
The Westminister, B. C., Southern Railway has been let out to contractors to the boundary line and 240 men are at work. The road will connect with Seattle, W.T.

EXTENSIVE Shipments of starch are being made from Summerside, P. E. I. to Point du Ohene, N. B. One day last week the steamer carried 30 tons of potato starch, valued at about \$2,000.

THE Spring Hill Coal Mines are still working only one slope, the water in the pits not

having been pumped out. Extra machinery is on the way from the upper provinces to clear the water from the pits.

Quits a number of importers in western Novs Scotia have been detected in defrauding the Dominion Revenue by smuggling, and a customs detective named Bonness has been making it hot for the smugglers.

This Trust and Loan company's report shows the net profits of the half-year to be £9,345 and announces a credit balance of £14,408. A dividend of 6 per cent, is proposed, leaving £4,658 to go forward.

APPLICATION will be made to Parliament to incorporate the Ottawa Terminal Railway and Bridge Company, for the purpose of building a union depot on the west bank of the canal between Sapper's bridge and the Militia store.

The Yarmouth Steamship Company has resolved to increase its capital to \$220,000 for the purpose of purchasing a fast side wheel steamer to run between Halifax, Yarmouth and St. John as a feeder to the steamer Yarmouth.

The Havana tobacco market continues active, and, it is said, a new batch of purchasers have just put in their appearance. Vuelta and Remedios leaf continues to sell at former prices, but already an upward tendency is observable.

Ir is understood that the Government has decided to extend to the Northern Pacific Railway the same bonding facilities enjoyed

by other roads on giving the customary security bonds, which will amount to eighty thousand dollars.

QUEERO buyers have visited the line of the Temiscoutal Railway and purchased all the sheep and lambs that were in the market. The farmers of the backwoods of New Brunswick are rejoicing at finding a near outlet for their farm product.

The steamer: M. A. Starr arrived in Charlottetown last week: from Halifax, bringing 120 hhds, 46 half hhds, and 30 kegs beer, and 40 cases liquor. The singularity of this is that the whole of Prince Edward Island is under the Scott Act.

REPORTS from Cape Breton are to the effect that construction of the Cape Breton railway is being pushed forward most vigorously since dry weather set in. The section between Grand Narrows and Boisdale will be ready for the rails next month.

Ir is rumored that a Toronto syndicate; composed principally of wholesale boot and shoe men, with a capital of \$100,000, have secured the Ontario Rubber Works at Port Dalhousie, and that the business will be pushed with great vigor.

Mrs. S. E. Simpson, who kept a small grocery store at Amprior, Ont.; has assigned. Her, husband is an agent for agricultural implements.—David F. Sherman, tailor, of Galt, Ont.; has assigned. He owes \$3,700 and has assets of \$2,600 only.

GEO. STRATHERN, jeweller, of Midland, Ont., is effecting a settlement with his creditors at. 50 cents in the dillar, secured and payable in twelve month, on liabilities of \$3,700. He was formerly of the firm of Strathern Bros., who dissolved four months ago.

Tue Grand Trunk Railway receipts, which have for some time past been showing smallgains, last week took a start up of \$20,324: This is decidedly a good sign both for the railroad and the country, and indicates that business along the road is improving.

An advance in spool threads was made last week. The leading British manufacturers, such as J. & P. Coats, Clapperton, Clark, etc., have raised the price of colored and 6-cord, 200 yards, from \$4.25 to \$5.75" per gross, and 6-cord, 300 yards; from \$6.25 to \$8,25,

JOHN M. WALLACE, woollen manufacturer of Lindsay, Ont., was formerly in the dry-goods business, and started in his present business in 1883. Since then he has apparently done fairly, but has always been more or less hard up. We now hear of his assignment.

Ir looks as though the electric sugar refining process, which was initiated in New York some time ago, would soon be tested again. The machinery has been running for some time to get in working order, and a trial will soon be made with sugar, according to current report.

Tue shareholders of the Hopewell, N. S. Woollen Mills have decided not to rebuild the mills to replace those burned last sum-

mer. The company's debts are to be paid out of the insurance money and the balance is to be divided pro rata among the sharcholders.

THE United States', Treasury Department officials deny the truth of the report that there has been any change in the policy of the administration or department towards the Alaska seal fisheries. There has been a relaxation this season of their watchfulness in Behring's Sea.

THE estate of P. A. Roy, the insolvent grocer and fruit dealer of Ottawa, has paid, 131 cents on the dollar to the creditors. The liabilities were \$1,326. The assets realized \$427 out of which \$258 was paid for disbursements leaving \$179 to be divided among the 39 creditors of the estate.

Mr. John Winlow, of Esquering, advertised an auction sale at Exeter, the goods to be sold by himself. Mr. Winlow had no auctioncer's license, and after the sale an information was laid against him; and he was fined \$20 and costs for not having license. One-half of the fine went to the prosecutor.

Tus Persian date crop is about one-half an average and the quality can be better told, when they arrive, later in the month. Last year the crops were pretty, fair aud the prices opened at 7 to 71 cents per pound, but as the crops are short the opening prices this season; will in all probability be higher if the stock is good.

The foreign bankers who have ordered gold: for shipment to Europe state that, owing to

the demand in London for gold bars for shipment to Russia and South America, bankers on the other side are paying for gold a fraction over the nominal price The amount of gold taken for shipment last week was \$4,-654,000.

Tus government steamer Newfield, which has been supplying coal, &c., to the lighthouses on the eastern coast, returned to port last week. She brought from Sable Island a number of carpenters who have been making repairs and alterations to the lighthouses The cranberry crop on the Island was a failure this year.

ALL the United States Consuls in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, St. Pierre and Newfoundland, are now. holding conferences in Halifax with Consul General Phelan. This is the first conference ever held, and it is believed the subjects under discussion are connected with the fisheries question.

P. C. D'AUTRUIL, dry goods merchant, of Quebec, has assigned. Liabilities are placed. at \$50,000 and he claims a nominal surplus of \$3.000. He did a fair trade until this fall when his business fell off and he ran behind. He appears to have overstocked himself; as his good credit induced his suppliers to force goods on to him,

MR. ROBT. MCNABS, wholesale dealer in lace and white goods, of this city, has just returned from an extensive business trip through the entire Northwest to Victoria, B. C. He reports that Montreal fully holds her own

They are said to owe about \$50,000 —Jno. McKenzie, a dealer in coal and wood, of the same city, has assigned. The failure of the Addisons, who owed him a considerable sum, is given as the cause.

We learn from Belleville that Jas. Moorman at one time manager of the Jas. St. Charles Carriage Works, but late local agent for the Gananoque Carriage Company, and, finally dairyman, has left the city, and Sheriff Hope has taken possession of his property in Thurlow, and will have a sale on the 30th., The Stinson estate has a claim for \$1,100, and Jas. St. Charles a chattel mortgage for \$600.

