

Dangerous Prophecies.

It is when we are young that we say, "I shall never" and "I shall always" — not knowing that we are only time's atoms in a crucible of incredible change. An old — in a score's date — "I have never" for he knows that if he searches he will find probably that he has. "All — all is change." — Booth Tarkington.

"There's one thing I'll never do," I heard a young girl say the other day, apropos of a friend's marriage to a young man with more prospects than salary. "I'll never marry a man who is getting a cent less than \$40 a week."

If it were possible for me to lift the veil that lies across my future, I would not do it. I believe most of us are happier knowing just the present, but I must say I would like to be able to look ten years ahead into that girl's future, and see if anything happens to that cock-sure assertion of hers.

I suppose you thought when you read that opening sentence that I was going to use it to launch myself into a tirade upon the extravagant matrimonial standard of the girl of today. Not at all. Of course the remark did suggest that line of thought. But as England's great story-teller so often says, "That's another story." What it set me to thinking most seriously was this: that it's mighty risky business to prophesy what we will or will not do under this or that condition.

Is there anyone among my readers, I wonder, who is not doing at least

Horses as Gold Mines.

With the coming of the flat-racing season, the thoughts of owners and trainers of racehorses are everywhere turned towards the possibilities lying dormant in the as yet untamed sinews and muscles of their yearlings.

For some few, at all events, amongst them are probably destined to turn out veritable equine gold mines.

This is no mere figure of speech. The sums earned in one way and another by certain thorough-breeds in the past almost surpass belief.

For example, St. Simon, who died at Welbeck in the early part of 1908, and who was undoubtedly the record money-making horse of his, or any other, age, earned in stud-fees alone for his dual owner no less a sum than £250,000; while his progeny netted over half a million sterling in nineteen years. And this, although he only cost originally the comparatively small sum of sixteen hundred guineas.

To find anything approaching such a record as this, it is necessary to go back to the time of Bellerose, whose progeny won £200,000; while his own earnings, on the turf and at the stud, exceeded £100,000. And Bellerose, it must be remembered, was bought for considerably less than a hundred-pound note.

Even lower prices than this, however, have at times been paid for horses that have turned out true gold-mines. Thus, Deadlock was sold for £20, and shortly afterwards dropped

a foal, the famous Isinglass, who won the Derby of 1895 and £40,000. Queen of the Roses, again, the dam of Reve d'Or, was given away in exchange for a sack of oats. Hampton, the sire of Ladas, Merry Hampton, and many other magnificent racers, was bought for 150 guineas. While one-third of that sum purchased The Rover, whose son, the great St. Gatien, was sold for £15,000 after dead-heating in the Derby.

Then there was Stockwell, bought by Lord Exeter for £180. Stockwell not only won the St. Leger himself, but no fewer than six of his sons followed his example, while three of them won the Derby. In one year his descendants earned in stakes sums aggregating over £40,000.

Revolutionists Secured Release of Several Prisoners.

Lisbon, Portugal, April 30.—Revolutionaries by a daring plan secured the release yesterday of a number of prisoners arrested during Sunday's political disturbances in the capital and confined on the Portuguese cruiser Republic, in the harbor. Several boats filled with armed men dressed as sailors clambered on board the cruiser at two o'clock in the morning and demanded that the prisoners be handed over to them. At the same moment three shots were fired from the guns on the cruiser, for what reason has not been disclosed. The prisoners were then given up by their guards to the men who had boarded the warship, and it appeared as though the affair had been carried out with the connivance of some of the officers and crew.



The Male Quartette.

The male quartette is a vocal m i s d e m o n i o r which cannot be reached by the law and is therefore subject to a fine or imprisonment in the county jail. It is caused by four men with full dress suits and sliding gear standing up in a bow-legged semi-circle and trying their voices on people who would rather listen to a xylophone solo.

The male quartet consists of two tenors, a baritone and a bass, all four of whom are perfectly willing to undertake any kind of a solo. In fact, an undertaker is provided for every solo, whether the audience likes it or not. The principal charm of a male quartet is the self-possession of the entire membership, which is not disturbed by anything in vegetable form.

