



The military was active in preventing citizens from venturing into the streets, which were deserted. Many dead and wounded are lying on the streets. Looting occurred in the city during the night.

H. C. L. RIOTS IN GERMANY.

BERLIN, June 23. Several persons are reported to have been killed at Ulm Wurtemberg in the course of riotous demonstrations against the high cost of food. Similar demonstrations are reported as occurring at Ravensburg and in other parts of Germany, including Osnabrueck in Hanover, Crefeld in Rhine Province and Frankfort on Main Many clashes have occurred between the police and Reichswehr on the one hand, and the demonstrators on other.

MARCONI STRIKE EXTENDING.

MONTREAL, June 23. The Canadian branch of wireless





NEW DODGES OF LONDON BUR-GLARS. Discussing the matter of crime in ondon with an expert on the sub

inal methods. The Scotland Yard (the headquarters of the detective force in London) experts have recently been excited by the evidence of a new implement in burglary. Brass padlocks of a considerable size and of the best make have been found so crushed by some implement that the lock mechanism has fallen out and the padlock become useless. The instrument, whatever it is, has had much the same effect as a nutcracker on a nut. It is not thought possible that burglars could travel with a pneumatic power outfit, and direct hydraulic pressure does not explain it. So far as my informant was aware the character of the implement is still a mystery. The latest improvement in the methods of burglary is for the burglars, after breaking into a building, to have the building locked up again. This has been done in the case of one burglary, where, after an entry had been forced by the destruction of a padlock, a confederate of the gang fitted on a new padlock and made the place secure, so that the policeman on duty when trying the door found everything as usual at the very moment when the burglars inside were packing up the goods. They made their exit by another way, and apparently took the stuff away by motor car.



was devoted to the interests of Education. Ex-President Bond was in the chair and after the reading and confirmation of the minutes dealt with the great needs of training in the work of the ministry. Ignorance was no longer regarded as an asset but both the college education and the experiences of life itself fitted men for the work of preaching. Professor Watson of Mount Allison was then introduced by Dr. Bond, and in one of the finest addresses heard by the Conference in recent years dealt with the subject of education. He expressed his pleasure at being in Newfoundland again and at the generous hospitality accorded him. He said knowledge was power, and showed what knowledge has achieved in the various departments of life. Wisdom was the product of knowledge and experience; it was knowledge crowned with reverence. Wisdom always recognizes God. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." He illustrated the failure of knowledge and efficiency by reference to German ideals and modern German history. Not learning, not mere efficiency but character was the object of education: to make men good citizens, men who will stand in every sphere of life. The present trend in our young people was towards pleasure. At a Winnipeg convention to discuss the morality in the public schools by representatives of all classes and creeds it was assumed that moral standards were low. The cause of the lapse of morality was the neglect of the family altar. Its imortance in the moral life of our peole, and in laying the foundations of Christian character was truly great. The church was the mother of eduation; it could not carry on its work

without education, and the history of education showed that it had been nurtured in the church. By reference to the ancient civilizations. Prof. Watson showed how in art, literature and laws, education was benig fostered. The institutions of learning now so firmly established on the American continent were founded by men in the name of religion. The Methodist Church, started two hundred years ago, now numbered 32 millions. It had 17 colleges in Canada and Nfid. alone, with a property value of ten millions of dollars. No church was so interested in education and no church had so much oney invested in education. 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
