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## CITY'S STREET RIGHTS RESTORED

### ORIGINAL AGREEMENT WITH RAILWAY TO GOVERN

### LEGISLATORS DENY ANYTHING WRONG

**Mr. W. K. McNaught's Amendment to Bill Which the Private Bills Committee Rejected is Carried, After Some Criticisms of the City Authorities and Press.**

### NO "LOBBY" TO INFLUENCE SO THE MEMBERS SAID.

Toronto had restored to her by the legislature yesterday the rights—what ever they were—which existed under the original agreement between the city and the railway company.

This was accomplished by W. K. McNaught, who moved a resolution notice of which had been given. Some slight verbal changes which he desired to make were considered out of order by Premier Whitney, but at Mr. McNaught's request Mr. Gagey moved as an amendment to the resolution.

"Notwithstanding anything contained in the act passed in the fifth year of the reign of Her Late Majesty Queen Victoria, and chapter 89, and intituled 'An act to incorporate the Toronto Railway Company and to confirm the agreement between the corporation of the City of Toronto and George W. Kieley, William Mackenzie, Henry A. Everett, and Chauncey C. Woodworth,' and notwithstanding any judicial decision interpreting the effect of the said act and the said agreement, it is hereby declared, that it is and always has been the true intent and meaning of said act, that the rights retained by and secured to the Corporation of the City of Toronto by the said agreement as to the control and management of the streets of the said city, and as to establishing and laying of the said city may be from time to time recommended by the city engineer and approved by the city council have not been and are not affected by the said act, but said rights remain and are as set out in the said agreement scheduled to the said act."

The point made by most of the speakers was that the resolution was that rejected by the city in the private bills committee, and that it was against the city's attempt to construe the agreement. Premier Whitney favored the clause and complimented Mr. McNaught on his speech.

Hon. Mr. Foy supported the city in a fine speech, and Hon. A. G. Macdougall acknowledged the original agreement, the city's position. Herber Leinow felt that he had been misrepresented, and declared his support of the clause.

When the Franchise Was Turned Over Mr. McNaught described the events of 1881 when the city bought the old street railway company from Kieley Bros. It was debated whether it should be run as a public enterprise, and it was finally leased to a syndicate of Messrs. Kieley, Mackenzie, Everett and Clark for 99 years from Sept. 1, 1891, and ending Aug. 31, 1921.

The original agreement was drawn up with great care under the late Mayor Clarke, and to assure the safeguarding of the city's rights Samuel Blake, K.C., was employed by the city to look after the drafting in conjunction with the city solicitor of the day—C. W. R. Biegar.

IN THE AGREEMENT THE RIGHT OF THE CITY TO THE CONTROL OF ITS OWN STREETS WAS VERY CLEAR. Mr. McNaught read clauses 11 and 14 of the contract to demonstrate this. The first clause was a part of the contract and the act also read section 12 of the agreement.

Somebody's Carelessness. The clause in the act respecting this was not worded in exactly the same way as in the agreement, and it was impossible to explain just how this was. Possibly the city solicitor, seeing that the city was not one of the contracting parties to the transaction (albeit it was an interested party) did not give it the close scrutiny it deserved. Possibly he relied wholly on the agreement, feeling that it really governed the matter. At all events the clause in the act being governed by the clause in the agreement, it probably appeared safe for the city.

Mr. McNaught read the following letter from Mr. Biegar:

98 Kendal Avenue, Toronto, April 9, 1908.

"My dear sir, I have your letter of this date asking, first, Was it contemplated under the agreement of Sept. 1, 1881, that the city should surrender to the Toronto Railway Company this right of control over the city streets?"

"No, neither by the city, nor G. W. Kieley, William Mackenzie, H. A. Everett and C. C. Woodworth, called in this agreement 'the purchasers.'"

"Second: Did the company during your term of office, ever even claim that the right of control over the city streets had been transferred from the city to the company, under the agreement?"