The first tenor is a tall, spectral wraith with a fifteen-story voice and elastic eyebrows, by which the audience can tell whether he is going to climb into the attic or has decided to stay on the fifth floor. By watching the eyebrows of a first tenor a person can tell at once when he sees a high note coming and is preparing to take a running start. Every first tenor has a porch-climbing attachment called the falsetto, which is not at all painful when it can be induced to blend with the right key.

The second tenor is a short but earnest singer with a rebuilt high baritone voice which is so used to stuff the tout ensemble so that it will stand erect. The baritone is a wide-awake and determined soloist who does not intend to be drowned out so that people can notice it. One aggressive, deep-breathing baritone, whose mind is on his business can set a pace that would dishearten a foundry whistle.

The bass is a cavernous receptacle for low notes, which he dives down for with a mellow grunt and shakes vigorously before ejecting them in the direction of the audience. He always sings a solo which sounds like a saxophone with the quinsy, and if he gets within four tones of landing in the middle of it everybody is surprised and pleased.



Notes and Comments.

In addition to the statutory holiday for Empire Day on May 24th, last night's Gazette proclaims as Public and Bank holidays, the King's Birthday, June 3rd, Labour Day, Regatta Day, August 20th, September 10th, Jan. 21st, 1914 and February 18th, 1914 and March 17th, 1914. It will be remembered that the Importers' Association this year for the first time at the request of the Societies of the city have decided to close the stores on Empire Day.

We notice that Councillor Mullaly in a letter published in the Daily News this morning, on the vandalism of boys in the city, states that he agrees with everything stated by the writer of the article in the Evening Telegram, entitled "Carnival of Destruction," and particularly with the suggestion that the teachers in the city schools take up the question of vandalism to instill into the minds of their pupils respect for public and private property.

Mr. Mullaly declares it would break the heart of any citizen whose ambition is to beautify and improve the city to witness the acts of vandalism of school boys that he has seen himself, and he instances as a proof that he is not overstating the case, "the fact that a few days ago work that entailed two weeks' labour was destroyed by boys in a few minutes at Bowring Park."

Now, we wish it to be understood that though we made the suggestion that teachers should take up the matter, we did not make the suggestion in any spirit of fault-finding with teachers. We did so because they are persons in authority who are in touch with the largest number of boys, and they can be the most effective monitors in the matter. We venture to trespass on the good nature of teachers, because we know they have much good nature and have the moral welfare of boys at heart, and they would be the first to welcome the beautifying of the city, particularly from the wholesome effect an improved environment would have on the minds of the boys themselves.

We know of the tendency to transfer every obligation in regard to children of schoolable age to teachers. But after all, it should be remembered that there are 168 hours to the week and that for 40 hours of the week, boys are not under the direct influence or control of teachers, and that during the holidays, about twelve weeks of the year, they are not under the control of teachers at all. From this it will be seen that home influence must be looked to as the primary moral influence on the conduct of boys in regard to matters external to the school.

Sir Edward Morris left this morning for Pogo to begin an Election campaign. For the past four elections, viz., 1906, 1904, 1908 and 1909, Pogo returned Mr. Henry Earle to support Sir Robert Bond and the Liberal Party. With the additional unpopularity which his government has earned, it will take Sir Edward all his time to effect any change in favour of the Government.

\$200,000 For Cancer Cure.

Henry Rutherford, by His Will, Makes the Rockefeller Institute Custodian of the Fund.
New York, April 30.—The largest single contribution toward the extermination of the cancer germ that has been reported since George Crocker gave Columbia University \$1,500,000 for that purpose three years ago, was made known yesterday through the filing of the will of Henry Rutherford. Disposing of an estate estimated at more than \$2,000,000, Mr. Rutherford directed that \$200,000 be turned over to the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research as a fund for the investigation and cure of cancer.

Mr. Rutherford, whose residence officially was Grand Isle, Vt., but who spent most of his time in travel, died in the Astor Hotel, February 25 last. He was sixty-five years old and a widower, without children, his wife having died thirty years ago. Only his most intimate friends and relatives realized the extent of his fortune and his philanthropies. His death was caused by cancer unconnected with cancer.

