Kings and Queens Inspect Nfld. Pavilion at Wembley

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Will you kindly publish the following telegram received from D. James Davis, B.Sc., F.I.C., F.C.S., F.G.S., who, as you are aware, is the technical assistant to Captain Gordon, M.C., High Commissioner for Newfoundland, who is our representative at the British Empire Exhibition, Leonard, Outerbridge.

Chairman Newfoundland Com. British Empire Exhibition, St. John's, Nfld.

Their Majesties the King and Queen, accompanied by the King and Queen of Roumania, visited Wembley yesterday and inspected Newfoundland Pavilion. Royal Party were met by High Commissioner and members London Advisory Committee and were conducted by me around building which is now complete with all exhibits in place. Their Majesties were greatly pleased with everything and left their autographs in our visitors' book. Great interest was taken in the Newfoundland Dog, Iron Ore and other minerals, fish, and pulp and paper exhibits. The Daily Mail this morning states as follows:—If there was one party in the exhibition which seemed to be enjoying itself, it was the Royal one. The King particularly was in the highest possible spirits. In the Newfoundland Pavilion, he was smiling and full of sallies, like a man without a care. King George was most jovial about the fine exhibit of Cod Liver Oil, and recalled how it was given to him as a boy with orange wine to mask the taste and said it was best described as nutritious. Their Majesties graciously looked at the models of the Daily Mail Paper works and the King was most interested and wondered how the loss of trees felled for the paper was ever made up, and was told it was not necessary to re-forest for in Newfoundland there was such continuous self-propagation of the trees.

Amendment to C.U. Bill to Avoid Suggestion of Coercion

Long Dispute Over Wages of British Miners Settled—Canadian M. P. Relinquishes His Seat.

AMENDMENT TO CHURCH UNION BILL.

TORONTO, May 15.

Divers opinions are expressed by Unionists and anti-Unionists in Toronto regarding the proposed compromise amendment to the Church Union Bill. Rev. Mr. Gandier stated in an interview, he thought the amendment as proposed would be acceptable to those in favour of Union within the Presbyterian Church, concerning the taking of a vote of non-securing Churches before the Bill became law. He believed all Unionists were prepared to grant this. This he thought would effectually remove any suggestion of coercion, and provided the principle of the Bill was maintained the amendment would be quite acceptable.

BRITISH MINERS' AGREEMENT PROBABLE.

LONDON, May 15.

An agreement was reached to-day settling the prolonged dispute over miners' wages. The Miners' Federation has recommended the full delegation to the conference, meeting on May 29th, to endorse the agreement.

HON. WALTER MITCHELL RELINQUISHES SEAT.

OTTAWA, May 15.

The resignation of Hon. Walter Mitchell from membership in the House of Commons, was announced by Speaker Lamoureux at the opening of to-day's session. He has represented St. Antoine District of Montreal since 1921. He simply stated in the regulation formal letter his desire to relinquish his seat.

MACLAREN TEMPORARILY DELAYED.

SHANGHAI, May 15.

Stuart MacLaren, British Aviator, attempting to fly around the world, was unable to hop off to-day from Allahabad, British India, on account of the presence of water in the petrol supply. A message received from Allahabad reported he arrived there yesterday from Nasrabad, and hoped to leave to-morrow for Calcutta.

BILLY SUNDAY ILL.

ROCHESTER, Minn., May 15.

Rev. W. A. (Billy) Sunday, Evangelist, arrived here to-day to enter Mayo Clinic Hospital for treatment for kidney ailment. He spent a restful night aboard the private car that brought him here from Chicago, "the best night in the last twelve" according to his physician.

MURDERER'S SENTENCE COMMUTED.

MONTREAL, May 15.

Within twenty-four hours of the time he was to meet death on the gallows, Joseph Freiler, sentenced to death and stated to hang to-morrow morning, was granted a stay of execution until October 21. He was convicted of the murder of Mrs. Bergeron here, two years ago. Edouard Freilais, sentenced to death for the same crime, had his sentence commuted to life imprisonment yesterday.

BONUS BILL VETOED.

WASHINGTON, May 15.

President Coolidge vetoed the Soldiers' Bonus Bill, passed at the late session of the Congress, on the heels of his disapproval of the Bureau Pension Bill, because he felt it would be an undue strain on the Treasury. Advocates of the Bill immediately announced that an attempt would be made to pass it over the veto. On its original passage it received more than the two-thirds, the vote necessary to override the veto, in both Senate and House.

A Narrow Escape

Yesterday afternoon, while a number of men were engaged re-building Job Bros. North Side wharf which has recently foundered, a pile driver, which was being used in the work, suddenly crashed through the pier into the water, carrying with it two of the labourers. One of the men had a miraculous escape from serious injury when the machine was falling. Both men were rescued in the nick of time.