Tus assignment of the Ontario Cotton Mills chronicled last week referred to the old company, which found it necessary to do so in order to wind up its business. A new organization, entitled the Ontario Cotton company, was incorporated in June last, which purchased all the stock on hand of the old company, leased the mill and is continuing the business and is in no way affected by the assignment.

A MEETING of the creditors of Stovel & Arm strong, tailors, of Toronto, wae held on the 22nd ulto. The statement showed liabilities of \$50,000 and assets, principally in book debts of \$69,000. It is expected a comprom ise will be affected. At the meeting of credit-os of Anderson Bros, grocers, of Toronto, a secured offer of 50 cents in the dollar was made by the firm. The assets are \$4,000, and liabilities \$5.000.

An Albany, N.Y., gentleman is in Ottawa investigating the paper-producing capabilities of Canadian sawdust, and has interviewed all the leading lumber firms on the question of erecting an extensive paper manufactory on the Chaudiere. He represents the Albany Improved Soda Process Paper Manufacturing Co., which consists in putting the sawdust into large steel digesters; heated by steam and containing a sode solution, which reduces the sawdust to the finest pulp. This pulp is then bleached to a snowy white, and passed between heated rollers over a felt surface until perfectly dry, and of the required thickness. The soda process is being adopted in many places in the United States, and seems to be an improvement on the slow acid process,

THE BONDING PRIVILEGE.

. It is altogether probable that one of the first diplomatic acts of General Harrison, after his formal installation in office, will be to resume negotiations with Great Britain upon the fishery dispute; and as undoubtedly the principal point of contention will be the granting or withholding of the privilege of transporting fish in bond across Canadian territory, it may be well to review the arguments advanced by both parties.

The American fishermen claim that while we refuse them the privilege of thus landing and transhipping their catches in bond we extend this right to French

fishermen without question. They argue that the injury done by the small duty they place upon Canadian fish is infinitesimal compared with that inflicted by the enormous bounty paid by France. They urge that they are the best customers for Canadian fish, and will take all the fish we can send to them, while France will not under any circumstances buy a single pound and legislates in every way against foreign fishermen and in favor of her own; and yet France is given the free use of those bonding privileges which are refused to them.

A portion of these arguments are certainly correct. Of late French fishermen have made large use of this bonding privilege for the deliberate purpose of undercutting Canadian fishermen in the Italian market, since Canadian fish are admitted free into Italian ports while the bounty protected fish of St. Pierre are subject to a special duty of 60 cents per quintal. As this would effectually prohibit their profitable competition with Canada and Norway, the French fishermen coolly lands his fish in bond at a Canadian port, transfers it to an English vessel, and sends it to Italy, duty free, as Canadian fish. The French fishermen are thus enabled through our bonding system to avoid the special Italian tariff against their products, as well as to earn the bounty of ten francs per quintal payable upon fish delivered on this continent. This is a manifest case where the privilege of bond works a direct injury to Canadian interests. Not only does the French fishermen receive a bounty of \$2 per quintal for the fish he takes in Canadian waters. but he is enabled under cover of the British flag to evade payment of the specific duty levied by Italy especially to offset the effects of that bounty.

Naturally the American fisherman points to this unjust use of the bonding system and argues that if the Frenchman,

in whose market we have no inducement to sell and who contributes nothing to the wealth of this country, be permitted to tranship his fish in bond in order to undercut Canadian fish in Italian ports, why should he, in whose markets we find our principal customers, be refused the courtesies of our ports? The answer is simply that two blacks do not make a white Because the French are enabled under existing treaties to rob our fishermen it is no reason why a similar opportunity should be granted to the Americans. No doubt at the time of the signing of the treaty of 1818 transhipment in bond was unknown, and was therefore never discussed, but we must not forget that the American fishermen deliberately elected to return to hat treaty, and that they cancelled the Washington treaty with their eyes open. They asserted officially that the privileges granted to them under that instrument were of no value, and, therefore, to ask us to return them, argues that either they committed a serious blunder, or that they hoped to coerce Canada into again granting them while withholding the inducements previously given in consideration.

So far as the French fishermen are concerned the remedy lies in our own hands. The Dominion has the power to enforce a protective tariff against all nations, and, therefore, could easily impose a duty upon French fish that would render their transhipment no longer profitable. A duty of a dollar and a half per quintal, as suggested by Mr. C. E Kaulback, would not only go far to check their masquerading as Canadian products, but would offset the present bounty of \$2 per quintal which militates so heavily against our fishermen in Mediterranean ports. Its imposition would remove the claim of unfair discrimination against American fishermen and would show our neighbors that we treated all our competitors alike, since at present the enjoyment of this privilege by the French forms a grievance upon which American political orators can safely enlarge, while it is a distinct injustice to our own people. Under these circumstances it might be well if, at the next session of Parliament the members for Maritime constituences would urge the incorporation of a specific duty for this purpose in the tariff, and thus abrogate a practice which is not only lowering the character of Canadian fish abroad but is enabling foreign fishermen to undersell our own.

THE DUTY ON LOGS.

Those Michigan lumbermen who are interested in the importation of Canadian saw logs into the United States for purposes of manufacture there, are naturally highly indignant at the increase of the

Canadian export duty from \$2 to \$3. But when they claim that this rise in the duty is an act of bad faith upon the part of the government or people of the Dominion they state what they must well know is not the fact. No breach of faith or violation of agreement is involved whatever; and, although, their organs in Michigan may put forward the claim that they have been outwitted and clamor for retaliation by the United States, they are perfectly well aware that they have no real grounds for such a statement, and that it is simply made for the purpose of concealing their disappointment.

The average American speculator, whether in lumber or any other product of this country, is far too keen a man of business not to thoroughly acquaint himself with the circumstances under which he invests his money before he pays out as much as a dollar. In this instance the uncertainty as to the future limit of the duty was a matter of public notoriety: was familiar to every man in the trade: and was undoubtedly taken into consideration when making the bargain. To suppose otherwise would be simply to infer that these shrewd keen buyers were gifted with less than the ordinary amount of common-sense. Every dealer in timber limits knew that parliament had authorized a further advance in the export duty upon saw-logs and that they had vested the Cabinet with power to proclaim this increase if they found that the lower rate of duty failed to check the depletion of our forests by American lumbermen. To pretend then that when they bought the limits they never enquired into this fact is manifestly opposed to the experience of most business men. It is usual for the purchaser to closely investigate the conditions and circumstances under which the sale is made, and to suppose that the Michigan lumbermen neglected to take this precaution is certainly not borne out by the usual practice of Americans when making large investments on this side of the trontier.

Not only this; the Michigan mill-men knew very well when they bought either from the Provincial Government or from private individuals, that the sellers had no control over the export duty which was then in existence, and that its continuance, reduction, or augmentation rested solely with the Dominion authorities, who alone have jurisdiction in such matters. and doubtless weighed that fact thoroughly before they closed the bargain. Every element of uncertainty then present had its full effect upon the price paid, and. loud as is their indignation at the present moment, we have little doubt that the advance in the duty was well discounted before the deeds changed hands. To charge then the Canadian people will deliberately violating a solemn bargain is manifestly not only absurd, but absolutely unwarranted by the true facts of the case.

