STOVE POLISH.—By placing a piece of camphor, about the size of a kickory nut, in the stove blacking the blacking will adhere through the heat.

RYE Biscurrs.—One pint milk, yeast bither home made or baker's, one table-poonful melted butter, and three ta-blespoonfuls of sugar, stir in flour enough to make as stiff as can be stirenough to make as still as can be still red with a spoon. Let it rise over night and the next morning drop it into well buttered gem pans or biscuit pans. Bake half an hour in as hot an oven as can be used without scorching.

To CLEAN BLACK CASHMERE.—Wash in hot suds, with a little borax in the water; rinse in bluing water,—very blue, and iron while damp. It will look equal to new. Another way is to brush the article to be cleaned, and then wash in clear, cold water and a handful of common washing soda dissolved; use no soap or warm water. Iron on the wrong side while damp.
