

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

# LEAVING THE PROVINCE.

To His Excellency SIR PEREGRINE MAITLAND, K. C. B. Lieutenent Governor of the Province of Upper Canada, and Major General Commanding His Majesty's Forces therein, Sc. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We the undersigned, Magistrates, Clergy, and other Inhabitants of the District of Newcastle, in congratulating your Excellency on your recent elevation to the Government of our Sister Province of Nova Scotia, are constrained to acknowledge that our sentiments of unfeigned satisfaction at this mark of His Majesty's favor towards your Excellency, are checked by feelings of deep regret, that the connection which has so long subsisted between us is now about to be broken.

We have witnessed much in your Excellency's administration to assure us that the welfare of this fair portion of His Majesty's dominions has engrossed your earnest care and active exertions, while the test of experience and time declares how successfully they have been applied. Nor are we without causes of equal regret, in the prospect of your departure from this Province, in the loss of your Excellency's valuable example afforded us in our private walk as a Christian and a Gentleman.

Although the tongue of calumny (for the most worthy are not exempt from its maledictions) has attached accusations to the public career of your Excellency, and although the rashness of political zealots may have deluded the unwary into an unjust belief of their truth, we beg leave to proffer to your Excellency the acknowledgement of our conviction, that your desire and labours have been to merit the approbation of your Sovereign and to advance the interests of this Province.

Our beloved Monarch to whom we owe and feel the affection of grateful subjects has evinced the strongest mark of confidence in your Excellency, by appointing you to a higher trust and a more exulted charge. While this testimony of His Majesty's approbation declares that your Excellency's past services in the field of glory are not forgotten: it manifests also, that your Civil Services are as well appreciated.

That this flourishing portion of His Majesty's dominions, may escape the evils which the base intrigues of a turbulent faction would bring upon it, we believe, to be your Excellency's earnest wish and prayer. And we beg leave to assure your Excellency, that we will struggle against the dissemination of their delusive doctrines, by unaltered affection for our Constitution and determined loyalty to our King.

We entreat the Almighty's blessing on your Excellency and your amiable family, and pray that you may experience in every land the hearty affection and sincere good wishes which the loyal and the worthy amongst the subjects of His Majesty in Upper Canada so generally and so justly entertain.

Answer to an Address of the Inhabitants of the Newcastle District, presented to Lieut. Governor SIR PEREGRINE MAITLAND, on the occasion of His leaving the Province.

GENTLEMEN,

The Address from the Magistrates, Clergy, and other Inhabitants of the District of Newcastle is received by me with very much pleasure; and I am much indebted to you, Gentlemen, for your kindness in attending to present it in person.

I beg you will in return convey my assurances that the duties of any situation that may be committed to me by my Sovereign, will never prevent my feeling the most anxious solicitude for the happiness and prosperity of Upper Canada. After a long administration of this Government, it is truly gratifying to me to receive from so large and respectable a body of the people a manifestation of friendly feeling so warmly and kindly expressed.

When I assumed the Government of this Province, I could not but consider it my obvious duty to pursue that course which appear-

ed to me best calculated to promote your true interest, and to maintain against every encroachment the excellent Constitution which it is your happiness to enjoy.

I was never so unmindful of the experience afforded under all forms of Government, and in all Countries, as to imagine that I could secure the applause of those persons whose designs were inconsistent with those great objects—but I contented myself with the assurance that the approbation of my Sovereign, the satisfaction of my own conscience, and the gratifying acknowledgements of the virtuous and intelligent, must attend an adherence to the right course. I have therefore persevered, as I was bound to do, through evil report and good report, and I take my leave of you and of this Province, with the reflection that I have sacrificed no principle to the vain hope of appeasing the clamor of the unreasonable—that I have laboured much and anxiously to procure peace and security for those who have been artfully misled to defame and suspect the measures of my Government. It would be a scource of deep and painful regret, if at any time your happiness as a people should be found to be diminished by a departure from the principles of the British Constitution, that such a departure could be traced to any act done or suffered by me while I had the honor of representing my Sovereign amongst you.—To be unable to cherish this reflection, would in my mind, be poorly compensated, by having purchased the silence of evil tongnes from whose attacks no man in a public station can procure an exemption by honorable

For the people of this Colony I shall ever entertain the most sincare regard. I have constantly represented them to His Majesty as deseserving His utmost confidence and care; and when I observe the munificent Grants and the extraordinary exertions devoted by the Mother Country to your improvement and protection, I am happy in the belief, that my representations have not been doubted or disregarded.

I have particular pleasure, Gentlemen, in comparing the present state of your District with the appearance it wore ten years ago. I pray that your prosperity may increase, and that you may enjoy it in tranquillity.

To His Excellency Sir Perforing Maitland, K. C. B. Licutenant Governor of the Province of Upper Canada, and Major General Commanding His Majesty's Forces therein, &c. &c. &c.