The sole object in imposing a duty upon saw-logs is to ensure their manufacture in this country. No Canadian wishes to see our national forests cut down and towed across the frontier to be manufactured in the United States. As Canada furnishes the raw material it is only fair that the wages paid and capital expended in its manufacture into the finished product shall inure to the profit of her own sons. Since a duty of \$2 did not suffice to compel the Americans to invest their money in Canadian mills, an advance of 50 per cent has been enforced, simply with the patriotic intention of giving the advantage accruing from the manufacture of the timber to the land that produced it. This is only fair—as even the Americans must allow-and although this policy may interfere with the profits of some of the syndicates who are now engaged in de-, nuding Canadian forests to build up American mills, it will meet with the approval of every true Canadian. If American lumbermen are compelled to seek their raw material in Canada we stand ready to sell it to them; but they must either manufacture it within our limits, or pay a sufficient compensation to the Government for the loss of wealth we experience by its being manufactured in a foreign country. ____

THE LIVE STOCK TRADE.

Luckily for shippers of Canadian cattle, the English markets have not been so unsatisfactory this year as last. Prices were sustained much more steadily and steep shrinkages and fluctuations were not so frequent as in some former seasons.

Last year everything seemed to work wrongly, but although we have had to report heavy losses this year also, there have been profits to make up for them. As we write, there is a much better feeling than at this date a year ago, and all the available cattle space at Portland, Boston and New York has been taken at full prices for the next two months. Nearly as many cattle were marketed as a year ago, but they did not come forward in as good a condition as a rule. The reason given for this is that the grass was a failure to a great extent almost all through the western district. In spite of the large importations of thorough-bred stock, cattlemen do not profess to see much improvement in the ordinary beeves offered for sale. The new market opened by the shipment of store cattle to Aberdeen is favorably spoken of, and great developments are hoped for in this direction. It is certain that Canadians, especially in this Province, know how to raise theusands of lean cattle, and it is equally certain that no people have made the fattening of

live stock such a study and such a success as the stockmen of Great Britain.

We are told that this branch of the trade has paid our shippers well, and that the receivers in Aberdeen think highly of Canadian store-cattle. One lot of lean ranche cattle was taken from Glasgow by stockers, but, as a rule, the prairie steers are awkward to handle, being much too wild. It is thought that improved breeding, now largely in vogue in the far West, will bring about better results in this direction. With regard to the general market, the regular movement of cattle to the other side, and an avoidance of spasmodic effort has, no doubt, had much to do with results. A big glut in the hot spell last year brought disaster, and luckily no such slaughter prices have been seen this season. The cattle trade of the port is fortunately working into a better system of management, and the railway companies seem inclined to do their share and help things along.

The trade in the ranche cattle of the Canadian North-West has again been an important feature. With the exception of two or three notably fine lots, the quality was only middling, and too often decidedly inferior. Some were not at all suitable for the old country trade, and the prices realized for the poorer sorts prove this. This should not discourage shippers, but teach them a lesson for the future. So far as the dark color of the beef is concerned. that is a temporary prejudice which will wear away, and which will be partially, if not wholly cured by careful breeding. Some of the cattle were killed in Montreal, but although the flesh was a little darker than what may be termed eastern stock, good judges say that so far as the flavor was concerned there was no cause whatever for complaint. It is stated that some consignments will be received here from the Winnipeg district about Christmas time for the holiday markets. The ranchemen were saved a good deal of trouble this year by a Montreal syndicate which stepped in and bought up about two-thirds of the season's North-West exports As previously stated, a proportion were wild and scraggy, but some choice lots showed good breeding, and were ahead of the best Ontario stock. Estimates vary as to what the North-West will be able to spare next year, but the shipments this year to Montreal were about 5,000 head, as against 1300 or 1,400 last year. In the States, the prairie pastures are about eaten out by the vast herds there, and the Americans would be only too glad to invade Canada with their stock. A local drover said that if restrictions were removed, 100,000 American cattle would be driven across the lines within a month. Of course. England would then impose the same strict preventative of disease rules against

Canada as she does against the United States. and our present advantages in British markets would be lost.

The total shipments of Canadian cattle from Montreal for the season of navigation have been as follows:—

Ocean freights have been higher at the close of the season than for some years past, as the ships were crowded with other freight. Rail rates were the same as last year. Not much is heard at present about the insurance combine on the part of the steamship agents. Dealers are still of opinion that it would be far more satisfactory to the trade if insurance was optional, like it was before, and not mixed up with freight rates

The export traffic in sheep has kept up very well as the figures above indicate. but we are told that quite a number of farmers have given up sheep raising, as they find it does not pay so well as some other branches of farm work. Returns to old country shippers were satisfactory with the exception of a few markets in September and October. New Zealand continues to be a competitor with her frozen mutton, but it is not so good as fresh killed, selling 2d. @ 3d. per lb. less. Two ships recently arrived in England with 150,000 carcasses, which were, as usual, stored ashore in refrigerators built expressly for the trade.

It is stated that few cattle ships are going to Portland this winter. We also hear that there are not many cattle to go forward, as the best have been shipped, if we except a few lots retained for the holiday markets.

ARMED EUROPE.

The generally received statement that no State can support one-hundredth portion of its population in arms and idleness without ultimate exhaustion, appears to be stultified in modern days. Lord Salisbury, who, as Premier of Great Britain, has exceptional opportunities for obtaining absolute facts upon this difficult subject, asserts that at the present moment the five great continental powers, France, Germany, Russia, Austria and Italy, have under arms some twelve millions of men absolutely withdrawn from their usual avocations and, until the moment arises to call them into action, mere useless drones living upon the taxes wrung from their fellows.

If this statement be correct—and coming from the quarter it does it would be foolish to discredit it—the question arises, how long can these countries afford to support such a large proportion of their virile population in absolute idleness without a

national bankruptcy resulting, or without involving such an increase of taxation as must lead to revolt on the part of the oppressed civilian? It must be remembered that these twelve million soldiers are all men in the prime of life; and that, but for their present enforced idleness, they would all be wage-earners or producers. They represent the best and healthiest of the earning classes of their respective countries, and yet, so great is the existing tension, that they are perforce withdrawn from the farm, the workshop, and the counting-house, where they would add by their skill and labor to the wealth of the country they belong to, and forced to become a burden upon those whose physical infirmities or age debar them from service in the ranks. It is evident that such a condition of affairs as this cannot last. Twelve millons of the absolute bone and sinew of Europe cannot be withdrawn for long from the arena of labor without producing a financial crisis. Either these men must be allowed to return to their ordinary avocations, or they must be used in war, since it is evident that the power to maintain the existing position of affairs by floating new loans and increasing the burden of taxation has its limits, and that these limits are nearly reached. Financiers are commencing to look askance on these new warloans, and every method by which money can be wrung from the resident population is very nearly exhausted. Shortly the armed nations will be comvelled by financial pressure, either to force a war in the hopes that they may be victorious and that an accession of territory, or a war indemnity from the vanquished, may recoup them for their outlay, or else to disband the major portion of their soldiery in order that they may once more become self-supporting workers instead of mere useless burdens upon the community.

