The famine is not due to Bolshev ism but to natural forces. The Russian Commission of the near East Relief says: "The rainfall through the Volga Valley in April, May and June of this year (1921) averaged less than 2.4 millimeters per month as against a normal rainfall (17 year average) of 35.6 millimeters; and the temperature averaged 12.6 degrees fahrenheit better than the 17 year average." 

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