We His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the undersigned Clergy Magistrates, and other Inhabitants of the District of Gore, understanding that your Excellency is about to retire from the

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Government of this Province, are desirous-previous to your departure-to offer our congratulations upon His Majesty's increased confidence in your Excellency, in promoting you to a situation next to the General Government of the British North American Colonies: and to express to you the high sense which we entertain of your Excellency's conduct as Lieutenant Governor of this Province, which has been blessed with so many marks of the fostering hand of the Parent State since your Excellency has presided over it.

We have hailed with grateful feelings the beneficence of the best of Sovereigns in the various imperial grants so auspiciously made to secure to us and to our posterity, the proud advantages of British Subjects, as well for the purpose of fortifying our frontiers as for opening and improving our internal communications: in which we recognize your Excellency's favourable representations to His Majesty's Government, on those subjects so intimately connected with the true welfare of this Province.

We are not unmindful of the great improvement in this Province since your Excellency's Administration of its Government, in laying open to actual settlement, so many Townships, which were previously so many fellow subjects from the Mother Country.

We are also sensible that your Excellency's Administration has always been marked with that mildness which Religion and virtue inculcate; and we are satisfied that it has been your Excellency's constant desire to administer equal and impartial justice alike to all His Majesty's Subjects.

We beg to offer you our assurances of unfeigned respect, not only as the Representative of our beloved Sovereign but as a Soldier and a Christian; and to Lady Sarah Maitland, whose examplary piety and domestic virtues commands our highest admiration; and wherever your Excellency and family's lot may be cast, our best wishes are, that you may enjoy happiness and prosperity.

In regarding the possible effects of misrepresentation, I have never ceased to declare to His Majesty my readiness and my wish at any moment, or in any manner, to account for every act of my Government; and if this opportunity of explanation has in no instance been presented, I must take it for granted, it is because it has in no instance been thought necessary.

I have great pleasure, Gentlemen, in reflecting upon the present very improved state of this Colony, and in observing the extremely rapid growth of this Town. I pray earnestly and sincerely that your welfare and your happiness may continue and increase.

I thank you for your very kind congratulations upon the appointment which I have recently received—and you must permit me to add the thanks of Lady Sarah Maitland to my own, for the friendly wishes you have expressed, and to assure you that we shall always hold in grateful recollection our intercourse with the Inhabitants of the Town of York.

# MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

Being apprised that your Excellency has been promoted to the Government of Nava Scotia, we cannot permit you to depart hence, without some expression of feeling, by which the Loyal Province over whose destines you are now to preside, may form some judgment of the way in which your services have here been estimated. The present we consider as a peculiarly appropriate time for the expression of our sentiments.—Your Excellency has now nothing to bestow, and we of course nothing to expect; it will therefore be impossible for the most fertile minded asperser of your Excellency's

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administration, to impute to us other motives, than those of the purest disinterestedness,—of the most perfect attachment to your Excellency's person and government.

For ten years we have lived under the mild and equitable administration of your Excellency-for ten years we have witnessed. with the attention of men having a deep interest at stake in the welfare of the Province, the unwearied exertions of your Excellency for the advancement of its prosperity, and the happiness of its people—and although we have during this period not unfrequently heard of oppression, of misrule, of public wrongs, and private grievances, we believe they have existed only in the imaginations of men, who, either to attain popularity, or to gratify some less laudable propensity, endeavour to infuse into the public mind a spirit of hostility to the existing authorities of the Country. The people feel. (notwithstanding the industry of the discontented and the disaffected) that they are living in the perfect, the undisturbed, unfearing possession of every blessing of our enviable Constitution .- "They sow in hope, and reap in gladness."-They arise with the smiles of the morning and lie down beneath the chadows of night "uone daring to make them afraid."-They see the Country once an uncultivated desert, now unfolding its fertile bosom; and by the abundance of its productions, their toils are compensated, and their wants supplied. They witness also the many and important operations which are progressing for the improvement of their internal navigation; and whilst they proudly anticipate the day, as almost at hand, when the once isolated Barque of the Western Lakes, shall proudly swell its spreading sails upon the bosom of the ocean, bearing the productions of their farms to distant lands, they cannot help thinking (notwithstanding all they have heard to the contrary) that under your Excellen. cy's administration, the Province is rising to great commercial, and agricultural importance. It is therefore impossible that we, who are likely to derive so great advantages from the measures recommended and adopted by your Excellency, and entertaining as we do the highest esteem for your Excellency's private character could now abstain from assuring your Excellency, that we deeply regret your departure from this Province.

Permit us therefore to bid your Excellency a grateful and affectionate farewell; and believe us when we say, we shall ever feel as happy to hear of your political advancement as we have always been of your domestic happiness.
