

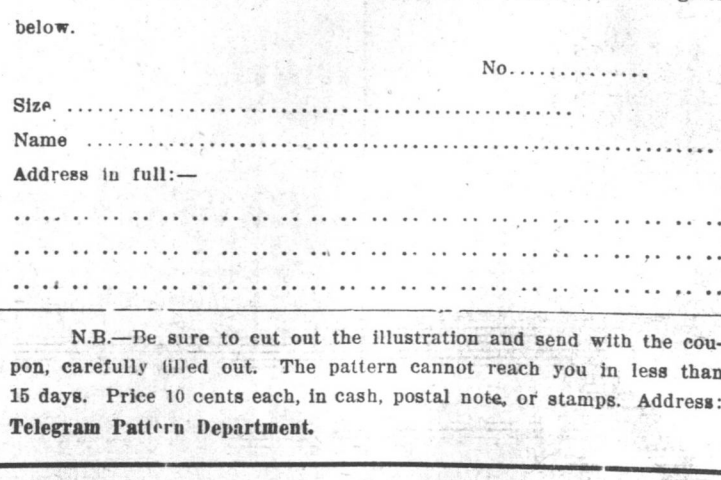


8763. A Practical Outfit for the Busy Woman.

Household Notes.

Green window shades should provide darkness for baby's daytime naps.

To clean ivory, make a paste of chalk, olive oil and ammonia, equal parts, and rub well. Let it remain on until thoroughly dry, and then wash off.

When eggs are broken and cannot be used at once they will keep better if the shells be removed and a quart of a teaspoonful of salt beaten in for each egg.

The bureau drawer can be made to open easily and noiselessly by rubbing it with common soap, and the same device can be used upon doors that stick.

To keep sliced Spanish onions from falling apart, take toothpicks and stick them through each side to the centre; then dip in egg and cracker crumbs and fry in batter.

To mend rubber use soft kid from an old glove and paste the patch to the gum with automobile paste. The leather adheres better to the gum than a gum patch.

A delicate sandwich filling is made from one part chopped almonds and two parts of shredded or grated celery, with a dash of salt. Moisten the mixture with mayonnaise.

To save gas, remove the tip and insert a small piece of cotton in the pipe and replace the tip. This lessens the pressure and a more even and softer light is obtained.

When nuts have become too dry to be good, remove the shells, let stand over night in equal parts of milk and water; then dry them in the oven and they will be fresh and good.

If shelves and floors of closets are wiped with water which is hot with cayenne pepper insects will be kept away. Borax and alum are good to put into the cracks.

Nothing is more helpful in dusting polished floors than the absorbent broom bag, which can be purchased for a few cents or may be made at home of a piece of cotton flannel.

When making apple pie the flavor is much improved and the apples will keep in good color if a few drops of lemon juice are squeezed over the apples just before the crust is put on.

Melted beef drippings or tallow can be used in the place of paraffin over the top of jelly. Be sure when cold to cover the space around the edge where the it has shrunk away from the glass.

If threads draw hard and break easily when preparing a piece of fancy work, a little white soap rubbed on the wrong side of the linen will be of advantage. It does not harm the linen.

Fishery Specialist.

In his time the Hon. D. Morison has been called upon to play many parts, and has played them to the satisfaction of his friends, otherwise he would not be where he is to-day. But we never expected to be able to chronicle that he would be nominated as expert specialist to examine into the practical effect of fishery regulations.

But the unexpected has happened and Mr. Donald Morison, K.C., Attorney General, has been nominated by the Newfoundland Government as a Practical Fishery expert.

The announcement was not made here first, but in Canada by the Canadian Press Agency, and the Daily News this morning adds authenticity to the report. We may also say that we have no reason to doubt the authenticity of the News, even though Mr. P. T. McGrath recently over his own signature in the Halifax Chronicle stated that "the British and American Governments (with the concurrence of Canada and Newfoundland) have agreed to postpone for six months the selection of national commissioners."