Europe is now becoming absolutely an armed camp. Every budget shows an enormous increase in expenditure, andowing to the withdrawal of two-thirds of the mass of the working population for service in the field-a steady decrease in revenue. In the meantime, the officer caste, whose sole hope of advancement lies in a fortunate war, are daily increasing in influence and numbers. With twelve millions of men under arms; with every one of the five Governments rapidly nearing the end of its borrowing powers; with the taxpaying community daily growing smaller as the tax-consuming soldiery are augmented from the ranks of the workers; and, lastly, with this vast body of idle men weary of the monotony; of drill and anxious to show their mettle in active service; .who can venture to hope for peace?

Either war or forcible disarmament must come. No one of the five nations can stand the existing strain much longer, and whether war come from some overt act or from a rejected demand to disarm, there seems to be little hope that it can long be averted. At present each one of the five countries fears to make the initial step that will precipitate the general conflagration, while all are equally aware that the slightest withdrawal from their present attitude of armed expectation would simply lay them open to attack. How long they can afford to maintain their present overgrown armaments remains yet to be seen; but indications are not wanting that the limit of financial endurance will soon be reached. When once the poorest nation comes to the bottom of its purse and to the limit of its credit the present position of passive readiness will be changed for one of enforced aggression, and so far as we can judge by the course of the financial markets there seems to be little doubt that this period is approaching rapidly.

WINTER STYLES.

The heavy storm of snow and sleet which broke over this city on Monday effectually stopped the retail dry goods and millinery business. The car traffic was utterly demoralized; sleighs could with difficulty get about the streets; and when it finally culminated in a downpour of rain, that continued until Thursday night, the streets were left in such a condition as to practically confine ladies to their houses. At this period of the year the loss of four days trade is a serious affair. It is now only a short time to the Christmas holidays and, consequently, very little scope is allowed for making up for the wasted days' trade. For the last month every week has contained one or more days when business was practically suspended by the weather, and as a consequence the sale of holiday goods has been checked and merchants are commencing to look anxiously at their crowded shelves.

Not that there is any less money to spend this year than there was last; for the experience of those who cater to the middle and lower class trades is that more money is going than for some time past; but simply because owing to unfavorable and unseasonable weather, intending purchasers have postponed buying until so late that they may possibly keep their money in their pockets alto-Especially have the wretched gether. days told heavily upon the smaller shopkeepers. Some of these small stores do not take in a dollar on a day like last Monday, and as they have rarely much financial backing, and as expenses for

rent, fuel and wages go on with remorseless regularity, a number of them have run so far behind in their payments that their solvency is a matter of anxiety to their suppliers.

Winter fashions are now well defined, and it is evident that the polonaise will be the prevailing style in making up the rich beavy fabrics which are now in vogue. For brocade, velvet, or plush, it is really the only style possible to give a good effect, and, consequently, polonaise and redingote effects will be the ones principally used for heavy handsome For party and evening wear goods. white toilets will be more worn than ever. and manufacturers have catered for this fashion by placing white dress fabrics on the market in endless variety. All are equally in style, whether brocade, velvet either plain or striped, watered silk, bengaline, Ottoman silk, faille, Irish póplin, velvet, embessed satin, India cashmere, Henrietta cloth, tailor cloths. veilings, China crepe-lisse, fulle or goldembroidered white India silk muslins. Next to white and the ever-present black. Russian blue, a superb dark shade, greatly favored by the Princess of Wales, is one of the very popular colors of the season. The universal becomingness of this particular tone in blue renders it an exceptional favorite with women either of fair or clear olive complexion. It does not fade in silk or all-wool fabrics, and it is agreeably relieved in gold, certain shades of red, ecru, tan and silver. This color appears in fabrics of broadcloth, faille, cashmere. camel's hair, vigogne, velvet, tricot, fancy silk and velvet combinations, woollen armure and English serge, and can thus be brought within the range of any desired costume.

In the latest novelties in millinery sent out from London we find velvet hats trimmed with a fur boa, which first encircles the crown, than falls, leaving a long end at the back to be passed around the neck as a boa. One model shows a directoire hat, protruding in front and short at the back. It is made of Romanred velvet trimmed with loops of black moire ribbon and a fur boa of Russian lynx fur. Long, full, ostrich feathers are to be in great use. Upon toques and turbans two plumes are fastened at the back. the ends crossing in front and drooping over the waves of hair. Plumes, tips and feather bands, soft and flexible, will be in greater vogue than stiff plumage, birds or wings and heads. In bonnets, the Carmosine canote has taken very well. It is of brown velvet, lined with bright red. The low crown is stretched plain; the sides are pulled. The border, rising high over the forehead, is fluted, showing the red lining. It is trimmed on the top with an aigrette of fancy feathers and a bow of

brown faille. The Letitia is another capote that has sold well. It has a high, peaked border, while the small, close crown fits the head at the back like a cap. A pretty model is of steel-gray epingle velvet, trimmed inside the border with a large pinked-out ruche of pale rose-colored silk. Three heron's feathers are fastened upon the crown with a steel brooch. There are also a great many capotes of black velvet and lace, with no ornament beyond a small aigrette of feathers, fastened with a jet or metal brooch.

Hats in fine soft black felt will be very much worn. They are all low-crowned, and the whole of the ingenuity of the maker has been concentrated on the brim. A stylish-looking hat is the black felt Nathalie, which has a broad brim slanting up all round from the head. Its only trimming is a superb black of trich feather, fastoned inside the brim in the middle of the back, rising above it, and drooping over the crown. The Amazon'is a shape which comes in gray felt with a broad flat border. A long gray ostrich feather is laid over this brim, and goes completely round it. An aigrette bow of gray velvet completes the trimming in front. This is one of the most becoming hats of the season. For a young lady the Hilda hat is very graceful. Its brim slants down on the right side, but turns up jauntily on the left, leaving the hair uncovered. This hat is made of black 'or dark-colored felt, with no trimming but a large aigrettebow of shot surah.

BANK CIRCULATION.

