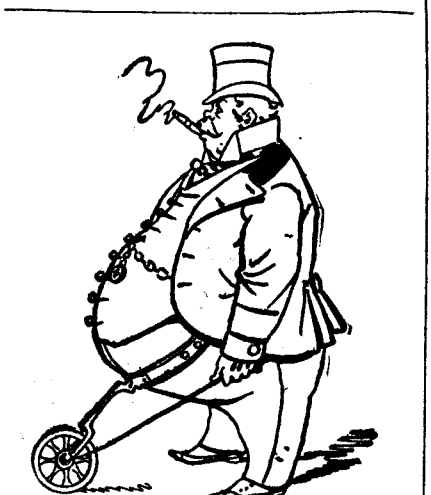

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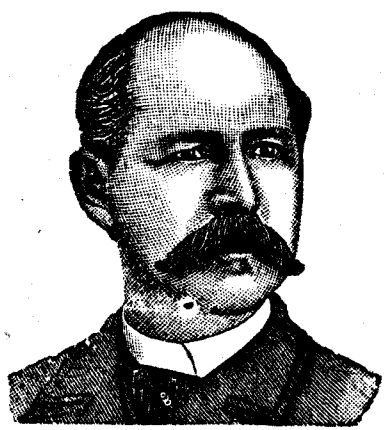

THE Jesuit Fathers connected with St. Francis Xavier's church, New York, give a record of 125 conversions to the Catholic faith during the past year.

A BELL was blessed and placed in the Rosenkrans church, Copenhagen, recently, which is said to be the first to ring out from a Catholic church in Denmark since 1535.

THE picture of the "Old Woman who lived in a shoe" will not be on exhibition at the World's Fair, Tom Greenway having arranged to supplant it by his side-show.

BUFFALO, N. Y., is to have a new and elegant College for priests, the projectors being the Order of the Oblate Missionaries of the Immaculate Conception.

It is reported that a great number of French Canadians are returning from the New England States, and that they will now settle in the Northwest.

MONSIGNOR M. Decelles was consecrated Bishop of St. Hyacinthe, Que., on Thursday, March 9, in the presence of nearly 350 prelates and priests. Archbishop Fabre, of Montreal, officiated.

THE archdiocese of Chicago, which has long felt the pressing need of a seminary for the education of its own priests, has taken the first step towards securing such an institution.

It is reported that a Dutch Protestant who was recently converted to the Catholic faith while on a visit to Lourdes has presented the sum of 3,000,000 francs to the bishop of Tarbes for the completion of the parish church of that famous place of pilgrimage.

THE Catholic Temperance congress will convene in Chicago on the morning of June the 8th and will close its session in the evening of the following day.

A book by Cardinal Manning, a posthumous work after the manner of the seventeenth and eighteenth century essayists, is about to be published. It is a book on "Popularity," "Vanity," "Honor," "Critics," and like topics.

THE colossal statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary, made of wood and covered with copper, seventy-five feet high, was placed in position on the top of Bonsecours church, Montreal, on Friday last.

THE average number of patients treated in the hospital for last week were eighty-five, of which fifty were males and thirty-five females. Thirty-nine out-patients were also treated during the week.

THE department of public works, Ottawa, has awarded the following contracts: Court house at Regina, to Charles Willoughby; post office fittings at Vancouver, to F. W. Hart; officers residence at Victoria, B. C. quarantine station, to Geo. McFarland; quarantine hospital, B. Sherbourne, Victoria.

THE Church of the Immaculate Conception was crowded to the doors on Sunday evening last, when Rev. Father Cherrier delivered a most interesting and eloquent sermon on the blessings to be derived from devotion to the Blessed Virgin. Owing to want of space we regret being unable to reproduce the sermon.

CAPT. O'PHELAN has received from John C. Rooney, 24 Rutland square, Dublin, a note, dated April 8, acknowledging the receipt, through Hon. Edward Blake, M. P., from the Winnipeg Home Rule association, of £23 6s 11d, by Justin McCarthy, M. P., Thomas Sexton, M. P., and John Dillon, M. P., trustees. The captain prizes the document, and talks of getting it framed.

CHRISTOPHER Columbus' twenty-foot statue of bronze, was mounted on his thirty-foot marble pedestal which stands on the lake front at the foot of Congress street last Tuesday. It was formally unveiled Wednesday. The figure is said to be the largest bronze figure in the United States and, with its pedestal, represents an expenditure of \$40,000.---Northwestern Chronicle.

EXPRESSIONS of the most sincere sorrow were heard on all sides Friday when the news of U. S. Consul Taylor's death was passed around and soon flags from many buildings were placed at half mast. Among the number were the Hudson Bay store, the C. P. R. offices, the provincial buildings, the post office, city hall and a number of wholesale houses. Instructions were also received by Colonel Villiers from Minister Bowell to have all flags on Dominion offices hoisted at half-mast out of respect to the late consul and to keep them flying until after the funeral which took place on Monday last.

ON Friday last, at the conferring of degrees in McGill college, Montreal, Norman W. Trenholme, Q. C., dean of the faculty of law delivered the opening address in which he announced that in future lectures would be given in the French language as well as English, and examination papers prepared in the same tongue, as the authorities of the university felt more and more the absolute necessity of familiarizing their students with French. Although Trenholme did not say so, it is stated this new move has also been determined upon to give French Canadians a chance of enjoying the opportunities found in McGill for a first-class legal training.