Ans: "Never in any shape or form. Yours (Signed) C. W. Biegar."

## That Pest, the Lobbyist

Premier Whitney "declared himself" on the question of lobbying, during his remarks on the city's bill in the legislature yesterday.

For 15 years, he said, he had heard the motives of hon. members aspersed.

Nothing had been going on in an improper sense, but there had been too many attempts in the past two or three weeks to influence legislation. The tendency grew on people to ask all sorts of legislation which was quite wrong.

He purposed that before another, with the assistance of some experts, he would have some regulations formulated concerning this matter. There was a fear that the legislature itself should become a disorganized body. Some thought one thing should be done, some another. It was all right. There was nothing wrong, it was argued.

He might be allowed to say that the conduct of business on both sides of the house was not what it ought to be. Primarily, he stated, he was to blame for that more than anyone. He had kept an informal record and found that some public bills had been called between 25 and 35 times and each time they were asked to stand. The federal house was more strict, and he was sure the members would agree with him that there must be a change.

As Mr. MacKay had said, there was no such lobby here as in the States. Lobbying meant pervading the corridors to influence, positively or negatively, the course of legislation. The people might be honest in themselves, but their methods were not proper.

J. Fleming. Mr. Blake had been quite satisfied that the city was entitled to control the streets in the private bills committee Mr. Blake was very careful not to say what was his opinion. Mr. Fleming would now try to make it plain that there was no control, but Mr. McNaught believed Mr. Fleming was honest at the time in working for the city and tried to get an agreement in its favor.

It was considered when the act was passed by the legislature that the original agreement governed and the city was entitled to a right to say on what streets the cars should run. This is proved by the fact that as late as 1903 the railway company attempted to lay down a line on Avenue-road against city orders, and did this at midnight of July 3. Had they believed they had acted in a right manner they would have acted in daylight.

Friction having arisen between the city and the company, eleven lawyers were employed by the latter and they discovered that by founding a claim on the clause in the act passed by the legislature, the company might set up a claim to exclusive powers over Toronto's streets. This would give them a fighting chance in the court.

On going to law, the case was tried three times in Canada. Justice Anglin gave the judgment in favor of the city. The case was then carried to the Ontario's highest court, the Ontario Court of Appeal, where it was again sustained by four judges, Justice Sedgwick dissenting. Thus in the trials eight were for the city, and one against.

A Mistake to Be Corrected. The case then went to the privy council, whose judgment was based on the act of the legislature and did a great injustice to the city.

This being the case, Mr. McNaught made it plain that the legislature had a right to correct its mistake and restore to the city what should be an inalienable right.

Hon. Mr. Foy thought it quite within the province of the house to do this when he had spoken in committee, and Mr. McNaught said that he was not in the least surprised that he had been misrepresented in the British decision, but merely asked to do an act of justice in restoring what they had inadvertently taken away.

Hon. J. Foy was only surprised that the city was so moderate in its demands.

He covered the entire United States, and the capital cities of Europe, and even the prominent cities of South America and Australia, Asia and Africa came in for a fair share of attention.

## U.S. RAILWAY MEN AMAZED AT THE RUSH

Settlers by Thousands Headed for Canada From Northern States—Seeding Under Way.

WINNIPEG, April 10.—A special from St. Paul, Minn., says: "The volume of traffic from the States into Canada, at present has astonished even those railway officials who had expected a revival of the 'American invasion.'"

The Chicago Great Western is bringing a ten car train in from Iowa, the Burlington, two from Nebraska, and one from Iowa, and the Rock Island one from Kansas and Oklahoma.

The destinations of these families are said to be Northern Saskatchewan and Alberta. The Battleford and Prince Albert districts in Saskatchewan are largely favored, but "anything north of the line" seems to be the cry.

