SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any mail over 18 years oldf may homestead a quarter section o, available Dominion land in Manitoba Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appl cant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Su Agency for the district. Entry proxy may be made at any agency, certain conditions, by father, mo hon, daughter, brother or sister of itending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and culivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owner and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother ar sister.
