. Mars in the 5th will render theatres and places of amusement liable to fires this month. All persons born on the 21st of April or 24th of October, must now prepare for trouble, as Saturn will, in the former case, be with the Sun, and in the latter in opposition thereto at birth. They may expect to meet with losses, ill health, or death of friends. Let them avoid speculations, and be careful of health the remainder of the year.

MAY.

The fair VENUS rules the Lunation this month, and is truly the QUEEN of this floral month of May, as she is found in her own sign, TAURUS, and in the ascendant in trine to Mars, and disposing four Planets. This, so far as it relates to the public, denotes health, joy and pleasure, and the people will give much attention to recreation and amusements, but the revenues will be somewhat deficient. As Mars begins to separate from URANUS, Turkey is given a little respite, yet

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the epidemic was so enormous. Hence, we maintain that although there may be too much reason to expect the outbreak of epidemics within the ensuing few years, there is no cause for general alarm. People cannot (unless they commit suicide) choose the manner of their death (notwithstanding that the State doctors promise immunity from small-pox by universal vaccination and revaccination), and to the Christian as well as to the philosopher it should be a matter for calm inquiry, and not for puerile alarm, when epidemics may be expected.

The epidemics which have visited Russia during the last two years would seem to show that the line is advancing, and it is a warning to us to set our 'house in order.' The year 1883 is likely to bring an epidemic of Asiatic cholera or of small pox in England. A study of where the planets will be "angular" (*i.e.*, either rising, southing, setting, or on the lower meridian) at the moment of their conjunction will show in what countries the greatest effects will be felt. In proof of this we may take a recent instance, *e.g.*, the conjunction of Mars and Saturn of June 30th, 1879. At London the conjunction of the two infortunes took place at 7h 38m 2s p.m. If to this amount we add the longitude of Cabul, *viz.*, 4h 36m 24s east, we shall find that the conjunction took place at 12h 14m 26s p.m., mean time there, at which moment of time the right ascension of the mid-heaven was 18h 48m 25s and the sign *Aries* 18° 35' occupied the eastern horizon or ascendant. Now the planets Mars and Saturn were conjoined in 15° 8' 38" of *Aries*; they were therefore exactly *rising* (having more than 2° of *south* latitude) at Cabul at the moment of conjunction. What terrible events followed on September 3rd, when Mars came within 5° of the opposition of the place of the Moon (26°m 40') at the conjunction; and what battles were fought in October when Mars was *stationary* in opposition to the Moon's place, and again in December when Mars was *stationary* again in the ascendant of the figure of the heavens for the moment of conjunction, will be fresh in memory of the reader.

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London is also ruled by the same sign, and it is well known that London is now the largest city on the face of the globe, having a population between four and five millions; and is famous for her Institutions of Art and Learning, and her citizens are perhaps more energetic than in any other part of the British Empire.

Again, the United States, or at least a portion of them, is more or less influenced by this sign, which may well account for the well known perseverance of Americans, who are "to the manor born," and whose inventive talent stands almost unrivalled, while the growth of the nation has been unprecedented.

THE VERNAL EQUINOX, 1881.

Although we have already given a synopsis of the planetary influences for each month in the year, yet it remains to consider briefly the Planetary Speculum at the Vernal Equinox,—the true beginning of the astronomical year, occurring this year on the 20th of March. The great benefic planet, JUPITER, is the ruling planet for the year, and we find him rising and in the ascendant. This is a fortunate position, and shows prosperity and success to the people, generally speaking; but SATURN being there also, and near JUPITER, will injure the public health, by colds, consumptive complaints, diphtheria and catarrh in the head, and which will prevail chiefly in the Eastern sections of the country. VENUS is strong in the 2nd house. This speaks well for the revenues of the country, that money shall be plenty and that tradesmen shall prosper. But MERCURY afflicted will prove detrimental to some of the railways, as well as to some of the mining operations, with much litigation and loss. SATURN, the general significator of agriculturists, being with both JUPITER and VENUS, will benefit that class generally; yet the depression of MERCURY will seriously injure the crops in some sections, and prove detrimental to literary men and the book trade. The Moon's position in square to MARS, points to many deaths among females and children. Yet all things considered, the figure has more good than evil and bespeaks that there shall be less malice among mankind, than has hitherto been the case some years.

CRYSTALS.

Crystals were a kind of translucent or luminous stone used by the Ancients for the purpose of divination. These stones or glasses, were in form, oval or nearly egg shape, and are believed by some to have had their origin in India, and to have eventually found their way into Egypt, and thence to the western nations. But they were in all probability, first

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THE PERIHELIA OF THE PLANETS JUPITER,
SATURN, URANUS AND NEPTUNE.