It is evident that the Americans themselves are not so satisfied with their present system of banking as those of our citizens who are urging the adoption of the American system would have us believe. The Commercial Bulletin of New York, one of our most valued and reliable exchanges, in pointing out the many defects in the existing system of guaranteeing the circulation, goes on to say:—

The burdensome requirements of the National Banking laws call for the immediate attention of Congress. Unless these illogical restrictions are relaxed in at least one respect the formation of new national banks, already seriously checked, cannot long continue, and many of the established banks must surrender their charters and return to the State system, as the Bowery National Bank of this city has just done. The compulsory deposit of Government bonds has become a burden which the banks cannot bear. This requirement is the relic of financial conditions which have long since passed away and is incapable of logical defence in the light of present knowledge. There has, perhaps, never been a time in our history when conditions were so favorable to the organization of new banks throughout the regions springing into industrial activity, or when the expansion of banking capital was so essential to the progress and welfare of the country. And yet it is at this time, when every day should be adding a new bank

to the national system, that arbitrary and unreasonable laws interpose a fatal obstacle and check the development of banking when its growth is most needed and when the necessity is most generally recognized The national bank note circulation must be revived, freed from burdensome restrictions, and expanded to meet the commercial requirements of the country and the demands of varying conditions and increasing business, If this is not done a new system of note circulation under federal anspices must be devised, or, if this too is neglected or inadequately provided, the prohibition upon state bank issues must be repealed. Or e of these lines of action must soon be adopted. The necessity for an adequate note circulation cannot long be ignored, and if the national bank issues based upon Government bonds are to disappear, the Government must authorize a 'new form of currency based upon state, railroad or municipal securities, or upon the credit and negotiable paper of national banks.

As this last suggestion is precisely the method now in use in Canada, it is evident that the Americans look upon our system of circulation as as great an improvement over their own as some of our Canadian would-be financiers would have us believe the National Bank system is over ours. If American financiers prefer our existing system to their own, it would obviously be ridiculous for us to abandon a policy which has proved itself eminently adapted to the needs of the country to adopt one which has already proved a failure in a far wealthier country than Canada. A system of circulation which experience has shown to be too rigid and inelastic for the United States would be utterly unsuited to this country, and, therefore, those who have previously advocated a change to the American plan would do well to peruse carefully this concise statement of its defects given in the leading commercial paper of New York.

THE APPLE TRADE.

As pointed out in our last issue the apple shipments from Montreal this year besides being the largest on record are ahead of the exports of any one port on the American continent, New York being some little dis-Unfortunately the French tance behind. steamer had to put into Halifax and thousands of barrels intended for her were frosted on the wharf. Then the Pomeranian had to depart suddenly for fear of being caught in the ice and 4,000 barrels of her cargo were left behind. It is a pity that such a large proportion of the fruit is crowded here for the last boats and the worst policy of all is the shipping of some quantity from the interior in open cars. The losses from frosted fruit this fail will be very heavy. The final shipments from the St. Lawrence were as follows: Oregon to Liverpool, 9,531 brls; Circassian to Liverpool, 11,422; Assyrian to London, 11,-500 : Pomeranian to London, (estimated) 6,-000; Dominion to Bristol, 1,975; A late cable to Mr. Geo. Those who are under the impression that the imposition of a protective tariff checks the importation of goods into the country, need only weigh the following figures given in answer to a correspondent by the editor of Commercial Bulletin of New York. They show the gold value of the net imports of merchandise into the United States, at decennial periods beginning with 1860 and ending with 1887, compared with the population of the country at each of the years cited:

It will be remembered that in 1860 the United States had a low revenue tariff; and the imports of foreign merchandise averaged \$10.70 per head of the population. In 1870 they were under one of the highest tariffs that has ever existed in any country; but there was no consequent exclusion of foreign products, the imports for that year being \$10.88 per head. In 1880, the tariff remained with little change; and the imports rose to \$13.08 per head,-an increase of 20 per cent; that, however, was a time of some commercial inflation, due to the resumption of specie payments; but the facts show that the tariff did not enable home manufacturers to absorb the whole benefit of that great impulse to trade for their own advantage. In 1887, a year of fairly prosperous business and freedom from commercial expansion, the imports reached the rate of \$11,20 per head. The evidence of fact therefore is that, after a quarter of a century's full and fair trial of the highest duties known in the history of civilized nations, the consumption of foreign products in the United States so far from being curtailed by the operation of that policy, is five per cent greater for each inhabitant of the country than it was under the preceding low revenue tariff. Our readers can draw their own conclusions from this plain . statement of actual fact.

THE New York Commercial Bulletin sums up the mackerel fishing season as follows:—

The season for the catch of mackerel upon our shores has about closed, and according to the advices from the East the total quantity taken by the New England fleet to date is 39,479 barrels, against 78,478 bbls in 1887, 89,232 bbls in 1886, 330,033 bbls in 1885 and 420,000 bbls in 1884. These figures certainly show a decadence of the industry upon the North American shores; but whether this loss is to be permanent in character is a question which only the future can solve. Mackerel during the past several years have gradually come to be regarded as a luxury, as only consumers in good circumstances are now enabled to meet the fancy prices that a scarcity has created, whereas formerly they were within the reach of all, regardless of condition in life. The habits of the fish have changed.

Fishermen during the past several seasons have reported that they have been forced to pursue their labors at an increasing distance off shore, and even with the greater risk and trouble incurred have secured very unsatisfactory returns. While the catch of this country has shown a steady falling off, that on the coast of Great Britain and Ireland has increased, thus proving to the satisfaction of the trade that the fish have discovered new feeding grounds, and that there is a strong probability that the future supply will be dependent largely upon importations from for-Some venture the belief that eign countries. the question of fishing between Canada and the United States has been carried to such an extent of late that the fish have decided to settle the matter themselves by leaving the territory where they have proved such a source of trouble to the two countries. If so it is a display of intelligence never before credited to members of the finny tribe. Under date of 13th ult, advices report season's catch to September 30 on the shores of the British Isles as 409,130 cwt, or say 2,000 bbls; a quantity which, it is true, is small, but it should be borne in mind that the natives on the other side are not provided with facilities equal to our own for the catching; but should the fish increase annually they will undoubtedly endeavor to enter into the industry with greater spirit, especially as good returns are known to await them. The imports of mackerel into New York from the Provinces from January 1 to date are as follows: 1888, 28,744 bbls; 1887, 48,165 bbls; 1886. 47,708 bbls, and 1885, 37,408 bbls.

