

THE CROWN PRINCE'S CASE

A DOCTOR'S REPORT ON THE PROGRESS OF THE DISEASE

The Patient Expresses Gratitude for the Many Measures of Sympathy Sent to Him From Germany and elsewhere—Medical News in Close Alliance.

Berlin, Nov. 23.—Dr. Schmidt, in a report to the Medical Society of Berlin on the case of the Crown Prince, says: Dr. Gerhardt was first consulted March 6. Afterwards with two operations he removed a tumor from the cervical chord. He then intimated to Dr. Wegener and Dr. Orth of Ems his fears that cancer existed. The course of the Crown Prince's case was considered mainly protracted, the object being to ascertain whether the swelling was benign or malignant. On June 18 Dr. Landgraf discovered a swelling on the larynx. On July 1 another swelling was observed, situated on the posterior wall of the larynx, with a strong outgrowth towards the cervical chord. On Aug. 8 Dr. Mackenzie undertook to eradicate the swelling. After his operation the Crown Prince went to Bremen. The German doctors, for whom no accommodation was provided, took a further examination until Aug. 23. The next year they showed several pointed excrescences which Dr. Mackenzie assumed to be the result of his operation.

On Sept. 1 the German doctors left. In conclusion Dr. Schmidt declares that a cancerous infiltration has existed from the beginning behind the left vocal chord. This caused irritation, which produced a capillary growth on the chord. About the removal of these the public is already informed.