The approach of four great planets to their perihelia within the next few years—a circumstance which has not occurred for five hundred years—has so over-excited the imaginations of some astronomers, ignorant of astrology, that the most extravagant predictions have been made by them of the dire effects expected to result therefrom.

Jupiter reaches his perihelion on September 25th, 1880; Mars will be in perihelion on May 26th, 1881; Uranus will be in perihelion on April 9th, 1882. Hence, although Saturn and Neptune will be a little longer reaching their perihelion positions, the effects of the approach of so many large planets to the Sun should begin to appear in 1881 and 1882.

There are some other phenomena which will signalise the year 1881, and will aid to render it a "great year." Allusion has already been made, in our general predictions to the conjunction of Saturn and Jupiter, in *Taurus*, of April 18th. This circle will be quickly followed by the conjunction of Jupiter and Neptune, on June 18th; then Mars will join Saturn on July 6th, and Jupiter on July 22nd. It is remarkable that these four important conjunctions will take place in one and the same sign (*Taurus*), and that there will be but a space of twenty degrees between the first and the last. Consequently, if astrologers are right in the assertion that certain countries are "ruled" or influenced by the sign *Taurus*—and history abounds with proof of the truth of this assertion—then will the chief effects of these conjunctions fall on Ireland, Poland, Asia Minor, Persia, Cyprus, and other places ruled by 8. Reference to *Deuteronomy*, xxxii., 8, and to *Genesis*, xxxviii, 9, will show that however numerous the nations are, they are all under one or other of the signs of the zodiac. The "children of Israel" were identified with the twelve signs.

To return to the nearly coincident perihelia: In the middle of the fourteenth century, when four large planets were last at their perihelia near the same time, plague devastated Europe and continued its ravages, more or less, for the two following centuries, culminating in the Great Plague of London in 1665. But, because the "Black Death" raged with such unremitting fury in the middle of the fourteenth century it by no means follows that with similar phenomena in the heavens recurring in the next few years, a like terrible and furious scourge must result. The Black Death in the fourteenth century found a pabulum to fatten on which, if it should recur in 1881 or the ensuing few years, it will not find again in England at least. Readers of Macaulay will find

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Mars will hardly get out the sign)-(, before the middle of the month. Saturn has now quitted Aries, where he has been domiciled during the two years, and entered Taurus, to the great discomfort of IRELAND, and other parts under that sign; but as Jupiter enters the sign with Saturn, he will keep the peace there for some time to come. All persons born on the 2nd or 3rd of May, will have a prosperous and happy year, as VENUS will be joined to the Sun, in her dignities at the birth day. The numerous planetary aspects will doubtless cause the barometer to fluctuate widely this month, with much moisture in the atmosphere.

JUNE.

MARS is the governing planet this month, and strong in the 4th house in his dominant sign, in friendly relation with Mercury and the luminaries. This begets a martial spirit in the community, and savors strongly of military display. Commercial men now prosper. Jupiter in the 6th will improve the health bill this month.

But we have, at the same time, URANUS in elevation and near the Cusp of the 10th house. This will bring trouble to the U. S Government, and it will be involved, the time being in perplexities. Changes therein are imminent. HERSCHELL, retrograde still keeps the Sultan's dominions in an uproar, and Paris is unquiet, while in the WEST INDIES death seems busy with his darts. About the 1st and 2nd weeks in June will be the most critical periods. Persons born the 1st of June will have Uranus in bad position with the SUN, and they should be cautious in all things at this period.

The month begins rather cool, but heat prevails after the first week.

JULY.

Sultry July is once more upon us, and old Sol the great dispenser of light and heat leads the Planetary Host this month. The Sun and Moon are found in the oriental quarter in happy accord with the other planets. This will be productive of good results, and serve to maintain friendly relations at home and abroad. We are glad to observe VENUS in elevation, and joined with Jupiter in her dignities. This will insure good success and prosperity to the United States Government, and all those cities near it, and signifies also, that it has emerged from the difficulties indicated last month. On the 9th there will be some bad ship wrecks, and some controversy in church affairs, as well as some singular court trials engage public attention. Mars has now entered TAURUS, and will form a conjunction with Saturn on the 6th, and with Jupiter on the 22nd day of the month. Now comes loud complaints from the EMERALD ISLE, where the demon of

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dwapar-yug of 864,000; the futu-yug of 1,296,000, and the sata-yug of 1,728,000; and these numbers being added together comprised the divine year of 4,320,000. The Hindoos had observed at a very remote period, that the poles of the Earth varied 4 degrees at each revolution of the equinoxial points, (embracing a period of about 25,200 years,) and these two motions taken together would divide the heavens between the two poles into 45 equal parts. Now in the Hindoo mythology, we read of one DURGA,—a woman,—who it is said, entertained dreadful forebodings respecting her favorite child, according to the manner in which it inclines, if it happens to repose with its head toward the North, she apprehends that some great calamity is about to befall it, and as it may otherwise repose, so will be its future fate. This specimen of mythology, as well as nearly everything pertaining thereto, has been ridiculed by many modern writers, who regard it as only heathen superstition, resulting from the grossest ignorance among the benighted people of India, who, of course, had not at that remote period the blessings of modern civilization; but the stupidity is on the other side.