Campaign for Clean Government opens in West End

Monster Meeting Acclaim West End Team -- Monroe Candidates, Grosbie, Linegar and Browne.

The West End campaign for Clean Government opened last night with a most enthusiastic meeting in the Star Hall. Every inch of space in the large auditorium was occupied. Hundreds could not gain admittance. An eager crowd gathered in the hallway whilst others unable to get so near listened in at the windows. Mr. John Caldwell, Chairman of the West End Committee, called the meeting to order. He expressed his pleasure at seeing so many of last year's committee present, as well as many newcomers. To all he extended a hearty welcome.

CANDIDATES INTRODUCED.

The meeting, he stated, was called for the purpose of submitting for approval the candidates for St. John's West, viz, Sir John Grosbie, W. F. Linegar and W. J. Browne, B.A. The latter was a new man in the field and as he was possessed of much ability, Mr. Caldwell felt that he would be acceptable to all. It was then proposed and seconded that the West End candidates be accepted. On a vote being taken every man in the hall rose and loudly acclaimed the team. Following this the Chairman called on Mr. C. E. Hunt, who headed the poll in the district last year, to speak.

THE ISSUE BEFORE THE ELECTORATE.

Mr. Hunt was pleased to have the opportunity of again addressing the people who stood by him in the last election. He regretted that circumstances prevented him from again offering his services. He asked for support of the men who had been accepted to carry on the work they had begun last year. He urged the necessity of everyone pleading himself to work to the best of his ability. The sentiment was that there would be no fight, but many an easy fight is lost because it is taken too easily. The issue before the electorate now is whether St. John's is going to be a city or a deserted village. Everyone knows of the hundreds of able bodied men who are walking around for the last five years, vainly seeking employment, and if the present condition of affairs is allowed to continue there will be no work for anyone.

CONDITIONS IN ST. JOHN'S.

St. John's West, in 1913, saw hundreds of men leave the wharves of the city and go to their homes happy because they had plenty of employment, but at the present time it is a sad state of affairs to the people who are destitute. During the past twelve months hundreds of men have gone to his office and the host and the most able men asked for work of some kind. During the whole time there were not twenty men who came to him and asked for something for nothing, but a man gave him a sack of coal for \$4.00 a cord had been paid for roasting but he has a man on his premises who is willing to sweat the coal for \$2.00, \$2.50 and \$3.50. After the Walker Report should be asked to walk the Streets, said Sir John. It had been said of him that he had grafted and in this connection the Escaconia deal was mentioned. He had nothing to be ashamed of regarding this transaction. The Newfoundland Government had refused to take a chance. He ran the risk, put his money in and won out. Had he taken the advice in 1919 about fishery matters been taken the country would not be in the troubles she is faced with today.

THE RESULT OF CLASS CRY.

The cry had been down with the merchants. The merchants are down and what is the result? A few years ago a house could not be obtained in St. John's. Ten-day can nearly every street house for sums of \$20,000 down to \$500 are for sale. Mr. Hickman's Manifesto states that the Government had raised the price of fish. This is an absurd statement as the price of fish is governed simply and solely by the law of supply and demand. The slogan should be Newfoundland for the country cannot afford to have young men go out for the country under to return. Concluding Sir John asked for a straight ticket vote for the three candidates and if there was any man who felt and could not support the three he did not want such a man to support any one of them.

LABOR CANDIDATE SPEAKS.

Mr. Wm. Linegar the labor candidate in the last election, who rolled up such a big vote in St. John's west was next called on to speak. Mr. Linegar thanked the meeting for accepting every man in the district as a candidate for St. John's West. He would do the best in his power in this, as in other elections, and he asked for the assistance of the country under to support every man who was up and running. Mr. Linegar showed up many rotten things in connection with the affairs of the country and he felt it his duty to stand by the party who were out to clean up this state of affairs. He would not support the Hickman-Cooker Party for it brought so much distress to St. John's. He did not now propose to speak at length but later on in the campaign would lay before them his views on many matters. He asked for the hearty co-operation of everyone in the coming campaign and the straight ticket vote for Grosbie, Linegar and Browne.

AN HONEST DECLARATION.

Mr. W. J. Browne, B.A., was accorded an enthusiastic reception. He said he felt it was a great honor in his life that he had been selected as a candidate for his native city.

The Latest Political Scandal

CITY SOLICITOR E. L. CARTER LINES UP WITH HAWCO.

WHAT DO ST. JOHN'S TAXPAYERS SAY TO THIS?