Planting Outfits Arrive. "NORTH PORTAL, April 10.—All trains arriving from the south are heavily loaded with settlers and land-seekers. They are bound for all parts of Saskatchewan and Alberta, and are a good class of settlers. A number of steam plowing outfits are coming in daily.

Seeding Under Way. "WINNIPEG, April 10.—Reports from various parts of the province received to-day state that in many places grain was being put in, and work has commenced on the land in the greater part of Manitoba. The warmth of the last few days has cleared the land of snow.

Portage Plains on Wednesday, continued yesterday, a number of the farmers taking advantage of excellent weather to put in the first of their crops for the season of 1908. At several points on the Estevan line of the C.P.R., including Estevan, Lyleston and Carleton Place, the grain is being sown, and the reports add that with present conditions seeding will be in full swing by Monday.

Applications for help keep coming into the Dominion and provincial immigration departments in great numbers, and places can now be found without delay for over 1000 experienced hands. There are that many farmers who are applying for help, and can be compelled with, owing to lack of man, and the applications keep coming in by every mail.

BACK, EMMA, BACK! Winnipeg Wants Oliver to Keep Anarchist Out.

WINNIPEG, Man., April 10.—(Special)—Emma Goldman is not coming back to Winnipeg again if the civic authorities can help it. After her recent visit here, which ended in her rather sensational disappearance across the boundary under an assumed name, passed off without outward incident, the authorities fear that her propaganda may be upsetting to the foreign element in the city, and have consequently requested the minister of the interior, Hon. Frank Oliver, to take steps making it impossible for the woman to return to Canada from the States.

SIR FRED'S SUCCESSOR. Rumor Names Hon. G. H. Murray for the Position.

HALIFAX, N.S., April 10.—(Special)—There is a report in circulation here that Hon. G. H. Murray will shortly retire from the premiership of the province and will succeed Sir E. W. Borden as minister of militia and defence.

FOUR YEARS FOR PERJURY. Woman Witness in Druce Case is Given Severe Punishment.

LONDON, April 10.—Miss Mary Robinson, one of the witnesses in the Druce case, was to-day sentenced at the Old Bailey to four years' penal servitude for wilful perjury.

NOT FOR SALE. Principal Matthews of the St. Albans Boys' School states that the school site is NOT available, even if the school be desired, for the new technical school.

END OF THE SESSION. The legislature adjourned at 1 o'clock this morning and will resume at 11 a.m. It is expected that the session will be ended before 5 p.m. Hon. Mr. MacKay having promised to facilitate this.

## Alleged Store Burglar Is a Parole Prisoner

George Slack Identified as Man Who Assaulted and Robbed Mrs. Davis—Two Others to See Him.

Slack was committed to Kingston Penitentiary for 12 years in company with one Fred Chambers for assaulting an old couple on Victoria-street in 1897.

Slack, who is a parole prisoner, released from Kingston Penitentiary, where he was serving 12 years, is charged with assaulting Mrs. Davis and robbing her on the night of March 20, when a man entered the store, which was full of customers, asked to use the phone and when the store was empty struck down Mrs. Davis and secured \$20 from the till made good his escape by the front door. Mrs. Davis was brutally beaten.

Mrs. Davis was taken to the Board of Trade Building by McKinney. They went up in Slack's elevator and then came down with him. The woman positively identified him and he was taken into custody.

Slack had served eight of his twelve year sentence when he was paroled in 1907.

Jacob Haskins, 650 Yonge-street, who was beaten at his store the same night that Mrs. Davis was assaulted and just an hour before, will see Slack in an effort to identify him as his assailant. Mrs. Davis was also assaulted by an unknown man in a similar way to which the assault was made on Mrs. Davis April 1, will also see Slack.

Slack was committed to Kingston Penitentiary for 12 years in company with one Fred Chambers for assaulting an old couple on Victoria-street in 1897. The men beat them with an ax and the crime came close to being murder. Since Slack's incarceration until this winter no similar crimes have been committed in the city. Slack was allowed out on parole in 1907 by reason of ill-health.

