CONDEMNATION OF DR. MCGILL. The second public meeting of the Reformers of South Ontario took place at Brooklyn on Wednesday last. Fully 500 persons must have been present, and a more unanimous hearty assemblage has seldom been witnessed. Many of the most prominent members of the party were present. Mr. J. S. M. The Jays - in Prince's Square - are singing their songs of praise, and all nature rejoices - including the public libraries - that the snow isn't ten feet deep. - Ham-silton Times.

Despatches to the Evening Mercury. LONDON, March 11. - In the House of Commons this evening, Mr. Cardwell, Secretary of War, made a statement in regard to the army estimates, showing a reduction of £1,000,000 in the total amount, as compared with last year. He said that the Government proposed to partially accomplish this saving by reducing the forces in the colonies, except at military stations.

DUBLIN, March 11. - The amnesty committee of this city, has started a subscription to raise funds for the benefit of the Fenian convicts who are discharged from imprisonment by the Government. American Despatches. New York, March 12. - The Tribune's special agent's nomination of Hamilton Fish for Secretary of State creates no enthusiasm. He has been out of politics for so long a time that people seem to have forgotten him.

THE PROFITS OF MALTWOOD. - The Globe of Thursday says that the Couragee Sun is informed, on what it regards as reliable, that "Mr. William Eyre, of Hamilton township, brother of John Eyre, Esq., M.P.P., has been appointed Registrar for the West Riding of Northumberland, in the room of the Hon. G. S. Boulton, deceased." This confirms a story we have heard elsewhere, and we have not much doubt that it is at least true that the appointment in question has been promised. There is nothing surprising about it. It is not Mr. Eyre, M.P.P., one of the nine martyrs - one of Mr. Sandfield MacDonald's Combination Reformers? And is he not entitled to his reward as much as Mr. A. W. Lauder, Mr. A. P. Cockburn, or Mr. H. D. Smith? The precious document, the manifesto of the nine, must be decently paid for - say nothing of the votes for ball-rooms, billiard-rooms, and stables for the Lieut. Governor, and kindred extravaganzas. - The only thing to be remarked in the business, is the distastefulness of Mr. Eyre in seeking an office for himself, instead of getting soothed for himself, as Mr. Smith and Mr. Lauder did.

FIRE AT GORDERICH. - Another destructive fire occurred in Gorderich on Wednesday night in a frame block on the west side of the Market Square, owned by Dr. McEugene and occupied by G. N. Davis, dealer in shoes, &c.; Mrs. Wilson, milliner; Thos. Sturdy, shoemaker; and Mrs. Mack's restaurant. From the first it was evident that no part of the building could be saved and the citizens directed their efforts to saving the adjoining brick building, occupied by N. Gordon, druggist; and J. Harris, dry goods merchant, and to the removal of goods from the different shops in the burning block. Mrs. Mack saved most of her goods, but badly damaged. She is partly insured. Sturdy saved but a small portion of his stock, insured for \$400. Mrs. Wilson, lost nearly all her stock and household goods, partly insured. G. N. Davis, stock and furniture very badly damaged in removal, loss unknown - insured for \$1,500. Jordan's building was saved through the extraordinary exertions of the citizens and the favorable wind; but his stock is very much destroyed by removal - loss not known.

Both feel sold, and inwardly resolve to buy umbrellas nearer home in future, and to deal "no more in ycn town." - Elora Express.

Artful Female Dodgers and their Victims.