He did not provide, as did Mr. Crocker, that in the event of a cancer cure being discovered the fund should be devoted to other branches of scientific enquiry. Mr. Crocker's bequest to Columbia University, made public on December 7, 1909, consisted of the proceeds of the sale of his city residence, No. 1, East-Sixty-fourth street, and his country seat at Darlington, N.J., valued together at more than \$1,500,000.

"Mr. Rutherford was the type of man who did good unostentatiously," one of the beneficiaries of the will said yesterday. "It does not surprise me that he left a legacy for cancer treatment, but it does surprise me that he did not make the gift before his death. I know that two months before he died he gave away far more than \$200,000 to charities in which he was interested, always with the proviso that his name be kept a secret. He had no business, being one of a family every member of which is very wealthy. The medical campaign against cancer was a subject in which he was deeply though imperceptibly interested."

The only next of kin which it is set forth have been located are sixty-eight cousins of Mr. Rutherford, many of whom are residents of England.

40 Years In Prison.

Sentence of Brooklyn Man for Highway Robbery.
New York, May 1.—A flat sentence of forty years was imposed yesterday by County Judge Fawcett upon James Cassidy, convicted of robbery in the first degree. In sentencing him the judge said:—

"Your crime was a desperate one. There are few crimes worse than highway robbery. Your record demonstrates that you are a menace to any community. Old offenders need expect no clemency at my hands. Let all burglars and highwaymen take warning from your sentence as to what they may expect if they are convicted in Brooklyn. The sentence of this court is that you be confined in Sing Sing prison for a term of forty years with hard labour."

Cassidy and Frank Redmond had been jointly indicted on the charge of entering the store of Lewis Price, 1307 Broadway, 1912, and holding up Louis Price and Henry Shearon, while they stole \$500 worth of jewelry. The charge was that Cassidy kept the men covered with two revolvers, while Redmond rifled the safe. When Shearon resented having to hold up his hands Cassidy struck him a vicious blow over the head with the butt of one of the revolvers. All this happened at 7.30 in the evening, when the street outside was crowded.

CHINESE CREW MUTINIED.
One Fatally Wounded in Battle With Police at Staten Island Docks.
New York, April 24.—In a battle with a mutinous crew of Chinese on the British freighter Glen Melvor, tied up at Staten Island pier last night, one member of the crew was mortally wounded by revolver bullets, and one of a dozen private detectives who, with a score of policemen, were engaged in the fight, was badly injured. The police took 37 Chinese prisoners.

The trouble arose over refusal to allow the Chinese shore liberty. The crew had given trouble all the way from Singapore, once trying to throw one of the officers overboard.

PARIS, May 6. Rumors of anarchist design against King Alfonso, are causing grave anxiety, and the police and government are taking comprehensive precautions.

LONDON, May 6.

The Royal Ulster Yacht Club today, received a letter from the New York Yacht Club, replying to Sir Thomas Lipton's challenge to race with Shamrock the fourth, for America's cup. It is stated in the letter that since 1902 there have been many changes in its system of measurement and time allowance, and that important changes have been made in racing rules. The letter continues and says: "Your reference, therefore, to the regulations of the last contest as governing the present challenge leaves it uncertain whether you mean to challenge for the race to be sailed with or without time allowance; and if with time allowance, whether you propose it to be sailed under the New York Yacht Club's system of measurement and time allowance and under the racing regulations of 1902, which governed the last contest, but are not in force now." The letter concluded by asking for information on these points, as it is essential that the New York Committee be informed of the specific nature of the race proposed, before it can take any action on the challenge.

New Auto-Bus.

TRIAL SPIN.

Yesterday afternoon the new Auto-Bus, recently imported from New York by the St. John's Garage Company, and which will be used for carrying passengers to and from Portugal Cove

made its maiden trip. It proved most successful and those who were fortunate in being invited by Chauffeur Silverlock spent a delightful time. The new car, called the "Chase," though not of the usual type, carries a thirty horsepower engine and runs a speed of fifteen knots. The conveyance can accommodate fifteen persons easily, is an open vehicle and can be covered in easily. The roof of the vehicle will carry the luggage. It is the intention of the company to make two trips to Portugal Cove daily (forenoon) in order that passengers may connect with steamers leaving for Bell Island. The afternoon will be set aside for bringing parties to recreation grounds such as the Football Field, Bowring Park, Golf Links, etc.

