The Murderer Townsend Once

HIS SUPPOSED DISCOVERY AND CONFESSION.

Fearful Record of Crime.

The N.Y. Times gives the following from its correspondent at Mazatean, Mexico, which if true brings to light the notorious murderer Townsend, whose crimes in Canada some 18 years ago roused the horror of the entire companies. munity. He had been keeping a low groggery and dance house in that place, under the name of Adams, and knowing that he would soon die from the effects of a pistol shot received in a fight some months ago, he made a confession to Capk. Verplank, the American Agent, of having in his lifetime committed 14 mur-ders in the United States and Canada. Adams companied his narrative by

Adams commenced his narrative by stating that his proper name was George Worley, and that he was a native of Manchester, England. He commenced his career of erime by murdering the second mate of the American ship Cultivator, in the Liverpool decks, about the year 1854. After this deed he went to Canada, and roved about through these provinces for two years in pursunt of robbery. In the year 1855, at which time he was known by the name of Orton, he was engaged as a sailor on the lakes. While lying in the American port of Oswego he murdered a man, whom he understood to be a painter, by throwing him over a bridge. He met his victim in a drinking saloon, where he went to collect a bill of the proprietor, and followed him until the opportunity was favourable, when he struck him down with a slung-shot; and disposed of the body in the way mentioned. After this Adams returned to Canada, and assumed the name of Townsend. With two accotaplices he commenced a campaign of robbery, and perpetrated four murders in the country west of Toronto, ending with the killing of a sherifa few miles west of Nigara River. That country then became too warm for him, in consequence of the offering of large rewards for his arrest, and he escaped on board a schooner passing through the Welland Canal to the American port of Toledo. From that port he went to Chicago, and committed three murders in that place during the same summer. One of his victims was the captain of a vessel, whom he followed from the St. Charles saloon; another was a German saloon-keeper, whom he killed in his bed at night, in his place of business, which was situated near a railroad depot, and the third was some man unknown to him, whom he murdered after leaving a brothel. After these crimes he was argeed in a series of robberies through the committed a murder in Louisville and one in Menphis, but of the names of his victims he had no knowledge. Adams left New Orleans about the time of the breaking out of the war and went to Vera Cruz. From thence he went to the city of M

The Kingston Election Trial. The Kingston Election Trial.

The examination of witnesses in this trial closed on Wednesday, and Chief Justice Richards has reserved his judgment till Friday. At the commencement of the trial it was admitted by respondent's counsel that bribery by agents had been practised, which admission was sufficient to void the election. The evidence taken was, therefore, with a view of proving personal briberyby Sir J. Macdonald. A number of witnesses were examined, who took a more or less active part in the election, and who seemed to have the handling of considerable sums of money, which was freely distributed among the tavern and saloon keepers in treating, paying for rooms, and in the hiring of teams.

Sir John himself was examined by Mr. Bethune. The substance of his evidence was that he was doubtful about offering for Kingston until persuaded by his friends, who formed themselves into an Association, the Hon. Mr. Campbell being the most active member. Sir John thought that his own expenditure did not exceed \$2,000, but other sums were contributed—the exact amounts not being stated—by friends in Toronto and other places. Mr. Campbell had charge of the distribution of the funds, and it is a somewhat suspicious circumstance that this gentleman could not be found when wanted to give his evidence. He had been traced from Montreal to New York, and there had mysteriously disappeared. His evidence would have thrown more light on the way the money was spent than that of any other witness. All that could be got out of Sir John was that he had made a close personal canvass, had been around a good deal among the tavers, but, to use his own words, "did not directly or indirectly give any money, nor approve of, know of, or sanction the giving of money for bribery."