According to the law as at present existing, the evidence of a female in cases of assault or attempted assault upon her person is sufficient, without corroborative testimony, to convict the party accused. No doubt the Statute was so framed for the better protection of unprotected females, and for the more speedy execution of justice upon the offender. Nevertheless, in many cases this provision has failed in the object aimed at, and has opened the door for treachery and perjury to women of doubtful character, in order to secure from their victims a certain amount of "hush money." So many cases of this kind have occurred in England, particularly in the railway carriages, which only contain three or four persons, that gentlemen of the most irreproachable character sometimes assure themselves before they enter one that they will not be shut up alone in the company of a female who, for aught he may know, is travelling for the special object of entrapping some unsuspecting passenger. The annals of the English Police Court will tell of many cases of this kind where abandoned women pursue this game—and very often with fair success. Rather than have an exposure, though as innocent of dishonorable intentions or efforts as the child unborn, the unfortunate victim of the plot will hand over a sum of money to his persecutor—and for any redress of this evil there is no use looking—he has no alternative but to either submit to the fleecing, or have himself dragged before a court, his private character maligned, and perhaps in the end have to pay all the costs, besides a sum to compensate his persecutor for her "honor." We do not refer to England only for examples of this kind, but to all other countries where a similar law obtains. Perhaps were the statute in such cases made and provided radically altered, the evil might be shifted the other way; and therefore on the whole we cannot complain of the law as it stands—the best thing to be done is to be very careful in judging of the woman's testimony in the premises. A clear-headed jury can generally discover from the plaintiff's own evidence whether or not she is worthy of belief—and her past character for veracity and general good conduct should be carefully sifted. It is not so easy after all to enact the role of a badly abused and modest woman, as some people imagine—and consequently a vast amount of deception and skill is required on the part of a plaintiff who like some brazen-faced women in cases of breach of promise, regards the question of damages as the most important—honor and modesty being secondary considerations. We have said this much in order to point out the necessity of care and good judgment being called forth in the settlement of such actions as we have referred to; for while every man is certainly not a Joseph in his morals, every wife, unlike Caesar's, is not above suspicion, as has frequently been proven in courts of law.

Mrs. Grant.—Some of the American papers freely criticize Mrs. Grant's personal appearance. "On Thursday last there was installed a mistress of the White House a little, plain, ordinary woman, to whom the fashionable necessities of her position will no doubt be as irksome as she, in manners and appearance, is notoriously unfit to assume them. Poor thing!" This is really too bad. Another journal says:—Mrs. Grant is essentially an insignificant kind of woman, whose only hold on the attention or memory of her visitors is an unpleasant strabismic peculiarity, and the train of thought she suggests about great men almost always having homely wives. Leaving personal appearances aside, Mrs. Grant is immeasurably superior to Mrs. Lincoln in all the attributes of a lady.

THE HUDSON BAY COMPANY.—From an answer recently given in the British House of Commons last week, it appears that no satisfactory arrangements have yet been made for the surrender of the Hudson Bay Territory to the Canadian Government. Messrs. Cartier and Macdougall have been a long time in England now, and they should be urged to demand an immediate and final decision, as the present state of suspense is most unfavorable; and not only the North West Territory, but Canada itself is likely to suffer from the delay.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY.—The Dublin Irishmen, in an article with reference to the approach of St. Patrick's Day, asks how it should be celebrated. It says:—"Last year we mourned; this year why should we rejoice? Nothing is changed with us, except that some others of our imprisoned brethren have been carried from the dungeon to the grave." It further says that the craze and the sham-rock must still intermingle; "their union is not so soon to be severed."

ONTARIO MUTUAL LIFE ASSURANCE COMPANY.—At the last session of Parliament a bill was passed incorporating this Company, which is now in a most flourishing condition and is about to establish agencies in all the principal cities and towns of the province. The head office is at the village of Waterloo, and the managers are men of influence and standing, well known in this locality, such as Mr. Moses Springer, M. P., Mr. I. E. Bowman, M. P., Dr. S. W. Walden, and Messrs. John Allchin, and John B. Snyder. The company intend to carry on a general life assurance business on the mutual principle within the Province and as its rates are, we understand, very low, they will doubtless be able to do a very large business. An office has been opened for Guelph and vicinity, and Mr. H. C. Drake appointed agent.

