Enemy Lost Zeppelin In Attack on Libau

KINGSTON OFFICER ON NILE PROMOTED

Major W. B. Leslie Named Lieut.-Colonel—Serves on Staff With Australians.

C. P. R. ACTION BLAMED

Reeve Donaldson Objects to Closing of Small Railway Stations by Company.

Special to The Toronto World. KINGSTON, Ont., Jan. 26.—A fact which speaks well for Kingston in these war times is that there remains less than one per cent. of last year's taxes uncollected out of a total of \$300,000.

W. J. McIlroy, 48, a prominent citizen, is dead. He resided here all his life.

Word was received of the promotion to the rank of lieutenant-colonel of Major W. B. Leslie, R.E., now serving as A. A. and Q.M.G. on the staff of General Sir William Birdwood in Egypt. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. William Leslie of this city.

Thirty recruits in the Divisional Engineers unit have all been equipped and are now quartered in the cereal works waiting for the order from Major H. T. Hughes to leave here for overseas service. The men will probably be taken over by Sergeant-Major Black, and will be trained first in England and later in the south of France.

Nelson S. Truax is seriously ill at the home of his daughter in Bay City, Mich. Mr. Truax is 97, and the doctors hold hope for recovery. He is one of the few veterans of the Patriot war of 1837-40, and took part in the battle of the Windmill. He was a prisoner for many weeks in old Fort Henry, Kingston, now used to house alien enemies of England.

That a protest should be entered against the Dominion Railway Board for closing up small stations on the line in order to curtail expenses during war times was the declaration of W. J. Donaldson, the newly elected chairman of the Frontenac council, at the inaugural meeting of the council this afternoon.

Reeve Donaldson lives in Palmerston Township, where he is reeve, and he says that already one small station has been closed in his township, and he understands that other is also to be closed. He said that the railway realized big profits during good times and during the hard times should bear the burden. The C. P. R. line from Kingston to Sharbot Lake, formerly known as the Kingston and Pembroke railway, was honored by his township for treason. He is another reason why Reeve Donaldson makes a protest against the action of the company. He recommended that the council take action, and will press the matter.

GIFTS OF ROCKEFELLER TOTAL QUARTER BILLION

Son Gives Testimony Before Investigators of Philanthropic Foundations.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., today told the United States Commission on Industrial Relations, which is investigating the great philanthropic foundations and the causes of industrial unrest, that he felt justified in placing the amount of money his father had devoted to philanthropy as a quarter of a billion dollars.

FORMER JUDGE ARDAGH DIES AT AGE OF EIGHTY

Veteran Barrie Resident Presided Over Simcoe County Courts for Thirty Years. Special to The Toronto World. BARRIE, Jan. 26.—One of Barrie's oldest and best known residents died today in the person of John Anderson Ardagh, late senior judge of the County of Simcoe.