He has not been working steadily of late, being only employed on the moon relief at the Board of Trade Building. Mrs. Davis made immediate identification as soon as she saw Slack and was quite sure that another man, of somewhat similar appearance to him, was not the man.

J. W. Curry, K.C., is retained to defend Slack, who is held without bail. A strange coincidence is that Mr. Curry, during his tenure of office as crown attorney, prosecuted Slack when he was sentenced to the penitentiary. The penalty for robbery with violence, which is the crime with which Slack is charged, is life imprisonment. His defence will be an alibi.

STARTED THE FURNACES. Orangeville's Splendid Cement Plant Down to Business.

ORANGEVILLE, April 10.—(Special.)—The Superior Portland Cement Company started its furnaces to-day, and will be running night and day until next January with a staff of about fifty men. It is one of the best cement plants in Canada.

**ALBERT GULP KILLED BY FALL FROM A SCAFFOLD**

Plank Broke His Neck and Death Followed Instantly—General News of Hamilton.

HAMILTON, April 10 (Special).—Albert Gulp, 31 Spring-street, was killed almost instantly this afternoon. He had put up a scaffold to the second story of a new house on the south side of Main-street, east of West-10th-street, and soon after he stepped upon it and it gave away. After he alighted on the ground a heavy plank fell across his neck, killing him almost instantly. The dead man was about 40 years of age, and leaves a widow. His brother was working on the same job, but got one saw the accident. An inquest was opened to-night by Coroner Baugh.

A couple of Italians picked out a spot near No. 4 police station this evening for a fight. In a few minutes they were surrounded by a posse of constables. The police were not quick enough to prevent the Italians from drawing knives. Both the fighters were arrested. The names they gave are Sposito Matray and Joseph Cocchi. At 4:30 the firemen were called out to the T. H. & B. roundhouse. A small shed adjoining the roundhouse was burned.

Roasted Reaves of Detroit. The text of the majority report of the conciliation board has been given out. In addition to finding that the street railway was justified in dismissing John Theaker, the president of the union, the arbitrators roast R. Reeves, Detroit, the International Union official who conducted the case of the union, saying that his actions were "unjust and unwarranted." The arbitrators also find that the company that they could not have arranged a compromise with their men and retain their self-respect.

Ralph Ripley, general agent of the Canada Life, has resigned.

An Interesting Romance. Mrs. Mary Ann Trevelyan, who has relatives in this city, is being courted by a young man from Detroit. They were married in a few days, completing an interesting romance. As young people they became engaged at Falmouth, England, but quarrelled, and Mrs. Trevelyan married. After leaving his home for the first time, Mr. Trevelyan's husband died a short time ago, and after a lapse of 40 years Mrs. Trevelyan proposed again by letter and was accepted. They met a few days ago at Halifax, and will be married on their arrival in Detroit. They are 65 years of age and his bride five years his junior.

**SUCCESSFUL TEACHERS AND HOW THEY'RE MADE**

Canon Cody's Address at Annual Convention of the Toronto Teachers' Association.

Speaking to the Toronto Teachers' Association, which opened its annual meeting in McGill Hall yesterday, Rev. Canon Cody outlined nine points of "power in teaching."

The teacher should maintain an infallibility in the eyes of the scholars, he said, never acknowledging defeat when confronted with a puzzling question. To ensure proper discipline the teacher should have at once the confidence, respect and fear of the pupils. Teachers should study themselves and make sure that they possessed the faculty of imparting knowledge. Praise and blame should be judiciously employed, and authority should be exercised without brute force.

The power of awakening the mind was a most essential factor in successful teaching, and the successful teacher should command the highest respect, because the monotonous nature of the work required a constant battle against easy-going tendency.