THOMAS MENZIES, of Peterboro, Ont., for many years a dealer in books, stationery, &c., has been in difficulties for a month or more, and on the 28th November called a meeting of his creditors, at which he made an offer of 221 cents in the dollar, which was not accepted. For many years past, he has added to his regular business the role of private banker, and the throng of creditors who responded to the call was largely made up of depositors in his bank; some of them having put in money within about a month past. He issued deposit books in which the amounts were entered, but, strange to say, when asked at the meeting, he said that he kept no proper cash-book or other books as to this branch of his business. The number of people who were tempted by his offer of 6 p.c. on their money may be imagined when it is stated that \$11,000 of claims were those of such depositors, some of them ranging as high as \$1,000 each Liabilities unsecured, \$18,000; stock and book debts, \$14,500. Secured claims-mortgages on real estate. \$14,500; on property, estimated at about \$18,000. The largest creditor is C. M. Taylor, wholesale books, &c., \$4,200. The meeting seemed unable to come to a conclusion, and Mr. Menzies evidently did not want to make an assign-

THE Buffalo Express says it may be only a few years before the United States will be compelled by the force of circumstances to seek for new customers in the markets of the world. For wheat, cotton, and meat England is now their best customer. It has already

been shown that for the English trade in wheat India, Russia and Canada are competitors, while in cotton Egypt is beginning to be a formidable rival. The Argentine Republic is now coming to the front as a great meatproducing country. It has a favorable climate, immense territory, and unrivalled water-ways. In 1885 the Argentine Republic had 100,-000,000 sheep and 88,000,000 cattle, and it was stated that only a beginning had been made in the way of stocking the country. The River Plate Frozen Mest Company ships weekly, 7,000 carcasses of beef, refrigerated, to Europe. As soon as the new harbor works at Puenos Ayres are completed, so that vessels can load directly at the meat factories, the cost of handling and freight will be so reduced that we may expect to see most of the cheap meat sold in European cities furnished by South America

THE Detroit Tunnel Company has been incorporated at Detroit, Mich., for a term of 999 years. The capital stock is \$1,500,000 or more than half the cost of the proposed tunnel under the Detroit river. Luther Beecher, the well-known Detroit capitalist, takes substantially all the stock. The tunnel approaches are projected to be built on land largely owned by Mr. Beecher, running back from the river a sufficient distance to secure the entrance under the river bed at the necessary depth. It is proposed to construct to the middle of the river, the national boundary line. The other half of it is to be completed by a similar company to be organized under the Canadian laws. Tracks will run from the tunnel to the northern end of Detroit, and there connect with every railroad entering that city. For thts purpose over one mile of the right of way for these tracks has already been secured The company will lease its track and tunnel privileges to the railroad companies, which take a great interest in the proposed enterprise and will give it every encouragement possible.

THE appeal in the case of Brossard versus the Canada Life Insurance Company has been decided in favor of the Company, Justice Cross remarking that the verdict of the jury in the Court below (which was also in favor of the Canada Life) was a good one and should stand. The action in this case was for the amount of insurance on the life of one Bourdeau, deceased. The claim was resisted on the ground that there had been wilful concealment and misrepresentation as to material facts touching the state of health of deceased; an allegation that was so thoroughly borne out by the facts that an ordinary jury at once decided in favor of the corporation. The managers of the Canada Life so seldom contest a case that, when they do, it is always because they have excellent grounds for their action; a fact that the two verdicts in the present case prove conclusively.

Canadians who fancy our neighbors across the border are anxious to annex us will do well to read the following extract from the N, Y. Journal of Commerce. "Desirable as the annexation of Canada might be for any reasons, the acquisition would cost us at least the amount of her large debt. Public sentiment in all those States which would not derive immediate advantage from the annexation would oppose the shouldering of this new burden. Sectional and political fears and jealousies would surely operate toward the defeat of any such scheme. It might be said with truth that this country already has more land of its own than it can hope to populate and improve in the next twenty-five years. The sparsely settled condition of such fertile territories as Dakota shows how much remains to be done for the development of the present magnificent domain of the Union."

WE learn from our correspondent that Kingston, Ont., was yesterday to have voted on the question of granting bonuses of \$150,000 to the proposed Kingston & Smith's Falls Railway, and \$75,000 to the proposed line connecting the Kingston & Pembroke and Napanee & Tamworth Railways. Large meetings have been convened on the subject during the past two weeks, and the eneral impression is that the bonuses will be granted .- Messrs. R. & J. Gardiner, retail drygoods, of Kingston, are retiring from business intending to re-open in the wholesale trade if these railway by-laws are carried. The new waterworks system is being rapidly pushed. and will furnish a water service to compare favorably with that of any city on the continent. It is expected that the local Board of Underwriters will promote Kingston to class

The increase on 50 per cent in the export duty on pine logs has stirred up Michigan lumbermen who are interested in Canadian timber, and it is proposed to get even with Canada by agitating the passage or a bill doubling the import duty on Canadian lumber, which is now \$2 per 1,000 feet. As Canadian logs thus far have been exported in limited quantities, while over 600,000,000 feet of lumber is exported annually, it will be seen that the doubling of the import duty on lumber would prove disastrous to the Canadian lumber industry, as it would completely shut them out of the American market. Lumbermen interested in obtaining logs from Georgian Bay will use every effort to secure legislation from Congress doubling the import duty on lumber.

It is creditably reported in this city that Mr. Geo. A. Drummond has been called to the Senate, in place of the late Hon Jas. Ferrier, and if this proves correct the choice of the Government has been a fortunate one. No one of our merchants could represent more authoritatively the mercantile interests of

this city than Mr. Drummond. A successful merchant himself, and largely interested in the industrial development of the country, occupying the responsible position of president of the Montreal Board of Trade, and vice-president of the Bank of Montreal, Mr. Drummond has qualifications which would single him out as a representative business man, and, therefore, as the man best qualified to forward commercial interests.

Hap the roply of Lord Sackville to the celebrated Pomona letter been as cautious as that of Sir Charles Tupper we should have been spared a very disagreeable incident. Sir Charles wrote:—

I esteem it a high compliment that your letter should have been addressed to me. My official position, as the representative of Canada in Great Britain, makes it quite impossible, however, for me to offer any opinion on the question you raise, as I am sure, on reflection, you will immediately comprehend. As you will be aware, the hope is uppermost in everybody's mind that the matters in dispute between the two countries may soon be disposed of in a manner satisfactory to both, and your knowledge of public opinion in Canada will show you that Canadians are most desirous that their relations with the United States should be of the most cordial and friendly character.

WINNIPRO grain dealers claim that the CP.R. are giving rates over their Soo route that discriminate heavily against them. This rate has operated so favorably or Americans that they have been able to cut the local firms out of the trade of furnishing flour for Indians and other inhabitants of the Nipussing and Muskoka regions. The duty on flour is 50 cents a barrel, and as there are only five bushels of wheat to the barrel, it only amounts to 10c. a bushel difference. The wheat rate given over the "Soo" line is 25 cents a hundred, while it is almost double that amount from Manitoba to Eastern Canada, thus the American millers have had matters all their own way,

A CALCUTTA correspondent of the London Times, under date of Nov. 4 writes as follows: "Extensive preparations are being made to meet the threatened famine. In Guzerat, Kantleish, Kattywar and Nassik the crops are withering, and in Punjab, the Central Provinces, Rajpootana and Hyderabad they are suffering from drought. Great scarcity, bordering on famine, prevails in Orissa, while the Ganjam district appears to be quite disorganized. Robberies of grain on a most extensive scale have been perpetrated—to the value of 10,000 rs.—and 72 arrests have been made. A public meeting has been held at Aska, and resolutions were passed to memorialize the Government for the opening of relief works and for military protection." This should help the wheat market in Great Britain.