At 2.30 p.m. yesterday the car left the city and reached Portugal Cove in quick time, conveying a party of ten. After stopping awhile return was made under equally favourable circumstances. The next place visited was Donovan's where a sumptuous tea was partaken of. After those engaged in the new venture of opening up the new Auto-Bus service to Portugal Cove had been congratulated on their enterprise, return to town was made at ten o'clock. We understand the fare to Portugal Cove will be 70c., and we bespeak for the Auto-Bus a good share of public patronage.

Extol Anglican Missionary.

DOES R. C. BISHOP.

Says Explorer Steffanson's Remarks On Missionaries are Unjustified— "Blonde Eskimos" Old Discovery.

Montreal, April 25.—Right Rev. Gabriel Joseph Elie Breyant, Roman Catholic Bishop of the Apostolic Vicariate of Mackenzie, N. W. T., who is in Montreal to-day, repudiates assertions reported to have been made by the explorer Steffanson regarding the work of the Protestant missionaries among the Eskimos.

"To mention a case of admirable work among the Eskimos," said his Grace, "I will name Rev. Mr. Fry, a young Protestant missionary, who, for the past few years has been devoting himself with great abnegation to Christianize the natives. Steffanson should not fear that the Catholic or Protestant missionaries will corrupt the Eskimos. He should rather doubt the adventurers who, in their perilous excursions, have no other motive than to search for lucre and whose morals are as broad as their appetite."

Speaking of the alleged discovery of blonde Eskimos made by Steffanson, Bishop Breyant says: "I must state that sixty years ago the English explorer, Collinson, mentioned the discovery among the Eskimos of a special tribe whose features resembled much that of white men. They were but the descendants of Greenlanders, who had been driven to the polar regions.

PRICE OF SALMON.—There was a deal of salmon in the market yesterday hence there was a further drop in the price from the previous day. Portugal Cove men disposed of a good supply for 16 cents per pound.

Forest Fire.

NEAR KANE'S VALLEY.

Although early in the season for such occurrences, a forest fire was discovered last evening at Kane's Valley. People passing that way about seven o'clock saw volumes of smoke issuing from the thick woods. Later an outbreak of fire was discovered. The flames were fanned by a N. W. breeze. Timber was being burnt to the ground quickly and as the blaze was coming in the direction of the Topsail Road residential property in that neighborhood was in imminent danger. At 10 p.m. there was no sign of the fire and it is evident that people living near Kane's Valley fought it with success.

To Burn Up London.

Amazing Suffragette Plot Discovered By Police.—Plan Was to Set Fire to Every Large Timber Yard and Cut Off Telephones. London, May 2.—According to the Daily Mirror, the police have discovered an amazing suffragette plot to set London afire. They secured an elaborately written plan for setting fire to every large timber yard in London, also for cutting off all telephones in the vicinity of the yards, the idea being to make it impossible to summon the fire brigades immediately. London is full of timber yards many of them in the neighborhood of

small dwelling houses. The chief timber storage areas are near the docks. The Surrey Commercial dock is the largest timber dock in the world, and in the lumber season over 300 acres of its land and water area are covered with timber.

LONDON, To-day.
It is authoritatively stated that Connault's return to Canada is a matter of uncertainty, even if he does return his sojourn at Ottawa will likely be of the briefest. He will be succeeded by the Hon. Lewis Harcourt present Secretary of State for the Colonies. The defeat of the Woman's Suffrage Bill last night by a majority of 47 votes, fifty Nationalists voting against it, gives rise to the speculation as to whether there is any chance that the present Parliament will pass a Bill of more limited character. Possibly the Nationalists fear if they allow the Woman's Franchise Bill to pass a second reading it would lead to a Parliamentary struggle, which would not unlikely end in the dissolution of Parliament before the Home Rule Bill gets on the Statute Book. The defeat of the Bill raised a great cheer from all sides of the House. The vote stood 266 to 219. Neither Bonar Law, Leader of the Opposition, nor Balfour voted. Among the Ministers who voted against the Bill were Asquith, McKenna, Harcourt, Seeley, Churchill, Hobhouse. The Cabinet supporters of the Bill included Sir Edward Grey, Lloyd George, Isaacs, Birrell, Buxton, Masterman, Simon and Asland. The Bill sought to enfranchise six million women.

