PARIS, Jan. 19.—Just before the bourse closed union general shares fell 255 francs, producing a panic.

The panic has not been equalled since 1877. The bank of Lyons at Loire failed. Every stock in the market is affected.

A number of Lyons speculators have been ruined. No financial disaster is known in Paris, but all depends on the ultimate position of the Union Generale. The crisis will only touch speculators.

London, Jan. 20.—The News Paris despatch says there was a tremendous panic on the bourse yesterlay.

The General Appearance of the American Capi-tal and its Population—A Visit to the White House—The President at Home.

(Correspondence of The Toronto World.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—A few notes on things I have seen and men I have met in things I have seen and men I have met in the course of a few days' stay in Washington may help to fill up an odd corner of The World. It is a goodly city, and its people are proad of it. One of the evening papers keeps the official population—some 180,000—as a standing line at the head of its editorial columns. The streets are broad, many of them are laid with concrete pavement, and all are kept clean and in good repair. It has a fairer all-round good repair. It has a fairer all-round average of good dwellings and business houses than any other city that I know, though of course it will not begin to show the class of stores, hotels and dwelling of New York or Chicago. There are many poor houses, of course—the homes of the negro population—but if there is a " poor quarter" I failed to see it.

Just now the city is overflowing with oliticians and lobbyists; it is the season in Washington, and society is at its gayest. During the afternoons the capitol hums with life. Both houses meet at 12 o'clock, and usually the session does not continue later than 6 o'clock. 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
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