The Coaker-Hickman political organ this morning brazenly announces that Edward Leo Carter, City Solicitor, has lined up with M. E. Hawco and will contest the district of St. John's in the interests of the Coaker-Hickman-Gibbs-McGrath outfit. It is hoped the announcement is not correct, and if it is that Mr. Carter has resigned the position of City Solicitor. The taxpayers of St. John's East and West will please remember that Edward Leo is paid by them at the rate of \$2,000 a year and is also furnished an office, light, fuel and attendance thrown in, free of cost, equalling a cash value of another \$600. The duties of Solicitor Carter are to legally advise the Council on all matters even against the Government, but having lent himself as a political candidate to Coaker, we fail to see how Mr. Carter in the event of his party being returned but be allowed to advise against the whims and wishes of Coaker who has threatened to make the grass grow on Water St. Coaker in control of a section of the country is big enough goodness knows, but the last straw is his effort to get a hold on the City Hall officials. Mr. Carter may be honest and sincere in his political views but surely while occupying the position of City Solicitor he cannot permit himself to associate with Coaker. 

Municipal Council

WEEKLY MEETING.
The weekly meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided, and Councillors Martin, Outerbridge, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present.

The meeting was a very short one; the following business being transacted.

F. W. Marshall, of Marshall's Garage, Ltd., who for several years past has been carrying on a Bus Transportation Service between Water Street and the Higher Levels, the starting point being Queen's Street, called attention to the fact that some days ago he was notified to discontinue parking at the latter place. He stated that since the beginning of the service, they had made this street their stand and could see no reason why they should now be compelled to go to George Street. The Council, however, has issued no instructions to this effect, and it was decided that a copy of his communication be forwarded the Inspector General.

The application of the residents of Warberry Street, for water and sewerage extension, was referred to the City Engineer, who is to submit estimate of the cost of this work.

Mr. A. W. Miller, Superintendent of the Poor Asylum, called attention to the need of having a light placed at the foot of Sudbury Street. This was referred to the Lighting Committee.

Regarding the petition of the residents of Theatre Hill and Dick's Square, for closing of the lane rear of the Star Hall, it was ordered that their request be granted, and that gates be placed at both entrances to this place, namely Bogva Street and Dick's Square.

Messrs. Bains, Johnston and Company, Agents for Newman's Estate, informed the Board that arrangements would be made for the removal of the dilapidated building, Duckworth St., as requested.

The Medical Officer of Health informed the Council that the usual spring inspection of back-yards was now in progress.

PLANS.
The following plans were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer.

Dwellings—Wm. Drover, Forest Road; Thos. Walsh, Water Street West; Iron Shed, Imperial Oil Ltd, Southside; Extensions, George Rowe, Mundy Pond Road, Mr. Murphy, Brazil's Square; West End Candy Store, Water Street; Garage, M. Fahy, Boncloddy Street.

The plan submitted by the Reid Newfoundland Company, for extension to garage, Victoria Street, was deferred, until the report of the City Engineer is received in relation thereto.

During the past week a burst occurred in the main at the Western Higher Level Service, at Coughlan's Bog. The Waterworks Department were immediately put to work, and had repairs made.

CLEAN-UP DAY.
It was finally decided that May 21st be set apart as "Clean-up Day." Citizens are requested to have the garbage and accumulations placed in proper receptacles in front of their dwellings, so the same may be removed by the Sanitary Department.

Any citizens wishing to co-operate with the Council in its endeavours to make the City clean and wholesome, and who are desirous of giving assistance of any kind, such as the use of horses, carts, motor trucks, etc., are requested to communicate with the City Clerk, or with Sanitary Supervisor Dwyer, or send same to the Sanitary Stables, Hayward Avenue, at 7 a.m. on the date mentioned.

The Medical Officer of Health reported seven new cases of Scarlet Fever and one Diphtheria in the City during the past week.

The reports of the City Engineer, Sanitary Supervisor, etc., were tabled.

Orders were given for the placing of a new fence along the Circular Road side of Banerman Park; also to have preparations made for putting the play ground apparatus in position.

The meeting then adjourned.

Antwerp Cutters

MAKE DIAMONDS MORE BRILLIANT.

Diamonds will gleam with four-fold brilliance, yet cost considerably less, if the invention of two Antwerp gem cutters is perfected. Working in a gloomy, poorly equipped shop, these two men, whose names have not been revealed suddenly decided that progress in their art had not kept pace with other industrial science.

After six months' research, often working till nearly daybreak, they found a method of cutting and polishing diamonds which gave 635 reflections, instead of the usual 175, besides yielding a fire that had not been obtained since the days of ancient Egypt. Moreover, under this process, the rough stone loses almost nothing in its cutting and the smallest chips may be made to glow as brightly as any princely gift of several carats.

Some American diamond buyers have been negotiating for American rights to the invention, but the Belgians refuse to sell until they have revolutionized the industry.
