DEATH OF JOCKEY SPELLMAN.

A Canadian Who Attained Eminence in the Saddle—Tobogran sidde in Queen's Park.

New York, Nov. 23.—John Spellman, the Jockey, died this morning from the effects of injuries received in a house of questionable reputation on Thirteenth-street.

Ispellman was a Canadian by birth, having been born in the County of Brant. About 1871 he was a bell boy in a Brantford hotel, which occupation he left to join the turn. His first and only employer in Canada was the well-known horseman Pat Davy, in whose employ he was two years, during which he became prominent by riding the old horse Pilot. In 1873 he left Canada and went to the United States, where he soon became very successful in the saddle, and till within a few years was considered one of the best Jockeys on the American turn. 