MONTREAL, To-day.
Two new direct steamship lines will be established before the end of the present season between Canada and Italy, according to a statement made by the special agent of the Italian company here. He said the Navigation Generale Italiana and Itala Companies would shortly inaugurate two steamship services from Genoa, Naples and Palermo. The line is to be directed by the former company and will land passengers and cargo at Halifax and Boston. The Itala Company means to land passengers and cargo at Quebec and Montreal. The steamers to be used on the latter route are the La Zio and Sannio, which Sannio has been transferred to the Itala Company by the Navigation Generale Italiana. Both lines are allied with the Hamburg-American and other North Atlantic lines.

LONDON, To-day.
Dearer living all round, or lower quality of goods offered at the same price is threatened by the British railway companies' proposal to increase merchandise traffic rates by 4 per cent., and in some instances by more, from July 1st. Traders are alarmed at the prospect, but the railway companies are putting into effect only the powers granted them by recent legislation in keeping with the Government's promise of 1911, permitting them to recoup themselves for increased cost of labor.

HALIFAX, To-day.
The biggest number of immigrants which ever landed in Halifax in the month of May heretofore was 4,000. In the first six days of the present month of May that number has been reached, and the immigration agent at Halifax expects there will be 3,000 before the end of the month. The German steamers Wasgenwald and Palanza, from Hamburg, yesterday landed 1,300 passengers at Halifax. The Canadian Pacific service to Trieste is affected, and the withdrawal of that company from the pool is having its effect in helping the Intercolonial

Railway, for not one of those passengers was ticketed over the C. P. R. The former is taking them all to Montreal, there handing them over to the Grand Trunk, which carries them via Chicago to the Northwest. Thus the European lines are seeking to get even with the C.P.R. for invading the Austrian field.

MONCTON, To-day.
Fire last night destroyed the warehouse used by the I. C. R. for storing oils. Hundreds of barrels of oil were destroyed with the building.

Spend 6,000,000 a Day.
Gotham's Stores Reap Big Harvests From Lady Shoppers.

New York, April 25.—It is estimated by a department store expert that women shoppers spend \$6,000,000 every day in the shopping district. "What is some spending. But it must be true as the statistics say so in this square mile between Fourteenth and Thirty-fourth streets, there are ten big department stores and at least 25,000 shops of one sort or another. "By actual count," says that expert, "it has been ascertained that from 30,000 to 60,000 persons enter each of the big stores every business day. It is fair to assume that the average purchase is \$5 per customer, for in almost any shop the average customer buys \$1 worth, and in many shops the average is from \$10 to \$20. So \$5 per customer is a conservative estimate for all department stores. Taking the lowest average number of customers for each shop, 30,000, and multiplying that by ten, you have a daily total of 300,000 customers. If each buys \$5 worth the amount of money spent per day in these ten shops aggregates \$1,500,000. It is also conservative to estimate the wholesale business—say \$4,500,000 a day. That brings the grand total up to \$6,000,000. Several other merchants put the daily shopping bill at \$10,000,000. One, however, asserted that \$15,000,000 came nearer the truth. When it is considered that the Pittsburg department stores send at least ten buyers here every day to replenish their stock and that each buyer averages anywhere from \$1,000 to \$5,000, the latter figures seem to be nearer the amount spent in this district."

Patient Escapes From Hospital.

Last night Annie Stead, aged 48, belonging to Clarendville and who was a patient at the General Hospital, escaped through a window of the institution without acquainting anyone of where she was going. So far she has not reappeared. The police authorities were apprised of the matter, and this morning a posse of police were engaged searching that section of the town around Quidi Vidi and dragging the pond. There were no tidings of that nobody saw her after she left the institution. We also learn that the patient was not in good mental condition. It is to be hoped the patient has not committed suicide.