A HARD CASE.—On Wednesday of last week two brothers named Wm. and Jno. McCleary arrived in Toronto for the purpose of entering the hospital, both having had their feet frozen some time before, while working in Ellis township, and had, for about 6 weeks afterwards, lived on the charity of the people of Guelph. Last week, however, Dr. Herod purchased tickets for both the men and the wife of one of them, and sent them on to Toronto. They were unable to obtain admission into the hospital, having no claim on that city. Ultimately, Mr. Boustead, chairman of the Board of Health, gave an order for their admission for one week at his own expense, to allow time to communicate with the authorities of this town, and ascertain whether Guelph is willing to support them.

SAINT AND SAGE.—The London Advertiser says: "The Spectator is discussing whether Sandfield is a sage or a saint. It may be saintly to tell lies, but it is hardly sage to boast of it in public. The truth is, Wood called Sandfield both saint and sage. Thus, the matter is worse than it was reported. Why don't Sandfield canonize Wood; surely one good turn deserves another. Wouldn't they make a precious pair of saints!"

Not so Bad.—The book which has been used in the Toronto Police Court for years has been discovered to be a copy of Webster's Dictionary. The Cadi on Friday, had occasion to refer to a passage of scripture, when the real nature of the book was discovered. It has been charged for some time that a bible was not used in the court. The police magistrate ordered a new copy of the Scriptures to be procured.

ENGLISH GAME LAWS.—It is difficult to account for the fact that the tyrannous game laws of England find scarcely any opposition from the press of that country or leading men. The only popular writer who spoke plainly was Thomas Carlyle, in his "Past and Present;" but this was long ago, and before he made the discovery that the common people have no rights.

COURT OF CHANCERY.—The Court of Chancery will sit in Guelph on April the 6th, Chancellor presiding.

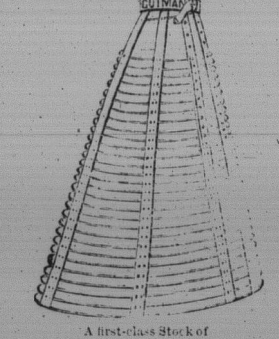

The Insurrection in Cuba. It appears an expedition from the United States, Nassau and Inaug, has landed on the Cuban coast. The captain of a Spanish vessel which arrived at Havana on the 11th, reports that on Sunday last while east of Punta Matanzas he saw a fleet, consisting of one side-wheel steamer, bark rigged, and three other steamers, schooner rigged, steering north-east. Shortly after he passed a sidewheel steamer, bark rigged, which was anchored two miles from Grancho Keep. The report has been in circulation for some time past in Cuban circles that an expedition was under way to those shores, bringing cannon, arms, ammunition and recruits for the insurgents. A committee of Conservative citizens of Matanzas have been organizing bands of volunteers, who are sent out daily in all directions to scour the country. Other towns are disposed to follow the example of Matanzas. The news from the jurisdiction of Cienfuegos is favourable to the Government. The Governor of Sagua from Villa Clara, has marched with all his available forces against the insurgents, who have for some time past made their headquarters on the San Jose plantation. In the Eastern department the government troops are very active. Columns have left Santiago and Bayamo to attack the main force of the insurgents at Mayarí. In the Central department the government is strengthening the garrisons. A battalion 250 strong has arrived at Colonia de St. Domingo. The vessels which are to convey the political prisoners to Fernando Po will sail on Sunday next. They will be accompanied by the Spanish man-of-war *Topica*. Among the prisoners to be transported are Senator Castillo, the Bank President, Senator Embil, a planter and Senator Regueme, a merchant, all well known men in high standing in the community. The Government Censor has notified the Havana journals that they will hereafter be permitted to publish only the official accounts of engagements; giving as a reason that other statements tend to mislead the public mind.

Mr. Whitaker, the officer who was shot at Quebec by Chaloner, died last night. The coroner's jury was empanelled this afternoon at four o'clock, and proceeded to the Clarendon to the body. The surgeon of the regiment was examined, and stated that death was caused from a wound produced by a pistol shot. The inquest will be continued to-morrow to allow medical examination of the train, and to discover the precise spot where the bullet is lodged. Mr. Whitaker's appearance is very much changed, and mortification has set in, the effect of which was evident. The body was examined by the jurors, but did not show any marks.