The teacher should also create a moral atmosphere here her personality. In Canada there were no extensive gross sins, but there were sins of the sordid nature, sins of the spirit, materialism, lying, dishonesty, profanity and sloth. Children should be made to appreciate the dignity of virtue.

President Geo. Deacon reviewed the financial statement, giving great credit to the executive, which had so successfully managed the business of the year to have a balance of \$133,447 to the association's credit. Some \$33,225 was subscribed to the new hospital fund. It has not been necessary to draw upon the relief fund. It was noted that a number of teachers had not contributed to the relief fund last year. The roll showed 723 members in good standing.

The following notices of motion were brought before the convention: Chas. G. Fraser: That a grant of \$3 be made to the public school department of the O.E.A.; that the nomination of officers for the T.T.A. by other societies is not considered in the interest of the public school teachers of Toronto.

Geo. M. Ritchie: That a copy of the 1907 proceedings of the Ontario Educational Association be placed in each city school.

Dealing with Toronto's government, in addressing the senior fourth grade in Ryerson school, Controller Spence said that the committee which the council committees which meddled with administration would go out of existence. Some men were in council because of the salary controversy. Responsible business men who discreetly avoided public office were being blamed for the mismanagement of the city by those who were in council for selfish motives.

The association concludes its sessions today.

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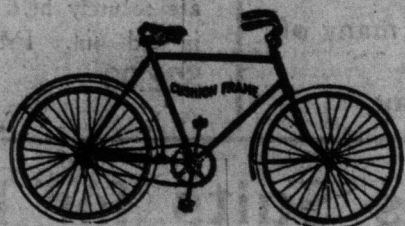

