

NOTE AND COMMENT.

The member of the Canadian House of Commons from the Yukon takes nineteen days to reach Parliament Buildings, Ottawa. Should he journey westward through Asia and Europe, crossing Pacific and Atlantic Oceans it would take him twentyfive days to reach Ottawa. Canada is a big, big country.