It will be understood therefore that DURGA was but a symbol, or figuratively a portion of the heavens, and also the mother of all the years emanating from URANUS' lamp, and representing at the same time that space in the heavens laying between the Equator and the Southern horizon of Hindoostan, and she reigned during the time the Southern Tropic continued in that space of the heavens. Then came the age of horror,—her darling child was the SUN.

GENERAL PREDICTIONS.

PARTIAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN, DECEMBER 31, 1880.

At the moment of ecliptic conjunction of the luminaries the twelfth degree of the sign *Gemini* is on the Eastern horizon, and Mars is setting. The Sun and Moon are in the eighth house, in square aspect with Jupiter, and in trine with both Uranus and Neptune. Venus is in the mid-heaven. The position of Mars is the most significant. Placed in the house of war, near to Mercury, and in parallel declination with the Sun, there can be no doubt that foreign warfare is signified. In the East of Europe, in Spain, in Hungary, in Sclavonia, and in Arabia, will the disturbing influence of Mars be felt. In the East, "war, horrid war," will be waged with fury and almost without mercy. The Crescent and the Cross will be again engaged in a death struggle, and blood will flow like a river in consequence of the policy of spoliation pursued by Russia. The King of the Hellenes will do well to act very prudently, or the turn of events will be very disastrous for him, for the eclipse falls very near to the place of the Sun at his

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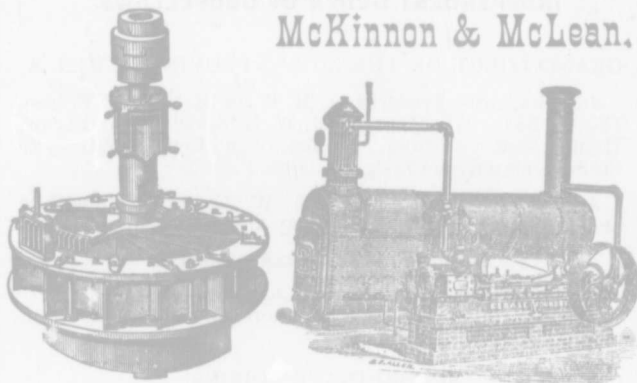

fully confirm the principles laid down, when viewed in the light of reason, to be correct. Taking the foregoing as a basis, we will quote once more "*there shall be signs in the Sun, and in the Moon and in the stars, etc., and one star differeth from another star in glory (or influence).*" And it is found that the signs differ to the extent, as to produce a marked difference in the conformation of body and mind of persons born under opposing signs.

The sign Gemini was declared by Ptolemy as having chief rule over Egypt, and partially so in some other places or countries. It is well known to those familiar with the subject, that this sign contains a greater number of fixed stars of the first magnitude, than almost any other sign in the Zodiac. Mercury, the swift messenger of the Gods, as he was denominated by the Ancients, is Lord of this sign, that is, being of kindred nature or quality of the stars composing this sign, and when by his revolution became located therein, he had greater power; hence this sign was called his house. Therefore, it was found that persons under the influence of this sign and Mercury, who, having chief rule over the brain and mind of man, were naturally active, persevering, and generally of greater intellect and more searching fancy, and inventive talent, and being addicted to learning and knowledge. In stature they are tall, in complexion dark, hair and eyes the same, having a smart, active look, and are generally restless.

The foregoing description fully agrees with the well known genius and perseverance of the Ancient Egyptians. And on examining the hieroglyphical characters copied or still to be found in great numbers on the remaining tombs and temples in the valley of the Nile. The figures there to be found, representing men in almost every sphere of life, also agree in appearances with that given of the sign, being tall, rather slight in build, high foreheads, with decidedly expressive features. It is not to be supposed however, that the whole inhabitants in any one country are under the rule of that particular sign governing. But it is to be understood that the sign so ruling, will produce its characteristic effects on the country at large.

It will be perceived by the foregoing, that Egypt being under the sign Gemini, the people were what are known as mercurial, being active, energetic, and of superior intellects. It may then be readily imagined, for there is no doubt that the Egyptians under the influence of one of the most active constellations in the heavens, rose so high in the scale, among the nations of her time, which made her famous, and a marvel of ancient times.