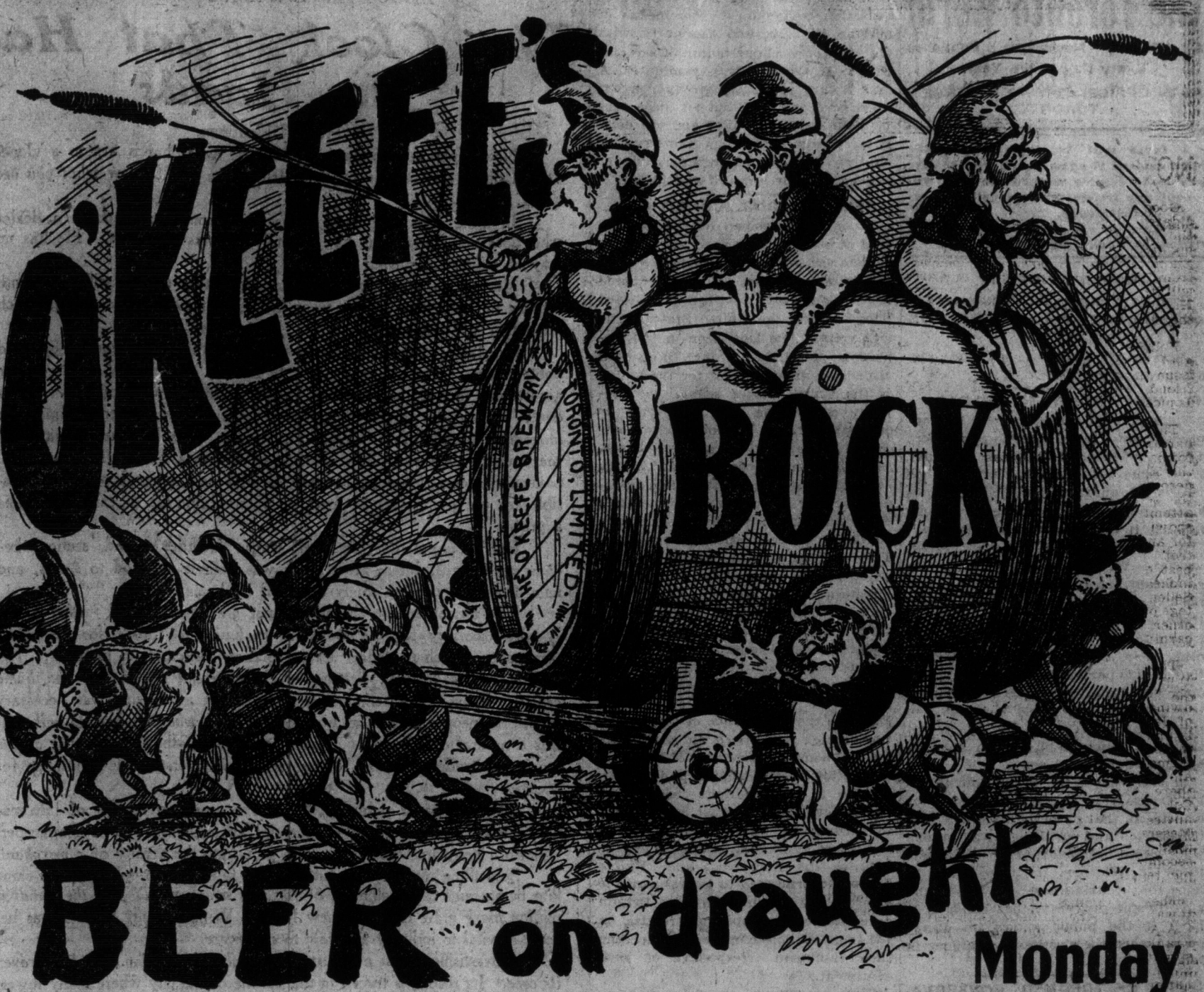

DOESN'T NEED IT. Premier Whitney NEVER needed a campaign fund other than TRUST IN THE PEOPLE.

WHY HURRY TO HELP? Taking into consideration his expressed convictions while in opposition, willing friends of Premier Whitney have some reason to be startled that he should guarantee a William Mackenzie proposition so largely, without making it an issue to the people.

As the Mackenzie need so urgent, was the Whitney desire to appropriate as a precedent, that the legislature could not close without the one merging into the other? Is Col. Hugh Clark's inability to follow his leader indicative of other than a long and firm conviction that in this particular matter his leader does not focus progressive Conservative policy?

In other days, the dying hours of a legislature saw many things done, or attempted, that properly aroused public indignation and suspicion. And no one was more indignant and suspicious than Mr. Whitney. Is it too much to hope that a string has been tied to the government guaranty, that can pull it back if the public shows its disapproval when the election campaign gets hot?

DUTY OF TORONTO CONSERVATIVES. When the wise man of old prayed that he might be given neither riches nor poverty he uttered a petition political parties might with advantage adopt, slightly altered, as their daily prayer: for it to be a hopeless minority be an evil an over large majority is far from desirable.

The board of control yesterday received a detailed statement from the Salvation Army, showing the manner in which the civic funds have been used in relieving distress.

Between Jan. 23 and April 4, \$11,350.06 has been expended in this way in the district west of Bathurst-street and that east of the Army, which territory was allotted to the Army at the conference of Associated Charities.

It was stated that 609 families received aid, some of them as often as ten times, the commodities supplied being groceries and coal.

The Army expended \$425 in furnishing relief to single men, 7410 of these "lonelies" receiving meals, while, in order to prevent needy persons being dispossessed by landlords, \$493.50 was expended.

The board of control yesterday discussed the question of the date at which the new park commissioner should take up his duties, but was unable to come to a decision.

Controler Harrison said Mr. Southworth wished to begin on May 1. Controler Spence complained that the civic departments were deserted at the noon hour, save for minor employees, so that citizens who dropped in on business could not get their wants attended to.

Industries Commissioner Thompson has received from the Sunbeam Traction Lamp Company an offer of \$50 a foot for 100 feet of land on Dufferin-street, south of the Toronto Carpet Company. The company offer to erect a building worth \$80,000 and employ 400 hands.

