HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

JACK DODDS WAS NOT HAZED BY CHILDREN

Boy Was in an Ordinary School-boy's Fight—His Condition Still Critical.

HAMILTON, May 18.—(Special.)—It has been learned that the circumstances surrounding the illness of young Jack Dodds have been greatly exaggerated. It was alleged that Dodds received injuries in a fight with schoolmates, which caused his present illness from brain fever. This, however, has been found to be entirely untrue. The boy did have a fight with one other boy at the Stinson-street school, but it was such a combat as is common among school boys, and according to the evidence which has been obtained, Dodds was only punched a few times by the other boy. Principal Richardson of the Stinson-street school says that hazing is not practised by the pupils of the school, and that nothing more serious than the usual detraction is indulged in by the boys there. The condition of young Dodds is still critical.

TRIED HIGHWAY ROBBERY

Such is Serious Charge O'Neill and Cowell Are Facing.

Joseph O'Neill and George Cowell appeared before Judge Denton in the sessions yesterday afternoon, charged with assaulting Horace O. Ellins, with intent to rob him, on May 2 last.

P. C. John Stewart told the court of the attempted robbery and the cross-examination was unable to shake his story.

Ellins said on the night in question he was on a Dundas-street car and the prisoners appeared to want to be friendly with him. When he got off the car the prisoners followed him and attempted to rob him on Brock-avenue. They knocked Ellins down and at the crucial moment the policeman made his appearance and placed the prisoners under arrest. O'Neill stated in the witness box that he had been drinking and acknowledged he had punched Ellins, but denied he had attempted to rob him.

After the addresses of counsel Judge Denton adjourned the court till 10 o'clock this morning. His honor refused bail.

WOMEN WILL GET VOTES WHEN MAJORITY SO ASK

Hon. I. B. Lucas So Assures, While Deprecating Militant Methods Used.

The Hon. I. B. Lucas addressed the ladies' branch of the Centre and South Conservative Club yesterday afternoon in a speech on the subject of the proposed Reciprocity Agreement with the United States.

He declared that the club was the pioneer of a movement which he was convinced would spread throughout the Dominion and he hoped to see the day when the women of Canada would take an active part in the political life of the country. He said that people often called politics a game, but it was more than a game, for it had to do with the very life of the nation. It would be a sad day when the people had become too engrossed in the material development of their country to pay attention to that kind of politics.

Mr. Lucas did not feel in sympathy with the militant suffragettes (appliance), but that did not mean he was altogether opposed to the women's franchise. When a majority of the women in Canada showed themselves in favor of it no government, whether Conservative or Liberal, could ignore it.

In introducing Hon. Mr. Lucas, Mrs. Arthur VanKoughnet, who occupied the chair, said she was glad to welcome the distinguished parliamentarian, to show the club how much the Conservative party, both in the provincial and federal houses, had done towards opposing the Reciprocity Agreement. She said she hoped the ultimate overthrow of the pact would set an example nationally to Sir Robert Borden and his cabinet.

Mr. Lucas gave a very lucid statement of the arguments raised against the reciprocity treaty by the Conservative party's opponents. He raised the question of the national policy of thirty years ago and offered to the United States for free trade in national products. He said that the situation of the two nations had entirely reversed during that time.

"Canada, thirty years ago," said the speaker, "was a sparsely populated and agricultural country, there was no industrial life and naturally wanted access to the United States market, then very prosperous. To-day the Americans have used up all their natural resources and are beginning to look with an envious eye to the Canadian market."

Mr. Lucas said that now Canada's own markets in the large Canadian cities were superior to those of the United States. He said that the products of the farm and the mill were consumed in Canada, and twenty per cent goes to England. A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Lucas by the ladies' branch, after which A. E. Donovan, M.L.A., introduced the meeting briefly.

SEIZED FIGHT FILMS

But Defence Claims Law Doesn't Prohibit the Pictures.

He declares that the pictures are illegally seized and that his client is under a \$10,000 bond for their safe return to the United States.

ONUS OF PROOF IS NO LONGER ON RAILWAYS

New Conditions in Regard to Killing of Stock by Amendment to Railway Act.

OTTAWA, May 18.—(Special.)—The debate on Hon. George P. Graham's amendments to the Railway Act was resumed in the commons this morning. It lasted all afternoon and into the evening. It was a fight on behalf of the farmer. The clause prescribing new conditions in regard to the killing of stock by railways, and which provides that railways are responsible for animals slaughtered, unless the farmer places his gates open, was strongly opposed by A. E. Lancaster, Arthur Meighen and other members of the opposition, who argued that the striking out of the provision fixing onus of proof on the railways would leave the farmer in a worse position than he is in to-day.

Mr. Lancaster said that it would be better to allow the law to stand as it is.

Mr. Graham, in reply to a question, said the proposed clause had been drafted by Chairman Mabee of the railway board. It was along lines suggested by the farmers' associations. He read a letter from James Bower, president of the Canadian Council of Agriculture, approving the clause, and remarked that Judge Mabee was not disposed to err on the side of the railway. The clause was, however, disposed to go too far the other way. Mr. Lancaster declared that he had certainly favored the railways in drafting this clause. As for the farmers' associations, they were like an 8-year-old child, who would allow its guardian to sign away a farm to get a dollar with to buy candy. The clause gave them five cents' worth of protection and took away \$5000.