Edmonton's Loan Too Big.

London, April 28.—Eighty per cent. of the Edmonton city £1,000,000 five per cent. loan issued at ten shillings above par has been left with the unsold result is largely owing to the size of the loan, which is considered excessive, and owing partly perhaps, that the sponsorship for the loan was rather unusual for a Canadian issue. Competent observers of the London Market express fear that symptoms of rather acute congestion as far as Canadian issues are concerned are likely shortly to be in evidence.

True Bill Against Cashman.
The Grand Jury was addressed this morning on the bill preferred against Hubert Cashman for stealing a postal letter. The Grand Jury retired and later found a true bill. Cashman will be arraigned to-morrow.

THE FOX CASE.
E. J. Horwood vs. C. A. Jerrett and Grant.

Johnson, Justice, delivered the following judgment: "I find that a 'sale' of the fox for \$2,750 had been made by Jerrett to Grant, in Smith's presence, on the 16th of December last, before Horwood sent Smith to Jerrett that day. Subsequently Jerrett delivered the fox to Grant, but the purchase money has not yet been paid. On the issue joined in Jerrett's added defence, I find against him with costs of that issue to the plaintiff. On the issue in defence, I find for the defendants, with general costs. A. H. Murray vs. The Bonaventure S. S. Co., Ltd.

Mr. Morine, K.C., for the plaintiff, moves for the hearing of the main issue of unseaworthiness, the proof of the amount of damage to be allowed, but the general issue to be disposed of. Mr. Fenelon, for the defendant, is heard. Tuesday, May 13th, was set down for the hearing.

George M. Barr vs. John B. Foote.
Mr. Morine, K.C., for the plaintiff, moves that this cause be referred to the Master for report. Mr. McNeilly consents, is ordered accordingly.

Simple Life at the Wilson Table

Chef Says President Doesn't Care Much About Eating.

Washington, D.C., April 26.—"Dead skin, hair work down here ain't goin' to be half what it was with Mr. Taft was President."

This was the broad-grinned, mouthful statement of Jim Carter, one of the chefs connected with the kitchen of the White House, when he expressed his opinion concerning the change in administration. It suggests the new conditions brought about in the domestic arrangements at the White House.

While the Wilson family is considerably larger than that of President Taft, and while there are always more guests staying at the White House—President Wilson has many relatives and friends whom he likes to have about him—the household work at the executive mansion has decreased nearly fifty per cent. in some respects. Or, looking at it from Jim Carter's standpoint, "The new boss don't care half as much about eatin' as the old one did."

ROME, To-day.
The Observatoire Romano, the Vatican newspaper, publishes the following official statement regarding the health of the Pope: "Some newspapers have given incorrect news about the health of His Holiness which through his recent illness obliges him to follow special regime. The Pontiff neither has gone into the Vatican gardens nor is he about to resume audiences with Pilgrims, thus following the instructions of his doctors."

VANDAL CAUGHT.—Yesterday, Detective Byrne issued a summons for a lad whom he suspects is a party to the vandalism and destruction now being caused in the city. The youth is charged with breaking an electric lamp. He appeared in court to-day but the case was postponed owing to the non-appearance of a witness.

King Nicholas, of Montenegro, is to
be informed that the International
squadron blockading Montenegro's
coast has been instructed to arrange
with him the immediate evacuation of
Scutari. A Vienna despatch does not
state if the International troops are
to occupy the city.

LONDON, May 6.
Lord Edward Fitzgerald, youngest
brother of the Duke of Leinster, will
shortly be married to May Etheridge,
a pretty brunette, who has lately
been acting at the Shaftesbury
Theatre.

Madrid, May 6.—King Alfonso, of
Spain, Premier Count de Rimanopez,
and a large suite left for Paris to-
day. They will spend two days there.