The award itself called "upon the parties to designate within one month their national commissioners for the expert examination of the questions submitted."

The distinguished jurists of international repute who formed the Tribunal made it clear by expression of opinion and by their appointment the

type of appointee which was contemplated by the submission. Here are their words:

"The Tribunal . . . is of opinion that the decision of the reasonableness of these regulations requires expert information about the fisheries themselves and an examination of the practical effect of a great number of these provisions in relation to the conditions surrounding the exercise of the liberty of fishery enjoyed by the inhabitants of the United States."

"As to the third non-national Commissioner this Tribunal designates Doctor P. P. C. Hoek, scientific adviser for the fisheries of the Netherlands."

If Mr. Alexander is the nominee of the Government of the United States, it shows that the opinion of that Government coincided with the Hague Tribunal as to the type of man required. Mr. Alexander is a leading official of the American Bureau of Fishery. Mr. Morison is not even a member of our Fishery Board.

Bankers Hard Time.

The banking schr. Nereld, Capt. Geo. Noseworthy, arrived here from Labrador yesterday afternoon with 300 qts. of fish. She has been fishing on the coast for several weeks past and coming up had the full force of the storm of Saturday. The vessel had a very hard time of it, was constantly sea swept. A hurricane of S. E. wind raged and off Cape Bonavista her jumbo and foremast was torn into shreds and some gear was swept from her decks. The vessel had to close reef and the crew had a hard time of it before reaching port. She will get her sails attended to here before going home to Fortune.

In Eruption.

Special to Evening Telegram. SEAWARD, Alaska, Oct. 15. The famous bogswol volcano in the Ellutian Islands is in more violent eruption than ever, according to report brought by the Revenue Cutter Khoma. Smoke and ashes are rising a mile and a half above the crater. According to calculations made by the Khoma's officers, lava is flowing down the side, and huge boulders are flying in the air.

Mr. Lloyd George on Disarmament.

Mr. Lloyd George is interviewed in the Review of Reviews, and has many interesting things to say about international armaments.

"In the grammar of ruin there are three degrees," he said: "Positive, Protection; Comparative, Armaments; Superlative, War. Why are armaments excused? Because tariff war, which is almost universal outside Britain, may lead to war of the other kind. Nations make war for markets, desiring to close those markets to their rivals.

Why We Do Not Disarm.

He admitted that he spoke bitterly and felt bitterly on this subject. Out of every million of revenue he raised, half a million had to go in armaments—but he did not deny that the expenditure on Dreadnoughts was necessary. He proceeded:—

"We cannot disarm in the midst of an armed camp. Any remedy must be international, and we are not merely willing but eagerly anxious for an international arrangement by which we could arrest this headlong race to destruction. But when we have piped to other nations they would not dance to our music. Nay, they have even misconstrued our invitation to cover an insidious design to banish their legitimate desire for self-protection, or as an intimation that the pace was getting too hot for us, and that they had only to keep on to see us drop out

of the race. This naturally makes us chary of making new overtures for any international agreement on the subject of armaments. And until such an arrangement is arrived at we have no option but to go on sadly but with unflinching resolution to maintain the comparative preponderance of naval strength which for a hundred years has been recognised by friends and foes alike as the irreducible minimum of our national security.

"It is a game of beggar-my-neighbor, at which, if the peoples were wise, their Governments would not play. In beggar-my-neighbor it is a question as to which player is first played out. Our naval supremacy, living as we do from day to day on food brought from overseas, and with no conscript army of millions to defend our country, is a matter of life and death.

Our Naval Supremacy.