Eventually the clause was struck out.

AID FOR WORKING WOMEN

Large Gathering in St. James' Square Presbyterian Shows Interest.

A large gathering of Presbyterians assembled in St. James-square Church last night, and listened with much interest to the addresses of speakers introducing, as it were, the new work among women which the Presbyterian board of moral reform is inaugurating. Dr. A. S. Grant was in the chair, and he told of a self-supporting young woman who had donated \$500 to the cause.

Rev. Dr. Shearer spoke on the white slave traffic, and explained the earnest need of the work which was being set on its way. Mrs. W. G. Hanna, president of the Presbyterian women's council of Toronto, and Miss M. G. Ratto, both spoke. Rev. T. H. Rodgers, moderator of the Toronto Presbytery, and S. McDonald, chairman of the deaconess board of the general assembly, both commended the work. W. J. McBretnay sang artistically.

ALL-RED SYSTEM OF STATE-OWNED CABLES

Resolution Adopted by Royal Society of Canada Will Be Sent to Members Imperial Conference.

OTTAWA, May 18.—Officers were elected at the concluding session of the Royal Society in the Carnegie Library this afternoon and a number of resolutions passed; one, moved by Sir Sanford Fleming, advocated the all-red system of state owned cables. The new officers of the society are as follows: President, Dr. W. F. King; vice-president, Dr. W. D. Leseur; honorary secretary, Duncan Campbell Scott; hon. treasurer, Lawrence M. Lambie.

A memorandum prepared by Sir Sanford, approving of an imperial system of state owned cables on British territory and recommending an alternative route from Australia thru the Indian Ocean, instead of depending on one line, was adopted and will be sent to every member of the imperial conference. In the report of the section on English literature was included a suggestion that the minister of mines be asked for permission to establish the library of the Royal Society in the new Victoria Museum. A motion for the establishment of a Canadian National Library was also moved, and passed.

A resolution of regret was passed at the termination of office of Earl Grey, and another at the retirement from the Royal Society of John Reader of Montreal, a well known newspaper man.

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TWO CIVIC CAR LINES WILL COST \$505,000

City Engineer Estimates Cost of Operation at 31.7 Cents Per Mile.

The city engineer has prepared estimates of the city's new car lines on St. Clair-st. and on Gerrard-st., which gave the cost of the whole as \$505,000. The St. Clair-ave. line will cost \$280,000, including the rails, car barns and all accessories. The estimates for maintenance are built on a 10-minute service from 5 a.m. to 12 p.m. and at night a half-hour service. The cost would be 29.2 cents per mile at 31.7 cents per mile. It would be necessary to carry 823 passengers to pay expenses, at 5 cents the ride; 4538 at 4 cents and 518 at 3 cents. The area served is put at 1000 acres, and the population 4000.

FOUND BODY IN RIVER. Unidentified Man Had Been in Water About Three Months.

Niagara Falls, Ont., May 18.—(Special.)—George Clark to-day found the body of an unidentified man floating in the river near Queenston. The body is that of a man about forty-five years of age, five feet nine inches in height and stoutly built. It had evidently been in water about three months and had but little clothing on.

The trouble arose thru misrepresentation of the letter he had written to the president of the International Pressmen.

The action of the civic council as regards Capt. Leslie and the intake pipe, came in for a severe rebuff. The council endorsed the motion of Delegate Watt asking that the congratulatory letter organized labor should be sent to Capt. Leslie, and a copy sent to the board of control.

STRIKE CLOUDS CLEARING. It looks now as if there will be no strike among the hydro-electric line men. These men have agreed upon certain concessions from their original demands, and if they are agreeable to the city, the work will, of course, go on as usual. At first the men wanted an increase of four cents an hour, but now they are willing to concede to 2.4 cents. They met the city men yesterday afternoon, but as no agreement was arrived at, another meeting will take place to-morrow afternoon. It is hoped by the electrical commission that the trouble will be amicably settled then.

Earl Grey Here To-day. His Excellency Earl Grey and party will arrive in the city from Ottawa this morning and will be entertained at government house. In the afternoon he will attend the U. C. C. annual sports.

Died in South Africa. KINGSFORD, May 18.—(Special.)—Arthur H. Middlemass, only son of Hon. J. Rollo Middlemass, formerly of Montreal, died at Johannesburg, Transvaal, South Africa, as the result of an accident. He was for three years a science student at Queen's, was a Rugby and hockey player and figured in several Queen's teams.

Charged with Abduction. BRANTFORD, May 18.—(Special.)—Edward Griffin, who is alleged to have represented himself as a Toronto detective, in order to entice away from her foster home, Mabel Williams, a 15-year-old Norway girl, was charged with abduction in the police court here to-day. Griffin called at the house of J. C. Black Cairnsville, and is alleged to have secured the girl by stating that he had a warrant for her arrest. He was arrested later with the girl in St. Clair-st. and is asked for \$1000 American capital. The case was adjourned.