LONDON, May 6.
The King, Queen and the Duke of
Connaught, attended a memorial
service at Windsor to-day, being the
anniversary of King Edward's death.
The Mayor of Windsor, who met the
Duke at the station, said that he
hoped he brought better news of the
Duchess. The Duke's reply was,
"Unfortunately, no."

MONTPELIER, May 6.
Letters have been seized at Barce-
lona, which indicate that Spanish
anarchists contemplate another at-
tack on King Alfonso, either at Paris
or on his way there. Four dan-
gerous anarchists here and another
at Badajoz have been arrested. It is
alleged that the last was overheard
to declare that he would have the
skin of Alfonso this time.

LONDON, May 6.
A suffragette entered the Standard
offices to-day, and ran amuck through
several rooms, smashing the furni-
ture. "The woman was finally ejected
by the police. The Standard asserts
that the poisoning of the Pekinese
champion Choo Tai, the property of
Miss Violet Ashton Cross, last week,
was the work of one of these crea-
tures. The dog died soon after win-
ning the championship at Southamp-
ton show.

MONCTON, N.B., May 6.
This town was visited by fire this
morning, resulting in \$60,000 dam-
ages. The fire originated in the Old
Victoria Rink, which is used for
storing automobiles. Before the fire-
men arrived the structure was burn-
ed to the ground, also five nearby
residences, the Baptist Church and
the Christian Brotherhood Hall. The
church is valued at \$50,000, and the
hall at \$25,000. Both were partially
insured. Three automobiles in the
rink were burned.

LONDON, May 6.
St. Catherine's Church, the parish
church of Hatcham, London, S.W.,
was gutted by fire this morning. The
fire was well alight before discover-
ed, and soon after the firemen arrived
the roof crashed in. The Vicar, Rev.
Howard J. H. Truscott, says he saw
three women in the church before the
fire broke out, but assumed they were
worshippers, as the church is kept
open for private prayer throughout
the day. Shortly after he saw smoke
coming from the windows. A num-
ber of cassocks were found saturated
with oil.

LONDON, May 6.
Wilmington Dickinson, moving the
second reading of the Women's Suf-
frage Bill in the Commons yesterday,
argued that to refuse women parlia-
mentary suffrage rights, in order to
punish a few criminals such as the
members of the Woman's Social Po-
litical Union, would be unjust. The
abstention of speakers of prominence
from the debate caused interest to
lag to such an extent that at one time
there was less than a quorum pres-
ent. It was noticeable that both
those supporting and opposing the
bill were in accord in their denuncia-
tion of the so-called militants. One
member evoked cheers when he re-
ferred to "those irresponsible inatics
who are carrying on the militant
movement." Rt. Hon. Charles Stuart
Wortley, another supporter of the
Bill, said that no sane man could ap-
prove of the original acts of the mil-
itant group.

London "Star" In Five Minutes.

London, April 23.—In the search
for talent for the stage no London
manager has made such successful
efforts as Mr. George Edwardes and
in an interview on Monday he dis-
closed the discovery of an unknown
artist, who will, he says, "rank with
the greatest singer or actress pre-
sented at any time under my manage-
ment."

"She knew no one in any theatre,
manager or player, until she walked
into my office one day about seven
or eight weeks ago and said that she
had heard that Mr. Edwardes wanted
someone who could speak Italian, to
play a part."

"Five minutes later, when she
stood on the stage at Daley's theatre
—the first time she had ever looked
across the footlights, the work-people
of the house, who rarely take notice
of a voice trial of a rehearsal, stopped
and listened to this young artist with
a wonderful voice whose name even
I did not know. The result of that
interview was that she secured the
consent of her friends to go on the
stage, and I am now having her tri-
pled in dancing, singing, fencing and
eloquence. Before the end of the year
she will appear as the "star" in a
new play in one of my London theat-
res, and her name will be Louise
Duval."

£ 2000 a Week For Cinema Stars.

John Bunny, the famous cinema
comedian, is now starring at Ham-
merstein's Music Hall, New York, at
a salary of £200 per week, which
gigantic salary is not far short of
the sum he draws each week all the
year round when playing for the Vita-
graph Company, for the rapid growth
of the cinema has brought about big
salaries for popular performers.