"We do not argue about it. We maintain it, and we must go on maintaining it, against all challengers, even if it comes to the spending of our last penny. But those who delude themselves into imagining that we are nearer our last penny than our Protectionist neighbours should not forget that so far we have at least paid our way without having to borrow money with which to build ships—which is more than some of them can say. And although he who goes a-borrowing goes a-sorrowing, and we shall keep on paying our way from day to day out of revenue, nevertheless if the beggar-my-neighbor game is to be played out to the bitter end we have still the untouched reserve of a naval loan available to fall back upon—a resource of which our competitors have long ago had to avail themselves.

"We are not going from lack of sense, to risk the absolute immunity from invasion which is one of our most priceless national assets. We are open for a deal; we are anxious, for a deal. But no matter how heavily we may be pressed we shall

never be driven to surrender a position which, our rivals themselves being judges, is essential for our continued existence as an independent State. The basis of any such deal must of necessity be the maintenance of that humanity. That we cannot risk by any arrangement. Such proposals lead not to peace, but to war."

A large crowd gathered around the station when it was seen that two constables had two prisoners in charge. The report was circulated that the two men in custody were the Grand Falls safe crackers. The lads admitted the guilt to the police and said that they spent all the money in having a good time in Sydney, except their passage money and \$2 each left in their pockets. They had no suspicion that the Sydney police had been shadowing them, and believed that when they got on the train at Port aux Basques that all the trouble was over. They will be sent back to North Sydney for trial.

Crew Were Exhausted.

Passengers by Saturday night's train say that the crew of the schr. Empress which was lost off Cape St. Francis early Saturday morning rowed into Carbonear in a dory. There were three men in the vessel and they were for several hours in the dory exposed to all the fury of the elements and drenched from the heavy rain and spray which swept over them. Repeatedly the dory was almost swamped in the terrific sea that raged. The unfortunate men had to bail her as best they could, and so exhausted were they on arrival that they could barely walk.

This Association, which last winter held a number of most successful entertainments of various kinds and was thus enabled to give most valuable financial assistance to the two Colleges, after which it is named, has begun to make preparations for the coming winter with redoubled energy. Drowned at Carbonear.

Passengers who arrived here by Saturday night's train tell of a sad drowning accident which occurred at Carbonear at 9 a.m. that day. The storm which prevailed created a very heavy sea, when a man named Herald seeing that his trap skiff, which was moored on the "collar," was in danger of sinking took his son with him, a young man of 24, and went out in a small boat to secure the skiff which was shipping seas very quickly. When they got to her father jumped into the skiff and began bailing the water out of her; the son who sat in the smaller boat holding on to the stern of the other. Suddenly the skiff, which was heavily ballasted, shipped a more than ordinarily heavy sea, and sunk under the man who was on board her. The boat in which the son was swept a considerable distance away on the crest of the wave which had done the damage. When Mr. Herald found the boat gone from under him he grasped an oar and getting it under his arms found that it floated him. His son, in the meantime made every effort to reach his father but found it impossible almost to row against the heavy sea. His exertions so reduced his strength that the boat was suddenly twisted round, went broadside

on to the combers, was buried in the waves and floated away bottom up, while the unfortunate young man disappeared beneath the waves and never again came to the surface. In the meantime the father was borne shorewards by the sea. The accident which occurred about two gunshots off the Point was witnessed by a man who was powerless to render aid. Clinging to the oar as his only salvation the now exhausted man was driven in towards the Point and ran the risk of being killed by being dashed against the rocks. On getting in close to them the man thrust himself off with his feet and escaped death, for he was swept around the Point, and becoming unconscious was picked up by the man alluded to above as he was swept in on the beach. The man who saw the accident from the Point believed the other was dead when he found him, but when help which he summoned arrived he was after some time resuscitated. The body of the son has since not been recovered, and it is feared will not be found. Both father and son were on the Labrador all the past summer but did nothing, though since returning they caught a good deal of fish with hook and line.

FROM BELL ISLAND.

