





The memorial to Queen Victoria was unveiled to-day by her grandson, King George V., in the presence of the Emperor and Empress of Ger-many, and of numerous members of the British and German Royal families. The King, in a speech eulogis-tic of Queen Victoria, described the memorial as a tribute of races and legions more various in character and circumstances than have, ever been combined before in a common pur-pose. He referred feelingly to the bleasure afforded him by the visit of he German Royal family, saying:--"It is a source of deep satisfaction to me and to my family that my dear cousin, the German Emperor, accom-panied by the Empress, is present at this historic ceremony.