Marion Lennard, another famous
American picture actress, draws
£200 a week for her services with
one of the independent companies,
and amongst those whose salary runs
into three figures weekly may be
mentioned Arthur V. Johnson, of
the Lubin Company; Miss Ormi Hawley,
of Lubin's; Miss Alice Joyce, the
beautiful Kalem Star; and Miss
Daphne Wayne, world-famous as the
"Biograph Blonde."

Good directors—the men who pro-
duce the films—are as expensive as
star actors. Lawrence Griffith, of the
American Biograph Company, prob-
ably the best dramatic director in the
world, draws considerably over £5,-
000 a year for his services, in addi-
tion to a royalty on films; whilst
Sidney Olcott, who produced Kalem's
"Life of Christ" picture in the Holy
Land, was retained at £5,000 per an-
num.

The scenario editor is another im-
portant member of a cinema studio,
and those working for the big Ameri-
can companies draw salaries on a par
with the money paid to big newspa-
per editors in this country. "Gloom"
Donaherty, of the Biograph Company,
draws £3,000 per annum, and an
editor of the Universal Company was
recently paid £2,500 a year for edit-
ing scripts. American companies
were the first to realize the impor-
tance of good scripts and to pay big
money to the right men for editing
scenarios; £500 to £700 a year is a
small salary for a scenario editor
across the Atlantic, and many of them
receive as much as three or four
times these figures.—London paper.



England's Farming Scheme.

Moved by Sir Sydney Oliver—Grant Has Been Made to Rearrange and Extend Present System of Agricultural Education.

A new scheme for extending and systemizing agricultural education in England and Wales is explained in a circular issued by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, to the local education authorities recently. A grants from the fund to the local and the Development Commissioners for the period ending March 31, 1916 and the Board of Agriculture will make grants from the fund to the local authorities. The object is to bring all agricultural education under one head in each county and to establish a farm school in connection with each authority.

Local Advisory Councils.

The Board will have formed advisory councils in such areas in England as may be decided upon, and will be asked to consider the needs of said areas with a view of providing them with agricultural education and keeping them in close touch with the main body.

Some of the other duties will be to prepare agricultural experiments and demonstrations to be carried out jointly by the counties within the area and to advise local authorities as to the need for further farm schools. The farm school is to be the headquarters of the itinerant lecturers and teachers employed. The schools will provide winter courses for those who have already some practical experience, and summer courses where circumstances require. They may be part of, or located near college institutes.

Additional Grant.
In addition to the grant from the commissioners, a capital grant will be made towards the cost of land, buildings and equipment. A large portion of the expense comes from the Department Fund. Much importance is attached to the suggestion that the scheme provide for all stages of farm training above the elementary and secondary school level.

The memorandum is signed by Sir Sydney Oliver, who was recently appointed secretary to the Board of Agriculture. He quoted the post of Governor of Jamaica for this appointment, and this scheme is about the first important undertaking with which he has been associated in his new sphere of work.

ST. JOHN'S MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

Public Notice!

WHEREAS under and by virtue of certain powers and authority invested in the St. John's Municipal Council, under the "St. John's Municipal Act, 1902," and under Section 1 of an Act passed on the 16th day of April, A.D., 1913, entitled "An Act to amend Section 93 of the St. John's Municipal Act, 1902," as follows:—

"Every house within the town of St. John's situated within fifty feet of the public drain or sewer, shall be connected with the general water and sewerage system, and in or appurtenant to every house there shall be constructed and maintained one or more proper and sufficient water closets as shall be determined by the Council, subject to the approval of the City Engineer, who will decide as to the efficiency of the same."

AND WHEREAS at a regular meeting of the Municipal Council, held on the 2nd day of May instant, the following standard of closet, cistern and trough was adopted to be installed in all houses, where the Municipal Council shall be called upon for such installation, and the same ordered to be published in the "Royal Gazette," viz:—

An enamelled iron closet with hardwood top seat and flush tank lined with lead. Cast iron trough with overflow mounted on brackets.

All work to be done in accordance with the existing Plumbing Rules and Regulations.
