WASHINGTON WHISPERS.

A SCENE IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The General Appearance of the American Capital and its People. A Visit to the White House. The President at Home. (Continued from the Toronto World.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—A few notes on things I have seen, and men I have met in the course of a few days' stay in Washington may help to fill up an odd corner of the World. It is a goodly city, and its people are proud of it.

Just now the city is overflowing with politicians and lobbyists; it is the season in Washington, and society is at its gayest. During the afternoon the capitol halls with life. Both houses meet at 12 o'clock, and usually the session does not continue later than 6 o'clock.

YOUNG CONSERVATIVES.

Meeting in West Toronto—A Fair Attendance—And Considerable Entailment.

A public meeting under the auspices of the Young Men's liberal conservative association was held last night in Bailey's hall, Huron street.

Mr. J. R. Warrall, president of the club, was the first speaker, and made a fluent speech, in which he claimed that the conservatives had ever acted in the interests of the country, while their opponents had not.

Mr. L. P. Kribbs was the next speaker. His speech was full of humor and without foreboding. He created not a little amusement by quoting from the World and applying to Mr. Blake a verse of poem originally intended for a very different individual.

Mr. Ed. Clarke said the first principle of conservatism was British connection and the second was the development of the country. Mr. Price was proud to be a member and would do all in his power to keep the blue flag of the conservative movement from being dragged in the dirt.

Mr. Bowen was roundly cheered and spoke at some length, at one time he had hoped great things for the future but had forfeited his confidence. He advised the young men to secure the adhesion of bank clerks to the conservative cause.

Mr. A. W. Wright was called for and said he shared the sentiments of the speaker and quite acceptable. He was cordially with the Dominion government, but could not approve of the policy of the present government.

News and Notes of the Latest Sporting Events—Orman Blinett's Injuries.

The Chicago annual will be rowed for by the Columbia, Princeton and University of Pennsylvania crews on June 25. Prof. John Donaldson offers to fight any man in America, bearing Ryan and Sullivan, according to the rules of the London prize ring, for \$300 or \$1000 a side.

Among the sensational events likely to make the approaching season an eventful one, will be a repetition of the great stallion race of 1881, at Rochester, N. Y., for a purse of \$10,000.