If Conservative candidates, A and B, are to be chosen by conventions good and well, but let these conventions be fairly called and the delegates freely chosen by Conservative electors, not selected by executives or cliques more or less self-appointed.

NEW IMPERIAL CONDITIONS. That the statesmen of the motherland are alive to the changing circumstances of the empire is the most conspicuous feature of the proposed arbitration treaty between the United Kingdom and the United States. The treaty itself has long been in contemplation, and indeed would have been already in existence but for the action of the United States senate, the majority considering that its terms as originally drawn conflicted with their constitutional rights and privileges.

Britain on its side has also introduced a new condition reserving the right before concluding an agreement under the provisions of the treaty to consult any of the imperial states that may be concerned in the matter in dispute. It would not be easy to exaggerate the importance of this departure, which is at once an acceptance by the home government of the new conception of the empire, and a notification to other nations that its internal developments must be taken into account by them.

Quite recently a prominent German newspaper attacking the present British Government for its protectionist affinities declared that if it had sincerely held to the obsolete principles of free trade it would have hastened the settlement of the tariff war between Germany and Canada. "It would," the German critic proceeded, "have persuaded Canada, as well as Australia, New Zealand and British South Africa to abolish their respective differential duties in favor of British products, such differential duties being incompatible with the principles of free trade."

The World's Paper Trade Review, 20th March, published in London, England, says: A royal commission to look into the pulp wood question is being strongly advocated. The Ottawa district pleads for representation, should a commission be appointed, and W. H. Rowley, head of the E. B. Eddy Company, is suggested as a commissioner.

This is good news for the farmers, settlers and wood cutters; in fact for the whole of the Ottawa Valley, for Mr. Rowley has given a lot of time and earnest attention in trying to get as much as possible for the sale of Canada's timber and wood, and knows the pulp and paper business from "the tree to the finished sheet."

Additional interest attaches to the appointment of a commission from the fact that a recent Washington dispatch says that H. Riddet, who voices the views of the United States newspapermen in their effort to procure cheaper paper, says that wood pulp and print paper will be on the free list before the end of the present session of congress, and that 98 Republican representatives have pledged themselves to carry the measure overhangingly.

It therefore behooves Canada to have strong, well-informed men to look after her interests in the matter of pulp wood and wood pulp and paper manufacturers, etc.

The Clock That Had No Hands

By Herbert Kaufman. Newspaper advertising is to business what hands are to a clock. It is a direct and certain means of letting the public know what you are doing.

In these days of intense and vigilant commercial contest a dealer who does not advertise is like a clock that has no hands. He has no way of telling folks what he's at.

He can no more expect a twentieth century success with nineteenth century methods than he can wear the same sized shoes as a man which fitted him in his boyhood.

His father and mother were content with neighborhood shops and bobtail cars. They were the best to be had in their day. They were accustomed to seek the merchant instead of being sought by him. They dealt "around the corner" in one-story shops which depended upon the immediate friends of the dealer for support.

As long as the city was made up of such neighborhood units, each with a full outfit of butchers, bakers, clothiers, jewelers, furniture dealers and shoemakers, it was possible for the proprietors of these little establishments to exist and make a profit.

But as population increased, transit facilities spread, sections became specialized, block after block was entirely devoted to stores, and mile after mile became solely occupied by homes.

The purchaser and the storekeeper grew farther and farther apart. It was necessary for the merchant to find a substitute for his direct personality, which no longer served to draw customers to his door. He had to stretch a bond between the commercial centre and the home centre.

Rapid transit eliminated distance but advertising was necessary to inform people where he was located and what he had to sell. It was a natural outgrowth of changed conditions—the beginning of a new era in the trade which no longer relied upon personal acquaintance for success.

The newspaper publisher, hitherto a gossip, a retailer of information, became a first aid to commercial advancement. The shopkeeper, hitherto a petty tradesman, began to grow into the dignity of a merchant.

