

# GANG OF THREE BAD MEN

ONE CENT

Sensational Attempt at Robbery Was Frustrated by a Plucky Nineteen-Year-Old Youth.

THEN MURDER WAS ATTEMPTED.

One of the Desperadoes Was Overpowered and is in Jail-Others Are at Large.

Hamilton, Feb. 25 .- (Special.) -The north end of the city is wildly excited to-night over one of the most sensational attempts at robbery that ever took place in the history of the city. A gang of bad men with revolvers struck the town about dusk and put on a Wild West act.

One of them shot at two men, and it was no fault of his that he did not kill them. He is in the cells at No. 3 Police Station. He is a young fellow of about 23 years of age. He gives the name of Matthew Thomas, and his address as New York. He is a stranger to the police, and they have no means of knowing whether he is telling the truth or not. His pals made their escape. The police are searching the city and the district for them, and as hey have good descriptions they have opes of capturing them.

At Littlewood's Hotel The scene of the gang's operations is Thomas Littlewood's hotel, at the corner of Barton and Bay streets. It is only a few blocks from the Stuartstreet police station. The man with the revolver fired, and the ball grazed the lad's head, crashed thru the door behind him and buried itself in the wall.