A MEETING of the Underwriters' Association of this city was held at their rooms on the 28th ulto, to discuss the feasibility of reducing the existing rates in the business section.

All the companies were represented. After a

lengthy discussion, lasting upwards of two hours, it was unanimously decided that considering their requirements had not been complied with by the city, the rates should not be reduced, and a letter embodying this decision was ordered to be sent to the Council. This decision will be regretted by those who have the best interests of both parties at heart.

Owing to the retirement of Mr. Thomson, manager of the Bank of Commerce at Belleville, from active service after a long and honorable career in the bank, a number of changes in the staff have been rendered necessary. Mr. C. M. Stork, the present manager at Windsor will in future manage the Belleville branch, while Mr. H. B. Walker, accountant at London, becomes manager at Windsor. We are glad to learn that Mr. Thomson will continue to give the bank the benefit of his intimate knowledge of business at Belleville in the capacity of local director of the bank.

A MEETING of booksellers, publishers and paper-makers is to be held at the office of the Canada Paper Company, to-day, to discuss the proposed Copyright Act. It is expected that Messrs. Robertson and Lancefield, of Toronto, will be present to give information in regard to the opinion and intention of the Toronto publishers in the same matter. The settlement of this question is of vital importance to the booksellers and publishers, as well as the paper trade of Canada, and much interest will be taken in the discussion here.

Quits a number of small creditors are enquiring for the whereabouts of G. Milner, of McGill street, who did business as a fruit dealer for some time past. He was indebted to a firm of wholesale fruit dealers, who took a judgment against him, and selzed last night. Among other creditors is the landlady, to whom he owed \$110. He had taken from her the premises overhead on a ten years' lease and gave out that he would start a boarding house. The only trace he left of where he has gone is a railway guide.

The Guelph, Ont., Carriage-Top Co.'s assign e has declared a third dividend of 12 cents on the dollar, and the estate will probably pay a further dividend of 3 cents. The deficit is about \$40,000.

ONTARIO NOTES.

Large quantities of scrap iron have been purchased in Deseronto during the past week and have been shipped by train to Toronto.—

A Belleville paper states that it is doubtful if the Murray canal will be open for navigation next spring. There is yet about a quarter of a mile of solid rock to be penetiated by the excavators. The rock is almost as hard as granite and workmen will be busy quarrying all winter.—Not much of barley has yet been drawn into market. Prices fell during the past week to 65 or 67 cents. Many think

there will be no advance again this season, but others are of the opinion that now that the presidential election is over, there will be a brighter outlook for the farmer -Bath wants a tinsmith to locate in that burgh.-New buildings are going up rapidly in Newburgh.-Picton bakers have advanced bread to 13 cts. a loaf.—There is a great apple barrel famine in Prince Edward this year.—About 100 cases of canned goods will be shipped from Picton this year.—Adam Henry has purchased the Maybee homestead in Sidney for \$8,000.— Manley Austin, of Sidney, has cold out and will go to Wisconsin. He sold his farm to Albert Dench for \$5,240.—There is some talk of again starting glass-works in Napanee. Let us bope that the new scheme will be successful.—It is said that Welsh Bros.; shingle mill men at Coehill, have levanted leaving several creditors to mourn their departure.-The price of coal is advancing, and it is expected there will be quite a rise before long.—The Cedar Mill, Desoronto, has stopped running by night for a time at least. It has had a busy time this season, the output being a large one.—The government building at Trenton is progressing rapidly.—One dealer recently shipped five tons of fish from Belleville.-All the excitement about the Richardson gold mine near Madoc bas flattened out.-There is great dissatisfaction in the north with the management of the Central Ontario railway, the services being unsatisfactory.-The fire insurance agents of Ontario have formed an association with Mr. F. M. Clarke, of Belleville, president.

To-day being Thanksgiving Day in the the United States, we are without our usual telegrams. Money in London yesterday was cabled at 3½ per cent, with the bank rate unchanged at 5 per cent. In our local market we have no change to chronicle, and so long as the banks continue to struggle for

business, we shall witness no hardening in values. Commercial money continues to average at 6 per cent, at which figure the great bulk of the paper is done, but a tew favored firms can get it at five, and the more doubtful ones must pay seven or even eight for their discount. Call loans continue to rule at 31/64 per cent; and abundance of funds are offering at these rates. Remittances show a marked falling off. Trade, owing to the continuous mild wet weather and the wretched condition of the streets and roads has been almost at a standstill, and as a consequence payments have been poor, and applications for "more time" have been unpleasantly frequent.—Sterling exchange has fallen a sixteenth during the week, and we now quote sixties at 9/0 h between banks and 9 3-16@5-16 over the counter. Domand 9304 and 9 15-160104. Cables 10101 New York funds are 1-16 discount to par between banks, and at 1/21 premium over the counter. The New York sterling market is closed for Thanksgiving Day. - Business on the local stock exchange has been miserably dull and quiet all through the week. A small scalping business has been going on, but any pressure to sell at once reduces prices, and the fact that values have been fairly maintained is due simply to the lack of trade. Nearly all the speculative fraternity. are on the "long" side, and hence are interested in keeping up prices, but the impression seems general that after the settlement next Monday there will be a general drop in stocks. The Quebec syndicate are evidently tired of holding the market up, and it is manifest that the general public will have nothing to do with stocks at present values. There are very little grounds for any feeling of confidence, as trade during the past week has been much below the average, and the retail drygoods merchants in particular are complaining bitterly. The decision of the insurance company, who are said to be contemplating realizing upon their holdings, is awaited with some anxiety; as should anything happen to break the market now, it is feared the drop will be a serious one:

MONTREAL, Thursday Evg., Nov. 29, 1888.

In most branches, trade has been flat. This is partly due to broken weather and slushy roads but a lull is always looked for immediately after the close of navigation. So soon as the winter really sets in trade must certainly improve as all supplies in the country are small. The reported light crops in the early fall caused storekeepers to purchase sparingly and since then the continual rains have kept the roads so bad that business has practically been impossible any distance away from the railways. Good sleigh roads will without doubt set trade on the move. It has been stated that although the crops, in some parts of Ontario have been poor they are better on the whole than last vear and that the enhanced prices of grain and other produce will give the Ontario people eight to nine million of dollars, more to spend than in

CHEMICALS, ETC.—Heavy chemicals are steady and tending upwards. Actual orders are few; in fact there is a lull in the trade as interior buyers filled their requirements before navigation closed so as to get low freights. Blue vitriol is decidedly firmer. All lines of navel stores are firm. Spirits of turpentine is held slightly higher. Linseed oil is unchanged at 55c for raw and 58c for bolled. Paints and glass met with a fair call this fall but are now dull.

DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS .- The market for cheese has maintained the firm and healthy position noted iast week Orders have come forward at good prices and the wind up of the season will be as satisfactory as any part of it. It is stated that some former 'bears' have been large buyers. Considerable business has been done West, The late make in England has been poor, and it looks as if all our make left will be wanted at paying prices. The cable came 1s higher at 56s. At Ingersoll, 9,675 boxes September and balance of season were hoarded. The sales at the board were 2,735 boxes at 111c, but some factories were placed during the week, and the trade was reported brisk. At the close 111c was paid for good-sized lots; in fact, sales of about 2,000 boxes have been made at that figure. Earlier makes also have advanced, and 11c was paid for finest August. The cable has again advanced another 1s to 57s; in fact the whole situation on both sides of the Atlantic has a strong tone. In butter we have little to add to former reports. Finest is in light supply, and good demand at full prices. Local provisions met with a fair call. Pork sold well in small lots, and prices were steady. Demand for lard moderate. Dressed hogs quiet, because of the mild weather; jobbing lots, \$7.50@\$7.75; car lots, \$7 25@\$7.35. Eggs sold at 20c for fresh in cases and 181c&19c for limed. Poultry fairly active. Turkeys, 8c@90; chickens and geese, 5c@7c; ducks, 8c@9c; partridge, 60c@65c per brace. Venison scarce at 12c.

DRY-Goods .- There is no change of importance to report in this market. The wholesale houses are now taking stock, and the city trade has been temporarily killed by the wretched weather. The first three days of this week were so miserably wet and sloppy that hardly any trade was done by the retailers, and fears are now expressed that the holiday trade will not come up to previous expectation. As a consequence, the retailers are not buying and repeat orders are few and far between. Travellers are doing a fair average with spring goods, but the sorting orders are few and unsatisfactory, and stocks are consequently larger than the trade care to admit in spite of the cautious buying of thetr representatives. Remittances have again fallen off and are below expectations, and altogether the outlook is not to favorable as it was a week ago, although prices continue fairly firm. The advance in spool cottons is commented on in another portion of these columns.

Fish and Oils.—The last steamer with fish for this port; the Polino has reached Quebec and is expected to winter there. Her cargo was much wanted, and as we write, the weather being mild, some efforts are being made to have her sent up her. If she stays, at Quebec part of her fish cargo will be sold there and the rest distributed over the country. Green cod has been in very good demand here at rather improved prices. Herrings have again gone out well this week principally to the French wholesale city

trade; some lots have also been placed at outside points. Stocks now are very light in first hands. Of the quantity still on the wharves about 1,200001,300 bris are still unsold but the rest have been bought and it is said they are being accumulated in few hands. In fish oils we hear of large seles and atocks are light and are being concentrated. No stocks are accumulating in Halifax as the States are free buyers. Very little, if any, new oil is coming here from Halifax. For really sweet straw seal as high as 40c is wanted.

FUEL.—Supplies of anthracite coal in the hands of some dealers are light and prices are held firmly. Prices to householders are unchanged at \$7 per ton for stove.

FLOUR AND GRAIN -The flour market has been quiet and easy with buyers not inclined to-operate, hoping for a decline. The recent break in the west has caused holders to be more liberal, and producers have rushed stocks forward, fearing a continuance of low prices for a time. Stocks here have accumulated, partly owing to the stoppage of ship-ments to the lower ports. At the close wheat in Chicago seems to be pointing higher, and brokers are advising their customers to buy on breaks. Corn does not seem to have Wheat in sight and affoat much support. is 60,031,000 bushels, an increase of 70,000 with a week ago, of 707,000 with two weeks ago, of 3,057,000 with three weeks ago and of 5,229,000 with a year ago. Wheat in Chicago on this week was active and stronger, and prices advanced 1c@1½c, closing at 1.03½ Dec, 104½ Jan. 1.09½ May. Corn was weaker Dec, 1041 Jan. 1.09 May. and declined &c. The imports of breadstuffs into the United Kingdom, for the week, show an increase of 18,000 qrs. wheat, a decrease of 3,000 corn and an increase of 50,000 brls of flour. The English markets were dull and inactive, and wheat and corn cargoes were very heavy. It is evident that Great Britain is getting more than enough at present. Canadian peas are quoted at 5s 11d.

GROCERIES .- There are very few points of importance this week, business being quite dull. Sugars are higher abroad in producing countries, especially in Brazil, but refiners' prices here are the same. The tone on all sweetstuffs is a firm one. In teas there has been little life, but previous consignments are being well reduced, and the future of the market points upward. There has been some enquiry for nuts. Grenoble walnuts sold to the trade at 121c@13c. A lot of Sicily filbeats was placed last week at 83c, and 91c is now being asked. It is said that the shipments of Japan tea to this continent are five million pounds less than those of last year. London sugar cables are : Java cargoes affoat. 168 9d; beet quiet at 13s 41d; cane firm. Fair refining, 138 6d.

GREEN FRUITS, &c.—As mentioned last week in a separate article thousands of barrels of apples were frosted at this port while awaiting shipment. These are offering for sale here at 75c a barrel. The final shipments of the season are given in another column. Winter apples are worth \$1.50\(\omega\$1.75 in carlots as to quality, Retail prices \$2\(\omega\$2.50. 



Prices are unchanged and are very firm and so soon as present stocks are exhausted must advance considerably, but it is evident that we must depend principally upon the local trade and that at present western houses can undercut this city as far, east as Kingston. Warrants in Glasgow are cabled at 418 5d. 7 No. 3 iron in Middlesborough is at 33s 9d. London November 26.—Spot tin, £100.28 ed ; 3 months tin, £101.18s; market st-ady; Ohili, bars, spot, £78; Chili, bars, futures, £72.10s; G.M.B. copper, £78; market steady; soft; S, anish

LEATHER AND SHORS.—This is a very quiet season in these lines. Leading shoe houses are still stock-taking, and are doing scarcely anything in consequence. English trade is

almost at a standstill for the same causes. Prices in England still show a margin on Canadian exportations of buff, split and sole. The leather men have also been taking stock. A pretty fair December is looked for. Shoemen/working for jobbers, at any rate, are likely to be busy. A round lot of No. 1 B A sole recently sold at 22½c, and a smaller quantity of No. 1 ordinary at 20c. There have also been a few large sales of splits.

RAW FURS .- The market for raw furs is quiet at the revised quotations given in our prices current. No. great slir is expected in the near future. The chief points in the situation were outlined in a lengthy article last week.

Woor. - Business in both domestic and foreign wool has been good. Only a week's supply of domestic was said to be on the market and most of this was taken. Prices are higher; for the time being in the States, but this does not affect prices here. Expect. ing a change in the tariff. American manufacturers allowed their stocks to run down. The week after the election the sales at Boston were eight or nine million pounds, while ou a general average they run from two to three millions weekly. Some fair lots of Cape have been sold at 13½c@16½c, and Australian within the range of 16c@20c The mills throughout the country have been operating quite freely for some little time having got numerous orders ahead for manufactured
