LONDON, May 18. - In the course of a statement in the house of commons today concerning the postoffice appropriations, Postmaster-General Samuel announced that he had arranged to obtain some control over cablegram rates from now on by the insertion of a clause in the licenses of cablegram companies, giving the government power to protest against excessive rates, and, in cases of dispute, to refer the matter to an impartial tribunal. Sharp Criticism in House of Lords of Supineness of Government in Failing to Safeguard Interests of United Kingdom — Haldane Talks Free Trade.

LONDON, May 18 .- The government was sharply criticized by the Earl of Selborne in the house of lords this evening for what he termed "their extraordinary supineness" in falling to safeguard the interests of the United Kingdom in the American-Canadian reciprocity agreement. The Earl referred to President Taft's "very remarkable specin," and declared that when Mr. Taft said the annexation talk was bosh all accepted the president's word: nevertheress the agree-ment formed a precedent capable of very large extensions. It was the first time in the history of the empire that one part had obtained better terms from a foreign country, than had the United Kingdom, and the step between receiving and giving better terms was a snort one. UNDERGROUND RIVER IN TEXAS.

It is maintained by geologists that Texas has the greatest underground river in the world. It is thought that of the al miles wide, sweeps across New several streams, such as the Guada-

lupe and others, is obtained.

Wells sunk recently in the northwestern part of this state and at places in Mexico strengthen the theory that such an underground stream exists. It is a well known fact that in the vicinity of Tucumacari, N.M., and points south of that city, fine flows of points south of that city, fine flows of artesian water are obtained at a depth of eight hundred feet. Recently while sinking wells in search of oil in the northwestern part of Texas living water was struck at about the same depth. At other points northwest to San Antonio fine flows of water have been struck at even less depth. The proof that this is a stream flowing underthat this is a stream flowing under-ground in the same direction as the Rio Grande is emphasized by the fact that the wells sunk north and south of a certain belt of country extending to the northwest have failed to find water, altho going to a greater depth.

SHORT CROP OF CATTLE

Over 800 cattle have been delivered on the two markets this week, all of which with the exception of about 800, which went for export, have been taken for home consumption and feeding purposes. Amongst the 80 exporters were 272 States steers, shipped and sold in bond. This was the second consignment of States cattle, which goes to prove that the Canadian market is better for cattle, as well as sheep and lambs. The cattle being shipped in bond did not have to pay duty, therefore we have, for fwo weeks, had a taste of the much talked of reciprocity, as far as the export cattle are concerned. Readers of The World will have noticed that these cattle, like the lambs, are better finished than the bulk of our Canadian cattle, being fed on corn and as a result nearly all of them both weeks sold about like per owt, higher. Another feature of the cattle situation was the best heavy buying of many of the best export cattle on sale, for feeding on grass, by farmers and dealers, especially in Western Ontario.
