WEIGHTS AND MEASURES Traders, Manufacturers and Owners of Weights. Measures and Weighing Machines generally are specially requested to read carefully the following instructions and act accordingly:

Every Trader, Manufacturer and Owner of Weights, Measures and Weighing Machines when paying moneys to inspectors or Assistant inspectors of Weights, Measures and Weighing Machines when paying moneys to inspectors or Assistant inspections of weights and Measures for verification fees is entitled to, and is specially requested to, demand from the officer who makes the inspection an official certificate ("Form O. 6" with the words "Original for the Trader" printed at the head thereof) properly filled out and stamped, and also at the same time to carefully ascertain whether or not the stamps attached to such certificate represent exactly the value the amount of cash paid. Traders are requested to bear in mind that certificates of verification are of no value whatever unless stamps covering the full amount of fees charged are attached.