Something more wonderful than the fabled philosopher's stone came into being, and the beginnings of fortunes which would pass the hundred million mark grew from this new force. Within twenty years it has become vital to industry as steam to commerce.

Advertising is not a luxury nor a debatable policy. It has proven its case. Its record is traced in the skyline of the city where many towering buildings stand as a lesson of reproach to the men who had the opportunity but not the foresight, and furnish a constant inspiration to the young merchant at the threshold of his career.

To Oust Postmaster Barfoot at Chatham. CHATHAM, April 10.—(Special).—Conservatives here think they see the details of a conspiracy on the part of the local Liberal machine to oust Postmaster Barfoot from his position. The scheme is to secure Mr. Barfoot's resignation and to place a prominent local machine man, who has no practical knowledge of postoffice work, in his place. It is said that the favorite upon whom the machine favours is a prominent business man who has been working the political wires for a great length of time.

GETTING TOGETHER.

Brantford Moves for Technical Education. BRANTFORD, April 10.—(Special).—The local technical situation was put on a definite basis at a special meeting of the public, collegiate and technical school boards this morning, at which Inspector Leake of the education department was present. It was arranged each board would consider an extension scheme, and declare in favor of it by resolution. With their combined support the government will then be approached for a grant which the inspector promises will be made.

Delivered the Goods. R. E. Gregory has begun an action against John McLeod to recover \$238.06 for goods supplied to McLeod at the corner of Queen and Parliament-streets, Toronto.

Refused Application to Wind Up. The application of Robert John Quigley to Mr. Justice Clute in chambers, to wind up the W. J. Gardiner Company, with assets, was refused.

Must Answer the Questions. Application was made to the court to compel George Burnett of the Town of Durham to answer certain questions in connection with the local option bylaw of the Town of Durham. Judge Clute directed that the defendant answer, but limited the questions to be asked.

Breach of Promise. Mary A. Couch of Newcastle has instituted proceedings against William G. Penny of the same place for damages for breach of promise.

Money From Home. When the estate of James McKim of Orangeville, deceased, was partitioned, James A. McKim, who was entitled to share in the estate, was an absentee. The money was therefore paid into court until further order. McKim is now alleged to be in San Francisco. Upon application being made to Judge Clute, the same place for damages for breach of promise.

Issued Money Orders. An action has been begun by the Dominion Express Company against John Maughan & Son to recover \$136.15, the amount of certain money orders issued by the defendants.

Preferred Cornwall to Toronto. Brener Bros., cigar manufacturers, of London, have an action pending against P. A. Barnhart, a former hotel-keeper at Mills Point, and his wife, for the recovery of \$190 balance on certain goods sold them. Application was made on behalf of the defendants to Master-in-Chambers Cartwright to change the venue from Toronto to Cornwall. His lordship refused the application, and directed that costs should be to the plaintiffs in the cause.

The President Must Answer. Master-in-Chambers Cartwright has decided that E. S. Sharpe of Uxbridge must attend again for examination for discovery and answer certain questions as to the amount of development work done on a certain mining property. Sharpe, as president of the Cobalt Mining Company, is suing William J. Clute, a capitalist, of New York, and his wife, for the sale of 1,000,000 shares in the company.

Company to Be Wound Up. The application of Walter H. Prest to wind up the Imperial Cobalt Silver Mining Company was granted by the Hon. Mr. Justice Clute in chambers. The company was incorporated in January, 1907, with a capital stock of \$1,000,000, shares of \$1 each, of which it is alleged, \$70,000 have been paid up. Capt. John Tretloway and J. P. Fleming of Toronto are directors. J. P. Langley was appointed interim liquidator.

Lord Chancellor of Cambridge. CAMBRIDGE, April 10.—John William Strat, Lord Raleigh, was today elected lord chancellor of Cambridge University in succession to the late Duke of Devonshire.