Several people arrived in the city from Bell Island Saturday afternoon and say that the storm was severely felt there, though no damage of any account occurred. A heavy sea ran in the bay and the Progress, which left for the Cove Saturday forenoon, was arrested when half way across as her pumps became out of order. She had to cripple back, but the engineer put her in good condition and she made the trip across late without trouble. She brought a number of passengers over. During the past week the weather on the island has been intensely cold, and about 400 men of the two companies who work on the surface could not perform their duties and had to give it up until better weather prevails. Numbers of men who recently arrived on the island seeking work cannot get it and most of them quit the place to try and get employment elsewhere. There are still men on the island who are idle and have not the means to get home.

AirShip Trip Across The Atlantic

Daily News Message.) ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 15. The Airship America, which has been preparing for a flight across the Atlantic Ocean under the supervision of Walter Wellman, was on Saturday morning taken out of the hangar in which it had been housed for months. At eight o'clock the cigar-shaped balloon went up in the air and started seaward. In two minutes it had disappeared in a dense fog. As the balloon went up in the air a partying cheer was given by a thousand persons whose faith in the Wellman enterprise had stood against the attacks of those detractors who declared their belief that he would never take the America off the ground. The aeronauts waved "good-bye," climbed into the car and floated off, while the crowd kept up cheering. The trip was scheduled as a trial, but the grim statement of Chief Engineer Varnish that "we won't come back until we have had a try for Europe" is believed to mean that the men will not return unless some accident befalls the airship, or the crew are forced by adverse winds to come back. A wireless message received at one o'clock said, "Still going seaward, headed northeast, all well on board; machinery working fine; good-bye."

Allan and Red Cross Liners Here.

The Allan liner Carthaginian, Capt. Danaher, arrived here at 1 p.m. yesterday after a run of 8 days from Liverpool. The ship had a very stormy voyage all through with gales of wind veering from N.E. to N.W., while a big sea ran the whole time and necessarily caused delay to the ship by reason of the reduction of speed owing to the stormy weather prevailing. The ship has 230 tons of freight and 20 bogs and 15 baskets of mail matter. Her passengers were Capt. Dicken, C. H. Emerson, Miss Emerson, Mrs. Hall, Capt. Ing, Esber Joseph, Capt. O'Neill Power, Miss C. G. Stirling, C. Tauster, Rev. I. K. Verker, H. Esber, Mrs. Esber and 23 steerage, with over 100 emigrants en route to Halifax.

The ship Florizel, Capt. Clarke, arrived here at 2.30 p.m. yesterday from New York via Halifax. She left New York at 1 p.m. Tuesday last and on the run to Halifax had very stormy weather with a high sea. She left there Friday at 1 p.m. and had N. and N.W. gales with heavy sea during her run to St. John's. She brought 7 bogs of mail matter and a full general cargo. Her passengers were: From New York—Miss B. Whitmore, Miss M. Pendergast, C. Woods, W. Robert, son and 11 second class. From Halifax—J. D. Halford, R. Luttler, S. Downing, F. W. Farich, C. V. O'Keefe, Miss B. Githorpe, M. Fitzgerald and 3 second class.

Mother Saw Child Ground to Death.

Mrs. Friedman, Anderson Street, Has Unhappy Fate of Seeing Little Son Killed Before Her Eyes.

Crushed to death under the wheels of a cart was the fate of fifteen-months-old Samuel Friedman. The accident occurred before the eyes of his mother at three o'clock on Saturday afternoon, while she was sitting on the doorstep of her home, 17 Anderson Street. The cart belonged to Benjamin Adunichio, wood and coal merchant, Bleury Street, and it was driven by Ulrich Forget, 619 Montcalm Street. The wheels of the heavy cart passed over the child's head, and nothing could be done for the poor little one at the General Hospital, to which he was at once taken.

When Mrs. Friedman saw the life crushed out of her little boy, she went almost crazy with grief and a doctor had to be summoned to attend her.

