



potassium permanganate if there is do not seem to like the water as well, and not drink as much of it. As eggs contain a large percentage of water, and the birds need it in their ration, it is best to give them plenty of fresh clear water with a good flavor, so that they will drink frequently. -R. G. Dept. of Labour Report Report for week ending November

22nd, 1919. artment of Labour reports that returns from the Dom n and Pro vincial offices of the Employment service of Canada for the week end ing November 22nd, show a decrease in placements as compared with the returns of the preceding week. Dur ing the week the 92 offices reported that they had referred 7,952 persons to regular positions, and that 5914 of these had received employment. This represents a decrease of 993 as compared with the previous week when 6,907 persons were placed. This decrease was due to a decline in placements in the lumbering industry in Manitoba. In addition 1,450 casual jobs were supplied as compared with 1,247 of the week ended November 15th.

During the week 9,329 applicants were registered, of whom 756 were women and 8,573 were men. This represents a decreage in registration of 738, when compared with the 10-067 applicants the previous week. The number of vacancies notified by employers during the week totalled 8,402 of which 1,134 were for women and 7,268 were for men. When com pared with 8,735 vacancies reported during the preceding week, this shows a discrease of 333 vacancies. 
The ushers were Charles Dodge of Moncton, and Russell Cahill, Sack-





The average number of persons working for wages totalled 56,815, of whom 26,735 were employed in operations in the woods, and 30 080 in the mills The total amoun' paid in wages was \$44,490,917.

New Brunswick comes fourth in the value of the lumber cut, the total amount being \$12.189,312. Nova Scotia comes fifth with a value of \$1,083; 039. Ontario is first with \$33,165,137 976, and Quebec third with \$20,916604






