Amendments to the **Local Affairs**

An Act to amend the Act 6 George V. Cap 18, entitled "An Act respecting the Administration of Local Affairs."

[Passed May 4th, 1916.] Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:-

1. Section two of the Act 6 Geo. V., Cap. 18, entitled "An Act respecting the Administration of Local Affairs," is hereby repealed, and the following is substituted therefor:-

2 (a) An area within the limits of which any Road Board existing at the time of the passing of this Act now exercises and performs its powers, duties and functions shall be an area for the purposes of this Act, and the Board elected hereunder in any such area shall, within the same area, exercise and perform the powers, duties and functions by this Act conferred and imposed upon Boards.

(b) Any such area may hereafter be subdivided or amalgam ated with others, or have its boundaries or limits altered or re-arranged, as hereinafter

(c) This Act shall not apply to the Councils at present existing in the District of Burin until such time as the voters under the jurisdiction of such Councils shall proceed as provided in Section 3 of this Act. 2. Section 3 of thes aid Act is here-

by repealed and the following is substituted therefor:-3 (a) A majority of the qualified electors residing within the limits of any area in this Colony within which not less than eighy qualified electors reside, and desiring to have or do not include the whole petition.