Forget, the driver, reported the accident himself to the police at the Cheonneville street station. He stated that he was not aware he had run over the child until the screams of the mother caused him to look behind him. An inquest will be held at the morgue to-morrow morning.—Montreal Star.

AID FOR TINSMITHS.—The members of the L.S.P.U. gave another card tourney Saturday night in the Mechanics' Hall in aid of the striking tinsmiths. A substantial amount was realized. The prize, a half-ton of coal, was won by Mr. Peter Joy, who generously donated it or its cash equivalent to the strikers.

Richest British Women

Inheriting from her father, Sir John Maple, a fortune of £1,000,000, the Baroness von Eckhardtstein, who recently married Captain Weigall, can claim the distinction of being one of the richest women in this country. The wealthiest is the Marchioness of Graham. On the death of her father, the twelfth Duke of Hamilton, she came into a fortune variously estimated at from £3,000,000 to £5,000,000, and certainly into an income of £114,000 a year. Mrs. Asher, the daughter of Mr. Harry Barnato, is the possessor of £2,000,000. She received the first million at the time of her marriage to Mr. Asher, and the second by her father's will. Her fortune is equalled by that of Miss Morrison, who was recently left £2,000,000 by her brother.—English paper.

Madame Sarah Bernhardt has ever had her share of attention from pressmen the world over, but surely nowhere to such an extent as during her recent visit to America. AUCTION STORIES.

Unexpected Prizes That Have Been Won by Bidders—A Great Bargain in Eggs --- How the Specimens of the Great Auk Species were Bought for \$9.00 and Sold for \$2,000.

"Of course I have met with a good many interesting experiences during my career as an auctioneer," relates Henry Stevens in a London magazine, "but the most striking of them all occurred, I think, in connection with a great auk's egg.

"Some years ago a young fellow rode over to an obscure furniture sale at the country village in the hope of securing a bargain to help in furnishing a home in view of his intended marriage. And a bargain he did get, though not of the kind he originally thought of.

"One of the lots put up for sale was a basketful of shells, eggs and other ornaments which had attracted the at-

tention of an old lady who happened to be present. Just as they were on the point of being knocked down to her the young man was struck by the appearance of two large eggs in the basket, and, thinking he might as well have them as curiosities, he started to bid, with the result that the lot was knocked down to him for \$9.

"Upon examining the eggs it occurred to him that he might be able to make a profit on their sale. He accordingly wrapped them up in a handkerchief and brought them to me.

"As soon as they had washed off the grime which covered them I discovered that they were eggs of no less a bird than the great auk, and as

a result of their sale a few weeks later I handed the astute young bargain hunter a check for \$2,000.

"At another sale which I conducted there was an old picture so covered with dirt and grime that it was almost impossible to see what it was like. This was hung upon the wall in a prominent position, but did not apparently find favor in the eyes of any of the dealers who were present. No reserve price was placed upon this picture, which had been put into the sale by a local pawnbroker to whom it had been pledged and not redeemed.

"In spite of every effort on the part of the auctioneer, it was eventually knocked down to a young man who had looked into the sale quite casually in order to waste half an hour during which he had to wait for a train. Taking a great fancy to the frame, which was of oak, blackened with age, he hazarded a bid of \$5, at which price it was knocked down to him without any competition.

"As he did not want the picture, he asked the auctioneer whether he would mind trying to get a bid for it if he cut it out of the frame, and, being answered in the affirmative, he took out his knife and neatly cut through the canvas all around the edge.

"Imagine the astonishment of himself and all present when, hidden behind the canvas, he discovered five bills for \$100 each. Evidently the picture had been used to conceal the savings of some previous owner, who had died without disclosing the secret and whose hard won fortune thus came into the hands of a total stranger.

"I should quote as very interesting a sale at Rutland Gate, where there were only the remains of the furniture, a firm having been allowed to take what they chose to their rooms. It was accordingly after the nature of a rummage sale, but in one cupboard which had been overlooked were what the junior clerk described as three silver cups.
