One means of testing coal is described in an American contemporary in these terms: Take a fragment and chip it till its weight is reduced to pound. Place this in a glazed assayer's crucible and weigh the two to gether. The addition in weight will, of course, be the weight of the crucible. Place the latter with its contents in a vessel of boiling water shallow enough so that the water does not have any access to the coal, and maintain water at a boiling temperature for four to six hours. BEFT HIS OWN MONUMENT.

Dr. Thomas Dunn English, who died in Newark, N. J., last Tuesday at the advanced age of eighty-two years, has left his own monument behind. His poem, "Ben Bolt," is one of the sweetest songs that was ever written on this side of the Atlantic and it has been sung wherever the Anglo-Saxon tongue has currency. Doctor English wrote during his lifetime other poems, but not that appear to have struck the popular chord like this famous lyric. 



Delarey, Kemp and other leaders vainly attempted to persuade their men to renew the action. Fifteen hundred Boers participated in the engagement, but they had suffered too heavily, and cleared away to the northwest and south. The British losses were also severe.