PEACE SUNDAY

"Peace beginning to be!" wrote Sir Edwin Arnold twenty years ago in the beautiful lyric that closes the epic which he hoped to set beside "The Light of Asia." Probably more has been done in this score of years to accomplish the amity of the nations than in any century in historical times.

The wars of to-day even have peace for their object. The military arm bears a constant's truncheon, and civilization fears the irruption of an eastern barbarism more than its own possible loss of self-control.

Anglo-Saxondom is hardly of two minds on the great issue of arbitration and will so importantly a settlement. All expressions of public feeling on this question are of importance, and the united efforts over the world to set next Sunday aside as Peace Sunday will be observed in Toronto in Massey Hall on the afternoon of that day.

CAPTAIN LESLIE'S COUP

There is an old saw about children and another class of persons not being permitted to see half-done work. The city council should take a day off and cogitate upon it. It seems lamentable that matters depending on experience and skill are considered and settled by men without either experience or skill.

SALUTING THE FLAG

METHODIST CLERGYMAN ATTACKS BASIS OF UNION

Cutting Comments on Presbyterian and Congregational Bodies—No Temere Resolution Passed.

MONTREAL, May 18.—Church union and the "ne temere" decree of the Roman Catholic Church were the chief subjects of discussion at the meetings of the Montreal Methodist Northern and Southern Districts here to-day.

He cited cases of Presbyterian elders siding with liquor dealers against the Northern District; the meeting of which was held in St. James' Methodist Church, headed an attack on the proposed basis of union of the Congregational, Presbyterian and Methodist denominations.

The "ne temere" decree was discussed and the following resolution passed: "As a Methodist district, we recommend the church to take such action as may lead to that uniformity in the marriage laws of the Province of Quebec as will prevent any ecclesiastical body whatsoever from having any power over the validity and civil status of marriages performed by members of any church duly authorized by license, and irrespective of the church relations of contracting parties."

The question of church co-operation as opposed to union was also raised; it seemed to be the general idea that while church co-operation was proving successful wherever tried and most notably in the mission fields of the Canadian Northwest, it should only be a step towards the accomplishment of a greater and more-to-be-coveted end.

MORE MONEY IN FRUIT

Eastern Ontario Farmers Go In Strong for Apple Raising.

CORNWALL, May 18.—(Special)—Farmers in this part of Ontario are waking up to the fact that there is more money in the growing of fruit than in the dairy business, to which most of them have devoted nearly all their attention in recent years. AUSTRIAN RAILWAYS.

In Austria and Hungary, according
to Professor Logan G. McPherson,
lecturer of Johns Hopkins University,
who was seen in this city recently,
there has not been a great deal of
canal construction, but turbulent riv-
ers, which in earlier days caused much
damage by erosion and deluges, have
been walled into well regulated chan-
nels and are now available for naviga-
tion. But the railroads are now the
most used means of transportation.

The first steam railway in Austria

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has been a resident of a section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, may apply to the Dominion Lands Agency for Sub-Agency for the district.

On certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead about a farm of at least 30 acres, wholly owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section of his homestead. The pre-emption may be made at any time after the expiration of six months in each of six years from date of homesteaded land. Rea and Foley-O'Brien Succumb To Heavy Selling from New York

Porcupine Issues Under Pressure, But General List Holds Its Own--Cobalts Show Definite Firmness.

World Office. Thursday Evening, May 18. New York was reported to be selling the Porcupine again today, and the Toronto market reflected this condition in the action of some of the big issues. Rea and Foley-O'Brien were under special pressure on what was taken to be special selling in the American metropolis, and both of these issues show a tendency to succumb under the realizing movement. It is currently reported that a determined effort has been made by a New York clique to depress Rea stock, and the action of this clique certainly conforms with this idea. To-day the shares dropped to the six dollar mark, and while a recovery of 15 points was made in the last hour, the selling movement was still in evidence. It is not known on what grounds the New York interests are basing their action, but it is believed that a considerable amount of short contracts have been assumed during the last few days. Traders here predict that the short interest will be severely punished when the true nature of affairs is realized. Hollinger sold higher on the morning board, the shares touching \$12.05, but this price was hard to hold, and later on quotations dropped back ten points, at which point the closing bids were made. Doble sold around \$3.20, or about yesterday's low figure. Foley made a new low record at \$1.30, and was offered at that price at the close, with bids 4 points lower. The cheaper Porcupines showed a firm trend, and while the selling was pronounced at certain intervals, prices held about unchanged from the previous day. Vipond sold at \$6 early in the day, but was off over a point at the close. The Cobalts were not influenced by the action of the gold stocks, and values of the silver issues were in the main decidedly firm. Timiskaming gained over a point at 7 1/2, and was bid for more at the close. Green-Meehan moved up another fraction, and other Cobalts were about on a par with yesterday.

ADJOINS PENNY VET Eldorado Has Elevation and Promising Veins.

Asoci. A. Gort, writing to The Toronto News from Porcupine, under date of May 14, says: The Eldorado adjoins the Penny Vet on the east line, and has almost the same formation.
