Destructive Fire Last Night.

The home of Mr. John Day, foreman of the Electrical wires, on York Street, About 8.30 the outbreak started. Three children were in the house at the time nd one of them used kerosene oil to light the fire in the kitchen stove in which there had been some smouldering embers. When the inflammable liquid touched these there was a sudden outburst of flame which ignited the woodwork nearby. Soon the adjoining rooms caught and a big blaze followed. The children made a hasty exit and alarmed Mr. P. Grace next door. He at once tried to reach the hall of the Day house to telephone for the Fire Brigade, but was unable to get beyond the step of the door, owing to the intensity of the heat. He then communicated with the East End Fire Hall by messenger and in a few minutes that Company and the Central were on the scene. Meanwhile the fire had rapidly increased and reached top portion of the building. A couple of streams of water were put into play and inside of half an hour the fire was extinguished. The house was gutted and its contents practically all destroyed, as such furniture as was not burnt was either broken or badly damaged by smoke and water. Mr. Day is a Musketry Instructor with the Regiment and was engaged at such work when the fire broke out. The loss to him is indeed very serious and he will have the sympathy of the community. He and family lost almost their entire clothing. His son, Private Dewey, lost some of his military outfit.

The child who put the oil in the stove was uninjured and had a miraculous escape. Another fortunate circumstance is that the fire was confined to the one house, as it is a congested neighbourhood and if the residence on either side of Day's had caught a big conflagration might have resulted.

It was fortunate, however, that the fire-fighters happened to be out at the time, for on their return the Central firemen were called on a second time. A chimney of the double house on Bond Street occupied by Messrs. Ellis and Garland was observed to be badly on fire, and they were called to the scene. They soon had the blaze out, but it is likely that but for their opportune presence another big fire would have occurred.

LUTHER BURBANK.

Luther Burbank, the author of the cold-tempered onion and the invigorating pim olive, was born at Lancaster, Massachusetts, sixty-nine years ago to-day. 

It is said that the defenders ran away, leaving intact the dugouts which the British artillery had shelled. The British found the villages taken much less damaged than they had expected.

The Chancellor opened his address by protesting against the criticisms levelled at the Reichstag by the Upper House of the Diet. Admitting the theory that Parliament in Germany is entitled to discuss Imperial politics, he titled to discuss Imperial politics, hereiterated the previous assurance that the war must lead to a political reorganization, and that the Govern ent would after the close of ho tilities propose a reform of the Prussian franchise. After the war, said the Chancellor, we shall be confronted with the most gigantic tasks that ever confronted a nation. They will be so gigantic that the entire people will have to work to solve them. A strong foreign policy will be necessary, for we shall be surrounded by enemies whom we shall not meet with loud words but with the internal strength of the nation. The loss of another fish carrier is not only an inconvenience to her last owners, but is a drawback to the general trade of the country. We understand the ship was fully covered by insurance.

Germans Missed Ship Carring \$50.000.000

Portland, Me., March 7.-In the Canada's cargo was \$50,000,000 in gold. It was landed at Halifax last Friday, and the fact became generally known here yesterday. Ranged along the sides of the deck after leaving the inner seas of Liverpool were the cases containing this immense amount of valuable bullion, ready to be cast into the sea should a German submarine or raider appear and a hostile crew insist on coming aboard. The Canada of the White Star Do-

minion line arrived here Monday, first touching at Halifax. It is understood that the bullion, weighing 125 tons, was shipped from Halifax to New York in five cars, guarded by armed men. That was the procedure in transporting previous shipments. Secrecy has surrounded the entire transaction and all officials are reicent about even confirming the bare skeleton of the story now divulged.

Convoy was kept up for a portion of the Canada's voyage. None of the officers or crew will discuss this phase of the voyage, so it is not known how ample was the protection afforded on the other side or to what point on this side of the ocean. It did, however, extend to hailing distance of this port.


